—Felcity, played by Vicki Williams of Sudan.

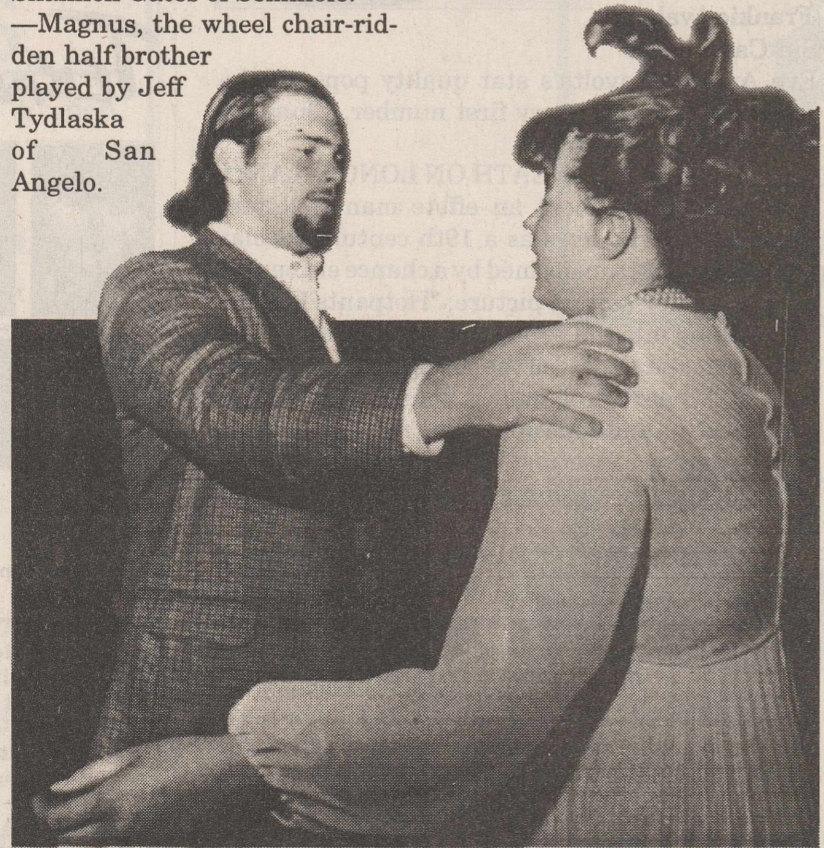
—Lady Muldoon, played by Shannon Gates of Seminole.

News Photo category.

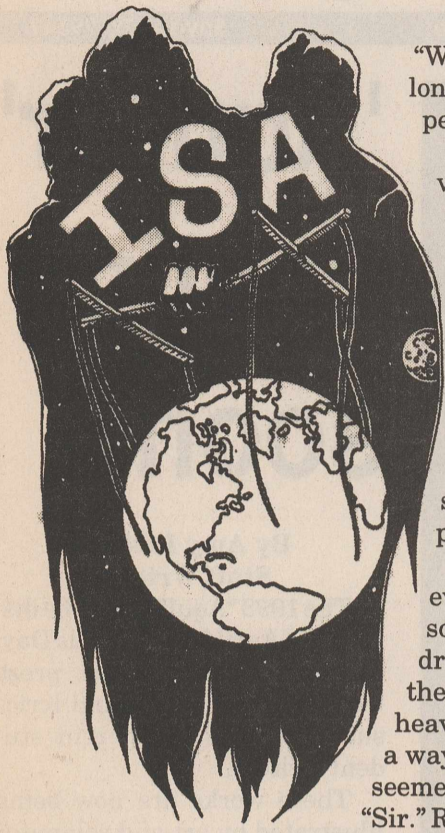
In the Critical Review category, two newspaper writers were honored for reviews written in Texans printed in the spring of 1997.

"What happened with Nordell?" Lake tried to avoid the issue, but the longer he did the worse it got "I never thought him to be the kind of person who would sell out so easily."

