## Mustangs Drop Cage Thriller To Canyon, 50-45

The Canyon Eagles, outscored in three quarters, helped themselves to a hot second period here Tuesday night which provided a sufficient cushion for a 50-45 cage victory over the Olton Mustangs.

Coach Lynn Hulsey's Eagles, who have lost only to Childress in four starts, trailed 23-15 early in the second canto, then poured in 15 points to go ahead 30-23 before the Mustangs could score again, and never again lost the lead, though the gap was narrowed to four points on two occasions late in the game.

Charles Neblett, sophomore forward, paced the District 1-AA Eagles with seven field goals and a pair of free throws for 16 points.

Senior guard Jimmie Priest topped Mustang scorers with 14 points, and Red Machen earned runner-up honors with 11 points. It was the all-around floor work of Max Kennedy, however, which kept the Mustangs in the game with the Eagles, who entered the contest as heavy favorites.

Coach Joe Turner's quintet outscored the visitors in the first, third and fourth periods but their game of catch-up fell short of its goal after the disastrous second quarter.

A pathetically small crowd, practically devoid of adult spectators, saw the game in poorly lighted Mustang gym. The Eagle junior varsity took a 39-31 decision from the Mustang B team in a preliminary game.

## Adopt Rules For Olton's Stock Show

Rules for the 1955 Olton FFA and 4-H Club Stock Show were adopted this week by the show's board of directors.

Jack Allcorn is president of the board.

The show is scheduled for Feb. 10, 11 and 12 of next year. Approximately 65 lambs, 25 breeding sheep, 50 barrows, 50 breeding hogs, 30 steers, 15 head of breeding beef cattle, 8 dairy animals, 25 poultry and 25 rabbits are expected to be entered in the show.

In the meantime, preparations already are under way for participation in the Fort Worth Fat Stock Show in late January and early February. Lambs, barrows and possibly some breeding animals will be taken to Fort Worth.

## LOTS BRING ALMOST \$100 EACH IN SALE

In one of the most spirited auctions so far, 52 Olton tax delinquent lots were sold Tuesday for a total of \$5,170.

The sale was held at Littlefield with County Sheriff Dick Dyer crying the sale. Highest price paid for a single lot was \$225 for lot 9 of block 139 which is located a block west of the Barton Prestridge home.

Approximately 50 persons, mostly from Olton, attended the sale.

Next sale of tax delinquent lots will be held the first Tuesday in January.

## ATTENDANCE CUP MISSING

Thirty-two second grade students were bitterly disappointed Tuesday morning when they entered their classroom and discovered their attendance cup missing.

The students won the cup for highest attendance during the second six weeks term. It has been sitting on the desk of their teacher, Mrs. Roy Hooper, to remind them of their achievement and to challenge them to keep up their good record.

But someone took the cup Monday after school.

Who could possibly have any use for a trophy such as this? Please return it to its rightful owners and winners.

Mrs. L. R. Goyne was fatally burned last Thursday afternoon in a fire that destroyed a small house near the Goyne home, 2 miles east of Olton on Highway 70.

Six other persons, including Mrs. Goyne's daughter, Iva Dell, also were burned. Three still were hospitalized early this week.

Mrs. Goyne was burned about 5 o'clock when a gas blast shook the small labor house a few feet from the Goyne's back door on the Chas. Reynolds place east of town. She died about 2:15 o'clock Friday morning in a Plainview hospital.

Hospitalized are Mrs. Jesusita De Leon, 48 years old, her daughter Dora De Leon, 11, and her son, Luis De Leon, 7. Two of Mrs. De Leon's grandchildren, Ricardo Guajardo, 7, and Mario Guajardo, 5, were less seriously burned.

The children were standing outside the building and were seared when it burst into flames. Miss Goyne and Mrs. De Leon were burned while trying heroically to remove clothing from Mrs. Goyne.

