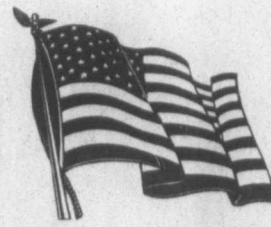

Death Valley, California, the record-holder for the highest temperature ever recorded on Earth, 134 degrees Fahrenheit, could come fairly close to that mark later this week as an extraordinary heat wave tightens its grip on the Western US. And that isn't the only location that will stamp new marks in the weather history books with this heat surge, according to AccuWeather meteorologists.

Forecasters say this current heat wave won't just be remembered for its intensity, but also for its duration.

Dozens of record highs have already fallen from California and Arizona to Montana and Idaho, and more are likely to tumble heading into the weekend as temperatures remain well above 100°F and even 110.

WHAT'S THE DAMAGE?

County Courthouse still undergoing water damage assessments here

The extent of damage to the Lynn County Courthouse continues to be assessed more than three weeks after the flooding catastrophe, when a waterline burst above the third-floor balcony over the District Courtroom and water gushed into the building throughout the night of May 25. The flooding was discovered the next morning, when courthouse employees arrived to discover water dripping down walls and onto furnishings, computer equipment, and paperwork, as well as flooded carpets and wood floors throughout the four-story historic courthouse.

The 105-year-old building underwent a \$9-million historic restoration during 2017-2019, which included the installation of a new geothermal heating and cooling system that included waterlines running from underground pipes to an array of pumps and waterlines installed above all ceilings in every office throughout all four levels of the building. One of those waterline joints to one of the pumps in the ceiling popped off during the night, and water deluged the building from the third floor down to the basement level.

This week, large dehumidifiers continue to run, pulling moisture out of the soggy floors, walls, and ceilings. A good portion of the ma-

ple wood floors in the district courtroom have been pulled up, to allow the subflooring to dry out, and it is likely that these floors will be needed to be completely replaced. The maple floors in the first-floor county courtroom have also cracked and buckled as the wood dried, curling up on the edges and creating an uneven surface there, as well as in the county clerk's office and other offices on those floors.

Plaster and paint are peeling off the walls, and sheetrock and ceiling tiles ruined by water will have to be replaced.

"At this time, we are still getting estimates on everything, but it looks like the plaster and sheetrock (See *COURTHOUSE DAMAGE*, page 6)

NH Coach Webb named 4-2A Coach of Year; Lynn County players garner district honors

All-District baseball selections for District 4-2A for 2021 were released last week, with New Home and Tahoka players garnering district honors in 2A, and O'Donnell players listed in Class 1A.

New Home Baseball Coach Brady Webb was named Coach of the Year for District 4-2A. Coach Webb led the 2020-21 Leopard squad to the Regional Quarterfinal series in Region 1 Class 2A UIL baseball playoffs this year.

Webb began his coaching career as an assistant coach at Cap-

rock High School (Amarillo) for 1 year and then Lubbock Christian High School for 3 years, both as an assistant coach. He took his first head coaching job at Floydada in 2012 and was there for 3 years.

"In 2015 we started the baseball program here in New Home," said Webb, who has headed the program from the start. "This season just finished my sixth year here, and this was a special group. We finished the year 19-6, going 16-0 in district. We beat Floydada in the

