Final Exams Start Monday

Olton High School students will take final examinations all day Monday and Tuesday morning, according to an announcement this week by J. A. Williams, high school principal.

Buses will take students home at noon on Tuesday, and no lunch will be served in the school cafeteria on that day, Williams said.

Buses will leave the school about 1 p. m. Wednesday to pick up students and will take them home again about an hour later after they have received their final report cards, he explained.

Two Olton Men Hurt In Crash

Leo Smith suffered three broken ribs and Earl Hysinger suffered a neck injury and a badly cut hand when Smith's car overturned between Lariat and Farwell early last Thursday morning.

Smith said they were about to pass a pick-up truck when a tire on Smith's 1953 DeSoto tudor blew out, causing the DeSoto to hit the back end of the pick-up and overturn one and a half times.

Smith termed the DeSoto "a complete loss." Only minor damage was done to the pick-up truck, and the driver was not injured, Smith said.

The two Olton men were treated at Memorial Hospital in Clovis, NM. Hysinger returned to Olton on Saturday and Smith returned Monday.

The accident occurred at 12:02 a. m. Thursday.

Sponsors Place Cash In Escrow For Paving Hillcrest Addition

Hillcrest Addition, with its promise of 144 new FHA homes, became almost a certainty Tuesday as its sponsors placed \$20,000 in escrow for paving streets in the project.

The escrow money was placed in City National Bank in Plainview by Jim Speer and Ben F. Smith.

Mr. Speer said it could be withdrawn only for pavement, curb and gutter in the new housing project.

Mr. Smith and Mr. Speer held a joint meeting with the city commission Tuesday and discussed plans for paving, curb and gutter in the new project with Wilton Thomason, Lovington, NM, paving contractor. The city commission also discussed street repair, paving and curbing with Mr. Thomason.

Present for the meeting was Ralph Douglas of Littlefield, city engineer.

Mr. Speer said he had called a meeting of property owners along West Ninth Street for the purpose of discussing the paving of that street from Main to the western outskirts of Olton.

The meeting will be held at 8 o'clock tonight (Thursday) at city hall. It also will be attended by the city commission and Mr. Douglas and Mr. Thomason.

Mayor G. H. Bley said anyone in town interested in paving should attend the meeting. It

was pointed out that better prices on paving, curbing and guttering can be obtained when a contractor moves in to do the city's paving and curbing and the job at Hillcrest than could be secured on a smaller job later on.

The city of Olton has filed an ordinance with the county clerk formally annexing Hillcrest Addition to the city. Mr. Speer said the plot now has complete approval of FHA.

Mr. Speer said plans call for pavement, curb and gutter in about half the project at the present time. He said total expenditure on paving and curbing will come to \$47,000 by the time the project is complete.

Mr. Thomason inspected city streets Tuesday but was hampered in his inspection efforts by the deluge of rain and hail which fell here Tuesday afternoon and evening.

Good Pitching Gives OHS Edge In Regional Play

The District 2-AA Champion Olton Mustangs rode the arm of Guy Granbery's four-hit hurling Monday afternoon to take a decisive 8-0 win over the Dalhart Wolves in the first of a scheduled best-two-of-three series for the regional championship.

The second—and if necessary, third—games were to have been played here this Thursday afternoon, but it appeared late Wednesday afternoon that wet grounds and continued rain would cause shifting the site to a neutral field, or possibly cause postponement until a later date.

Infield Lake

The entire infield at the Mustang baseball stadium was a lake of water late Wednesday afternoon.

Olton and 1-AA Champion Dalhart have until June 3 to wind up the playoff for the regional championship, Coach Turner has explained.

Monday at Dalhart, the Mustangs jumped away to a 2-0 lead in the first inning, added another in the fifth, and tallied five runs in a big sixth inning to take their 8-0 win.

Impressive Win

Granbery, a senior, was impressive in shutting out the strong Dalhart nine. He limited the Wolves to three singles and a double, walked two and struck out seven. Granbery pitched to only 27 in the seven-inning contest.

