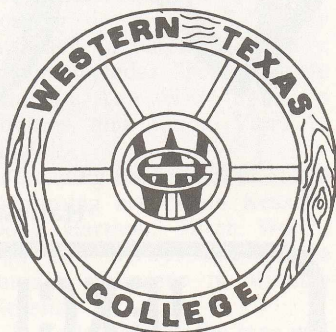
EMT got into the spirit of winning in Rootbeer Drinking, with their contestant Roger Valadez.

Money-making projects and fun projects for the year were studied. Members voted to have a \$2 per semester dorm fee to help purchase an ice machine, telephones for floors, or games to interrupt the boredom of afternoon dorm life. They will also try to sponsor a dance each semester.

Ms. Payne said, "For the longest time, the dorm students have been ignored. We are just living here — we aren't important. Or so it seems. This year

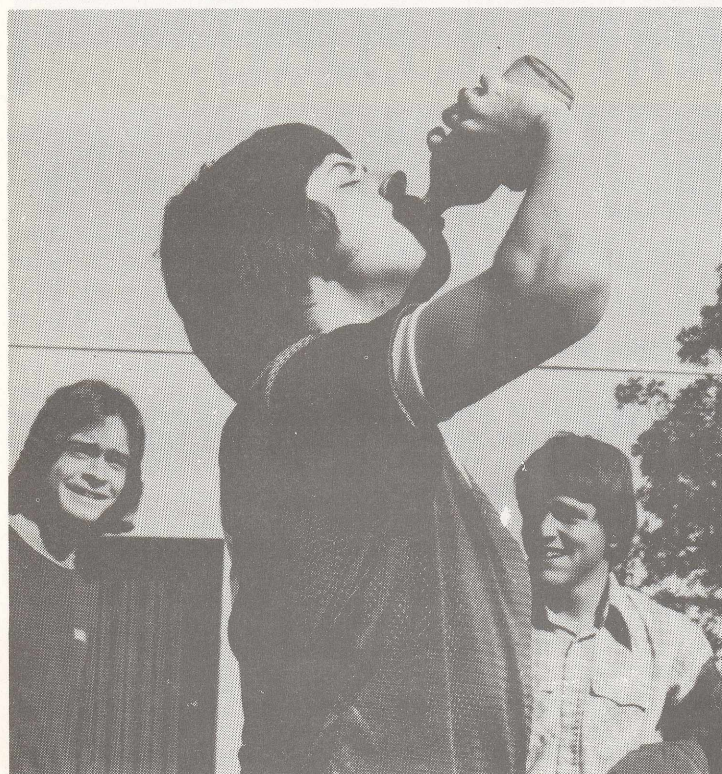
we're not going to let that happen. We are a group of concerned students. We have to live here, so we want to enjoy it!"

The display includes 25 watercolors, 13 oils and 2 pastels. Theme of the show is "Many Faces of Texas."

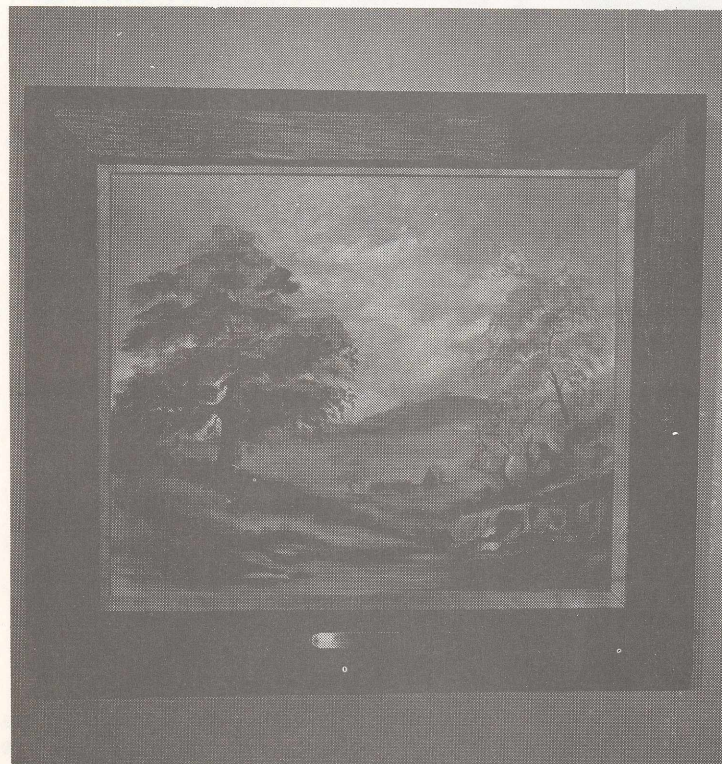
Mrs. Harbin was enrolled in the Famous Artists School and turned professional a year later.

