FFA Office Complete At Show Barns

Olton Future Farmers have completed a new office inside the FFA show barn in the north-east part of Olton.

Agriculture Instructors J. C. Lane and J. W. Brown said the office will enable show officials to clerk the show sale as it is going on.

They said plans call for settling with both the boys and the buyers immediately following the sale of animals.

The boys are in the process of building several pens outside the show barn for commercial steers. About 25 head of commercial stock will be shown. Buyers also will find several other steers in the community which should appeal to packer buyers.

The Future Homemaking school building has been renovated at the fair grounds this week and will be in fine shape for the stock show.

In other FFA news, members of the stock show board of directors will be out this week seeking financial assistance for the show and stock sale.

In the meantime, several boys and the agriculture instructors will be going to exhibit animals in the Houston fat stock show. Some of them plan to leave for Houston Saturday.

Tells Urgency Of School Count

The school census is progressing satisfactorily, but everyone in this school district should make certain that youngsters who will enter the first grade this fall be enumerated in the census, it was pointed out Wednesday by B. A. Dodson, school tax assessor-collector.

A total of 83 youngsters have been enumerated who will be first graders here this fall. But Dodson feels that there are quite a few who haven't been counted, chiefly on the basis that 111 new first graders entered school here this year.

The state pays this school district \$68 annually for each school child enumerated. A total of 1,034 youngsters have been enumerated to date, and the census will continue until Feb. 1, Dodson said.

"We urge everyone knowing of children who have not been enumerated — especially those who'll be entering the first grade — to get in touch with the school tax office immediately," Dodson said. The telephone number is 3781.

Olton's Mustangs, playing before a near-capacity crowd here Tuesday night, soundly tounced the invading Lockney Longhorns, 58-25, to even up their District 2-AA cage record at 1-1.

Big (6' 8") Clyde Rhodes, who continues to show improvement with each game, chucked in 18 points to pace the Mustang attack. Bobby Straw had 13 points and Red Machen had 10.

The Mustangs jumped away to a 13-2 lead midway in the first quarter and were never headed.

The margin would have been wider but for the fact that Coach Joe Turner's forces were able to make good on only 8 of 19 free throw attempts.

Girls Lose

The Mustang girls dropped a 37-59 decision to Lockney's taller and more experienced aggregation. Linda Franks had 20 points and Betty Sides had 13 for the locals.

Coach Louise "Poodles" Boyles' girls remain very much in contention for district cage honors despite the loss. They own a 2-1 record. And Lockney, generally considered most likely to cop the district crown, has also lost one contest, to Muleshoe.

Stadium Drive Near Its Goal

Forty more reserved seats. In a nutshell, that's how many more seats need to be sold to assure the proposed \$12,000 Memorial Stadium improvement project.

"Forty more reserved seat sales will finish it up," Supt. of Schools Carl Macon asserted Wednesday. "We need to finish the seat sales not later than Monday."

The superintendent, who has spearheaded the stadium fund drive since its inception back in the fall, was frankly optimistic that enough additional seats will be sold this week and Monday to assure the project.

Good Response
"The response has been good. Seat sales were exceptionally good on Tuesday," Macon said.

Macon has announced plans for a final meeting to be held at 7:30 p. m. Monday at Olton High School to put the finishing touches on the drive. "We want all of the remaining tickets to be in at that meeting," he pointed out.

Macon said the school board will meet that night — and if the necessary 40 additional tickets have been sold — will begin preliminary consideration toward letting of contracts for the big job.

1,110 New Seats
The reserved seat sales would finance construction of 1,110 new seats on the east side of Memorial Stadium and would build a concrete block dressing room and public restrooms on the west end of the band hall.

Overall cost of the project approximates \$12,000. Reserved seats — good for 1955, 1956 and 1957 — are selling for \$20 each.

In commenting on the progress of the drive, Macon said, "I should like to extend my sincere thanks to everyone who participated in the ticket sale drive, and to the many who have purchased tickets."

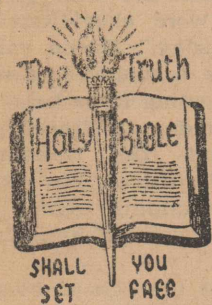

HART — Farmers here are up in arms over the drastic cut in Castro County cotton quotas this year.

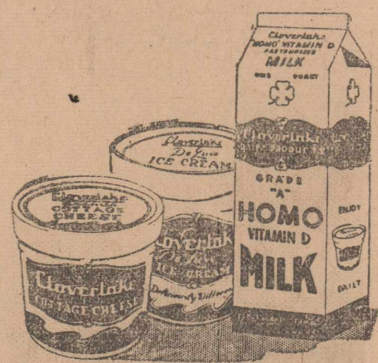