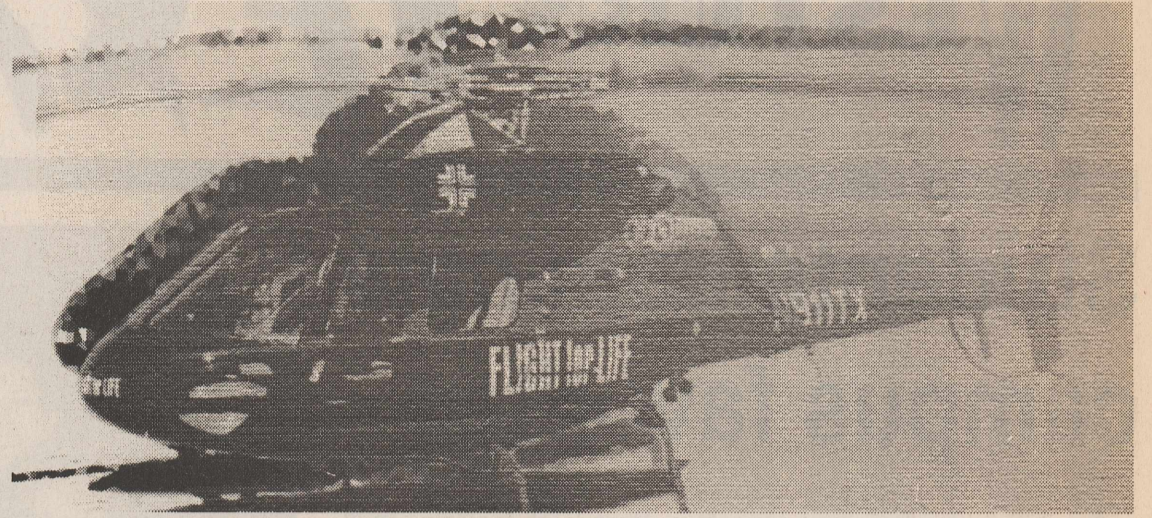

OUR FLICK OF THE WEEK is "Mercury Rising," a Bruce Willis thriller in which he plays a Chicago-based FBI agent who comes to the aid of a 9-year-old boy under threat of attack after he innocently deciphers a top-secret, extremely complex American security code. The child is an autistic savant, and much comment is made on his autism, but the explanation of what precisely is the nature of the boy's problem was not clear to me. Instead, when I think of this movie, I think of Willis standing in the middle of the rapid-transit tracks that run through the Kennedy Expressway, dodging a couple of trains coming from opposite directions at the same time. In other words, "Mercury Rising" is standard action fare with a false overlay of social conscience. R. 2 stars.

GREASE. A 20th anniversary revival of the classic high-school movie musical that was really a tribute to young love and to movies from the '50s. John Travolta and Olivia Newton-John are perfectly cast, along with such '50s icons as Frankie Avalon, Sid Caesar and Eve Arden. Travolta's star quality pops off the screen in the film's very first number, "Summer Love." PG. 3-1/2 stars.



LOVE AND DEATH ON LONG ISLAND. A strange story about an effete man of letters (John Hurt) who lives as a 19th century scholar but has his life transformed by a chance encounter with a tawdry motion picture, "Hotpants College 2." Walking into the wrong theater in a multiplex, he becomes enamored of the young male star of the film, a TV heartthrob named Ronnie Bostock (Jason Priestly), and ends up renting more of his films and arranging a meeting. The passion of this quest is thoroughly entertaining in a most original story. PG-13. 3 stars.

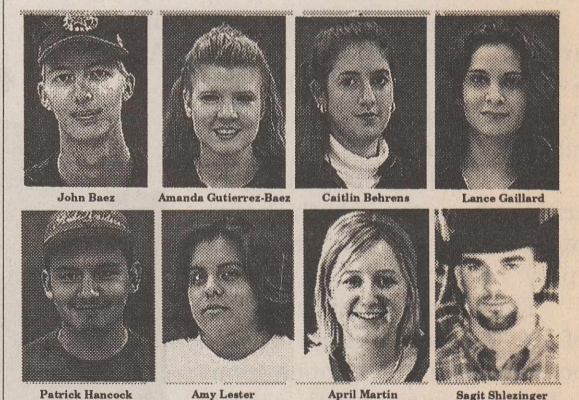
THE NEWTON BOYS. This a "Bonnie and Clyde"-inspired piece of Americana about a successful bank-robbing gang that worked mostly in the Midwest during the 1920s. The cast is young and talented, with Matthew McConaughey, Skeet Ulrich, Vincent D'Onofrio and Ethan Hawke playing the Newton crew. The script emphasizes the renegade spirit of bank robbing during that time period when robbing a bank is really robbing a robber, an institution that rips off the working class. Writer-director Richard Linklater provides an occasional line of dialogue that's fresh. The film looks good, evokes the '20s and concludes with a memorable postscript over the closing credits. PG-13. 3 stars.

