Finest Stock In 10 Years Expected At Olton Show

Ten Years Of Progress, Growth In Olton Livestock Show Story

The history of the Olton FFA, FHA and 4-H Club Stock Show is one of continuous improvement since the first show which was held in 1945.

"A bunch of the boys got to talking about having a show and so we did," relates W. B. Dickenson, Sr., charter member of the show's board of directors.

The Olton show is the second of its kind in the state to operate under a charter, Mr. Dickenson declared.

The first show was held in the present show barn which then belonged to Jack Straw. Jack had used it for a cotton warehouse and donated its use for the show.

In the first show there were only 16 animals on exhibit.

Everyone became interested, though, said Mr. Dickenson, and in 1946 the show was staged again and a few men got together and decided to buy the barn.

"That's where we really got started," Mr. Dickenson related.

Mr. Dickenson was president of the first board of directors which also included Walter Rose, J. W. Dear, E. C. Baker, Howard Davenport, J. W. Davenport, E. W. Walden, John Meekma, L. R. Vaughn, Tom Critchfield and C. E. Bley.

Truitt Sides was vocational agriculture instructor when the show began and he was succeeded in that capacity by W. W. Hall.

This is the story told by Mr. Dickenson:

"With others in the Olton vicinity we undertook to buy the barn from Jack Straw in 1946. Jack made us a price of \$4,000. We undertook through donations to buy the barn and give it to the FFA boys. In 1947 we had a deed to the barn and every dime paid and a charter from the state to operate as a corporation. It was the second such charter ever issued in the state of Texas to an FFA chapter."

Mr. Dickenson said the show kept growing until the board of directors decided to have a sale. Bert Ershman of Plainview held the first sale in 1949.

The original barn site consisted of the barn and six lots. At present the chapter has a barracks which serves as a lunchroom and homemaking exhibit place.

This year some 230 animals will be shown and this includes a commercial beef class. In 1954 animals shown brought the boys in between \$10,000 and \$12,000 and the show now attracts buyers from across the Southwest. It has been rated as one of the finest shows of its kind in the country.

At the end of 1954 the bank's capital funds included \$125,000 capital, \$125,000 surplus and \$75,000 profits. Mr. Granbery said the bank is owned by 51 stockholders.

Chamber Votes Support of Proposed Main Street Curb and Gutter Plan

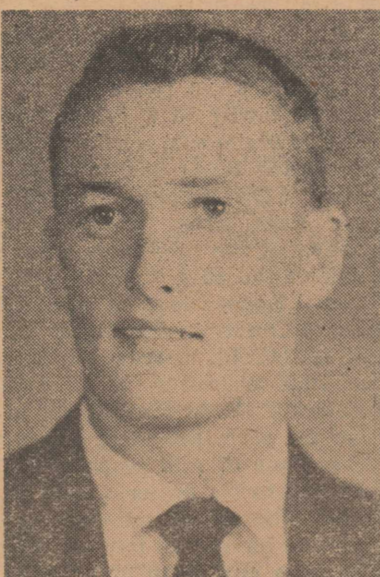
Sponsorship of a project to curb and gutter Olton's main street -- from the south extremity of Olton Memorial Hospital grounds north to the intersection with Highway 70 -- was voted unanimously Thursday by the Olton Chamber of Commerce.

Exact cost of such a project is not known, but C. of C. president Basil Sherman is asking for bids this week, and definite cost data should be available soon.

Cost Of Project

Cost of the project would be borne by individual property owners along the route under consideration. It is believed that curb and gutter cost would not exceed \$2 per running foot, Sherman said.

TROPHIES GIVEN IN STOCK SHOW

Olton firms and organizations have contributed several trophies to be given for winners and events in the Olton FFA, FHA and 4-H Club Stock Show to be held Thursday, Friday and Saturday.

The three grand champions, beef steer, barrow and fat lamb, will receive trophies supplied by the Olton Farmers Union.

Other achievement awards include three showmanship plaques -- one for each division -- to be given by the Olton Chamber of Commerce. The Chamber of Commerce also will give a plaque for the most outstanding exhibit and neatest pen.

Names of judges for showmanship will not be revealed.

OKLAHOMAN WILL JUDGE STOCK SHOW

A veteran judge of stock shows across the country will judge hogs, sheep and cattle in the 10th annual Olton FFA, FHA and 4-H Club Stock Show this week.

He is Clyde Quattlebaum, who holds a masters degree from Oklahoma A&M College. His degree is in animal husbandry.

Mr. Quattlebaum has coached several championship livestock judging teams.

He has shown champion stock in the Houston, Fort Worth, San Antonio, Oklahoma City and Tulsa shows as well as at the American Royal and the International Livestock Exposition.

He was chosen as one of three vocational agriculture teachers to select FFA hogs to be shown by Oklahoma FFA boys in the national barrow show at Austin, Minn. He has assisted in judging livestock at the Fort Worth Fat Stock Show and at the American Royal in Kansas City. He teaches vocational agriculture at Hydro, Okla.

