Tahoka Homecoming activities are this week

The 2021 Tahoka High School Homecoming events have been scheduled for Thursday and Friday, Sept. 2-3, including traditional festivities such as a spirit fire, pep rally, exes assembly and homecoming parade. As is tradition, the parade will end at the Lynn County Courthouse grounds on the Tahoka square for the community pep rally.

Thursday night, the black-out pep rally will start at 9 p.m. at the THS football field (not in the gymnasium as in previous years), followed by the Spirit Fire on the practice field.

Registration for the Exes Assembly will be held Friday from 12:30-1 p.m. in the THS Auditorium, with the Exes program to be held 1:00-2:00 p.m. This year's honored class is the THS Class of 2001.

The Homecoming Parade will begin lining up at 2:30 p.m. at the high school gym.

The Homecoming Parade will start at 3:00 p.m. and travel down N. 4th Street to Main Street, traveling through downtown and ending

up at the Lynn County Courthouse for a community pep rally about 3:15 p.m.

Pre-game Homecoming festivities will begin at 6:30 p.m. at the football field, with kickoff at 7 p.m. for the Bulldogs hosting Seagraves. Tickets will be available at the gate.

The THS Homecoming Queen will be crowned at half-time, according to a schedule provided by school officials.

Various class reunions may be held after the game.

The THS Class of 71 will have their 50th year class reunion, meeting at the exes assembly and riding in the homecoming parade, and then meeting at the Life Enrichment Center for the afternoon. A catered meal is planned on Saturday night at the home of Nathan Morris. For more information, contact Morris at 806-759-1208.

The Lynn County Harvest Festival will not be held in conjunction with the THS Homecoming this year due to the Labor Day weekend. It will be held Saturday, Sept. 25 on the square in Tahoka.

County commissioners propose lowering tax rate by 3-cents

Lynn County Commissioners are proposing to lower the property tax rate for Lynn County by three cents, from the current rate of 73 cents per \$100 of property value, to 70 cents for the 2021-22 fiscal year. Commissioners took action to approve the proposed rate at their regular session on Monday, Aug. 30.

The proposed tax rate will provide revenue of \$4,632,827 in the county's General Fund, and will fund a proposed budget of \$4,468,812.

Commissioners have set a public hearing for the proposed tax rate for Sept. 13, at the regular meeting time of 9:30 a.m. in the county courtroom at the Lynn County Courthouse.

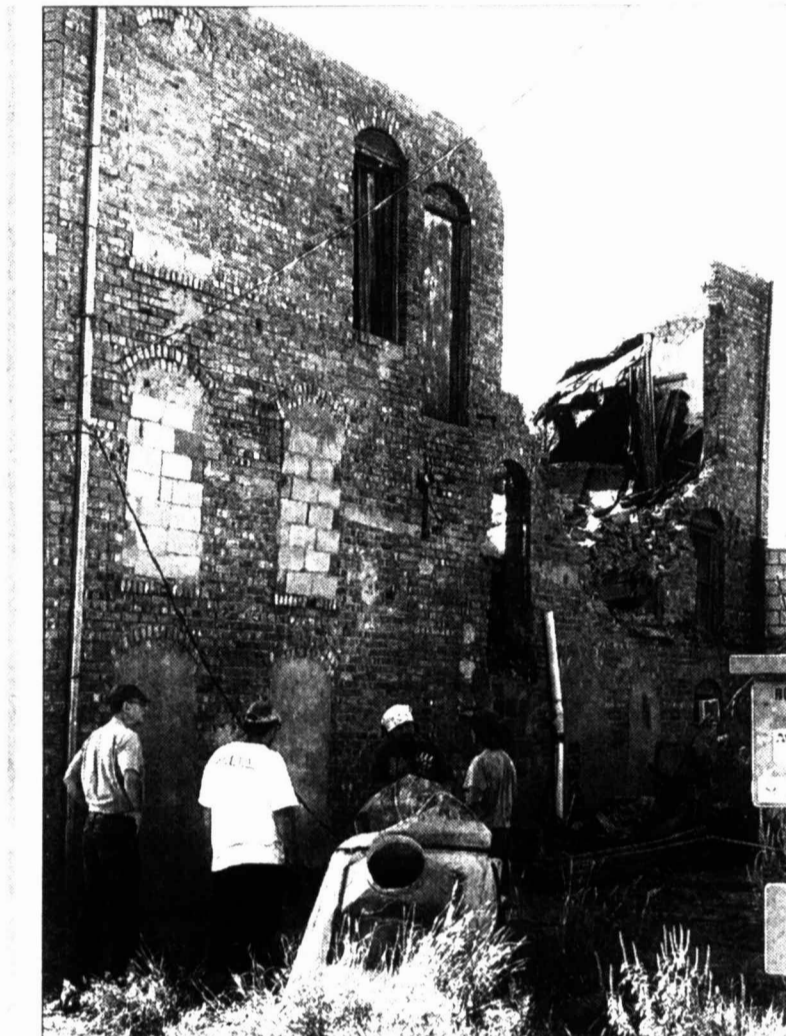
Senior Citizens Center to move into new facilities

The Lynn County Pioneers Senior Citizens Center is finally moving into its new home at 1612 Lockwood, where formerly the City of Tahoka had its offices. After more than a year of renovation, and frustrating delays, it is anticipated that the new center may be operating as early as next week.