TWILIGHT. The finest cast of the year, with Oscar-winners Paul Newman, Gene Hackman, Susan Sarandon (and James Garner in a supporting role!), is placed in service of a pointless exercise about faded careers and double-crosses. Newman plays a former detective investigating a murder that may involve his terminally ill good friend, Hackman, and Hackman's wife, played by Sarandon. Throughout this experience I continued to wonder what drew this all-star lineup to this lame material, written and directed by Robert Benton, who last gave Newman one of his better roles in "Nobody's Fool." None of the characters here compare to the ones in that film. R. 2 stars.



A PRICE ABOVE RUBIES. Renee Zellweger ("Jerry Maguire," "The Whole Wide World") plays a woman who tries with some difficulty to find her own identity amid the closed community of Orthodox Jews. The portrait of Hasidic Jews could hardly be less charitable but her struggle affects us simply because her character comes across as sincere and decent. Also stars Julianna Margulies from TV's "ER." 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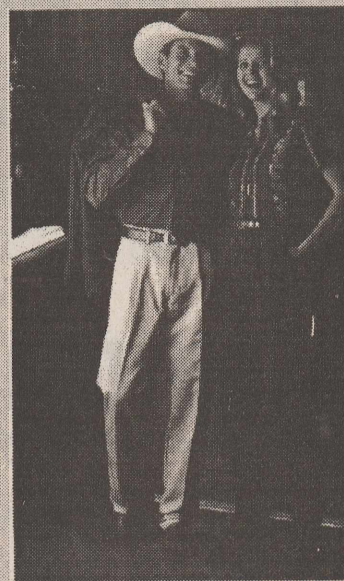
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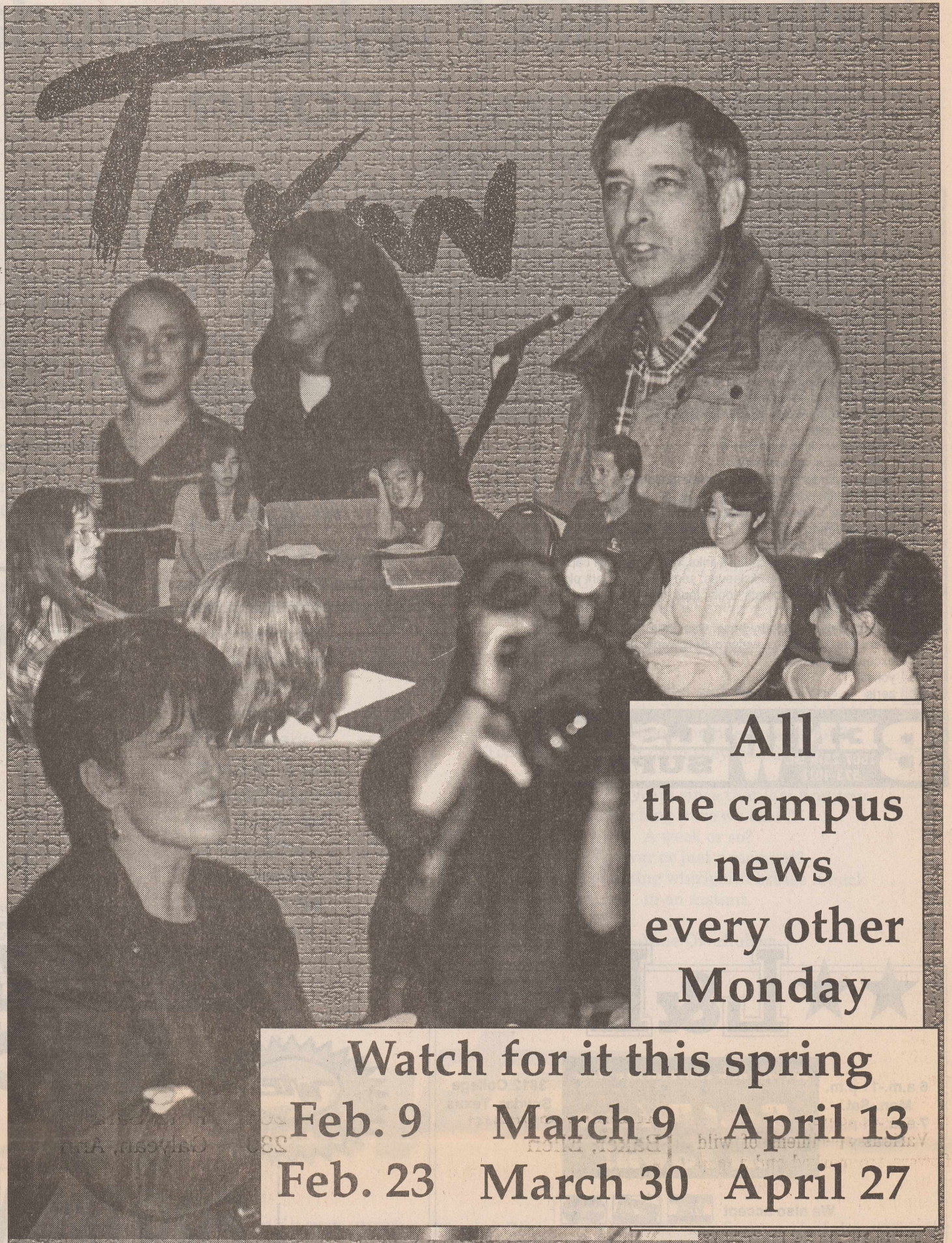