At WTC she was a member of Phi Theta Kappa, honorary fraternity. Last spring, at the

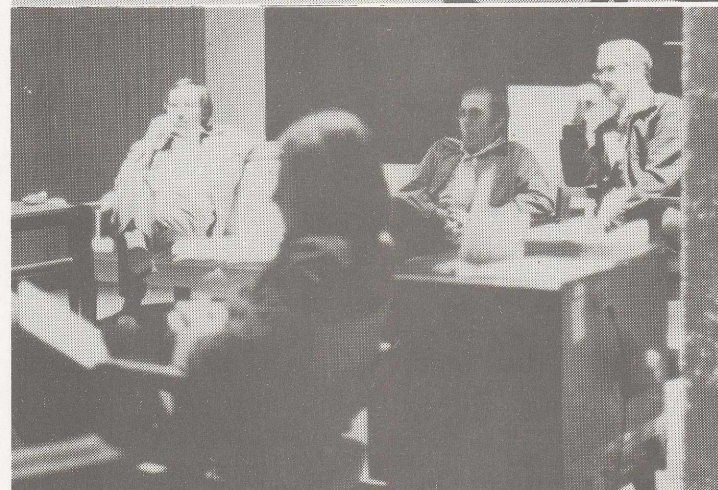
PTK convention in Biloxi, Miss., she won the only art award, a scholarship to the Honors Institute at the University of Mississippi.

Despite the confusion of rescheduling due to unpleasant weather conditions, Olympic Days gave students further opportunity for involvement. In the opinion of many, WTC has a long way to go. In the opinion of some, it has actually had a pretty good start.

