## Olton Wins In Last Minute Thriller Before Packed Grandstand In Opener

Many Olton fans gave up a minute and six seconds too soon last Friday night as the Ponies met the Abernathy Antelopes in the season opener in Olton Memorial Stadium.

There was just that much time left on the clock when Teddy Jack Estes plunged over for the tying touchdown. Then David Price wrapped up the game in a Mustang blue ribbon as he went across for the winning extra point.

The final score was Olton 20 and Abernathy 19. Mustang fans also experienced the thrill of seeing their team put the first score on the new electric scoreboard at the stadium.

Abernathy won the toss and

elector to receive. They returned the kickoff to their own 31 yard line.

Two first downs moved the ball to the 46 where Krueger Johnson intercepted an Antelope pass and returned it to the 36.

Olton's offense bogged down and the Mustangs were forced to punt. Price kicked over the goal and the ball was put into play on the 20-yard line.

Then after an exchange of punts Abernathy had the ball on their own 15, where an attempted pass was grabbed on the 20 again by Krueger Johnson and returned to Olton's 14-yard line.

This set up Olton's first touchdown. Price picked up a yard. Estes in two tries made eight and Jack Roye Straw ripped off seven yards to the 1-yard marker.

Price plunged over for the first tally of the 1956 season and initiated the new scoreboard.

Quarterback James Ray Hyatt held but Straw's kick attempt was blocked.

Abernathy took the kickoff and marched from their own 32 to a first and goal on Olton's 7-yard line. The Antelopes were favored with a five-yard penalty which took them to the two but one of the famous Joe Turner goal line stands gave the Mustangs the ball on the one yard stripe.

Price kicked out to the 41 where the ball rolled dead. Abernathy then moved to the 29 where they fumbled and James Carson recovered for Olton, only to have the Mustangs return the favor with Abernathy recovering on the Olton 20-yard line.

From there, in five plays Abernathy knotted the score. Their attempted run for the extra point was cut short by Billy King and Jerry Edmonson who came plunging in for the tackle.

Jack Roye Straw received the kickoff for Olton on his own 25 and returned it to the 44 from where Estes passed to Price for a gain of 30 yards and a first down on the Antelope 20-yard line.

Estes gained six. A Hyatt to Price pass broke even and then Estes raced to the 10 only to have the ball squirt from his arms and Abernathy recovered on the one as the half ended.

The score at halftime was six to six.

The third quarter opened with the Mustangs receiving. They returned the ball to the 28-yard line. Price got three to the 31.

The Whirlwinds downed the Mustangs in their last encounter which was in 1954. The score was 26 to 14 and the defeat cost the Mustangs the district title.

That was the only time Coach Turner's team failed to win district laurels since Turner took over as Mustang mentor.

## City Health Officer Dr. Souders Calls For Prevention To Fight Encephalitis

Dr. Souders asked that folks guard against leaky faucets, trash heaps, tin cans and other rubbish in which mosquitoes may breed.

The health officer also pointed out that air conditioners and

cess pools also may be prime breeding places for mosquitoes.

He recommended that air conditioners be treated with insecticides and that insecticides be placed in commodes in homes served by cess pools instead of sewers.

Mayor Bley said lawns which have been watered too much also might be breeding places and recommended more sparing use of water on lawns in some cases.

Gravity of the situation may be recognized by the fact that US Public Health Service representatives were in Olton for four hours Monday night applying insecticide dust.

Authorities have pointed out that the death rate from the epidemic has been unusually low but it still is a highly dangerous disease.

The disease is marked by headaches, fever, drowsiness and mental confusion, Dr. Souders said.

Its symptoms are similar to several other ailments, so health authorities have advised an immediate visit to your physician if the need should arise.

Dr. Souders said there have been several cases of encephalitis in Olton but no fatalities.

**Receives 3rd Award**

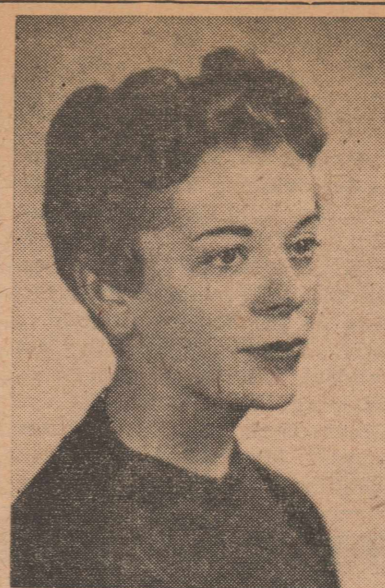
Kay Granbery is one of 17 outstanding Texas Tech freshmen to receive the \$150 Dunlap scholarship.

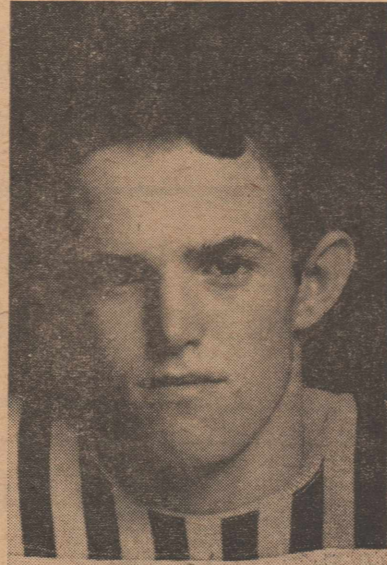

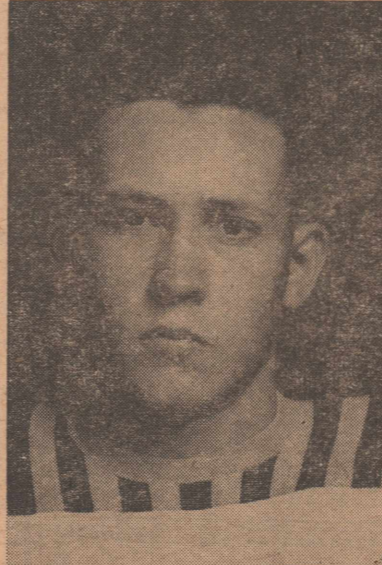

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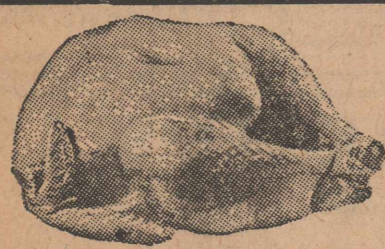
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
