

Did you know?

The Declaration of Independence and Constitution were hidden away during World War II.

Both documents were packed up about two weeks after the attack on Pearl Harbor, given a military escort and taken to Fort Knox in Kentucky, where they remained for several years.

More than one copy exists.

After the adoption of the Declaration of Independence, the "Committee of Five"—Thomas Jefferson, John Adams Benjamin Franklin, Roger Sherman and Robert R. Livingston-was charged with overseeing the reproduction of the approved text. This was completed at the shop of Philadelphia printer John Dunlap. On July 5, Dunlap's copies were dispatched across the 13 colonies to newspapers, local officials and the commanders of the Continental troops. These rare documents, known as "Dunlap broadsides," predate the engrossed version signed by the delegates. Of the hundreds thought to have been printed on the night of July 4, only 26 copies survive. Most are held in museum and library collections, but three are privately owned.

Former Tahoka coach named **High School Principal here**

t's been more than 25 years since he served Tahoka ISD as head baseball coach, but Cory Barnes is coming back to Tahoka for the 2021-22 school year as the new Tahoka High School Principal.

The TISD Board of Trustees voted unanimously to name Barnes as the administrative leader for the high school campus in action taken in special session Monday night, following several weeks of considering a slate of more than 20 applicants, recommendations from a specially-appointed THS Committee, and interviews with four of the top candidates for the position. Barnes was the lone finalist being considered for the position, according to Superintendent Torrey

"This is my 27th year in education," Barnes told the Board members at Monday's session. "I started out here in Tahoka, and I met my wife here. I've been chasing my coaching career around and feel like this is my next move. I am grateful for the opportunity to serve here, and am excited about coming back to Tahoka ISD," he said.

He earned his Bachelor's degree at Texas Tech University, and a Master of Education degree at West Texas A&M University.

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



New temporary location chosen for District court proceedings here

Lynn County Commissioners approved a new location for holding District Court, Children's Protective Services (CPS) court, and Attorney General (AG) court proceedings, in action taken at Monday morning's regular session. The Tahoka Housing Authority building was designated as the temporary new location due to allowing for repairs to flooring, walls and ceilings from water damage in the District Courtroom on the second floor of the Lynn County Courthouse. Bids for the repairs are still being considered, but the hardwood floors have been partially removed, which required the temporary relocation of court proceedings.

Commissioners also approved extending time for accepting bids for courthouse repairs to a later date, to allow for more information on the extensive repairs throughout the fourstory building.



purchase of two AEDs for the courthouse. An Automated External Defibrillator (AED) is a machine that is used to treat cardiac arrest in an emergency, by sending an electric shock to the heart of a person in cardiac arrest, to restore a normal heart rhythm.

Independent School District board members recently with her suspicions that such practices may have happened in the May 1 school board election.

"The wrong-doing was on the part of the candidates, not on the way the election was run," Schildknecht told the Lamesa Press-Reporter. "The purpose of my address to them (LISD Board of Trustees) was, 'Hey, we've seen this. It is not going unnoticed. Before you think of doing it again, we're onto it'."

Schildknecht said she was informed that one candidate assisted a voter with a mail-in ballot application and picked up the completed form.

"That is prohibitive by the rules of the ways to submit an application," she said. "Just the information that was given me concerns me."

Schildknecht said she noticed the percentages of local voters' mail-in ballots seemed a little high for an election that brought out about 500 total voters. In her figures, one spot on the school board collected 5 percent mail-in ballots. Another race collected almost 20 percent of its votes from mail-in ballots, and another got almost 40 percent of its votes cast from mail-ins.

"That is unbelievably high," Schildknecht said

"Quite honestly, it smells of ballot harvesting," said Schildknecht, referring to the school board races. "I don't think we want to be known for not having fair and free elections. Just play fair. We will be watching for it in any future elections," she added.

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

Slaton ISD dedicates new Trade Center

SLATON - The Slaton ISD conducted a dedication and ribbon cutting for the Mitchell - Overturff Center for Industrial Trades, June 10, at its location on Division St.

Don Mitchell and his family, along with the family of the late Sherrell Overturff, were also in attendance to conduct the ceremony. Mitchell graduated in 1961 from Texas Tech and taught in Slaton for 31 years, retiring in 1993. During that time, students won multiple shows at local and State level, including grand and reserve champion at seven major shows and grand champion barrow at El Paso for three consecutive years.

Overturff was a devotional trades teacher for 33 years providing technical and vocation skills instruction that introduced students to the world of work. He also taught them life skills such as banking, income tax, building trades, plumbing and general home maintenance. Overturff's son, K.C., spoke on the family's behalf, who also thanked everyone for the honor.

Casey Jones, one of the current FFA teachers at SISD, thanked everyone who helped get the Center built. "Without you this facility definitely would not be here," he said.

"One of the classes that I teach is building maintenance. Through that, kids are able to get an industry certification at level one. It provides them an opportunity, on graduating high school, to go to a place and say, 'I'm here to work, and I want a job, I have experience and I have certification.' And that's our one goal is to be able to get them that certification," said Jones.

In addition, he said teachers Adam Westbrook, and Cody Kinch teach a welding program that requires the students to undergo rigorous study, tests and making sure welds are within specifications to earn their degree. An electricity course taught

by Robert Barrera, and an HVAC course taught by Mark Hernandez are also offered, all of which students can earn a degree.

"Another vision we have ... is we're wanting to open this up for adult classes in the evening. I believe that's been discussed and something that they feel really, really positive about," Jones added.

Lamesa Police officer salaries far below area rates

LAMESA - When experienced law enforcement officers call the Lamesa Police Department (LPD) about job openings, they at first voice interest in working there. But once they hear about the salary, the conversation stops, according to LPD Chief Josh Peterson.

In the midst of the Lamesa City Council's first budget workshop, Peterson said his department is offering \$12,000 to \$18,000 less than other similar agencies.

"We've had a lot of interest from people interested in working here. When we got to talking about pay, they shut things off," said Peterson. The salary disparity, he said, leaves his department short-staffed while dealing with an ever-increasing number of calls.

An officer's starting wage at LPD is \$34,000, while the average wage offered to new patrol officers is \$47,000. A new dispatcher's starting wage at LPD is \$32,000 while the average salary is \$7,000 more.

Peterson said Lamesa can't compete with bigger and richer cities like Andrews, Big Spring or Lubbock, but said that even peace officers in neighboring small towns are reaping bigger paychecks.

In lesser populated Tahoka, officers get \$40,000 per year. In Snyder, patrol officers are offered \$53,000 and its supervising officers \$56,000-\$74,000.

Charles Thompson and the infamous John Hancock were the only two men who actually signed the Declaration of Independence on July 4, 1776. The other 54 delegates signed over the course of the next month.