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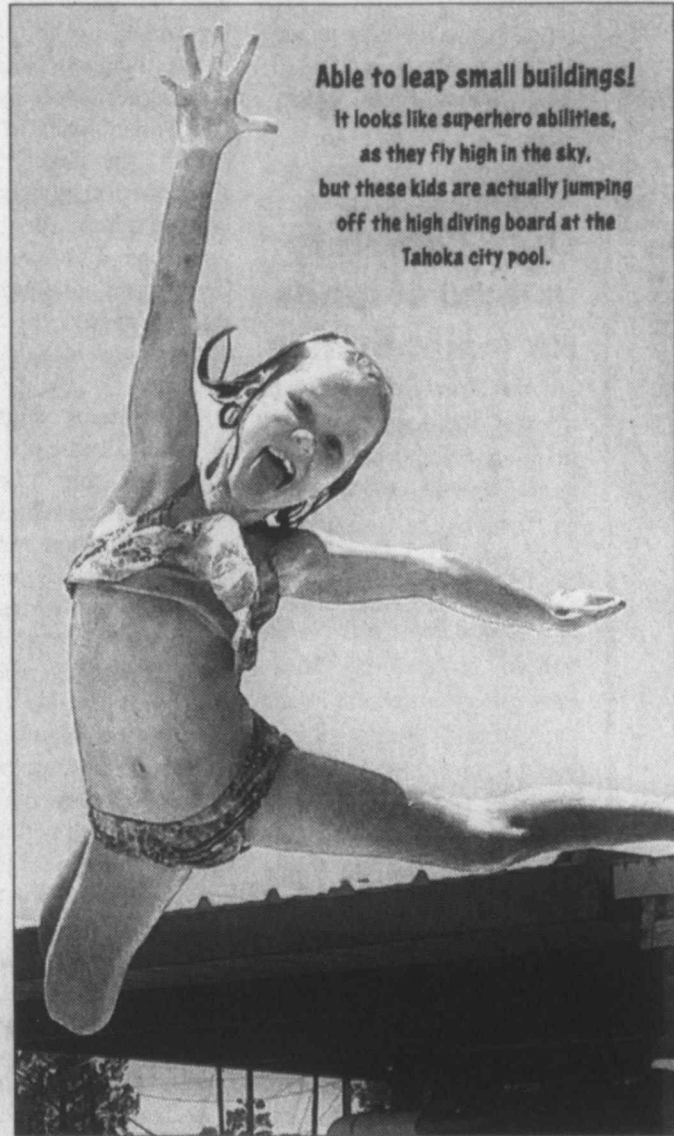

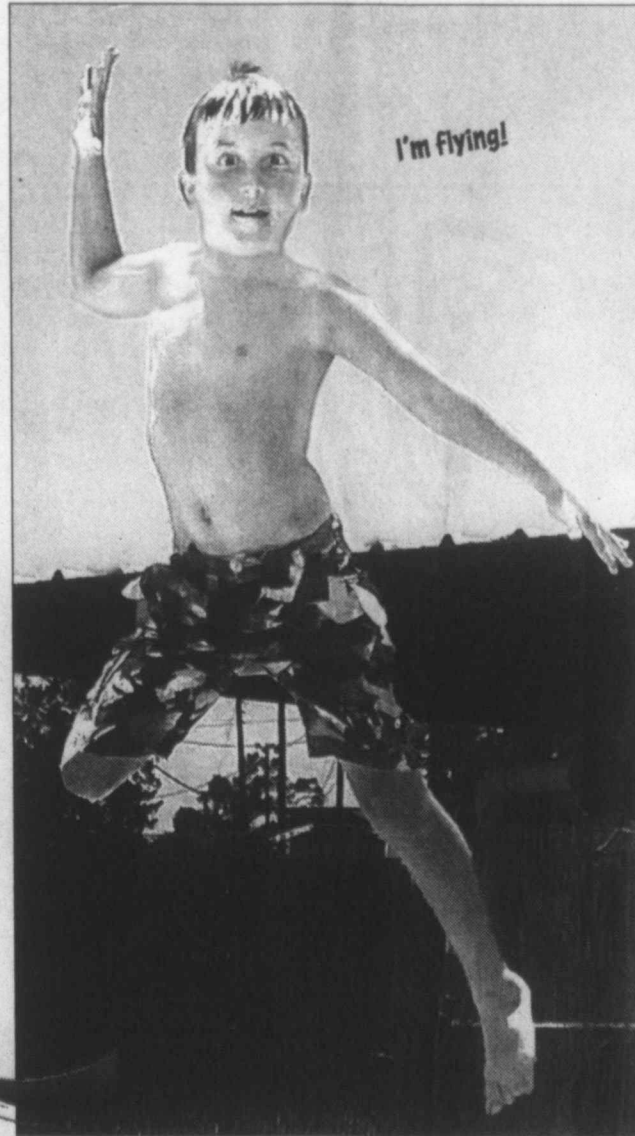

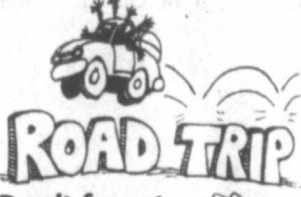

Driver gets away in high-speed chase, but officers will file charges on him anyway

A high-speed pursuit ended with the suspect getting away from law enforcement, but felony charges of evading arrest with a vehicle are expected to be filed on the man whom officers had already identified, according to information from the Tahoka Police Department this week.

It was an odd chain of events, with the man stopped on US 87 for a minor traffic violation and identified and released, but then caught the attention of local police for driving erratically through the streets of Tahoka.

