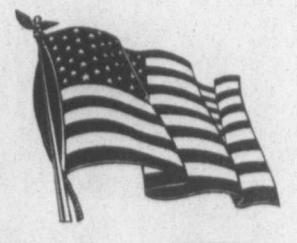

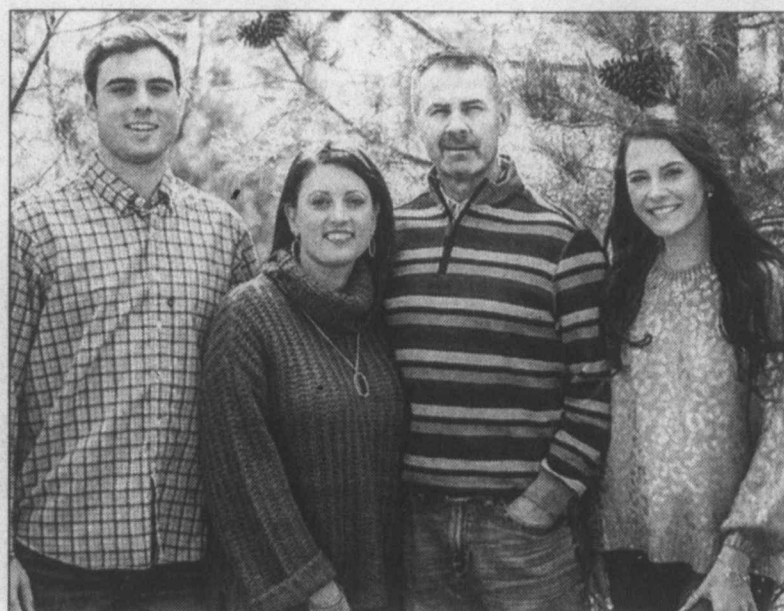

## Torrey Price named Lone Finalist for Tahoka ISD Superintendent

The Tahoka Independent School District Board of Trustees has named Torrey Price as the Lone Finalist for the Superintendent's position at TISD.

By state statute, the Board must now wait 21 days before action can be taken to employ Mr. Price. He is currently the middle school principal at Stamford ISD. He also served as high school principal at Baird ISD and Sherman ISD. Prior to entering administration, Price was the athletic director and head football coach at Tom Bean High School. He also taught special education at Collinsville, Lindsay, Little Elm and Pilot Point.

Price received his bachelor's degree from Texas A&M Commerce University in 2004, and his master's degree from Southern State in Durant, Oklahoma in 2010. He received his Superintendent's certification through the Region 14 ESC in 2020.

Price and his wife, Tonya, the chief nursing officer at Vernon hospital, have two children, a daughter, Talyn, a senior at Texas Tech, and a son, Trace a freshman at ACU. They plan to move to Tahoka as soon as his schedule permits, and he plans to begin his superintendent duties on or before July 1st.

Citizens will be able to make an appointment for the vaccine

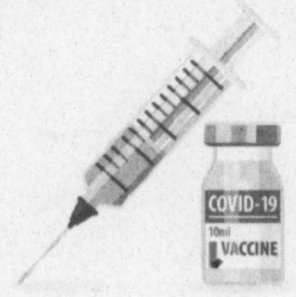
starting at 10:00 a.m. Tuesday, March 9th through 2:30 p.m., Thursday, March 25th.

## Lynn County Hospital announces rebranding to: Lynn County Healthcare System

Lynn County Hospital, a regional leader in rural healthcare delivery, has announced a rebrand as Lynn County Healthcare System.

"In January 1971, the hospital opened our doors, and a rich history of service began. We believe rebranding as Lynn County Hospital positions us well for the next chapter of this organization's commitment to providing comprehensive healthcare services," said Dr. Melanie Richburg, chief executive officer.

In addition to the rebrand, Dr. Richburg explained Lynn County Hospital is beginning a comprehensive renovation this year. Updates include new hospital rooms, new wheelchair-accessible bathrooms in each room, and a dedicated wing with independent ventilation systems, as well as the construction of a long-term care nursing facility on the hospital's campus.

Dr. Richburg projects the renovations and addition of the

nursing home will cost \$20-million dollars. Funding for the project is being sought through a USDA loan. Dr. Richburg states the loan application process will take about nine months for approval and says the hospital is seeking a fixed rate of 2.1%.