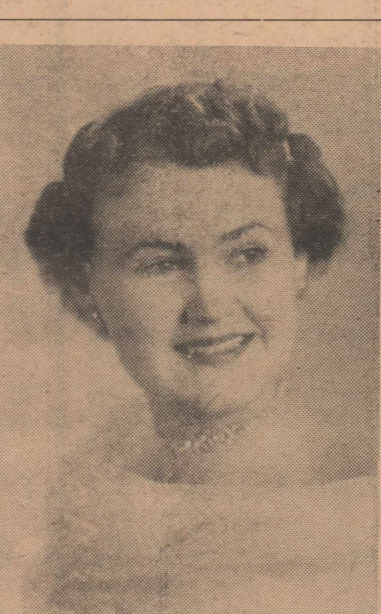

Deluge Filled Lakes Block Plains Roads

Twisters, rain and hail left a trail of havoc in their wake in this community Tuesday afternoon and evening.

Heaviest hail damage was reported southeast of town where stones fell "as big as grapefruit." The storm roared across the Ol-

The farm to market road south of Olton was closed Thursday morning. It was under water from a lake just south of the Paul Nafzger home.

The lake just south of Olton had climbed into the Consumer Butane installation. Water was up to the butane tanks.

Two houses were sitting in water in the Latin-American section.

Highway 70 was under water near Straw-Burrow Gin. Deputy Sheriff V. L. Smith said water was over the highway in several places between here and Plainview. Roads between Olton and Hale Center were closed. "A lot of roads will be closed if it doesn't stop raining," Smith predicted.

ton area a little after 4 o'clock Tuesday afternoon.

Property damage was extensive.

Gene Cottrell reported having seen a tornado in the Halfway area. Frank Mandrell said he saw a tornado in the process of forming over the Charles McLain home, 5 miles southeast of town.

The twister apparently never touched the ground with its swirling destruction. No tornado damage was reported.

Presence of tornadic destruction in the clouds was evidenced by the size of hail stones.

Charles McLain measured one-half inch stone which he said was 3/4 inches in circumference. "Some of them were as big as grapefruit," he declared.

Frank Mandrell lives in the same area as McLain. He said his family took to the storm cellar. "It was the biggest hail I ever saw. You can tell everybody that I was scared, Mandrell declared.

Picture windows at the Cottrell and Jack Allcorn homes were broken by large hail stones.

Here in town, hail was fine to medium in size. Guy Watson at Ben F Smith Grain Company recorded an additional 3.75 inches of moisture Tuesday evening and Wednesday morning. He said this brings the month's total to more than 8 1/2 inches.

North of town rainfall was not so heavy. B. C. Cooner, 14 miles northwest of Olton, said only .75 of an inch fell at his place Tuesday afternoon and Wednesday morning.

Gardens in Olton were badly beaten. Some auto windshields were hail pecked. Lightning struck and damaged the transformer at the number 2 city water well in the south part of town.

Meanwhile, farmers waited impatiently for dry weather to permit them to be about their planting.

MAIN STREET CURB AND GUTTER, WIDER PAVING, ARE VIRTUALLY ASSURED AS MONEY ROLLS IN

Curb and gutter and 80-foot paving for Olton's main street is virtually assured.

Close to \$7,000 has been collected from Main Street property owners here since Thursday night, and Chamber of Commerce President Basil Sherman says that collections will be virtually complete by this Saturday on the \$10,500 necessary to finance Olton's part of the project.

The curb and gutter project, which is being sponsored by Olton's Chamber of Commerce, got unanimous endorsement at last Thursday's C. of C. meeting. Property owners along the route proposed for improvement—Main Street from Highway 70 to the south end of Olton Memorial Hospital—began writing their checks to finance the project at the Thursday meeting, and money has continued to come in at a good clip this week, Sherman said.

\$2 Per Foot

Property owners are putting up \$2 as an escrow deposit for each running foot of property they own along the 8-block Main Street spur.