Mr. and Mrs. Guadalupe Guajardo, parents of two of the injured children, had made their home in the small house.

Escaping LP gas is blamed for the explosion. Source of the spark which touched off the blast is unknown. The stove in the house was supplied LP gas by a line running from a tractor tank through a gas cock, into a hose and thence to the stove.

Children are believed to have pulled the hose from the gas cock which was not equipped with a handle. A small Latin-American girl told Mrs. Goyne about the escaping gas.

Mrs. Goyne sent Iva Dell across the highway to Olton Butane Company's installation to get someone to help them turn the gas off. However, no one was there.

In the meantime, Mrs. Goyne tried to turn the gas off with a pair of pliers. While Mrs. Goyne was kneeling and working with the pliers the accumulation of gas burst into flames with a violent explosion which puffed up the solidly built roof of the building.

Mrs. Goyne was blown down by the explosion which closed the single door which had been used as an entrance. However, the explosion opened two other doors which previously had been nailed shut.

It was through one of these doors that Mrs. Goyne managed to make her escape.

Iva Dell and Mrs. De Leon managed to remove the burning clothing from Mrs. Goyne and dressed her in a robe. She was rushed to Olton Memorial Hospital in a hospital ambulance and was given emergency treatment. Later she was taken to the Plainview hospital.

The other injured also were given emergency treatment here.

Before the fire department arrived, a passerby who said he was from New Mexico backed the Goyne truck away from the burning building. Iva Dell was unable to find the car key, so the stranger pushed the family car to a point of safety.

The flames probably were the hottest ever fought by Olton's volunteer fire department. Heat from the blaze set fire to a rubber fire hose lying on the ground several feet away from (Continued on Page 4)

# Vote Renewal of Stadium Drive; Seat Sale Campaign Slated Tuesday

A community project aimed at sale of 600 reserved seats to finance a \$12,000 improvement plan for Olton Memorial Stadium will be renewed here next week with increased vigor, according to a decision voted Tuesday night by approximately 25 interested citizens who attended a meeting at the high school.

The drive, launched in early October, bogged down in late October after approximately 300 reserved seats had been sold.

Tuesday, Dec. 14, has been set aside as the day to seek completion of the reserved seat sale, and the approximately two dozen men who have the seats for sale will work in pairs on that day in a concerted effort to sell the remaining 300 seats.

## Important Program

The reserved seat tickets bear a price tag of \$20 for three years. Sale of 600 of these tick-

ets would finance a \$12,000 program aimed at construction of 1,110 new stadium seats and a dressing room-restroom addition on the west end of the band hall.

All of the reserved seats will be in the proposed new section, and will be situated between the 40-yard lines on the east side of Memorial Stadium, which will become the "home side" when the project is realized.

**QB Club Meeting**  
In connection with the decision to re-emphasize the importance of the reserved seat sale, Quarterback Club President Elmo Bryant has called an important meeting of the QB Club for 8 p. m. Monday, Dec. 13 at the high school. Bryant has urged all QB Club members — and all other interested citizens — to attend the meeting.

At Tuesday night's meeting here, it was emphasized that no

portion of the proposed improvement program can be sacrificed without serious hurt to the school's athletic program.

## Growth of School

Supt. of Schools Carl Macon pointed out that Olton has grown from A competition to permanent status in District 2-AA, and emphasized that the Mustang shower and dressing room facilities are now woefully inadequate. An estimated 60 boys are expected to report for varsity football practice here next fall, and present dressing and shower facilities would not adequately accommodate half that number.

The need for public restrooms at Memorial Stadium has been stressed here many times in recent months.

**Need More Seats**  
More seating space, to corre-

pond with the growth of the school and the mounting interest in Mustang athletics, is perhaps the major need, it was pointed out Tuesday night. The 1955 Mustang schedule — which calls for home games with Morton, Slaton, Muleshoe, Littlefield and Dimmitt — is a good one, and several of those games may be reasonably expected to draw considerably larger crowds than present seating facilities would accommodate.

