If enrolled by June 15, 1999, the school will earn 50 bonus box tops.

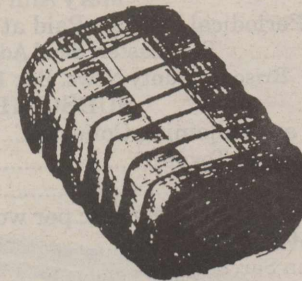
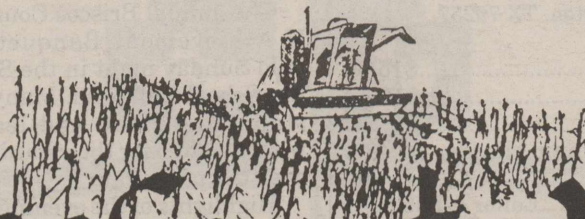

Owls Play Hard; Break Into Win Column At Guthrie Friday Night

After scoring 36, 73 and 42 points in losing the first three games, the Owls put up 67 and came away with the first win under Coach Dewaine Lee as Nathan Francis threw for eight touchdowns and ran for another.

The game ended early in the fourth quarter on the 45-point rule.

Clint Ivory kicked off to open the game for the Owls, and Seth Lee, grandson of Walter Arnold, made the runback stopped by Francis.

The Jaguars passed for a first down, then passed for a touchdown, but the PAT kick failed. With 7:16 remaining in the first quarter, Guthrie held a 6-0 lead.

Issac Garcia returned Guthrie's kickoff, and Clint picked up a first down. A pass from Francis to Adrian Ramirez was good for another first down. Francis passed to Paul Segura for the touchdown with 4:02 minutes still to be played in the first quarter. There was no PAT, and the score was knotted at 6-6.

Lee returned the ensuing kickoff, stopped by Clint Ivory. The Jaguars passed for a first down, stopped by Red Ivory, then scored on a 13-yard run by Lee. The kick failed, and with 2:14 remaining in the first quarter, Guthrie re-

gained the lead, 12-6.

The kickoff was returned by Garcia to the 23. Francis completed a pass to Daniel Reagan, picking up 14 yards, before Garcia went in for a touchdown with 34 ticks remaining on the clock. Francis passed to Reagan for the PAT, and moved the Owls into a 13-12 lead.

Clint Ivory's kickoff went into the endzone, and Seth Lee returned it to the 12. As the second quarter began, Clint Ivory recovered a Guthrie fumble and put the Owls back on offense again. Three plays later, Francis hit Reagan with a touchdown pass. There was no PAT, and the Owls moved into a 19-12 lead.

Clint kicked off again, and Guthrie took the ball on the 21, stopped by Red Ivory. Lee ran for three yards, but the Jags were forced to punt the ball away on fourth down.

Francis completed another pass to Reagan, which was good for a first down on the Guthrie 28, then passed to Garcia for a first down on the five. Francis hit Reagan for a touchdown with 5:34 remaining before halftime. There was no PAT, and the Owls held a 25-12 lead.

Francis is 6-Man Player of Week

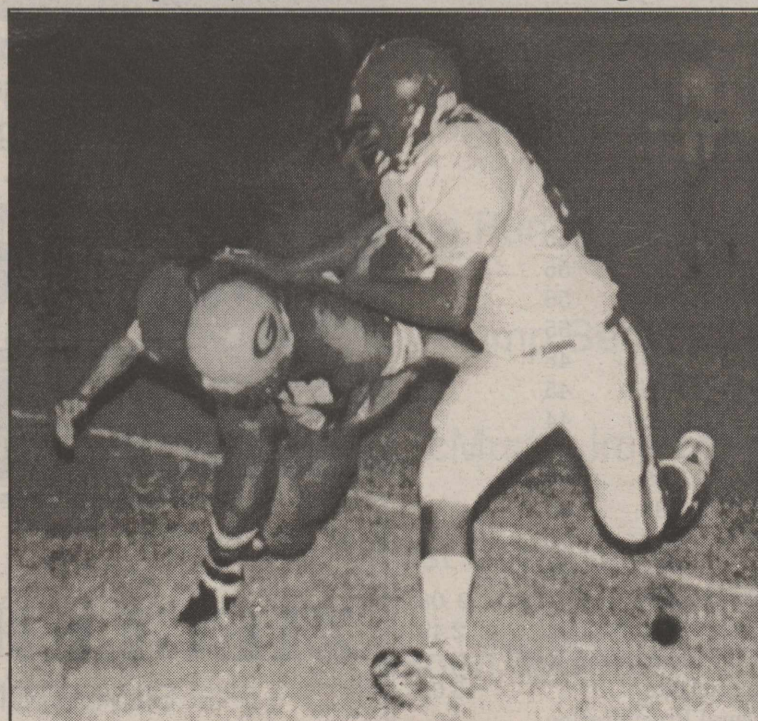
Nathan Francis was selected as 6-Man Football Player of the Week by the *Amarillo Daily News* for his performance in the Silverton vs. Guthrie game last Friday night.