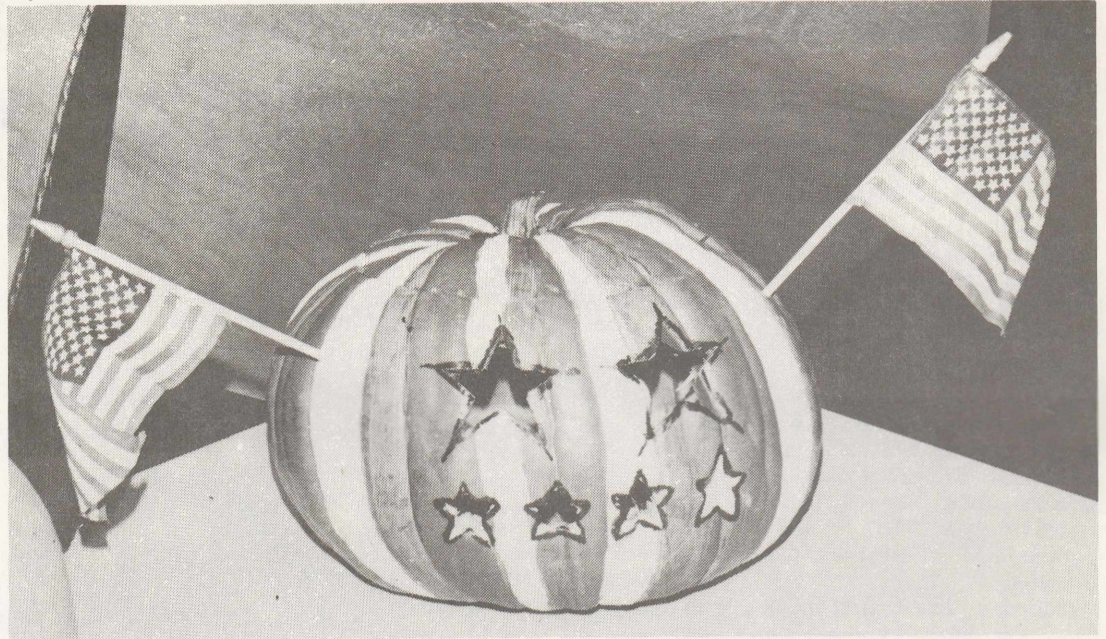

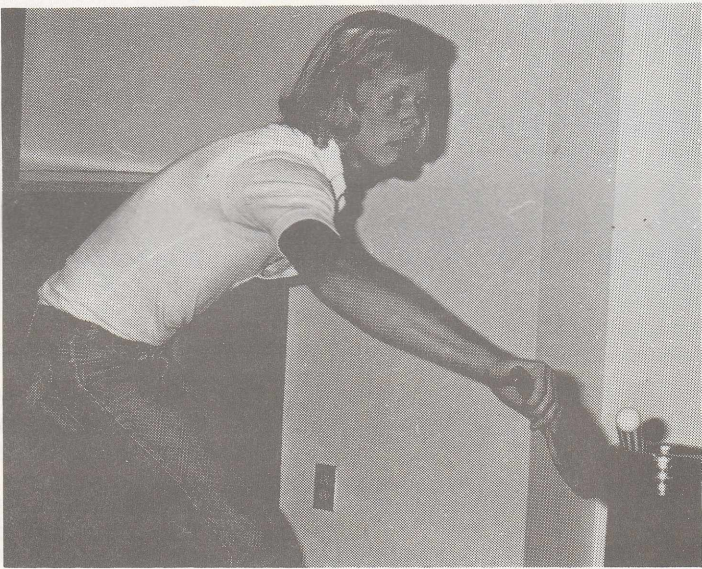
Mike "Snake" Banks and Linda Grissom are WTC's number one Pool contestants after competing with twenty other potential contestants.