"Other schools have financed some fine stadium improvement projects through the sale of reserved seats just as we're attempting to do, and we know that Olton citizens want stadium facilities comparable to those of schools we play," one citizen pointed out at the Tuesday meeting.

## Two OHS Students Sing In Choir; Band Try-Outs Friday In Lubbock

John Carson and Vern Steffey, Olton High School choirsters, will mingle voices in February with the all-state choir when they sing for the Texas Music Educators Convention in Dallas.

John and Vern were chosen Saturday in Lubbock during try-outs for Region I. John won first place as first tenor, and Vern was first alternate as second tenor.

Friday morning, 8 to 9 o'clock, auditions for places in the all-state band will be held. Kay Granbery will try out on French horn; Jimmie Priest, trombone; John Estes, bass horn; and Vern Steffey, bass horn and baritone.

Kay and Jimmie were selected for last year's all-state band, as French horn and alternate trombone.

Only twelve students from entire Region I will be chosen to participate. Try-outs will include playing 15 major scales, a Class I solo, sight reading, and playing a given selection from the instrument book.

### Public Forum

(Following is an article written by P. A. Nafzger, Olton farmer and stockman and member of the state Farmers Union resolution committee. Mr. Nafzger has recently returned from a state meeting of the union. Views expressed here are those of Mr. Nafzger. Our readers are invited to express their opinions on public affairs in The Enterprise Public Forum.)

The Texas Farmers Union is a stronger and better organization than I had fully realized. It is really a farmers' organization and deals with the problems which concern the people that till the soil and grow livestock.

It is high time that the people that till the soil let themselves be heard and let the world know that farming is very much different now than it was back years ago when we could grow our mules and horses and feed and plow our soil at very cheap rates. The mechanical age is here. Subsidization is here. Why shouldn't the farmer receive his prorata part of subsidy.

I some time believe that people in many places do not realize that farmers are not as prosperous as they think. They don't know that if wheat was given away by the farmer the loaf of bread would still cost them approximately 20 cents. Also the same about cotton. Thirty-five cents worth of cotton produces about a \$4.00 shirt.

So, really is the farmer breaking the government. No! The American farmer has lost the government about 1 1/2 billion dollars in the last 20 years. Yes, who has received the balance of the money.

The farmers union asked for

the enactment of national farm legislation assuring 100 percent parity for all agriculture commodities based on a price index that reflects the true relationship between the things farmers have to buy and the things they have to sell.

Farmers Union believes in readiness for war at any time. They believe in the stock piling of steel and other commodities which would be essential in time of war. We also believe that farm products should be stored in larger quantities than in the past.





## Exchange Ideas For Christmas Gifts, Decorations

Refresh your holiday atmosphere this year with new ideas for decorations, gifts, and food. Many Olton women are creating original schemes and packages, and adding to the old ones.

Perhaps YOU have a novel idea that you'd like to share or exchange with your neighbors. Why not tell us about it, and let us print it so others may use it?

Here are two suggestions this week that may come in handy for you. See what you think:

Have you heard about the new door decoration for the holiday season?

Make a Christmas "tree" from chicken wire, by cutting two triangles and bending cut ends of one piece firmly around the mesh of the other. You might weave silver tinsel in and out of the mesh on the edges.

Hang your ordinary Christmas ornaments on the "tree" by clipping small wires of the mesh and forming little hooks from them. You can even top the tree with a gold star and, if you like, add a green felt trunk at the bottom.

With your porch light on after dark, the tree shows up brilliantly.