He will arrive in Olton Thursday night and will stay at the home of his sister Mrs. Harry Ford.

Judging the poultry and rabbits this year will be Elmo Hall.

Olton High School girls' basketball team took a 45-35 decision over the Floydada girls Tuesday night to move into undisputed possession of second place in District 2-AA cage standings.

The OHS girls now own a 5-2 district record, second only to the high-flying Muleshoe girls, who have seven wins and no defeats in conference play.

Buyers From Across Area Will Be Here

This is it!

This is the week of the Tenth Annual Olton FFA, FHA and 4-H Club Stock Show. Show officials said 230 animals have been entered and this has the promise to be one of the most successful shows yet.

The show proper does not get under way until Friday morning but animals must be entered and in their places by 6 o'clock Thursday night (tonight).

A major attraction to this year's show will be the 25 head of commercial steers penned on the outside of the show barn. These steers will be graded at 11:30 o'clock Saturday morning, and will be auctioned to packer buyers immediately preceding the regular show auction.

Boys who fed these steers exactly as steers are fed by commercial feeders include Wayne Bodkin, Sammy Thomas, John Carson and Don Nafzger. The steers will be shown in pens of five.

J. C. Lane and J. W. Brown, vocational agriculture teachers, said 23 milk-fed calves will be shown beginning at 1 o'clock Saturday afternoon. About half of these will be lightweights and the remainder will be heavyweights.

"Anyone who loves a good cattle show ought to be there," declared Mr. Lane. "They'll see 23 FFA and 4-H Club boys and girls out there trying to win a showmanship plaque."

Nine head of breeding beef animals will be shown Saturday. They include Hereford, Angus and short horn cattle, both male and female.

"We didn't get as many daily cattle entries as we would like in future years," declared Mr. Lane. "Only three head were entered."

Sheep will be judged at 3 o'clock Friday afternoon. Sheep entries this year total more than 80. There are some 68 fat lambs of various breeds; 10 Southdown breeding animals; 4 Shropshire breeding animals; and 4 Hampshire breeding sheep.

"Even if you don't like sheep, you'll enjoy the sheep show," declared Mr. Brown.

Swine judging will be at 1 o'clock Friday afternoon. This year's swine entries include 45 barrows of various breeds and an equal number of breeding swine.

An interesting sidelight on the swine show will be sows with small pigs. "There's nothing cuter than small pigs," declared Mr. Lane.

Sheep, swine and cattle will be judged by Clyde Quattlebaum of Hydro, Okla., and poultry and rabbits will be judged by Elmo Hall of Olton.

Buyers from across three states are expected to be present for auction Saturday afternoon. Bays have been assured premium prices for their exhibits.

Kenneth Bozeman will be auctioneer again this year. Stock Show Directors have built an office in the show barn, and the sale will be clerked while it is in progress. This will enable show officials to settle with both the boys and the buyers on the spot.

FHA girls will maintain concessions in the FFA barracks near the show barn and will serve food, soft drinks and coffee.

COMPANY OFFERS COMPROMISE; OLTON COMMISSION COUNTERS

General Telephone Company of the Southwest Monday night offered a compromise that whacks \$3.50 off its original demand on business telephones.

The company originally asked for a boost from \$7.75 to \$12.50 on one party business service.

It originally had requested a jump from \$6.00 to \$10.00 on two party business service but is now willing to settle for \$7.50.

The company originally requested raises from \$4.50 to \$3.00 on one party residential service and from \$3.75 to \$5.00 on two party residential service.

General telephone is now willing to settle for \$5.00 on one party residential and \$4.50 on two party residential. Company officials said four party residential would inaugurate in town at \$4.00.

The city commission balked at the company proposal and offered a counter proposal of an across the board raise of 10 percent.

This would give the company \$8.50 on one party business lines; \$6.60 on two party business lines; \$5.00 on one party residential; and \$4.25 on two party residential.

Here negotiating for the company were Jim King and Bob Shirey from San Angelo and Bob Blatz of Littlefield.

Mr. King said he would confer with the company attorneys and officials and call Mayor Lefty Hollingsworth on whether or not the company will accept the city's proposal.

Mr. King said he will meet with rural subscribers as soon as the issue is settled with the city.

