> In the meantime, Mrs. Goyne tried to turn the gas off with a pair of pliers. While Mrs. Goyne was kneeling and working with the pliers the accumulation of gas burst into, flames with a violent explosion which puffed up the solidly built roof of the building.

> Mrs. Goyne was blown down by the explosion which closed the single door which had been used as an entrance. However, the explosion opened two other doors which previously had been nailed shut.

It was through one of these doors that Mrs. Goyne managed to make her escape.

Iva Dell and Mrs. De Leon. managed to remove the burning clothing from Mrs. Goyne and dressed her in a robe. She wasrushed to Olton Memorial Hospital in a hospital ambulance and was given emergency treatment. Later she was taken tothe Plainview hospital.