The telescope was placed in orbit in April, 1990. Scientists soon discovered its 94-inch mirror had been ground to the wrong pattern, however, distorting its images. A shuttle mission sent in 1993 to fix the mirror was a resounding success.

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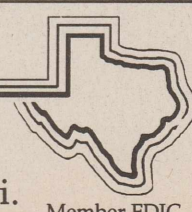

The Western Texas College golf team, ranked second in the nation as spring play began, has lost one team member and expects to lose two more following the State Juco tournament now underway.

Fredrik Widmark of Tyringe, Sweden has left the WTC campus and the men's golf team to pursue his career on the professional golf tour in Sweden.

Two other players have announced to Coach Milton Ham that they will soon follow in Widmark's footsteps, Michael

Stenger of Aabenraa, Denmark and Peter Gustavsson of Sweden.

Stenger plans to leave April 22, Ham said, and Gustavsson will leave April 19.

Ham said Widmark informed him only the day before he left—April 2—of his intent.

"He told me he and his father had been working on him turning pro for two years and that he already had two (corporate) sponsors," Ham said, among these the corporation Nike.

"I told him his timing was a little poor, but that I really couldn't blame him," Ham said.

"You're talking about the chance to make a lot of money for a long time on the pro circuit."

Ham pointed to golfer Tiger Woods as a role model for younger golfers.

"They see that a young man can compete and they want a part of it," he said.

Ham noted in the future when he signs international student golfers, her will require them to sign a guarantee that a scholarship-receiving student must stay a full season.

This past Sunday, Ham and a five-man team were at the State Juco Tournament being played

through Tuesday in Tyler.

Included in the team were two players nationally ranked in the Top 10 after the fall schedule, Andreas Ljunggren of Morrum, Sweden and Jonas Wahlstedt of Enkoping, Sweden, who were ranked No. 4 and No. 10 respectively.

"I still feel confident to play against any team with the outstanding players on this golf team," Ham said.

Following the conference tournament will be the Texas Regional Tournament and, this summer, the national tournament.