"We are excited to expand our commitment of offering healthcare closer to home. Our expansion, the addition of a nursing home, and the strength of Lynnwood Independent and Assisted Living Center will

position Lynn County Hospital as a continued leader for the next fifty years and beyond," Dr. Richburg added.

Lynn County Hospital is operated by the Lynn County Hospital District, which is governed by a seven-member elected board of directors. Current members include W. Calloway Huffaker (president), Sharon Isham, Dr. Ed Smith, Manuel DeLeon, Mary Gayle Raindl, Jana Bishop, and Connie Donald.

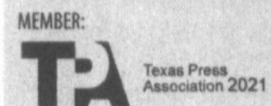

Alyssa Elizondo earned a Superior on her flute solo, "Sonata" by Poulenc. Also, earning a Superior was Ane

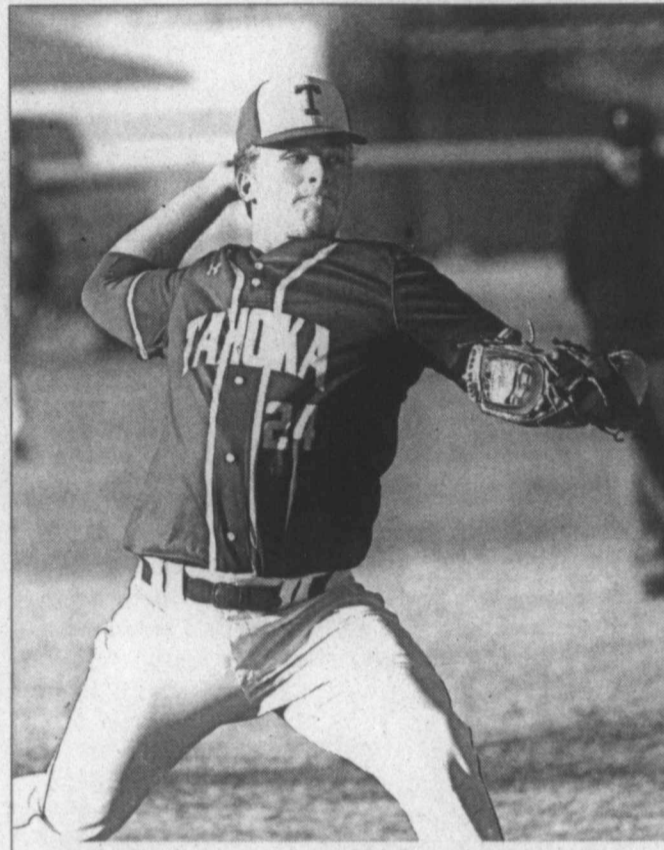

**Commissioners have routine meeting**

Lynn County Commissioners met in regular session on Monday, March 8, at 9:30 a.m. in the Commissioners' Courtroom in the Lynn County Courthouse. Commissioners Matt Woodley, John Hawthorne, Don Blair, and Larry Durham were all present with County Judge Mike Braddock presiding. Commissioners voted to

extend the county's bank depository with First Bank and trust for an additional two years, in a unanimous decision.

In other action, commissioners approved an interlocal agreement between Scurry County and Lynn County for housing Lynn County inmates in the Scurry County Jail, if needed. Judge Braddock explained that this agreement is being made in case female inmates exceed the number that can be accommodated at Lynn County Jail.

Commissioners approved to accept a lease purchase agreement for a maintainer for Pct. 2.

Sheriff Wanda Mason presented a report on the Lynn County Sheriff's Office, and Tax Assessor/Collector Donna Willis also presented a report. Monthly bills were approved as presented. The meeting adjourned at 11:30 a.m.

## LCHD Foundation sets 2021 annual auction for May 15

The annual auction benefiting Lynn County Hospital District, which was canceled last year due to the Covid-19 Pandemic, has been scheduled to return this year on May 15.

The LCHD Foundation's Billy Tomlinson Memorial Hospital Benefit Auction raises funds for the LCHD Foundation, which in turn directly helps make improvements at Lynn County Hospital District. Every dollar raised benefits the local hospital and its programs. The Hospital District serves several rural communities including Tahoka, Wilson, New Home, O'Donnell, Lamesa and Post.

