

South Plains Weather Warmer, **Much Drier**

Weather across the Texas South Plains during the month of November 1999 was significantly warmer and much drier than normal.

Temperatures averaged 5.9 degrees above normal and ranged from 4.1 degrees abve normal at Lamesa to 8.0 degrees above normal at Matador.

Silverton's temperatures averaged 53.5 degrees, which was almost a degree above the South Plains average.

Maximum temperatures averaged 8.8 degrees above normal and ranged from 6.6 degrees above normal at Snyder to 11.0 degrees above normal at Abernathy. The highest temperature during the month was 86 degrees at Spur on the 18th.

Silverton's maximum temperatures averaged 71.2 degrees, which was 1.1 degree below the South Plains average.

Minimum temperatures averaged 3.0 degrees above normal and ranged from 0.2 degrees above normal at ulia to 6.1 derees above normal at Matador. The lowest temperature reported during the month was 16 degrees at Muleshoe on the 15th.

Silverton's minimum temperatures averaged 35.8 degrees, which was more than a degree below the South Plains average.

Precipitation averaged 0.76 inches below normal and ranged from 1.03 inches below normal at Paducah to 0.75 inches below normal at Lubbock

This has been the driest November since 1960 in Lubbock and the second driest since records began in 1914. There was no precipitation recorded from any reporting station on the South Plains during the month of November.

Winter Driving Safety Tips

Winter weather travel hazards in Texas can vary from none at all to light patches of ice to fullblown blizzards. Traveling long distance in Texas requires both drivers and passengers to be knowledgeable and prepared.

The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) indicates that transportation crashes are the leading cause of death during winter storms. Getting a vehicle ready for a winter trip is critical. Have a mechanic check the antifreeze levels, ignition system, battery, thermostat, lights, exhaust system, heater, brakes and defroster. Take a look at wipers and windshield washer fluid, as well as the oil level (maybe change to a winter grade of oil). Make sure the tires are in good shape, with plenty of tread.

Plan long trips carefully, especially if wintery weather threatens. Check road condition with the Texas Department of Transportation by calling 800-452-9292, or through the internet at: www.dot.state.tx.us/hcr/ main htm

If there is a threat of winter weather, take along a car safety kit, including a flashlight with extra batteries, a first aid kit, an extra blanket or two, an ice scraper, plastic bags, matches, rain gear, a small shovel and booster cables. Also take along some extr food and water, and let someone know your travel plans.



with planes and flying began during his first plane ride at age 12 with his uncle at the controls. As a teen, he built many model airplanes from kits. As an adult he is building a Falco two-seat, single engine plane from scratch. Three rolls of plans and a thick instruction book lay open on a workbench in the large workshop in his backyard that houses the creation.

"There it is," he said as he opened the building door to the clean and organized workspace.

Rampley has been working on the plane, 40-year-old Italian design, for seven years.

"I'm out here fairly regularly. It just takes a lot of time," he says. He shows a wing rib, one of many in the construction, that has numerous small pieces of differentsized wood parts.

"It's a lot of detail work," said Rampley, a pharmacist by day at Economy Pharmacy on north York

Rampley's wife, Pam, a secretary at Tony Goetz Elementary School, said her husband is blessed with patience.

"He's one of those people who can sit and work a jigsaw puzzle or things like that for hours and days. I have to get with it and finish it in a day or two," she said.

"It does take a lot of patience," he said.

Sometimes Rampley's threeyear-old grandson, Braden Lanier, helps. Pam Rampley recalls moments when her husband and grandson sit in the kitchen floor bending wood for certain parts of the plane.

"This was my first experience at bending wood," he said. Rampley showed a piece of the

tail section that had been soaked in water for several days, heated with a steamer and then curved to fashion the smooth, rounded piece. The thicker wood of the plane is spruce and the plywood used for curving is birch.