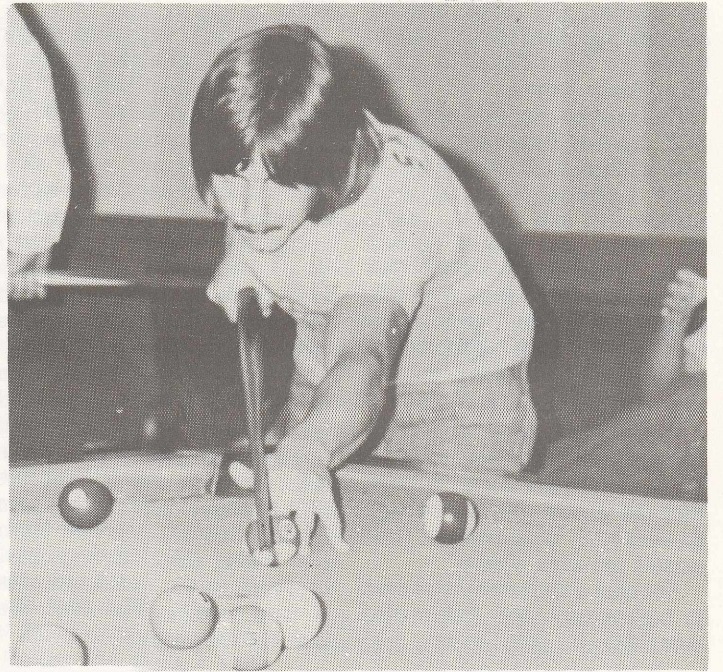

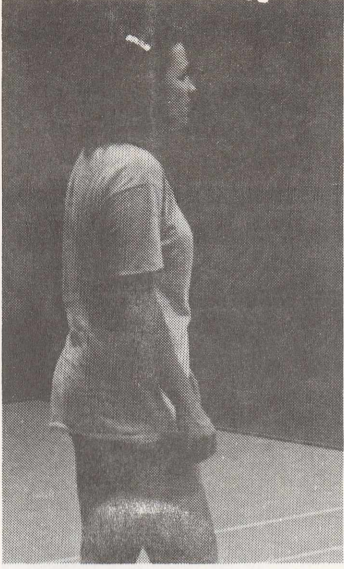

## Students Sent Midterm Slips

"Less deficiency slips were sent out compared to past years," said Dan Dever, associate registrar. "I don't know why, but it seems like students are doing better."

Deficiency slips are mailed out in the middle of each semester upon the instructor's request to students performing at an unsatisfactory level. Dever urges students to send the registrar's office their present addresses because many have moved and slips are being returned.

"Compared to last semester, absentees are about usual," Dever said. "Students need to remember that an instructor may drop you after three absences."

Two examples are individualized P.E. and failure to complete outside work. P.E. students who have not completed the minimum number of hours were mailed slips. They were also sent to students who performed well in class, but failed to complete outside work.

Dever said, "Veterans need to remember, even though their education is paid for, they still need to attend classes and complete necessary work."

At a larger college there may be 600 in one class and there's no way of finding out what your instructor is like!"

"If it weren't for Coach Simpson, I probably wouldn't be here today. I owe him a lot of appreciation for his actions as a coach and a friend. There's no other person I would rather play basketball under. My teammates will agree with me."

Ms. Baker and the rest of the Dusters opened the 1976-77 season last night against McMurry College in Abilene.

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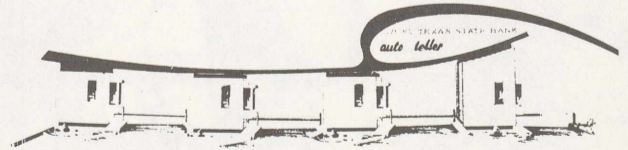

## Linksters Win First In Demaret Tourney

The Western Texas golf team completed the fall schedule with a first place finish in the junior college division of the second annual Jimmy Demaret Intercollegiate Golf Tournament held in Brownsville, Texas last week.

The three-day, 54-hole meet was played on two championship golf courses — the El Diablo Country Club and Angel Country Club. Teams were divided into three divisions — (1) junior colleges, (2) senior colleges, and (3) universities.

Weather conditions were almost perfect except for a strong 20 to 25 mph wind from the south on the third day of action.

Each college played five players and the total score of four players for 54 holes counted toward the team's final tally.

Results in the junior college division went as follows: (1) WTC (911), (2) San Antonio Junior College (923), (3) McLennan Junior College (931), (4) Odessa College (934), (5) Temple Junior College (935), (6) New Mexico Junior College and Midland College (936 each), and (8) Schreiner Junior College (943).

Finishing in the top three of the senior college division were: (1) East Texas State University (956), (2) Mary-Hardin Baylor University (958), and (3) University of Nuevo Leon (961). The University division

results were: (1) Texas A&M (893), (2) S.M.U. (907), (3) Tulsa University (914), (4) Texas Tech and Lamar University (916 each), (6) University of New Orleans (921), (7) Houston Baptist University (937), (8) Pan American University (938), and (9) Baylor University (958).

Several former WTC linksters participated in the university division. These WTC graduates were Mark Hargrove of Texas Tech, Grant Collins and Bryan Hargrove of Lamar University, and Ross Wortham of Houston Baptist University.

Scoring for the Westerners were Chris Brown (223), Donnie Loerwald (227), Brown McCrory (228), Dave Foster (233), and Miller Scott (237).