This money will be used solely to finance curb and gutter on both sides of Main Street. The Texas Highway Department—once assured that sufficient money is on deposit here for the curb and gutter—will assume all financial responsibility for 80-foot paving on the eight-block stretch, it was explained Thursday by W. H. Garrett, Texas Highway Department senior resident engineer from Littlefield.

Center Islands

Garrett said that 80-foot paving down Olton's main street would make possible concrete center islands along the stretch, assuring drivers of protected left turns and minimizing collision possibilities.

From Highway 70 to the south end of the hospital grounds is 3,000 feet. And with both sides of the street to be curbed and guttered at an estimated cost of \$1.75 per running foot, approximate total cost of the curb and gutter project is \$10,500. That is the amount which Olton must place in escrow before the project can be submitted through channels to the Texas Highway

Commission for approval, which is expected to be routine.

In One Contract

Garrett, who attended Thursday's Chamber meeting, indicated the state would let the paving job and the curb and gutter job as one contract to get the best possible price.

Right-of-way along the eight-block strip is 100 feet. According to present plans, the curb and gutter would be placed 10 feet in front of property lines, and 80-foot paving would extend from curb to curb. Garrett explained that the state would assume all responsibility for maintaining the paving.

The curb and gutter is expected to cost about \$1.75 per running foot. But property owners along the route are putting up \$2 for each running foot of their property to finance concrete valleys across all street intersections, as required by highway department regulations.

Parallel Parking

The city commission already has agreed to enforce parallel parking along the route when the project is completed. No defini-

te starting date has been discussed, but Garrett told the Thursday gathering that negotiations would "move right along nicely" once money for the curbing and guttering has been assured.

Sherman said yesterday that out-of-town people who own property along the spur have indicated their willingness to "go their part" on the project.

Under the arrangement whereby the state would let the contract, there would be no engineering costs to the city.

The city commission already has forwarded an official resolution to the Texas Highway Department asking for the eight-block improvement project, it was explained by Mayor G. H. Bley.

Main street property owners who attended the meeting expressed unanimous approval of the plan.

The weather seems to be the greatest concern to the Olton area during the week. Altho' the entire plains have been receiving some moisture, the city of Olton and its immediate surrounding area seems to be the more richly blessed (some don't desire the continued blessings).

The rainfall since last week's report has totaled an even 2" on our gauge thru Tuesday night, making a total of 7 1/2 inches during May. An estimated 1/2-inch has fallen this Wednesday morning (time of writing) and is continuing now.

Some of the near-by areas have received possibly more than Olton, especially the southeast and southwest sections from town, but as for the entire community the rainfall has been lighter and spotted. The Springlake area and the fellows north of the draw toward Hart have received much less.

The hail damage for Sunday night and Tuesday afternoon has placed all farmers on an even start again. All cotton crops in the area of Olton are considered completely ruined. Damage to hay and potato crops is undetermined yet. There will be some loss but is hoped the damage not too great.

The lakes appear to be at a higher level than we have seen in years. Much of the lake areas which have been farmed for the past few years can be marked off as far as farming this year.

A tornado funnel was sighted by many Olton resident Tuesday afternoon about 2 miles southeast of Olton at 6:05 p. m. The funnel appeared to remain about 2,000 feet of the ground and remained only a few minutes before being absorbed back into the following clouds above.

This week has been designated as National Mail Box Week. Sounds rather insignificant, but more we think of it, the more concerned we should be. The boxes to most fellows are a necessary evil. They are often torn down, shot up and always seem to be in the way. However, with just a little time and work they can be made an attractive part of the landscape. ONE BODY

"We sometimes hear people say that they can not understand the Bible alike. when they disagree about something the Bible says. It could be that some understand it, while others misunderstand it. Or probably all of them misunderstand it. When a dozen people understand the Bible there is no disagreement among them.