This year's event will be the 40th annual benefit auction. It will be held Saturday, May 15, at the Lynn County Showbarn in Tahoka, starting at 5:30 p.m. The event features a live auction, silent auction, door prizes, raffle prizes, and the popular all-you-can-eat fish fry prepared by members of the Tahoka Volunteer Fire Department.

Lynn County Hospital District's Board of Directors has selected new hospital beds for this year's funds to target. These new beds will be used

in patient care. According to LCHD, the new hospital beds run \$11,000 each.

"Our goal this year is to raise \$55,000," said W. Calloway Huffaker, President of the LCHD Foundation. "In 2019 your participation in this auction helped us raise over \$55,000 for LCHD, which was used to help purchase a wheelchair-accessible transport van that is now being used by Lynnwood as well as the Swing Bed program at Lynn County Hospital. Your participation and support is vital to this facility."

Supporters of past auctions, including area businesses and individuals, are being asked to once again share their generosity by contributing items for the auction. Anyone contributing will be recognized at the live auction, as well in the newspaper. All contributions are 100 percent tax deductible, as the LCHD Foundation is a 501(C)3 non-profit.

## Five powerlifters qualify for regional event

Tahoka High School powerlifters Alex Tew, Paxtyn Gwin, Dylan Quintero, Jon'Dylan Rodriguez, and Kade Hurt qualified for the Regional Powerlifting meet, after the THS team competed in the last qualifiers powerlifting meet held at Sundown. Regionals will be at Sundown on Thursday, March 11th starting at 2:00 pm.

At the Sundown meet last week, Alex Tew placed 2nd in the 220 weight class with a total of 1115 pounds, including 405 squat, 235 bench, and 475 deadlift; Kade Hurt placed 2nd in the 308 weight class with a total of 1005 pounds, including 425 squat, 185 bench and 395 deadlift.

Three powerlifters finished in third place, including: Dylan Quintero, 198 weight class, 1030 total, 350 squat, 245 bench, and 435 deadlift; Paxtyn Gwin, 132 weight class, 840 total, 315 squat, 175 bench, 350 deadlift; and Jon'Dylan Rodriguez, 242 weight class, 1065 total, 370 squat, 250 bench, and 445 deadlift.

Jonathan Renteria finished 7th in the 148 weight class, 885 total, 315 squat, 170 bench, 400 deadlift; and Thomas Sullivan finished 10th in the 148 weight class, 805 total, 285 squat, 180 bench, and 340 deadlift.

"I was extremely proud of all our lifters and the huge gains they made this season," said Coach Kent Allison.

Both the Tahoka High School boys and girls track teams were the Team Champions of the Crosbyton Track Meet held Friday, March 5th.

"The Tahoka Bulldogs participated in their first track meet of the year in Crosbyton this past Friday. All our athletes competed very well even with the wind and cold fighting against them. The boys came out of their first meet as Team Champions. I am super proud of the boys' success on Friday and I am looking forward to what the rest of our season has to offer," said Kavin Comer, head boys track coach.

The boys team had 5 first place finishers. The girls team claimed 8 first place honors at the meet, and as a team scored 154 points to claim the girls Team Champion honors.

"I wasn't sure what to expect with only 12 girls running track, but the girls hear me say this every day, that quality is better than quantity," said Kent Allison, head girls track coach.

First place finishers for the Lady Bulldogs included Madison Rose, Shot Put, and Discus; Zoie Garvin, Long Jump, and 200m; Amy Tew, 800m; Brooklyn Harris, 100 hurdles, and 300 hurdles; and the 4x200 Relay Team of Miranda DeLeon, Amy Tew, Estefanie Magadan and Zoie Garvin.

Second place finishers included Lillian Morrissey, 3200m; the 4x100 Relay Team

of Kylie McNeely, Miranda DeLeon, Alyssa Elizondo and Zoie Garvin; and the 4x400 Relay Team of Estefanie Magadan, Amy Tew, Lillian Morrissey and Brooklyn Harris.

In other Lady Bulldog results: Candy Garcia, 4th Discus, 4th 100m, and 6th 400m; Alyssa Elizondo, 6th 100m; Estefanie Magadan, 4th 300 hurdles; Miranda DeLeon, 3rd 200m; and Kylie McNeely, 4th 200m.

