

Teacher Certification Program begins with UT Permian Basin

Area residents will have the opportunity this Fall 2003 semester to pursue Teacher Certification Programs in Snyder as the result of a partnership between Western Texas College and the University of Texas of the Permian Basin (UTPB). This fall, UTPB will offer the teacher education core courses, which satisfy introductory requirements for those wishing to teach elementary grades up to Grade 4 and those wishing to teach

The concept behind the joint effort would allow individuals to stay in Snyder while earning their bachelor's degree and teacher certification. While it may not be possible to complete 100% of the necessary coursework in Snyder, a significant amount could be available making the pursuit of the degree attractive. Junior and Senior level coursework and education classes will be provided by UTPB. Planned course delivery from UTPB to

Snyder this fall will be via interactive television

Proposed teacher certification fields will include "Early Childhood - Grade 4" and "Secondary Certification - Grades 8-12". Undergraduates in UTPB's teacher education program earn their bachelor's degree in an approved area while fulfilling certification requirements. Students typically complete a multidisciplinary major or an academic major and supporting minor, and will consult with faculty members in Education and the academic discipline for help in planning a program. Students who already hold a Bachelor's degree may be eligible to pursue Post-Baccalaureate certification.

Getting to Know You

Tammy Wesson: Talent Search Director Hired: April 29, 1985

What led you to WTC:

After receiving my bachelor's degree from Abilene Christian University in 1983, I married and lived in Tyler, TX, where I worked as an office assistant for a doctor. I then moved to Snyder in May 1985 with my husband, Jay. Snyder is his hometown, and he needed a career change and wanted to be closer to his family. My first job was working in the financial aid office here on campus. After working in that position for a few months, I started teaching part time in the Computerized Business Technology Department and eventually stepped into full time for 17 years. Recently, I assumed a new grant director's position for

Educational Talent Search. This is a federally funded TRIO grant that provides guidance services for students 6th – 12th grades and individuals up to 27 years of age to pursue a college education.

Where do you go from here:

I'm excited about the possibility of the addition of more TRIO grants in the future. Just in the few months that I have been working with Talent Search, I have already seen positive results from secondary students, parents, and WTC.

Most memorable moment: Being a part of the WTC family is special. While attending a conference in Houston with several WTC instructors, I went into premature labor with my now 13-year-old son. Janet Halbert, retired English instructor, missed her plane and stayed with me until family arrived at the hospital. We laugh now about the taxi ride to the hospital and the look on the driver's face, but at the time, it was anything but funny. When I was allowed to return to Snyder, I was overwhelmed by concern shared by all here at WTC. Coming to work each day is more than just a job; it's a place where you are surrounded by friends who care and encourage you to be your best.

Most difficult decision:

Stepping out of a teaching career into a grant director's position is the most recent hardest decision I've made. I loved teaching and miss the students, but this new position gives me the opportunity to use different skills and develop new ones. I believe that knowledge is power. With this new job, this message will be delivered to approximately 600 students across seven counties each year.