An example of this is Eph. 4:4, which reads: 'There is one body, and one spirit, even as ye are called in one hope of your calling.' A great number of people are reluctant to admit that there is one body. But Paul makes it plain that there is one body when he says, 'But now are they many members, yet one body' (1 Cor. 12:20).

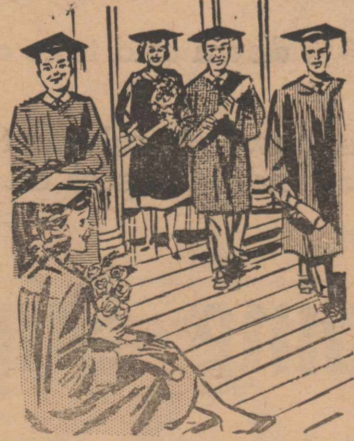
And this conclusion becomes more objectionable to some people when it is explained that the body is the church. Paul says, 'And he is the head of the body, the church; who is the beginning, the first born from the dead, that in all things he might have the preeminence' (Col. 1:18). This is not hard to understand, but it may be hard for many to believe.

In this connection two things are important. First, there is only one body. One in the Bible has the same meaning that it does in arithmetic. It never means two or more. Second, the body is the church. It cannot mean anything else. Paul plainly says that the body is the church. It is strange that some people will reject what the Bible states as a fact.

And Paul not only says that there is one body, but he says there is one God, one Lord, one hope. No one would believe it, if a preacher should say that there is more than one God, more than one Christ, or more than one heaven. Why disbelieve it when he says in the same place that there is one body? It would be no more unreasonable or unscriptural to preach a plurality of Gods, Christs and heavens, than to preach a plurality of bodies.

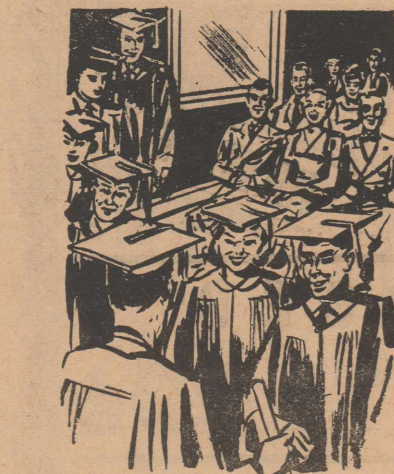

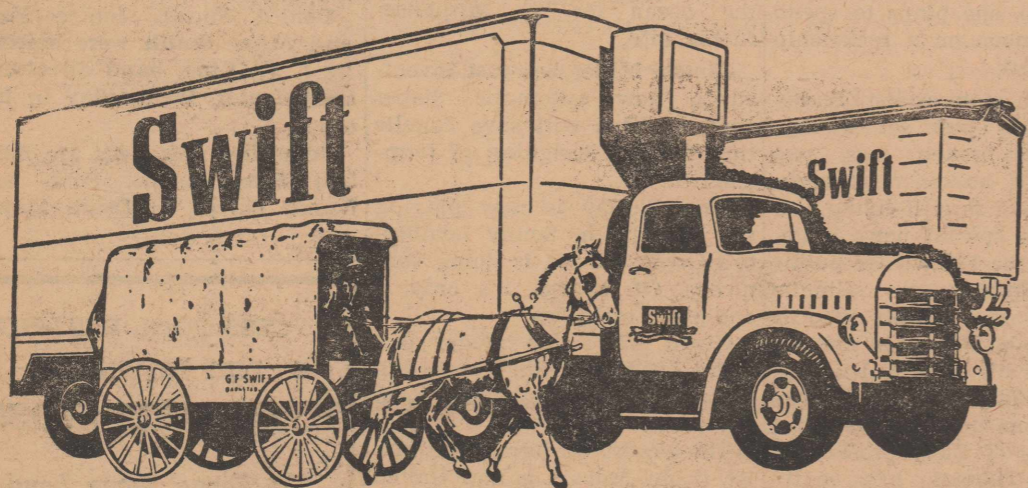
