# Four volunteer fire departments protect citizens of Lynn County

Being a volunteer means that you are offering something something that is not required nor an obligation. Most of the time, to volunteer means that you are working side by side with others. This connects you to other human beings as you are working toward a common goal. In Lynn County, there are many volunteers, and during National Fire Prevention and Safety Week, Oct. 4-10, the focus is on those who contribute so much to society by volunteering to serve in the four fire departments here.

Tahoka, Wilson, O'Donnell and New Home all have excellent volunteer fire departments that protect and serve the citizens of their communities and surrounding areas. During Fire Prevention Safety Week, tell the members of these fire departments how much they are appreciated for their dedication and tireless service that they provide so willingly.

As a nation, and especially in Lynn County, citizens rely on the volunteer fire service every day to save lives and protect property in times of danger and disaster. These volunteers perform fire suppression and other related emergency services for local jurisdictions, and are also expected to attend other non-emergency duties as well (training, fundraising, equipment maintenance, etc.) In addition, they often respond to traffic accidents, assist with traffic control, assist EMS, assist with landing zones for medical transports, fuel spills, bee attacks and other disasters.

Firefighters also provide an important role in educating the public regarding fire and safety. By teaching fire prevention and educating the public on how to respond in emergency situations, they can help save lives. During Fire Prevention Safety Week, firefighters remind citizens to have a fire safety plan for their family at home, to practice that plan with family members, and to test smoke alarms to make sure all are working.

The men that serve in our local. fire departments have sacrificed many hours in training, continuing education, and most importantly, in responding to the call when needed, no matter the hour day or night. They are true heroes to their communities, because they do this volunteer work in addition to their full-time jobs, and sacrifice time with their families, to provide a service that should never be taken for granted.

The four volunteer departments, while operating under the auspices of the city governments for which they serve, are funded from various resources. In addition to funding from each city, as well as annual funding from Lynn County governmental coffers, each fire department also undertake their own fundraisers to bring additional funding to purchase extra equipment or other needs for their departments. Most host an annual dinner/auction that community members are good to support. (See VOLUNTEERS, page 8)





### T-Bar Drive-In Theatre opens

The new T-Bar Drive-In Theatre, built and operated by the Wallace Theatres, was opened Wednesday night, and will be opened nightly in the future.

Four feature programs will be shown weekly, according to Lester P. Flood, local manager of the four Wallace shows in Tahoka. Show dates will be Thursday, Friday, Saturday, Sunday and Monday, and Tuesday and Wednesday.

The T-Bar Drive-In Theatre, located a mile north of town on the east side of the Lubbock highway, is new and modern in every respect. It is named in honor of the T-Bar Ranch of Lynn County, one of the oldest ranches on the Plains, and is decorated in blue and white, the Tahoka school colors.





New Home Coop Gin beginning processing by the end of this week, and Wells Coop Gin reported that Wayne Barton brought in the first cotton for processing on Tuesday, Oct. 6, which will soon be processed.

In O'Donnell, Farmers Coop Gin officials anticipate they will begin processing around Oct. 19-21, and Woolam Gin officials expect to begin in a couple of weeks.

Garlyn Coop also expects it to be a couple of weeks before they begin processing the harvest.

# Lynn County property tax statements should arrive during month of October

Lynn County property owners should expect to receive their 2020 property tax statements during the month of October, according to information this week from the Lynn County Appraisal District, which sends out statements to collect property taxes as set by all county taxing

All taxpayers with multiple properties will receive a single combined multi-item statement, instead of individual statements for each property.

January 31 is the deadline to pay property taxes. After that, the late payment fees, penalties and interest begin to add up quickly.

A \$25,000 homestead exemption on school district taxes (deducted from the total value of the home) is available for property owners who use the home as their principal residence on January 1 of the tax year.

Homeowners may file an Application for Residential Homestead Exemption with the appraisal district for the \$25,000 homestead exemption up to one year after the taxes on the homestead are due. Once you receive the exemption, you do not need to reapply unless you should move or your qualification ends.

An additional \$10,000 exemption on school district taxes is available for homeowners age 65 or older, or disabled. And, their school district taxes are frozen at the total amount of taxes that were due when they turned 65 or disabled, no matter what rate the school district's current tax rate is set (unless you move to a different

A \$3,000 exemption on county taxes is given for homeowners age 65 or older, and for disabled under 65.

Also, disabled or over-65 homeowners may opt to pay their taxes in four installments instead of a onetime full payment. To make the installment payments, the homeowner must notify the Appraisal District

**Terry County** approves two new subdivisions near Wellman



Some departments also write bers on the force. Craig Wilgrant applications to seek grant funding from other sources.

The Wilson VFD just recently hosted a drive-up fish fry and auction, and O'Donnell VFD has a driveup fish fry scheduled for Sunday, Oct. 25, from 11 a.m.-2 p.m. at the OVFD Fire Hall. Tahoka VFD usually has an annual fish fry as well.

O'Donnell VFD has a membership list of 24 active members, with over 410 hours of training. Brandon Pyron is Fire Chief, and is employed as a Flight Paramedic. According to the OVFD 2019 call log, the department responded to 104 calls during the previous year, including 2 structural fires, 1 non-structure fire, 7 wildland/grass/trash fires, 1 fire-utility, 2 fire-standby, 14 motor vehicle accidents, 52 EMS assistance, 15 landing zones, 4 utility stand-by, and 6 traffic control.

Bryan Reynolds is Fire Chief of Tahoka VFD, which has 20 active members. Reynolds is the manager of Farmers Coop Gin Association #1 in Tahoka. According to Reynolds, the department responded to 46 calls in 2019, including 11 grass fires, 8 house fires, 5 car fires, 9 other fires, 4 vehicle accidents, 5 hazmat responses, 3 assistance, and 1 tornado response.

Ryan Gill, Fire Chief of New Home VFD, reports that the department has responded this year to approximately 10 fire calls (mostly grass fires) and two vehicle accidents. Gill is self-employed as a cotton farmer, and there are 12 members on the New Home

Wilson VFD has 11 memke, a farmer, is Fire Chief. David Maldonado, Training and Public Information Officer for the department, reported that the Wilson VFD responds to an average of 20-30 calls an-

All of the fire departments are good to respond with a helping hand for their neighboring fire departments in the county when needed. Lynn County citizens depend on the four volunteer fire departments to protect their property and families, and appreciate the dedication and service of these 67 volunteers who put the needs of their communities so high on their list of priorities, and are willing to make the extra effort to serve their fellow man.

# **HPWD Board considering possible rule revisions**

At their October 13 regular meeting, the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District (HPWD) Board of Directors are expected to approve dates for one or more public hearings to receive comments on proposed rule revisions.

HPWD Board Members met with the District's County Advisory Committees (CAC) during a series of annual meetings in March 2020. At that time, the CAC members provided feedback on current HPWD rules and recommended that the Board proceed with draft revisions.

The proposed rule revisions cover a wide range of topics, including:

· Removing requirement for pump log submittal in order for a water well permit to be considered administratively complete.

· Adding a "Sunset Provision" for the conservation reserve (water banking) pro-

In accordance with state law, public notice must be provided 20 days in advance of the rulemaking hearing(s). The proposed rule changes would be adopted in December.
