Lamb County Soil Conservation District News

The cooperators of the district that are planning to plant grasses this spring have already got their seed beds prepared and will be planting in a few days.

Blue panic grass on the Johnnie Graham farm, is east of Lum Chapel, that was allowed to seed and shatter has already come up and is about 2 inches high and looking good despite the dry conditions. The old blue panic has come out and is approximately 10 inches high.

Gerald Allison of the Pleasant Valley community is irrigating his blue panic for the first time this year. Gerald has about 10 acres, and last year he run 1 cow per acre all summer and it got away from the cows. He combined the seed and got 1200 pounds of good re-cleaned seed. This is a yield of about 120 pounds per acre and at the present price of blue panic seed the income from the seed is about \$79.80 per acre. This is not bad considering that he grazed 1 cow per acre all summer. Gerald seeded 1 pound per acre and watered it twice last year.

Blue panic is looking more and more like the grass that should be used on plots that can be irrigated only part of the time. It is a dry land grass and drought resistant but responds well to irrigation.

Vetch and winter peas are beginning to show a tremendous growth since the weather has warmed up. These crops very seldom make rapid growth during the winter months so in order to realize the most benefit from these crops it is best to leave them as long as possible.

T. J. Tollett of Olton planted rye and vetch between 130 acres of cotton and sorghum middles land August, and for the last two months has grazed 60 head of dairy cattle on it and the rye and vetch are about to get away from them. Even with the grazing the vetch will do the soil a lot of good.

The selected queen will reign over the Lamb County Cotton Industry and as a prize, she will receive the money collected on entrance fees.

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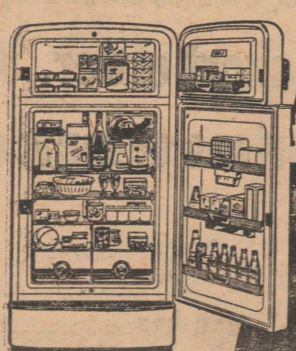

FARMS

The hot dry days have convinced many of the fellows that finally Spring is here and its cotton planting time. At least, many are operating under that assumption and have started planting this week.

To some, early planting is a regular practice and have heretofore done well by it. To many of the others it is a gamble seeking an early fall harvest. Early planting is an annual decision practically every farmer has to make. It is hashed over pro and con with its benefits and its drawbacks.

Early cotton usually means an early harvest, better grades thus better prices and can get hands to harvest more easily. Some of the difficulties with this thing of early planting is that it is quite often hard to get a good stand; the plants chill and are stymied for a while, weeds are more readily to get in the drill thus causing a greater expense in working out.

If it turns cool, which it often does, then a rewatering is necessary before replanting or else put cotton on land which you had not intended. So, after all, it's just up to the individual farmer; however, we understand too that its hard to keep the planter out of the field when the neighbor gets started.

The hay crop is getting started off quite well. Seems to us that the growth is faster and better this year than we have ever seen before. Some hay is due to be cut very early in May. To you fellows who will depend upon custom baler men to do your baling should speak early and get lined up with some man because it now appears that custom baler operators will be limited this year. Some who have been baling do not intend to operate this season.

Most all potato farmers have a good stand and the crop is growing off very good. This still looks like the year when spuds should pay off.

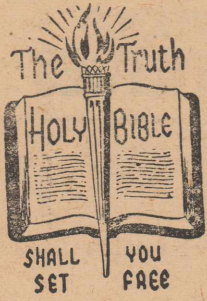