The driver of a 2019 white Ford F-150 pickup had been stopped Monday night, June 14, on US 87 in Lynn County by a Lynn County Sheriff's Deputy, who issued a verbal warning for a missing tail light to the man, identifying the driver and vehicle owner as Jason Ray Peterson, 40, of Lubbock. After issuing the warning, the driver was released. The vehicle then turned off the highway into the city of Tahoka at approximately 11:30 p.m., where a Tahoka Police officer on patrol observed what he believed to be suspicious behavior. He followed the vehicle, which turned off into alleys and turned off its headlights, with the officer following. Eventually, the driver fled towards Brownfield on US 380, with Tahoka Police in pursuit.

According to Police Chief Jeff Parker, who joined the pursuit, the chase exceeded speeds of 100 mph, but police lost the vehicle after it turned south onto FM 168 in Terry County and continued to flee at high speeds that officers deemed unsafe to follow in pursuit.

After doing some checking on the license plate, police discovered that LCSO had just stopped the vehicle for the taillight violation and identified the driver as Peterson, but apparently the system failed to provide information on the man's reportedly lengthy arrest record or to notify the officer that the man was wanted on two felony warrants out of Lamb County, one for aggravated assault with a deadly weapon and one for unlawful possession of firearm by a felon.

Chief Parker said that Tahoka Police will file felony charges of evading arrest with a vehicle on the man, and will contact Lubbock authorities to assist in locating him.

In other reports during the week, a female riding a bicycle between the 2100 block of N. 4th and Lockwood reported she was bitten on her calf by a small dog. Police responded

to the report, but were unable to locate the dog.

Tahoka Animal Control had several calls reporting dogs loose in the city on June 11, including a report of a pit bull loose in the 2000 block of N. 7th, and two dogs running loose in the 1000 block of Ave. J. Owners were issued citations in these cases. A dog was also reported to have gotten inside Tahoka Drug store on Main Street at 10:30 a.m. Friday, June 11, and refused to leave the store until Animal Control was able to capture him.

Animal Control also responded to a report of goats loose near the Tahoka Compress at 10:30 a.m. Friday, and was able to capture most of the goats.

Two Tahoka residents called police to report possible identity theft in two separate cases during the week, and other reports included domestic disturbances, responding to alarms which turned out to be owner error, and escorting a funeral procession.

LCSO received a call at 12:39 a.m. June 10 from a man who said he had just chased off a vehicle that appeared to have been stealing a refrigerator from the manufactured homes that were parked by his property at a rural location. He described the suspect's vehicle to officers and said the pickup had lost the refrigerator in a ditch at the intersection of FM 179 and FM 211.

A retired police officer notified LCSO of a suspicious vehicle, saying that a Brinks truck was pulled over in the center median a few miles south of Tahoka on US 87 at 6:21 p.m. June 9. A deputy located the vehicle, which the driver reported had a tire blowout while driving in the left lane and so had pulled over into the center median. The deputy waited with the vehicle until a wrecker arrived to tow it from the scene.

LCSO responded to several other calls during the week, for domestic disturbances, welfare concerns, suspicious vehicles, a report of harassment in Wilson, and assisting motorists.

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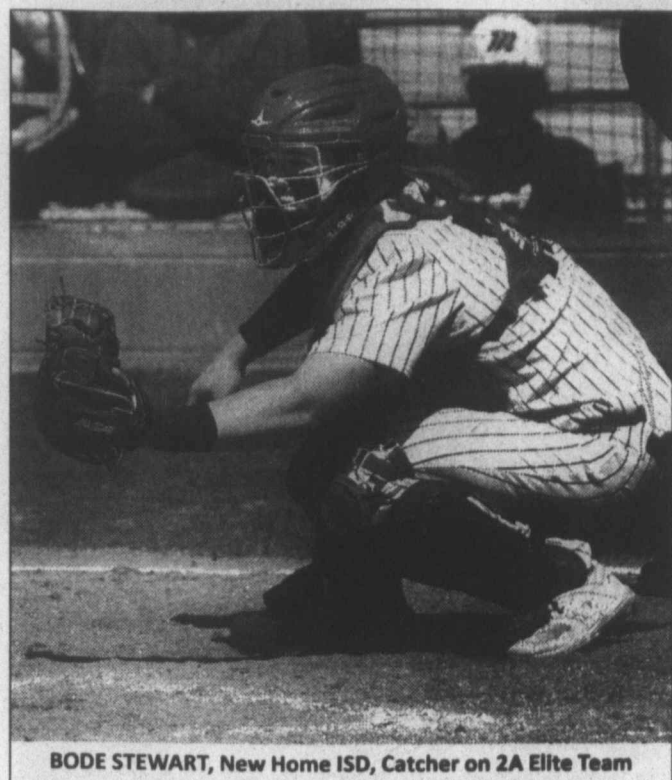
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Draw Cemetery in need of funds for maintenance

PUC echoes call to conserve electricity usage

The Public Utility Commission of Texas this week echoed a call from the Electric Reliability Council of Texas (ERCOT) to encourage electricity conservation in Texas homes and businesses for the coming week. ERCOT has reported the loss of more than 11,000 megawatts of generation due to "forced outages." Forced outages are unscheduled and result from the failure of a power plant to function as designed.

