

Getting to Know You

What led you to WTC:

My mother-inlaw told me about the college being created here in Snyder and encouraged me to come over and check into the possibility of being employed here. I came for the initial visit unannounced, expecting to make my motherin-law happy and nothing else. It worked out that I met both Dr. Brock and Dr. Clinton on this initial visit and was so impressed by both of them, especially Dr. Clinton's vision of what type of instruction was going to be created here and all his innovative ideas, that I decided to get a little more serious about the application process.

I had ties to this area already. My parents had lived in Snyder for a few years after I left to go to college. 
Hardest decision you've ever made:

Texas will need over 82,000 new teachers by 2008. The Bureau of Labor Statistics projects teaching as one of the fastest growing occupations over the next 5-10 years and beyond, with demand and growth continuing to increase.

In addition to signing bonuses of up to \$3,000, Texas teachers just received a \$3,000 pay increase - the highest across the board increase nationwide - raising the average teacher salary to \$38,857. Special pro-

tion will be on hand to review the requirements of their certification programs and to answer questions about the possibility of obtaining coursework in Snyder.

Students in the UTPB teacher education program receive their Bachelor's degree in one of the arts, sciences, or humanities while fulfilling Texas State Board for Education Certification requirements. Most elementary education students complete a major and a minor, while secondary education students generally complete a major and 24 hours in a second teaching field. Students who already hold a Bachelor's degree may be eligible to pursue post-Baccalaureate certificate.