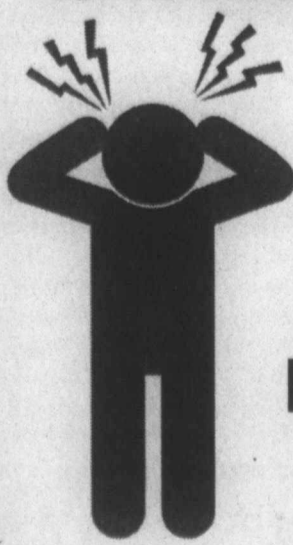

**Three accidents occur during Saturday morning hours**

Three accidents, an assault, and a dog bite incident were in law enforcement reports in the county during the past week. All three accidents occurred within a four-hour period on Saturday, March 6.

Two semi-trucks collided on US 84 at the Garza/Lynn County line at 5:35 a.m. Saturday, March 6. Garza County deputies, DPS, and Slaton EMS responded to the scene of the accident, which was just inside Garza County. One of the semis rolled over and the other was reportedly in the median. Traffic was rerouted to FM 211 due to westbound lanes being shut down during the incident.

At approximately 7 a.m. Saturday in Tahoka, a white Ford F350 struck a black Chevrolet Colorado that was parked in the 2400 block of Lockwood/US 380. According to Tahoka Police reports, the driver and family in the Ford had been traveling from Garland to Roswell, NM, when the driver reportedly fell asleep momentarily and his vehicle struck the parked Colorado, owned by the Lanae Gwin family. No one was in the parked vehicle, and no

injuries were reported for the driver or passengers in the Ford. Both vehicles had to be towed from the scene.

At 9:45 a.m. Saturday, another accident occurred just inside the Garza County line, at FM 212 and US 84. Garza County worked the accident, and no injuries were reported.

New Home ISD's school resource officer reported an assault at the New Home School Friday afternoon, March 5. No details were available except to report that a student had been suspended for three days and the father was advised to stay away from the school.

A New Home ISD student was reportedly bitten on the head by a dog, according to a report from New Home ISD on March 3. School officials reported the incident but stated that the dog bite had occurred in Lubbock County.

A woman in New Home reported Friday evening that her dog was attacked by another dog in the 100 block of South Main in New Home, and that she had to stop the attack. She reported she did not need medical attention but wanted to report the attack to the Sheriff's Office. A deputy told her this incident would be a civil issue and she would need to contact the Justice of Peace office if she wanted to file a claim, and also advised her to contact New Home City Hall regarding the issue.

A caller to Lynn County Sheriff's Office (LCSO) at 10 a.m. March 1 reported that her 12-year-old son had been threatened by a 13-year-old, in a voice mail. A deputy took the report and made contact with a school official regarding the threat.

A woman reported a possible burglary at a residential location on FM 400, reporting at 4:23 March 2 that she had gotten home and noticed her back door was semi-opened and she thought she could see someone looking out of one of her windows. Several deputies and Tahoka Police officers responded to the scene and cleared the house, reporting that no one was inside the residence and noting that the door, though locked, was not completely shut. Nothing was reported missing.

On March 4, a bank official requested a deputy speak with a customer about a possible scam, after the customer withdrew a large sum of cash because someone had reportedly called them and told them they had a family member in jail. The deputy visited with the individual and advised it was a possible phone scam, and asked the individual to call the Sheriff's

Office if the calls persisted.

At 1:38 p.m. March 6, a caller reported to LCSO that an unknown vehicle was parked inside an abandoned barn next to his property at CR Y and CR 2, and had been left there sometime during the night. A deputy investigating the scene discovered the vehicle had been entered in the system as a stolen vehicle by the Lubbock Police Dept., and the vehicle was returned to its owner.

At 7:11 a.m. Saturday, March 6, a caller to LCSO reported a white Ford pickup with a male reportedly passed out in the driver's seat was parked near the FM 400 exit and CR 21. A deputy responding to the scene reported that the man in the driver's seat was apparently intoxicated. He was issued a citation and was picked up by a family member.

At 11:14 p.m. Saturday, LCSO received a call from a New Home resident who reported he had heard what sounded like gunshots or fireworks coming from the northeast side of New Home, but a responding deputy was unable to locate.

An LCSO deputy assisted two females who were stranded in a vehicle that had run out of gas 13 miles north of Tahoka on US 87 at 11 p.m. Sunday. He transported the females to a convenience store to get gas, and then drove them back to their vehicle.

LCSO had other calls reporting suspicious vehicles and domestic disturbances.