Mrs. A. J. Walling has a clever idea for a hand-made to Christmas gift. It's a want-list holder for a busy housewife. Here are the materials required to make one:

- (1) One piece of board 1x2 1/2 x 9 1/2" for the back.
- (2) Two pieces of thin board or plywood 4x7 1/2"
- (3) Small piece of tin or sharp-edged metal.
- (4) Roll of 2-inch adding machine tape.
- (5) Paint or varnish.
- (6) Pencil

Begin by rounding off the top of the thin boards out to 2 1/2 inches from top; slope to bottom. Bore a 5/16" hole, two inches from top and 2 1/4 inches from back side, and another hole 1 1/2" from back and 4 3/4" from top. Cut a peg about 3" long to fit into top holes. This is to hold the roll of adding machine tape. The bottom holes hold a pencil.

Next, cut a piece of tin about a half inch deep and 2 1/2" wide, to lap over back piece loosely, and tack 2 1/2" from the bottom of the backing piece, on the front side. This is the cutting edge for your tape. Nail side piece, having tops even. Varnish or paint.

Put pencil through bottom holes of side pieces. With tape on peg, put peg through top holes, and pull tape down between back piece and tin, so that free end hangs below tin and can be easily written on and torn off for grocery lists.

Hang on your wall or shelf by a piece of wire or by boring a small nail hole in top of back piece.

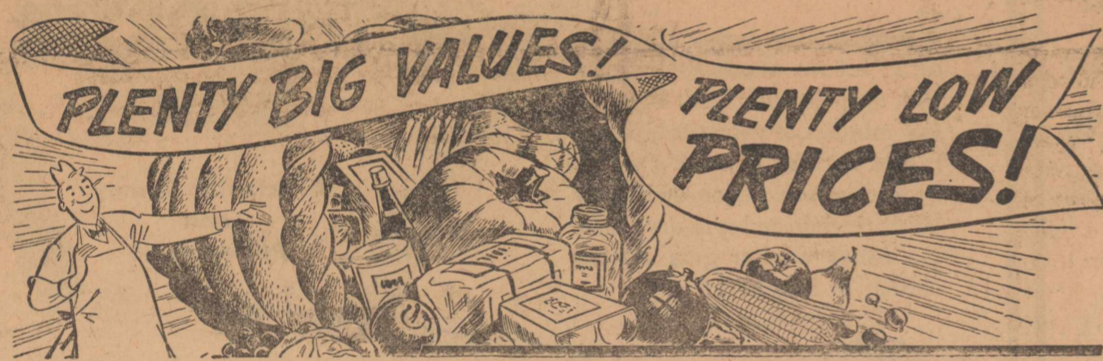

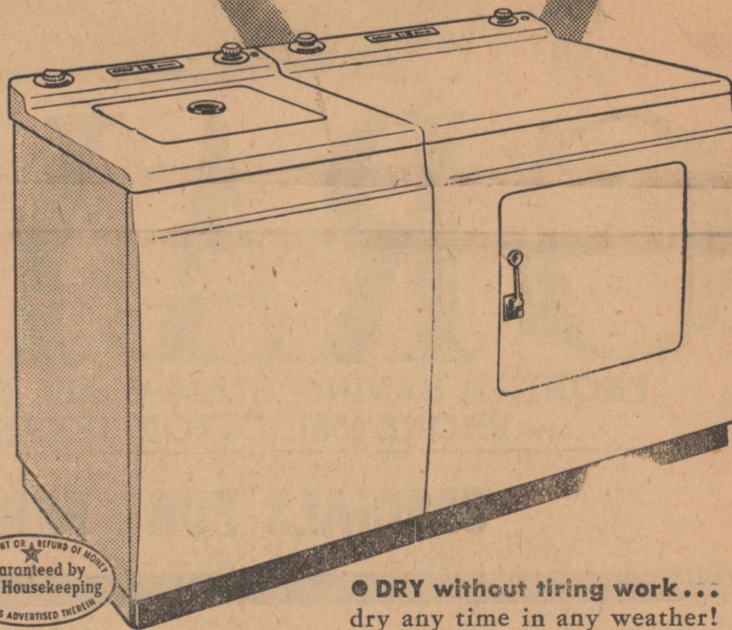
