Remote learning not serving students well: Tahoka ISD Board votes to end virtual instruction for students

he Tahoka Independent School District Board of Trustees took unanimous action at last Tuesday night's board meeting to eliminate remote virtual instruction for TISD students, after serious discussions about the lack of progress of about half of the

students currently involved in a remote instruction program. All Tahoka

ISD students will be required to return to in-class instruction by Nov. 9. Following the board action, Tahoka ISD Superintendent Dick Van Hoose composed a letter to send to

parents explaining the decision. This letter is printed in full, as follows:

"At the beginning of the year TISD offered two instructional methods to students: Traditional Instruction and Remote Virtual Instruction.

"After careful consideration and input from teachers, administrators and district families, the Tahoka Board of Trustees has voted to suspend virtual instruction effective November 9th. Students will be able to return to in-class instruction now and any time before the date of suspended virtual instruction, however all students are expected to return by November 9th for in-class instruction.

"The decision to end virtual instruction was not taken lightly. District and campus administrators believe it is in the best interest of Tahoka students. During our first eight weeks of instruction, we have had low incident rates of Covid-19

and high failure rates with remote learners. The district is serving 73 students remotely. Of the 36 students in grades 6-12 being served virtually, 20 are failing at least one class. Of the 37 students in PK-5 being served remotely, 15 are not being successful.

"While some students have remained actively engaged and successful throughout the process, a high number of our virtual learners are suffering educationally and are not showing learning progress. Our teachers and administrators have made numerous attempts to reach and engage virtual learners but have seen minimal improvement or success. As a district, our job is to serve students and provide them with the best possible educational opportunities. Thus, the decision to end virtual instruction. The only exception to this decision will be for students with serious existing health conditions or students that are being quarantined because of a confirmed test or being in close contact with someone that has tested positive.

"We hope parents will agree with this decision and return your child to in-face instruction. If you do not agree, you have options for educating your child. Included in the choices are home schooling or enrolling your child in an online platform provided by Texas Tech. Another platform you can explore is "K-12", a tuition free online curriculum.

"Be assured we are cleaning throughout the day, wearing masks in grades 3-12, practicing social distancing where possible and ending the day with spraying our facilities, including buses, with chemicals that are recommended for use in fighting

"Again, as we make this transition, you can bring your student back to traditional instruction at any time. Students not enrolled by November 9th will be considered truant and subject to state laws. "Thank for your support

throughout the year. Please help our district and your student in this process to get back to face-to-face instruction." - Dick Van Hoose,

Superintendent, Tahoka ISD During a video presentation on Tuesday afternoon on the Lynn County Hospital District facebook page, Superintendent Van Hoose said that currently there are eight TISD staff members that are being quarantined - of which only three tested positive but others were quarantined due to close contact. He also said that at the Jr High campus there are currently 18 students quarantined, but stressed that only one student has tested positive, the rest are being quarantined due to close contact with known exposure to Covid outside the school

"Tahoka ISD campuses have been deeply sanitized per CDC guidelines, and we sanitize daily. All TISD employees and students are instructed to continue to follow CDC guidelines and recommendations and to practice social distancing," the superintendent told The

Updates on Covid issues are posted on the TISD website.

Park on North side of Courthouse for Curbside Voting:

Early Voting continues thru Oct. 30 here

Early Voting is underway, and continues through Friday, Oct. 30, for the November 3 General Election, as well as for three other local elections that are being held in conjunction with the general election. As of early Tuesday afternoon, 554 ballots had been cast in Lynn County during the first 5-1/2 days of early voting in the general election.

In Lynn County, early voting for the General Election is conducted at the Lynn County Clerk's Office, on the first floor of the Lynn County Courthouse, during regular business hours Monday-Friday, 8:30 a.m. -5:00 p.m. (open during noon hour). On Oct. 30, the last day of early voting, the hours are extended to a 12-hour early voting period, from 7 a.m.-7 p.m.

Safety protocols for COVID-19 will be followed. Election officials will wear face coverings, and ask that all voters wear a mask as a courtesy. Hand sanitizer and face masks will be available at the courthouse, and election officials ask that when a voter picks up a pen to mark a ballot to take the pen with them when they leave.

Curbside voting is also available during the early voting period. To vote curbside, park on the north side of the courthouse (this is a change, was originally scheduled for the west side) and call the County Clerk's office at 806-561-4750 (signage with this number will be posted at the curb). An election of-

ficial will bring the ballot to your vehicle for marking.

Voters are reminded to bring their Voter Registration card and Driver's License or other form of identification to polling locations, and to please wear face coverings whether voting curbside or inside the courthouse.

In addition to the General Election, there are three other elections being held in Lynn County on Nov. 3, with the same early voting periods.

