DALLAS HOTEL FIRE SEEN BY OLTON PEOPLE

Seven Olton people were in the Adolphus Hotel at Dallas Friday when fire broke out in a club on the second floor and black smoke boiled through the swank hotel.

In the hotel were Mr. and Mrs. Don Williams, Mr. and Mrs. Raymon Carson, John Carson, Johnnie Mac Estes and Vern Steffey. Jimmie Priest, also a member of the party, was out for a walk during the excitement. Mr. Williams is music instructor at Olton High School. He and the Carsons had taken the boys to Dallas for the Texas Music Educators Association convention.

Mr. and Mrs. Williams and the Carsons were staying on the nineteenth floor and the boys were on the twentieth floor.

Here's John Carson's story of the fire:

"It was about 5 o'clock Friday afternoon. We were on the twentieth floor. I and a boy from Slaton saw some smoke boiling up.

"We hollered at Johnnie and Vern. Johnnie was taking a shower and Vern was shining his shoes. We walked down to the sixth floor and watched the fire until they chased us out."

The group had to leave the hotel building by fire escape.

A prize-winning cake and pie went for premium prices at auction Saturday. I. V. Fent paid top price of \$26.00 for an angel food cake baked by Joyce Keasler. Jack Alcorn almost met that price, with \$25.00 for a pecan pie.

Says Linda Franks, superintendent, "I think this year's show was one of the best ones we have ever had."

Homemaking and FHA girls worked in the exhibit building in two-hour shifts for almost twelve hours a day, supervising displays and selling concessions.

MAN DIES IN FREAK ACCIDENT

Jesus Cadena, 26 years old, was crushed to death Sunday morning when a car under which he was working slipped from a jack and pinned his chest.

Mr. Cadena was pronounced dead upon arrival at Olton Memorial Hospital.

The accident occurred about 10 o'clock on the Henry Mathis farm 7 miles southeast of Olton, where Mr. Cadena had been employed for the past two years.

The Mathis family was gone from home at the time of the mishap. Mr. Mathis said Mr. Cadena apparently had been working on the car's rear spring at the time of the accident.

Mrs. Cadena stopped A. B. Young who was passing by and Mr. Young summoned an Olton Memorial Hospital ambulance. One of Mr. Young's companions raised the car from the fatally injured man's body.

Funeral services were held Monday afternoon at the Olton Mexican Baptist Mission of which Mr. Cadena was a member. Officiating were Rev. Glen Godsey, pastor, and Rev. Paul Pequeno of Tulsa.

Burial was in Olton Cemetery under direction of Lemons Funeral Home of Plainview.

Survivors include the wife and two small children, Jesus, Jr., 4 years old, and Graciela 2; and the mother, Mrs. Segura.

Sharon Brigance Exhibits Champ; Animals Bring \$15,113.54 In Auction

A pretty little miss no bigger than a minute herself saw her 920-pound Hereford steer walk off with the grand championship prize and then go on to sell for 75 cents a pound in the climax of the three-day Stock Show here last week end.

She is Sharon Brigance, the 65-pound, 10-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Merrill Brigance.

The blonde, blue-eyed little lady captivated the hearts of the spectators while her lumbering Hereford won the heart of Clyde Quattlebaum, who came here from Hydro, Okla., to judge the show.

Olton Co-op Gin bought the Grand Champion at 75 cents a pound.

Sharon plans to re-invest the money in more show stock. Right now she is getting a calf ready to be shown at Plainview.

Sharon's triumph during her first year in 4-H Club work also held a touch of sadness for her. Because she exhibited the

grand champion she is forever disqualified to exhibit for grand championship in the Olton show again.

John Paul Jones showed the grand champion lamb, an 82 pound Shropshire. It was bought by the Olton State Bank at \$1.20 a pound.

The grand champion barrow was a lightweight duroc shown by Jack Hysinger. It weighed 193 pounds and was bought by Meinecke Brothers of Plainview at 85 cents a pound.

The reserve champion steer was an Angus shown by Jarrell Edwards. It weighed 950 pounds and was bought by Higginbotham-Bartlett at 60 cents a pound.

The reserve champion sheep was a 100-pound Southdown exhibited by Kent Wozencraft. It was bought for \$1.00 a pound by Ben F. Smith Grain Company.

The reserve champion barrow was a lightweight Duroc weighing 181 pounds and exhibited by Bobby Johnson and was pur-

chased by The Olton Enterprise at 61 cents per pound.

Grand Champions in all divisions received trophies from the Olton Farmers Union. These were presented by Raymond Cooper, president.

Agriculture instructors J. W. Brown and J. C. Lane said 150 animals were sold at the auction. Calves brought about 36 cents a pound on the average. Lambs averaged about 41 cents about 34 cents a pound.

They said this does not include the prices paid for champions and reserve champions.

Mr. Quattlebaum judged sheep, swine and cattle and Elmo Hall judged poultry and rabbits.

Buyers from over a wide area attended the show. Kenneth Bozeman was auctioneer. The animals sold for \$15,113.54, a record for an Olton Stock Show sale.

In addition to the regular show this year some 20 head of commercial stock were shown (Continued on Page 6)

We have a great responsibility to maintain and advance the ideals and standards which our people have come to expect of their public schools. We must keep pace with the growing needs of our schools by providing new classrooms, improved methods, and by encouraging loyal, able, qualified men and women to adopt teaching as a lifetime career.

HEREFORE I, as Governor of Texas, do hereby designate the week of March 7-12, 1955, as

PUBLIC SCHOOLS WEEK in Texas and urge every citizen to visit at least one public school during this period and to be-

come personally acquainted with the programs and accomplishments of our educational system.

Says Deanna Farrar: "The people are willing to help each other."

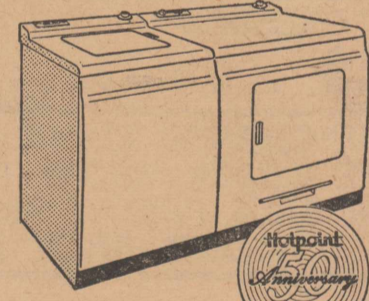
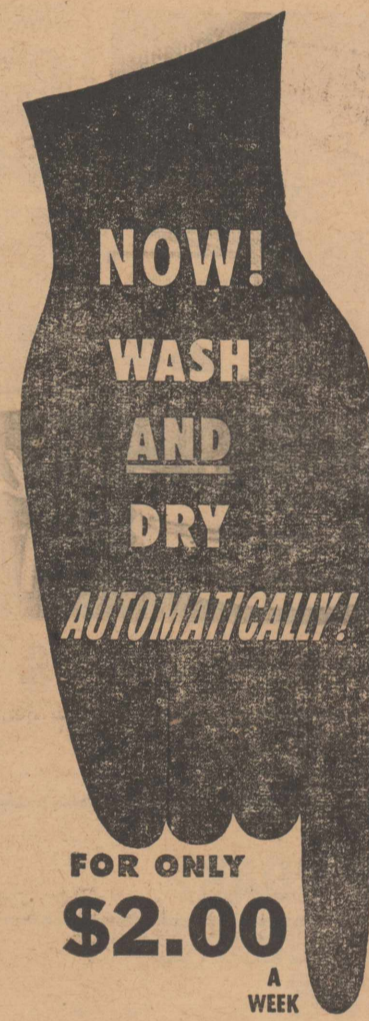