Tahoka Police Chief Jeff Parker reported this week that a gun that had been reported stolen in a residential burglary in April of 2019 in Tahoka has now been recovered and returned to its owner. A landowner found the gun on Lynn County property recently, after he saw some people leave the property and then he searched the area. Upon discovering the gun he turned it into the Sheriff's Office. A search showed the firearm's serial number in the state database, and the SO coordinated with the Tahoka Police to return the gun to its original owner.

Police responded to several reports of reckless drivers in the Tahoka area on US 87 during the past week, as well as reports of domestic disturbances, and assisted EMS. A convenience store employee reported someone driving off without paying for gasoline, at 4:30 a.m. March 8, and a report of a suspicious vehicle driving through alleys in the south part of town turned out to be a legitimate company vehicle surveying for fiber optics upgrades.

**Court proceedings to continue with masks, safety measures**

Lynn County Court proceedings will continue to be conducted with safety measures for Covid-19, according to information from Lynn County Judge Mike Braddock this week.

"The Supreme Court has left the decision to each jurisdiction as to whether to continue to require masks for courtroom proceedings," Judge Braddock told *The News*. "In Lynn County Court proceedings, we will continue to observe safety protocols for Covid-19, including temperature checks for any individuals entering the courtroom, and require participants to wear face coverings. We will continue to limit the number of people in the courtroom, by scheduling courtroom procedures in 30-minute increments with individuals, so as not to have everyone in the courtroom at the same time," he explained.

District Court proceedings will continue to be conducted under the direction of District Judge Reed Filley, said Braddock.

"Judge Filley will determine the protocols and/or safety measures for all district court proceedings," said Braddock.

**Museum builds new display honoring pioneer aviator**

SLATON — Elizabeth "Bessie" Coleman, born in Atlanta, Texas in 1892, was the first female African American and Native American pilot in the United States.

Her legacy is now a permanent exhibit at the Texas Air Museum in Slaton, displayed in the World Wars I and II wing. The exhibit was put out in February, which is Black History Month.

That said, Mike Delano, volunteer at the museum, said that is not why she has this new display of her life.

"She was brave, she worked hard, fought against major odds for what she got. Just a very rare person," he said. "It's because she was an extremely brave person."

Chris Whiting finished the thought. "And a true Texan."

Delano said the exhibit was small currently and they are hoping to build the display into a larger exhibit to honor other early African-American aviators. "There's quite a few of them, and honor them as well in the exhibit, that's our main goal and purpose."

**Lady Bulldogs beat Ira 18-2 in 5-inning run rule**

The Tahoka High School Lady Bulldogs softball team grabbed an early lead on their way to an 18-2 victory over Ira in five innings on Saturday, taking the lead on a walk in the first inning.

The Lady Bulldogs secured the victory thanks to 13 runs in the fourth inning. The offensive onslaught was led by Karlie Swinford, Noelani Rodriguez, Madison Rose, and Kaycee Swinford, who each had RBIs in the inning - including home runs by Swinford and Rodriguez, doubles by Rose and Swinford, and a walk by Swinford.

The team collectively

had a .601 batting average, and Noelani Rodriguez hit a grand slam in the bottom of the 4th inning.

Rodriguez took the win for the Bulldogs, pitching for four and two-thirds innings, allowing one hit and two runs while striking out 11 and walking one.

The Lady Bulldogs stole 14 bases during the game, as three players stole more than one. Swinford led the way with four.

The Ladies were sure-handed and didn't commit a single error. Miranda DeLeon made the most plays with 11.

**Masks no longer required at Tahoka ISD, according to Board of Trustees directive**

Tahoka Independent School District Board of Trustees officially voted to eliminate the requirement of wearing masks for staff and students, in action taken at Monday night's board meeting, March 8th - but also said that staff and students would be "highly recommended" to wear masks if in close proximity.

Following the governor's announcement last week that he was lifting the statewide requirement that everyone must wear a mask, effective March 10th, the Commissioner of Education at the Texas Education Agency informed all school district superintendents that he was keeping the mask requirement in place for every student, teacher, or staff member when inside a school building, school facility used for school activities, or when in an outdoor space on school property used for school activities. However, he did provide for an exception that stated, "The school board may modify or eliminate by formal action the mask-related requirements." The Tahoka ISD Board approved a motion to eliminate the commissioner's mask-related requirement; however, district officials are highly recommending that staff and students continue to wear masks, specifically, when in a school vehicle and in close proximity to other students and staff.