The City of Tahoka special election is for a one-year unexpired term for the District 1 city council seat. Only those registered voters residing in the District 1 area of Tahoka will be eligible to vote in this election. Election officials can determine if a voter is eligible, but generally District 1 is an area south from N. 1st Street to the southern edge of town, and between Ave. P and Ave. K, although the boundaries change slightly in some areas.

The New Home ISD election is for three seats on the Board of Trustees, with nine candidates vying for the three positions.


The Wilson ISD election is for three seats on the Board of Trustees.

We do have the capability of screening you. Can you come to LCHD if you think you have covid or been exposed? Absolutely. Call your primary care provider, and we will direct you to the appropriate next spot to get tested and/or get your symptoms treated. Do not hesitate to call us if you need help - we are here 24 hours a day," she added...

Dr. Christopher Leach but others were quarantined answered some questions due to close contact. He also from citizens sending those in during the video presentation. He said that if someone knows that they have been exposed to someone who is covid-positive, they should immediately quarantine and then wait 3-5 days before being tested.

"If you know you were exposed to someone who is covid-positive, please quarantine and then go get tested in 3-5 days. If you then test positive, we recommend a 14-day quarantine. Most people, their symptoms resolve in 14 days - however, if you are still symptomatic you need to remain quarantined," stated Dr. Leach.

"All of the providers here are on the cutting edge of keeping up with all the current treatments. Please call your provider if you have symptoms. Based on your symptoms and what you have going on, that is how we determine your course of treatment," he added.

LCHD sponsored a driveyou to do in the past - wear thru flu shot clinic in Tahoka last Thursday, and one was scheduled in O'Donnell on Wednesday of this week.

"If you missed the driveup flu shot clinic, we still have plenty of flu shots available, just call your provider here at LCHD and they will set up a time for you to get that," added Dr. Richburg.

Brownfield leadership warns of local rise in COVID cases

"Currently Terry County has the most active cases since this all began in March. We believe there has been "COVID Fatigue" in our community, everyone please remember the simple things we do can help prevent the spread. Wearing face masks, social distance, and sanitize your hands will go a long ways to prevent the spread of this ugly virus. If you are sick or someone in your family is sick, stay home," said Davis.

"Recently there have been several confirmed cases that are not quarantining per direction of medical professionals or Texas Dept. of State Health Services. We are working with SPPHD and law enforcement on these people who refuse to stay home."



"The physical and financial loss experienced by farmers and ranchers impacted by natural disaster events in 2018 and 2019 was widespread and catastrophic," said Richard Fordyce, Administrator of USDA's Farm Service Agency (FSA). "Fortunately, in addition to our already extensive suite of disaster assistance programs for crop and livestock producers, we were able to provide additional support through WHIP+. If you have not yet submitted your application for assistance, please don't miss your chance."

WHIP+ compensates producers for losses due to hurricanes, floods, snowstorms, tornadoes, typhoons, volcanic activity, drought, excessive moisture, and wildfires occurring in calendar years 2018 and 2019. Drought and excessive moisture were added as eligible losses for the program in March 2020. To date, FSA has received more than 133,000 applications for WHIP+ disaster assistance and paid out nearly \$1.4 billion in WHIP+ benefits.

Next week, FSA will launch a new tool on the farmers.gov WHIP+ webpage to help producers understand eligibility for the program and whether they had possible losses in 2018 and 2019. The tool will also allow producers an opportunity to provide

Through CRP, farmers and ranchers establish longresource-conserving plant species, such as approved grasses or trees, to control soil erosion, improve water quality, and enhance wildlife habitat on cropland. vides annual rental payment water quality, provide habitat Farmers and ranchers who participate in CRP help provide numerous benefits to the nation's environment and economy.

Signed into law in 1985, CRP is one of the largest privatelands conservation programs in the U.S. It was originally intended to primarily control soil erosion and potentially stabilize commodity prices by taking marginal lands out of production. The program has evolved over the years, providing many conservation and economic benefits. The program marks its 35-year anniversary this December. Program successes include:

 Preventing more than 9 billion tons of soil from eroding, which is enough soil to fill 600 million dump trucks;

· Reducing nitrogen and phosphorous runoff relative to annually tilled cropland by 95 and 85 percent respectively;

· Sequestering an annual average of 49 million tons of greenhouse gases, equal to taking 9 million cars off the

· Creating more than 3 million acres of restored wetlands while protecting more than 175,000 stream miles with riparian forest and grass buffers, which is enough to go around the world 7 times; and

· Benefiting bees and other pollinators and increased populations of ducks, pheasants, turkey, bobwhite quail, prairie chickens, grasshopper sparrows, and many other birds.

The successes of CRP contribute to USDA's Agriculture Innovation Agenda and its goal of reducing the environmental footprint of U.S. agriculture by half by 2050.

CRP participants with contracts effective beginning on October 1, 2020, will receive their first annual rental payment in October 2021.