"We hope to be cooking meals and having them picked up or delivered from the new center by

next week," said Jay Dee House on Monday. House is chairman of the Senior Citizens Board of Directors.

for the commercial vent hood to be operational, and House expects the company that installed it will have someone come initialize and test the equipment this week.

The renovated space features a new dining hall on the west side of the building, and tables and chairs have already been moved in to accommodate diners. Unfortunately, with Covid-19 cases on the uptick in Lynn County, center officials will keep the dine-in area closed until a later date. However, meals will be available for take-out from the new location, hopefully as soon as next week, and the center's meal deliveries will be loaded from the new location.

Tables and chairs, and some couches and other furnishings, were donated to the new Senior Citizens Center from the Tahoka Church of Christ when it closed down its church facilities, and a commercial refrigerator and other kitchen equipment was donated from Lynn County Healthcare System after the hospital kitchen was updated recently. New cabinetry, a large center island, a commercial freezer, and new commercial stoves/ovens/grill complete the new kitchen.

Offices, restroom facilities, a meeting room, and multiple storage

Traffic accidents, thefts in law reports for week

Two traffic accidents, an arrest for DWI, and three reports of theft were in law enforcement reports during the past week.

A caller reported to Lynn County Sheriff's Office (LCSO) that he had flipped his utility trailer by the roadside park on US 87, at 4:47 p.m. Aug. 24. A deputy responded to the scene. TxDOT was notified to pick up the debris off the roadway, and the trailer was hauled off by a wrecker.

At 6:11 p.m. Aug. 26, LCSO received several calls reporting that two, or possibly three, vehicles were involved in an accident on US 87 and CR 1 in the southbound lanes. Lynn County EMS, LCSO, DPS and Wilson Volunteer Fire Dept. all responded to the scene. Two vehicles were towed from the scene, but there were no reports of injuries. No driver information was available.

A Lamesa man was arrested after Tahoka Police Chief Jeff Parker and Sheriff Wanda Mason both responded to a report of a reckless driver heading towards Tahoka from Lamesa on US 87, about 4:20 p.m. Aug. 27. According to Chief Parker, both he and the sheriff spotted the Ford Expedition traveling northbound on US 87 a few miles south of Tahoka, with the vehicle reportedly moving slowly and erratically across the traffic lanes. He and Sheriff Mason blocked both lanes of traffic behind the Expedition to prevent any cars from passing, and it took several miles before the driver finally pulled over to the side of the road. Roberto Garcia of Lamesa was arrested at the scene, on charges of DWI and felony charges of Evading Arrest With A Vehicle.

Three thefts were reported during the week, including one from a woman who said that another person had changed the address on his ID to match

hers so that he could pick up her mail, and she reported that she was missing food stamps and a check.

A John Deere LA-125 riding lawnmower was reported taken from the New Home Coop Gin sometime between 9-10 p.m. Aug. 25, on FM 211.

In Tahoka, police were called to a residence in the 1200 block of Ave. J for a report of burglary, at 10:45 a.m. Aug. 28. The home owner had apparently been away for a time, and returned home to discover items missing including dishes, toys, clothing, game equipment, and other items. Police reported they have recovered some of the property, and the case is still under investigation this week.

Criminal mischief was reported on Aug. 27, with a caller reporting that someone had shot his mailbox and another resident's mailbox, on property on CR 11. On Aug. 28, a caller reported that someone living on the property had "destroyed" a rural residence on US 87 where she had been the executor of the estate, and had then abandoned the property.

In Wilson, a man told LCSO that he had found some ammunition at his residence on Aug. 24, and was not sure what to do with it. A deputy met with the caller and collected the ammo.

Police assisted an elderly woman who was attempting to change a tire on her vehicle near Lynn County Hospital at 4:30 p.m. Aug. 29, and responded to several other calls during the week for welfare concerns, civil matters, loud music, security alarms, and suspicious vehicles. Officers also assisted in searching for a lost wallet and phone which had reportedly been lost on Lockwood Street between the hospital and Stripes convenience store at 4 p.m. Aug. 28, but were unable to locate the missing items.

Tahoka ISD Board approves \$1.33 tax rate, adopts budget

Tahoka Independent School District Board of Trustees approved a 2021-22 tax rate of \$1.33 and also took action to adopt the 2021-22 budget, in a special session held Monday night, Aug. 30, following public hearings that were held on Aug. 18. Trustees approved a total tax rate of \$1.33640, which includes a Maintenance and Operating (M&O) tax rate of \$1.04260 and an Interest and Sinking (I&S) tax rate of \$0.29380, per \$100 of property value. The new rate is approximately 3-cents lower than last year's total tax rate of \$1.3638.