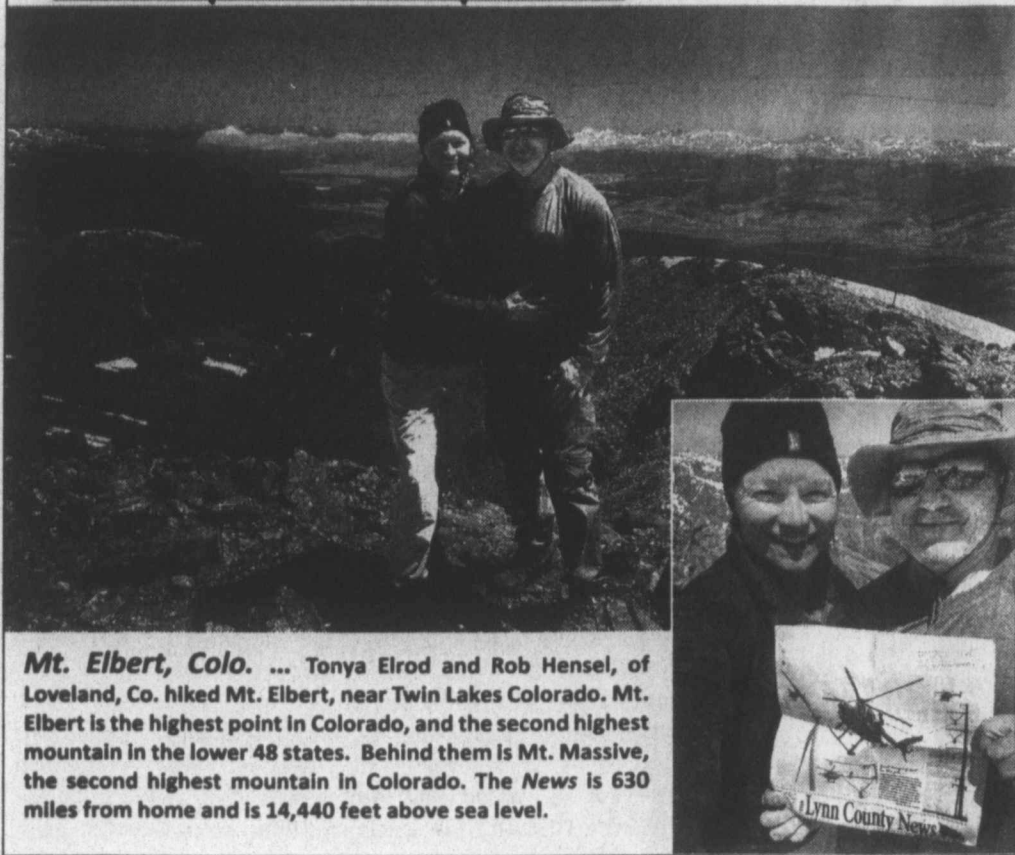
Texans are being asked to take simple steps in their homes and businesses to reduce demand on the grid. As temperatures peak in the late afternoon, air conditioning use typically follows suit, causing demand to surge between 3 p.m. and 7 p.m.

The PUC advises residential and business customers alike to reduce electricity usage with simple adjustments: Raise air conditioning thermostats at least two degrees and turn off unnecessary lighting. Customers should also wait until after sunset to run dishwashing and laundry appliances.

TISD Board approves staff changes, four new hires; applications still under consideration for HS principal

Tahoka Independent School District Board of Trustees met in regular session Monday night, June 14, approving two personnel changes and four new teacher hires, but applications are still under consideration for filling the position of high school principal here.

Amy Rodriguez, a former middle school teacher, will transfer elementary as a fifth grade teacher; and Danyale Hadderton, formerly the registrar/counselor's secretary, will be a new second grade teacher. New hires include Crystal Polk, 4th grade teacher, Brittany Borders and Kelly Addison, and new Ag Wildlife/Welding certification teacher Casey Sherrill at the

high school campus.