The principals, athletic director, and special education Co-op director gave monthly reports to the Board. Following action by the Board to approve the consent agenda, the superintendent's report covered a variety of areas, one of which was the 87th Legislative Session.

"A major concern is funding for Texas public schools over the next biennium," explained Gary Harrell, interim superintendent for Tahoka ISD. "Prior to the pandemic, the state's economic outlook was pretty good. The Economic Stabilization Fund (ESF), commonly called the 'Rainy Day Fund', looked promising for Texas public

schools to get additional funding this session. The main revenue source for this fund comes from oil and gas revenue. However, in late July, the comptroller delivered a bleak economic outlook for the state's economy. The amount of general revenue funds available for the current biennium was expected to be \$11.5 billion less than originally estimated in October 2019. This massive yet unsurprising reduction, primarily driven by the pandemic and depressed oil prices, pushed Texas' budget from an estimated \$2.9 billion surplus to a \$4.6 billion deficit.

"Since July, the picture has improved somewhat, but it is anticipated that the budget will be very tight this session. State education leaders are very concerned about the amount of state revenue school districts will receive over the next two years," Harrell explained.

Supt. Harrell also reported on the progress of the construction project. The new gymnasium is tentatively scheduled to be completed by the end of May and the new fieldhouse a month later.

"The contractors are working hard to get the softball and baseball fields ready for play as soon after spring break as possible. The recently freezing weather conditions have delayed the project somewhat. The new parking area should be complete within the next week or so," said Harrell.

"Phase 1 of the high school remodeling project started last summer and was halted when students returned to school in August. Phase 2 of that project is scheduled to begin as soon as a school is out and will continue throughout the summer months. The all-weather track is also scheduled to be resurfaced and restriped this summer. It is anticipated that both of those projects will be completed when school starts in August," he said.

School officials also reported on extensive damage that was caused by frozen and busted water lines during the

recent winter storm.

"Clean up and repairs are ongoing, and it will probably be several weeks before we know the full extent of damage and cost of repairs. Fortunately, much of the cost of repairs will be covered by insurance," said Harrell.

The Board considered administrative recommendations on teacher contracts for the elementary campus, middle school campus, high school campus and the special education coop personnel for the 2021-22 school and approved teacher contracts as recommended. School officials informed the Board the school counselor, Lana Martinez, has announced her retirement, effective at the end of the school year, and has given her letter of resignation. The Board also approved a recommendation from the special education coop director to employ Kadie Burnam as coop educational diagnostician.

The Board also approved the purchase of some cafeteria equipment to replace equipment that has worn out, and they also approved the replacement of the 10-year-old band uniforms currently in use.

TASB policy updates were approved as presented. Since 1975, the Texas Association of School Boards (TASB) Policy Service has helped its member districts meet the challenges of the rapidly changing statutory and regulatory framework for school district governance and management. TASB attorneys draft policies to reflect changes in legislation, state and federal cases, administrative regulations, and attorney general opinions that regulate school district issues. Although they provide both (LEGAL) and (LOCAL) policies, the local policies are the only ones that require board approval. The Board approved TASB (LOCAL) policy update 116 with changes to the DEC(LOCAL) Leaves and Absences policy.

The next regular board meeting is scheduled for Thursday, April 15th.

**Notice of Availability of Uncompensated Medical Care**

Lynn County Hospital District will provide at least \$80,000 uncompensated care this fiscal year. This care is available to individuals who cannot afford to pay for their medical care, and are legal residents of Lynn County.

Uncompensated services for Lynn County Hospital District are limited to all inpatient services, all outpatient diagnostic and radiological examinations, emergency room services, ambulance services and all out-patient rehab and therapy services performed by LCHD employees at the Lynn County Hospital District Hospital and Lynn County Hospital District Clinics.

To determine eligibility of this care, LCHD uses maximum level of income for the appropriate family size, which is established by the HHS income poverty guidelines. The current maximum levels of income are given below.

For families with more than 8 members, add \$4,540 for each additional member. The services will be provided to those who first request it until the compliance level is met for this fiscal period. To make a request for uncompensated services, please contact the Patient Care Navigator at the Family Wellness Clinic (806) 561-4053. If Patient Navigator is unavailable contact the Administrator or Financial Officer. The Patient Care Navigator will make a written determination of your eligibility for services.