In earlier play, Widmark had led his team to a 3rd place finish in the Southern Jr/Sr Invitational, played in Alabama.

Widmark shot rounds of 69-75-75 for 219. He was 2nd place Medalist at the event.

Other individuals scores in

Alabama were: Andreas Ljunggren, 74-78-72 for 224, Jonas Wahlstedt, 79-75-75 for 229, Peter Gustavsson, 75-77-80 for 232, and Michael Stenger, 81-82-72 for 235.

The team will next attempt to qualify for a berth at the national tournament to be played in May at Dothan, Ala.

Two tournaments will provide the qualifying scores. The team is now playing at the 54-hole State Juco Tournament at Wildflower Country Club in Tyler. That tournament ends Tuesday, April 14.

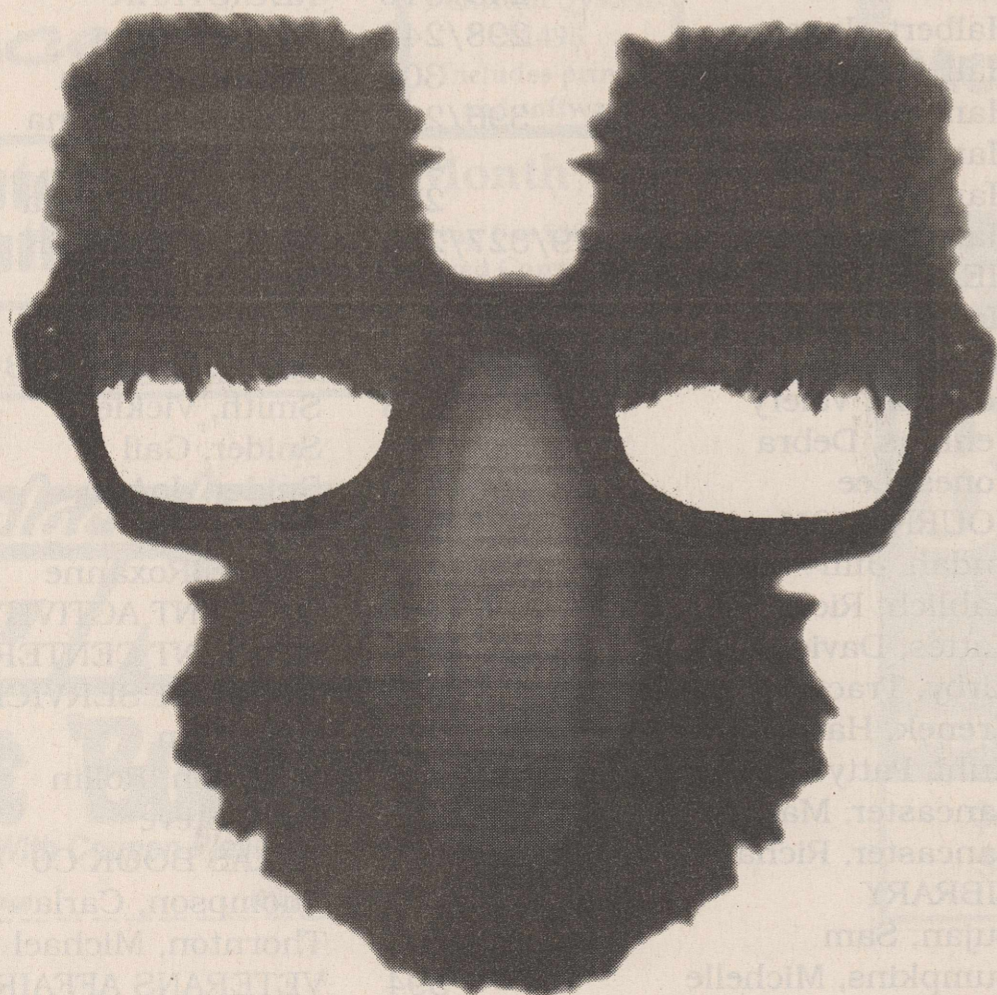
Team members playing there are Ljunggren, Wahlstedt, Stenger, Korberg and McCullough.