Rings of different sizes, the skeletons of the fuselage, hang on hooks at the west end of Rampley's workshop. The wing spars, landing gears with wheels and part of the fuselge skeleton is supported by a harness Rampley built. A heavy piece of

Rampley's not sure when his plane will be finished.

"I don't have a deadline," he

But he doesn't have to wait for to enjoy his hobby of flying.

He owns a plane that he houses at Tenkiller Airpark near Cookson. One of his days off each week is usually spent flying. He earned his pilot's license in 1968.

Sometimes he flies to the popular Oshkosh (Wisconsin) Fly-In.
"Now that is a kick," he said

with a smile.

Rampley flips through a colorpage book to find the photo of what his finished plane will look like. He plans to cover his wood with a thin, thin coating of fiberglass just as a wood protector.

"I like the wood, but I kinda like this red, too. You don't see many red planes," he said as he pointed to a sleek, fire-engine red colored two-seated plane with a larger-than-usual glass roof.

"You can see so much more with one like that," he said.

Rampley is the son of Faye Rampley of Silverton and the late O. C. Rampley. He and his wife, the former Pam Thompson, are graduates of Silverton High

Born July 8, 1948 in El Paso, he is a 1971 graduate of Southwestern Oklahoma State Univer-

The Y2K Motorists

Motorists are being urged to use extra caution as they travel after the first of the year, especially at intersections.

The Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) does not expect Y2K problems with traffic signals, but says motorists should always be careful when entering an intersection.

We have been working since early 1998 upgrading and testing equipment on the nearly 6,800 traffic signals on the state highway system," said Carlos Lopez, director of traffic operations for TxDOT. "If power is available, our traffic signals should handle the January 1 date change without a problem. If the power goes out, motorists will need to use caution and watch out for other

Motorists should take extra care at an intersection with a traffic signal that is not working and they should be prepared to give other drivers the right of way if necessary, according to TxDOT.

Right of way is something to be given, not taken," said Lopez. "Courtesy is the key to safe driv-

ing."
Crashes can be prevented if motorists play it safe, according to TxDOT officials. Driving at a speed appropriate for the conditions, using seat belts properly and never drinking and driving are some of the safe driving practices they say motorists should always follow.

"Holiday periods, like New Year's Day, are often a time to celebrate, but they should never be an excuse to get behind the wheel of a car after you have been drinking," said Lopez.

According to the Texas Department of Public Safety, nearly 30 percent of all traffic fatalities in Texas last year were alcohol re-

In addition to checking and upgrading signal lights on state highways, TxDOT also has been serving as a resource on traffic issues for cities and counties across the state. All the signal components and electronic controllers have been upgraded.

Because so many people depend on Social Security, we feel special responsibility to be ready for the new millennium and the Y2K computer problem. Our benefit payments systems are Y2K ready and have been for a full year ahead of the new millennium. We will be able to do all of our tasks on January 1, 2000, which include paying monthly benefit to 50 million people, tracking the earnings of 145 million workers, and processing six million new benefit applications next year.

The Social Security Administration (SSA) has no reason to expect a disruption to the delivery of benefit payments in January 2000. However, we have developed contingency plans to handle any unexpected or unforeseen disruption that may be beyond our control.

Social Security's payment delivery schedule with appropriate contingency plans are as follow:

•Since January 1, 2000, is a holiday, Supplemental Security Income (SSI) payments will be delivered December 30, 1999. Therefore, there should not be any Y2K problems with the January SSI payments.

 Social Security payments for January will be made on Monday, January 3, 2000.

• The post office will receive checks a day earlier than normally scheduled to ensure timely delivery on January 3

•In the case of direct deposit, SSA expects benefit payment delivery to financial institutions to be conducted in a "business as usual" manner. However, if problems occur with direct deposit payments, SSA will work with the Treasury Department and the Federal Reserve to resolve problems at a troubled financial institution and make payments available.

•SSA offices will provide emergency payments to beneficiaries in cases of dire need as called for by existing procedures