Brown and Kevin Foster of Schreiner College tied for medalist honors in their division. Loerwald tied for fifth while McCrory tied for eighth place in the tourney.

WTC led by four strokes after the first round of action, 18 following the second, and ended the tournament 12 shots ahead of second place San Antonio College.

The first place finish by the Westerners marked the second straight win for a WTC golf team in the Jimmy Demaret affair.

After returning to Snyder, Coach Bob O'Day stated he was pleased to close out the fall schedule by winning the meet.

# Tech Rated Fifth, Pokes 8-1

Can you believe it? Texas Tech's Red Raiders are ranked fifth nationally in the NCAA! Who would ever think this time last year Tech would be rated above the likes of Texas, Arkansas, Houston, or A&M, in the Southwest Conference? Or even better, how about Ohio State, Nebraska, Alabama and Oklahoma! Sure enough, the 6-0 Raiders have finally proved to themselves how to win the big game!

first bowl appearance since anyone can remember would be two defeats at the hands of Houston and Arkansas. I wouldn't count on it, though, if you're not a Raider Fan!

The Dallas Cowboys, supporting an 8-1 record after the New York affair, are off to their best start in a good while. 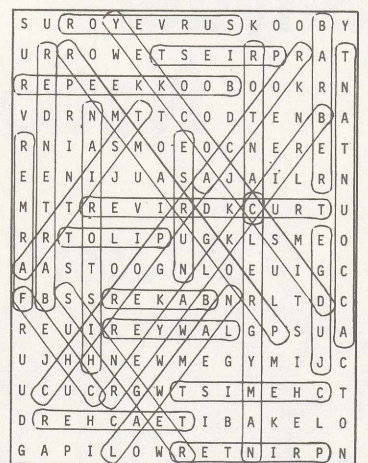

# Golfers Stay Second

WTC's golf team remained in sole possession of second place in the WJCAC standings with a second place finish at the fourth conference golf tournament held at the Odessa Country Club in Odessa, Oct. 29.

The Westerners finished tourney play with a 313, 23 over par under adverse weather conditions. The chill factor during most of the tournament remained below 30 degrees, with a 15 mph wind from the northeast and a slight rain hampering players throughout the day. A previous two-day shower caused playing conditions to become tougher.

The home-town linksters were narrowly knocked out of first place by New Mexico Junior College which finished at 312, 22 over par on the par 288 course.

Midland College also completed close behind NMJC with a 315, 25 over par, for third place. Amarillo College placed fourth at 27 over par and Odessa College wound up action in fifth at 30 over par. Howard College, Clarendon College, New Mexico Military Institute, and Frank Phillips College rounded out the tournament contenders, in order.

Leading the Westerner golfers was Chris Brown, shooting a 75

(three over). Brown also qualified as runner-up medalist in the tourney. Brown McCrory shot a 78, Donnie Loerwald 80, and Dave Foster 81 to complete WTC scoring.

Following the Odessa meet, Coach Bob O'Day said, "The scores were high because of poor weather conditions. Only ten players out of 45 broke 80, and five of these scores were in the high 70's. A conference tourney was supposed to be played the previous Thursday in Midland, but was rained out. The Odessa tournament closed out the conference's fall golf schedule."

After four complete conference tilts, Loerwald and Brown lead all Westerner linksters with 74 averages. Miller Scott, who has played in three of the four tourneys, is averaging 72. Another local golfer, Terry Kendrick, is also doing well after seeing action in three tournaments. He is averaging 74.

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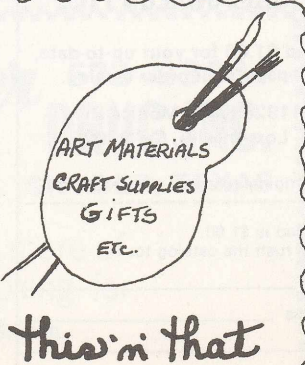
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