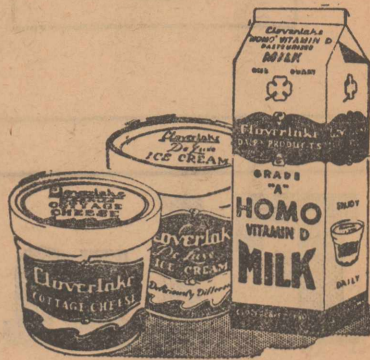

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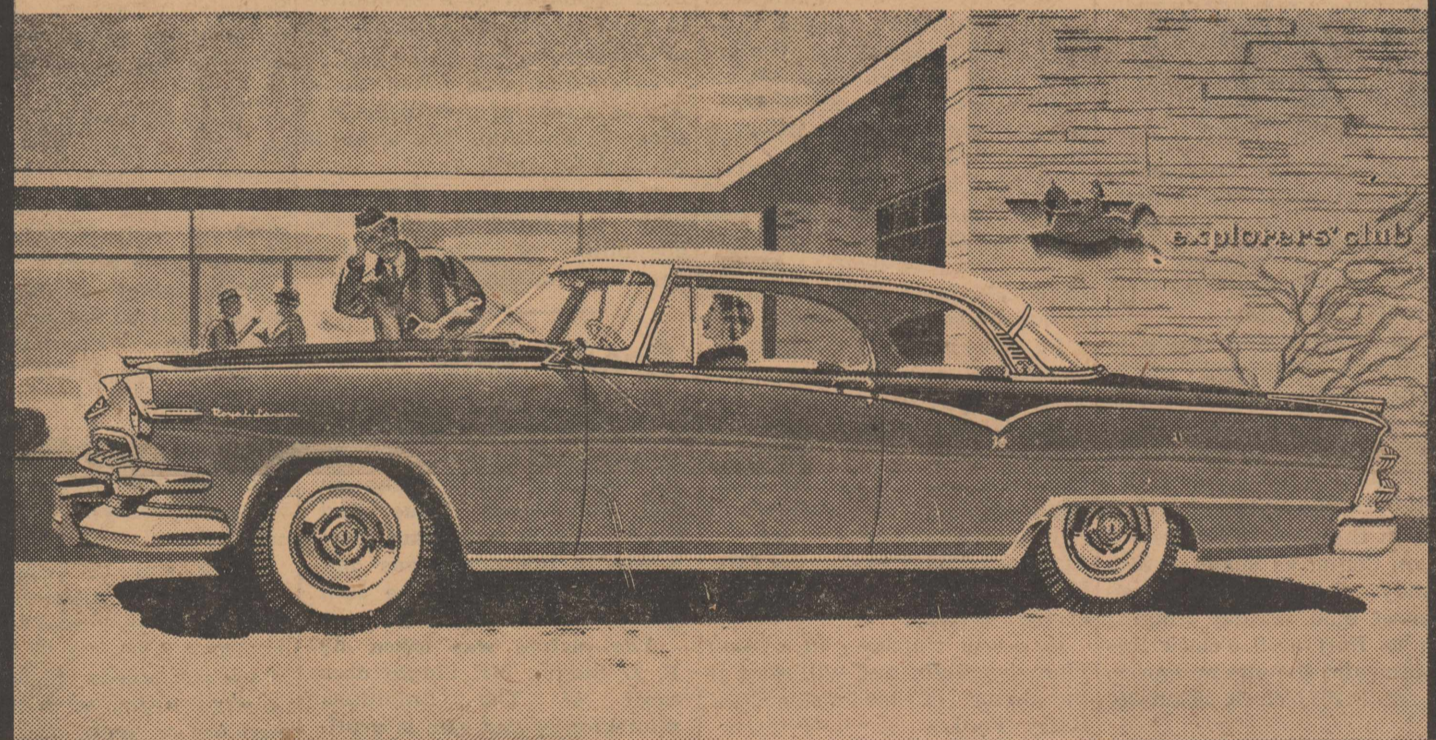

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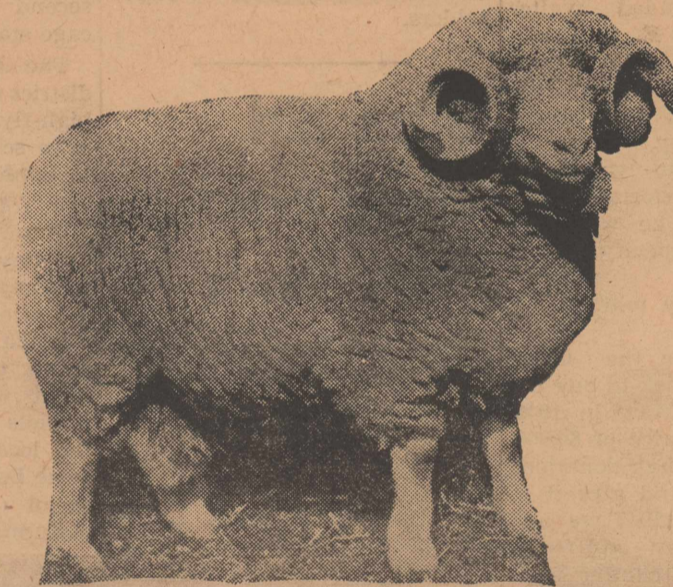
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Proclamation

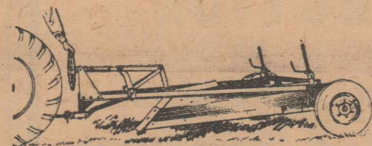