Tahoka Independent Superintendent Torrey Price reported that the district has received approximately 20 applicants for the high school principal position, and said that a committee of high school teachers and board member are in the process of scheduling interviews from among those candidates. He anticipates that the board will consider hiring the new principal at a later meeting, most likely at a called special session for the position.

Supt. Price reported that Lee Lewis Construction had informed him that the new sports complex facilities would be completed as of July 29, and that the Phase II campus updates are well underway and should also be completed by the first week of August.

Tahoka ISD, along with all other school districts, is eligible for the ESSER III grant, which is funding offered to school districts to help offset COVID-19 demands on school districts. Supt. Price reported that TISD has provided a survey that has gone out to staff and parents, and is also available on the school website for any interested community members, to provide feedback on choosing areas of most importance to citizens in the district.

He also discussed the possibility of having district office space and storage space at the church building (formerly the Church of Christ, which was donated to Tahoka ISD).

The next regular board meeting was scheduled for July 20.

Lynn County 4-H Members excel at Texas 4-H Roundup

4-H members from Lynn County 4-H participated at the 75th Texas 4-H Roundup in College Station, Texas, June 8-10th. Texas 4-H Roundup, the pinnacle event for all of Texas 4-H, welcomed around 1,300 youth to compete in approximately 50 diverse competitions throughout the week. The contests included both qualifying events, where 4-H members qualified at their county and district contests to compete at the state level, and invitational events. Texas 4-H Roundup was open to senior level, or high school aged, 4-H members only this year. Additionally, the Texas 4-H Youth Development Foundation awarded more than \$2.7 million in scholarships to 232 youth.