The 6'3" 175-lb. senior accounted for nine touchdowns during the Owls' 67-18 flight over Guthrie, which broke a season-opening three-game losing streak. While completing 20 of 30 passes for 269 yards, he threw for eight touchdowns--including four to Daniel Reagan. He also scored on a 42-yard run.

For the season, Francis has completed 84 of 135 passes for 1,048 yards and 19 touchdowns and has rushed 41 times for 420 yards--an average of 10.2 yards per carry--and four touchdowns. He has accounted for 1,468 of his team's 1,640 yards. Francis directs an offense averaging 54.5 points a game.

"Nathan's been playing real well for us," Coach Dewaine Lee said. "He steps up his performance when he needs to."

Graveside services for Bill Self, 69, were conducted a 10:30 a.m. Monday, September 27, in the Silverton Cemetery. Ted Kingery officiated. Arrangements were made by Myers-Long Funeral Directors.

Mr. Self died at his home in Silverton Friday, September 24.

He was the fourth child of Mart and Juanita Self and was born southeast of Silverton in the home of his grandparents, Harve and Delia Riddell, Briscoe County pioneers.

He was reared and attended school in the Haylake community and was graduated from Silver-

ton High School with the Class of 1947.

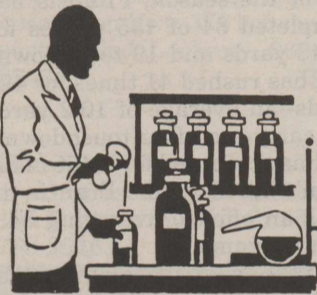
He enlisted in the Marine Corps July 29, 1948 and took his basic training at Camp Pendleton, California. He was stationed on Guam for two years and began his duty in Korea July 14, 1950. He participated in action against the enemy in the Korean Campaign and in the North Korean aggression with the Fifth Marines from August 3 until September 14, and the assault and seizure of Inchon September 15 to 17. He was wounded September 24, 1950, and was airlifted to an hospital in Japan where he underwent surgery several times for the removal of shrapnel.

He married Valvrie Honea March 30, 1951 in Weatherford, Texas.

In recent months, he had undergone cancer treatment.

He was preceded in death by a sister, Delma Masey.

Survivors include his wife, Valvrie Self of Silverton; two sons, Thomas Warren Self of Abilene and David Lee Self of Silverton; a brother, J. L. Self of Silverton; three sisters, Deal McGowen of Alamo, Texas, Lou Younger and Zobie Self, both of Silverton; five grandchildren and five great-grandchildren.

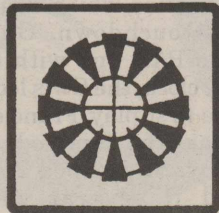

Francis completed a pass to Ramirez, to move the ball to the 22, after which Garcia ran for a first down. Francis passed complete to Ramirez again before hitting Reagan with a first-down pass. Francis passed to Reagan for the touchdown with 2:10 still in the third quarter. The PAT kick was blocked, and the Owls held a 31-12 lead.

Clint kicked off again, the Jags scored two plays later, kicked the PAT, and narrowed the score to 31-18 with 1:19 remaining before the half.

Reagan recovered the onside kick, and on third down Francis passed to Clint Ivory to move the ball to midfield. Francis passed to Red Ivory for the touchdown with 39 ticks left on the clock. Garcia kicked the PAT, to give the Owls a 39-18 lead.

On Guthrie's next series, Red Ivory almost intercepted a pass as the first half ended.

Guthrie performed the onside kick to open the third quarter, and this was controlled by Reagan. Francis passed to Ramirez for a first down before hitting Reagan with another touchdown pass. The PAT failed, and with 9:22 still to be played, the Owls moved into a 45-18 lead.

Clint kicked and Lee returned to near midfield. Guthrie ran four plays and the ball went back to the Owls on downs.

Francis completed a long pass to Ramirez, which was caught out of bounds, after which Francis ran for a touchdown. Garcia kicked the PAT, and with 6:37 still on the clock, the Owls led 53-18. On the first play, Francis hit the Jaguar who fumbled, and Ryan Minyard grabbed it and advanced it several yards. Francis hit Reagan with another touchdown pass, Garcia kicked the PAT and the score became 61-18 with 6:12 remaining on the clock.