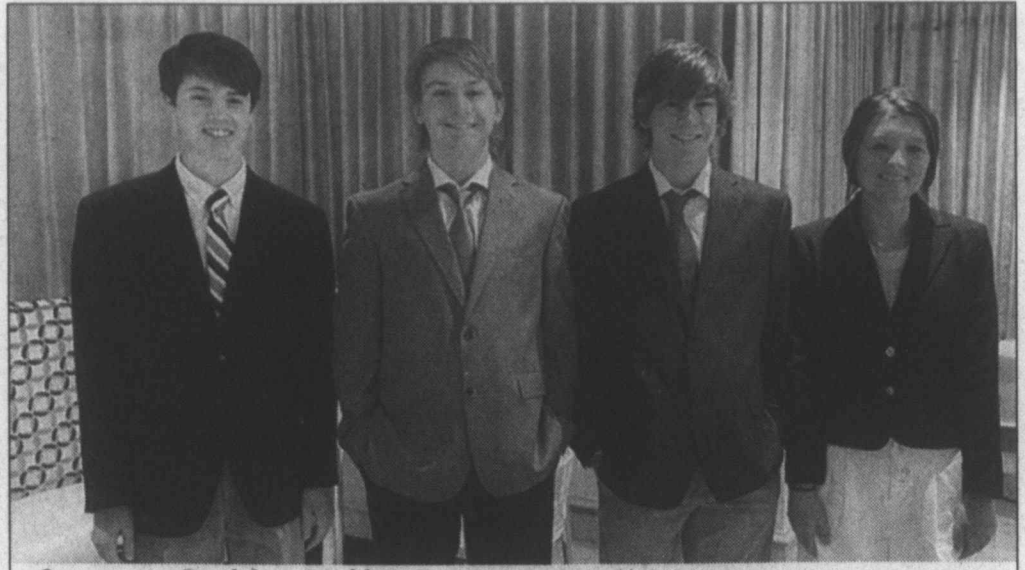

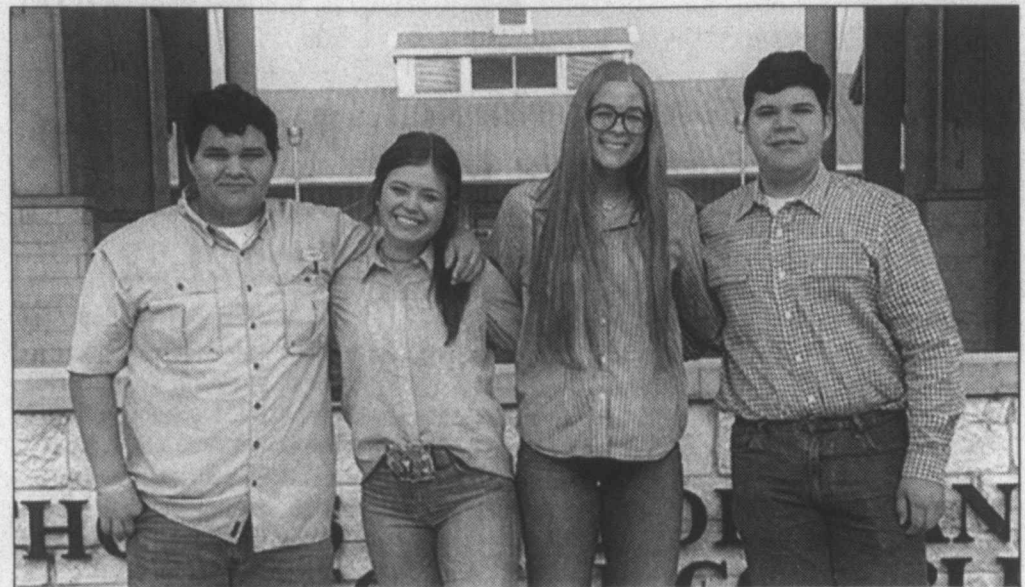

New contraceptive bait to fight feral hog threat by curbing population over time

Texas Agriculture Commissioner Sid Miller has announced an exciting new tool in the war against feral hogs with the release of a new hog contraceptive bait entering the market. A new product called HogStop is being released with the goal of curbing the growth of the feral hog population in Texas over time.

"The feral hog problem has exploded into a crisis," said Commissioner Miller. "Texas farmers and ranchers need every tool they can get their hands on to stop these hogs. With this new product, we're one step closer to my goal of making feral hogs an endangered species in Texas." According to recent reports, the feral hog

population in Texas has swelled to over 2.6 million. Feral hogs cause an estimated \$52 million in damages, not just to farm and ranch land, but to urban areas, parks, golf courses. Feral hogs were even responsible for at least one human death in the last few years.

An all-natural contraceptive bait, HogStop targets the male hog's prodigious ability to reproduce. Feral hogs have the highest reproduction rate of any similar species and can produce a new litter every three months or so and can produce litters of up to 20.

"I am very excited about this new product, Hogstop," Miller said. "This could be a great new weapon in the war on feral hogs. It appears that unlike other hog baits, this is not a poison. Instead, it interrupts the reproduction of this animal over time, and therefore makes the product more humane. Hogstop, or any other product that is available to help Texas farmers and ranchers curb the damage done by these feral hogs, is welcomed at the Texas Department of Agriculture."

Hogstop is considered a 25 (b) pesticide by the EPA, and as such, does not have to be registered by TDA before use.

"Contraceptive baits like HogStop work to strike a blow against the exponential growth of the feral hog population in Texas," said Miller. "As we fight to find other ways to eradicate these pests, these kinds of products can knock down the numbers over a period of time."

Many LISD students back in summer school

LAMESA - The impact COVID-19 has had on the academic year continues to affect almost one-third of the Lamesa school district's total student population who started last week on six weeks of school.

An estimated 400-500 elementary through high school students are attending half-day summer school classes. They either need to catch up on their reading skills or failed portions of the state-mandated exams.

"Some of them are having to catch up on lost time," said school Superintendent Jim Knight. "It's mainly because of loss of learning."

The district finished the 2020-2021 school year in May with an enrollment of 1700 students, and prepared for as many as 600 students in summer school.

Summer school enrollment is comprised of about 150 Lamesa ISD middle school and high school students, and 300 elementary students.

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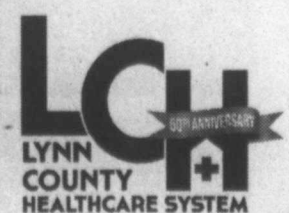

CITY OF TAHOKA ORDINANCE NO. 21-003

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF TAHOKA, TEXAS, AMENDING THE TAHOKA CODE OF ORDINANCE CHAPTER 3 ARTICLE 3.101 REGARDING ADOPTING THE 2018 EDITION OF THE INTERNATIONAL BUILDING CODE, ARTICLE 3.301 ADOPTING THE 2020 ELECTRICAL CODE, ARTICLE 3.401 INTERNATIONAL HOUSING CODE, ARTICLE 3.500 (a) AND (b) 2018 EDITION OF THE INTERNATIONAL RESIDENTIAL CODE, 2018 EDITION OF THE INTERNATIONAL PLUMBING CODE, AND BY ADDING ARTICLE 3.800 ADOPTION OF THE INTERNATIONAL ENERGY CONSERVATION CODE, ADDING ARTICLE 3.900 ADOPTION OF THE 2018 EDITION OF THE INTERNATIONAL FUEL GAS CODE, AND BY ADDING ARTICLE 3.10 - 2018 EDITION OF THE INTERNATIONAL MECHANICAL CODE, AND BY AMENDING ARTICLE 5.300 SEC. 5301 - 2018 EDITION OF THE INTERNATIONAL FIRE CODE, ADDING CHAPTER 15 - BUILDING PERMITS AND CERTIFICATES OF OCCUPANCY; PROVIDING FOR A PENALTY FOR ANY VIOLATION OF THIS ORDINANCE NOT TO EXCEED \$2,000; PROVIDING FOR SAVINGS, SEVERABILITY, AND REPEALING CLAUSES; PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE; AND PROVIDING FOR THE PUBLICATION OF THE CAPTION HEREOF.

Section 14. Penalty.

Any violation of any of the terms of this ordinance, whether herein denominated as unlawful or not, shall be deemed a misdemeanor. Any person convicted of any such violation shall be fined in an amount not to exceed (\$2,000.00) two thousand dollars for each incidence of violation. Each day of the continuance of such violation shall be considered a separate offense and be punished separately.

This ordinance shall be in full force and effective from and after its passage and upon the posting and/or publication, if required by law, of its caption and the City Secretary is hereby directed to implement such posting and/or publication.

ORDINANCE NO. 21-004

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TAHOKA, TEXAS REGULATING AND DEFINING A PUBLIC NUISANCE, ALLOWING FOR THE ABATEMENT OF A PUBLIC NUISANCE, OUTLINING THE NOTICE FOR A PUBLIC NUISANCE; PROVIDING FOR A SAVINGS/REPEALING CLAUSE; PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY; PROVIDING FOR A PENALTY; AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

Section 19. Penalty. A person commits an offense if any person violates any section of this ordinance and the nuisance remains unabated after the 11th day after the date on which the person receives notice from a city official, agent, or employee to abate the nuisance.

An offense under this section is a misdemeanor punishable by a fine of not less than \$500 or more than \$2,000. Each continuing day's violation shall constitute a separate offense. The penal provision imposed under this ordinance shall not preclude the city from filing suit to enjoin the violation. The city retains all legal rights and remedies available to it pursuant to local, state, and federal law.

This ordinance shall become effective upon its finding by Council that the public hearing was posted and conducted in accordance with State Law; passed by a majority vote of council and upon its publication in the official newspaper.

ORDINANCE NO. 21-005

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF TAHOKA, TEXAS ADOPTING THE TAHOKA FEE SCHEDULE; AMENDING CERTAIN FEES AND ESTABLISHING COSTS AND FEES CHARGED BY THE CITY OF TAHOKA; PROVIDING FOR A PENALTY FOR A VIOLATION OF \$10.99 OF THE CITY CODE OF ORDINANCES; AND DECLARING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

Section 6. A violation of this ordinance shall be a Class C misdemeanor with a fine of not more than \$500.00 as prescribed in §10.99 of the City's Code of Ordinances. If any other ordinance, including the Code of Ordinances, establishes a different penalty for the failure to pay any fee reflected on the Fee Schedule, the provisions of such other ordinance or Code of Ordinances shall control with respect to such penalty.

Section 7. Effective Date. This Ordinance will take effect upon its adoption by the City Council and in accordance with the laws of the State of Texas.

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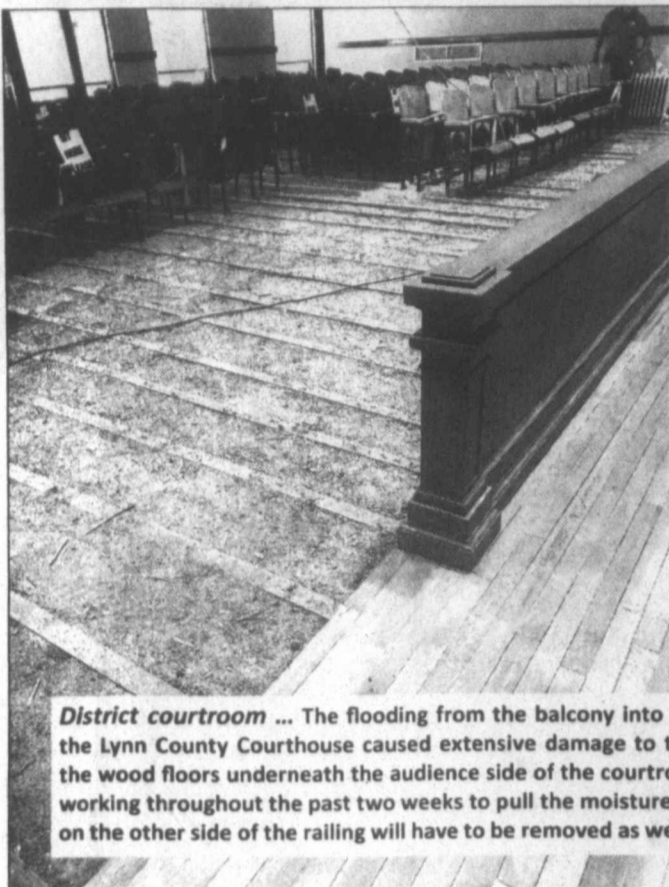
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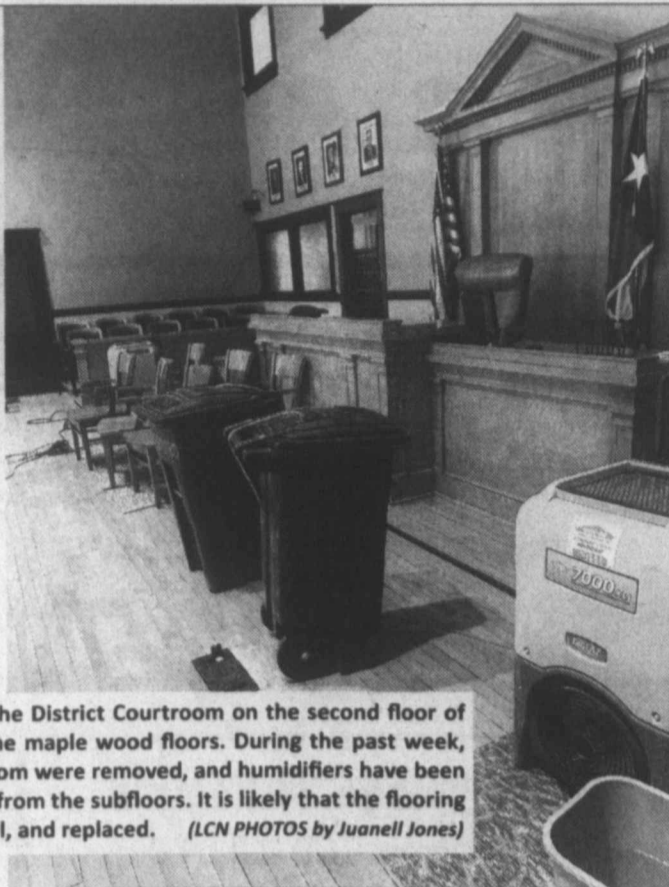

work alone will run somewhere between \$100,000 and \$150,000," County Judge Mike Braddock told *The News*.

He said that at least seven computers and monitors will need to be replaced, as well as 2-3 printers and copiers.

At this time, most of the courthouse offices are open but operating in offices still in disarray, and some employees are now working remotely from home.

Because the repair schedule has yet to be arranged, Judge Braddock said he is still unsure as to which offices may be relocated at different times, or may have to work remotely.

"I don't know when the wood floors will be repaired or replaced, but when the time comes for that process it is more efficient to replace all

the wood floors in these different offices or courtrooms at the same time, and that may require some rearranging of offices or remote scheduling," said the judge.

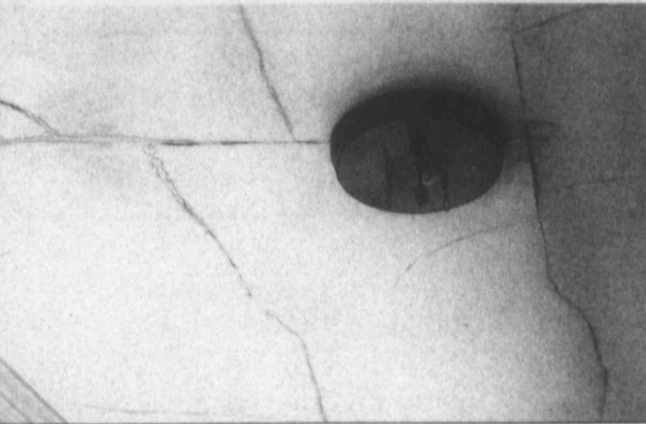
He said that anyone needing the services of any Lynn County offices should call the office first to inquire if the office is open to visitors, or how those services may be available.