I&S rate is 29.380-cents. The I&S rate is figured annually, to pay for the district's bonded indebtedness. The current outstanding bonded indebtedness is \$13,040,000, including the \$7.5 million bond for the construction that is nearing completion, of a new gym, field house and other athletic facilities.

According to figures provided by the school district, total revenue for M&O is \$8,241,067, and total expenditures on the M&O side is \$7,592,473.

Five of seven trustees were present at the special session, with Clay Taylor, Drew Stone, Tamesha McClendon, Lea Swinford, and Slate May all voting in favor of the motions for adopting the budget and tax rate. Trustees Jon Luna and Blanda Watt were absent from the meeting.

The M&O rate is \$1.04, which is the same rate as last year. The decrease is in the I&S tax rate. Last year's I&S rate was 31.4-cents, and this year's

Lamesa hospital seeing increase in Covid patients

LAMESA – Medical Arts Hospital (MAH) physician Dr. Anthony Gipson said combatting Covid-19 is not like it was last year, but the problems associated with the virus are still around.

With cases of Covid-19 increasing in Dawson County, medical staff at Medical Arts Hospital are facing long hours with little hope of the state providing additional nurses in the future.

The hospital relied on federal relief funds and state supplied medical personnel during the first year of the pandemic.

MAH is not alone. Other West Texas medical facilities, along with out-of-state hospitals that once accepted transfer patients, are shutting their doors after hitting patient capacity.

"These days, I'm staying almost non-stop busy," said Dr. Gipson. "It's everywhere like that. It's not just our facilities. It's at other facilities."

Though vaccines became available to Dawson County residents since early this year, Dr. Gipson said it seems those who did not get vaccinated are the ones being hospitalized here with Covid.

"I don't believe we've had any hospitalized patients that were vaccinated," said Dr. Gipson. "For the most part, it tends to be unvaccinated. The severe illness tends to be the unvaccinated."

That doesn't mean those who get vaccinated against coronavirus are immune to it, Gipson said. But a vaccinated patient normally experiences fewer severe symptoms and a higher survival rate, he said.

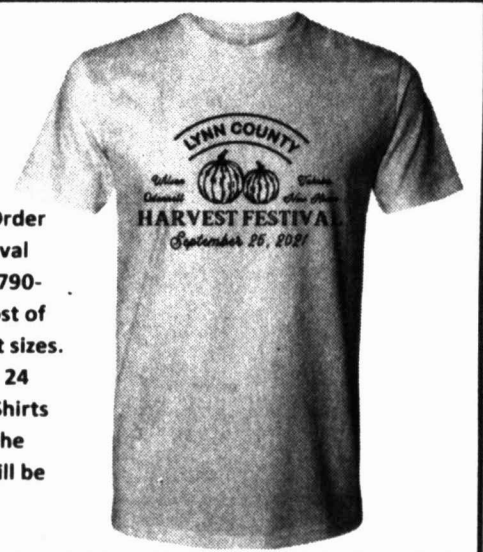

A tax rate of \$0.700000 per \$100 valuation has been proposed by the governing body of LYNN COUNTY OF TEXAS.

The no-new-revenue tax rate is the tax rate for the 2021 tax year that will raise the same amount of property tax revenue for LYNN COUNTY OF TEXAS from the same properties in both the 2020 tax year and the 2021 tax year.

The voter-approval rate is the highest tax rate that LYNN COUNTY OF TEXAS may adopt without holding an election to seek voter approval of the rate.

The proposed tax rate is greater than the no-new-revenue tax rate. This means that LYNN COUNTY OF TEXAS is proposing to increase property taxes for the 2021 tax year.

A PUBLIC HEARING ON THE PROPOSED TAX RATE WILL BE HELD ON September 13, 2021 AT 9:30 AM AT 1501 S. 1st Street Tahoka, TX 79373.

The proposed tax rate is not greater than the voter-approval tax rate. As a result, LYNN COUNTY OF TEXAS is not required to hold an election at which voters may accept or reject the proposed tax rate. However, you may express your support for or opposition to the proposed tax rate by contacting the members of the LYNN COUNTY OF TEXAS at their offices or by attending the public hearing mentioned above.

LCHD proposes keeping same tax rate of 25-cents

Lynn County Hospital District Board of Directors are proposing to keep the property tax rate of 25-cents, for the 2021-22 fiscal year. Directors have set a proposed rate of \$0.258253, and have scheduled a public hearing at noon Wednesday, Sept. 15, at the LCHD Hospital Meeting Room to hear public input.

Although the proposed tax rate is the same, it is

considered a tax increase because the same tax rate will bring in more revenue than the previous year, due to an overall increase in property appraisal values.

The proposed tax rate was approved unanimously by all seven members of the Board of Directors, including Edward Smith, Calloway Huffaker, Sharon Isham, Manuel DeLeon, Mary Gayle Raindl, Jana Bishop, and Connie Donald.

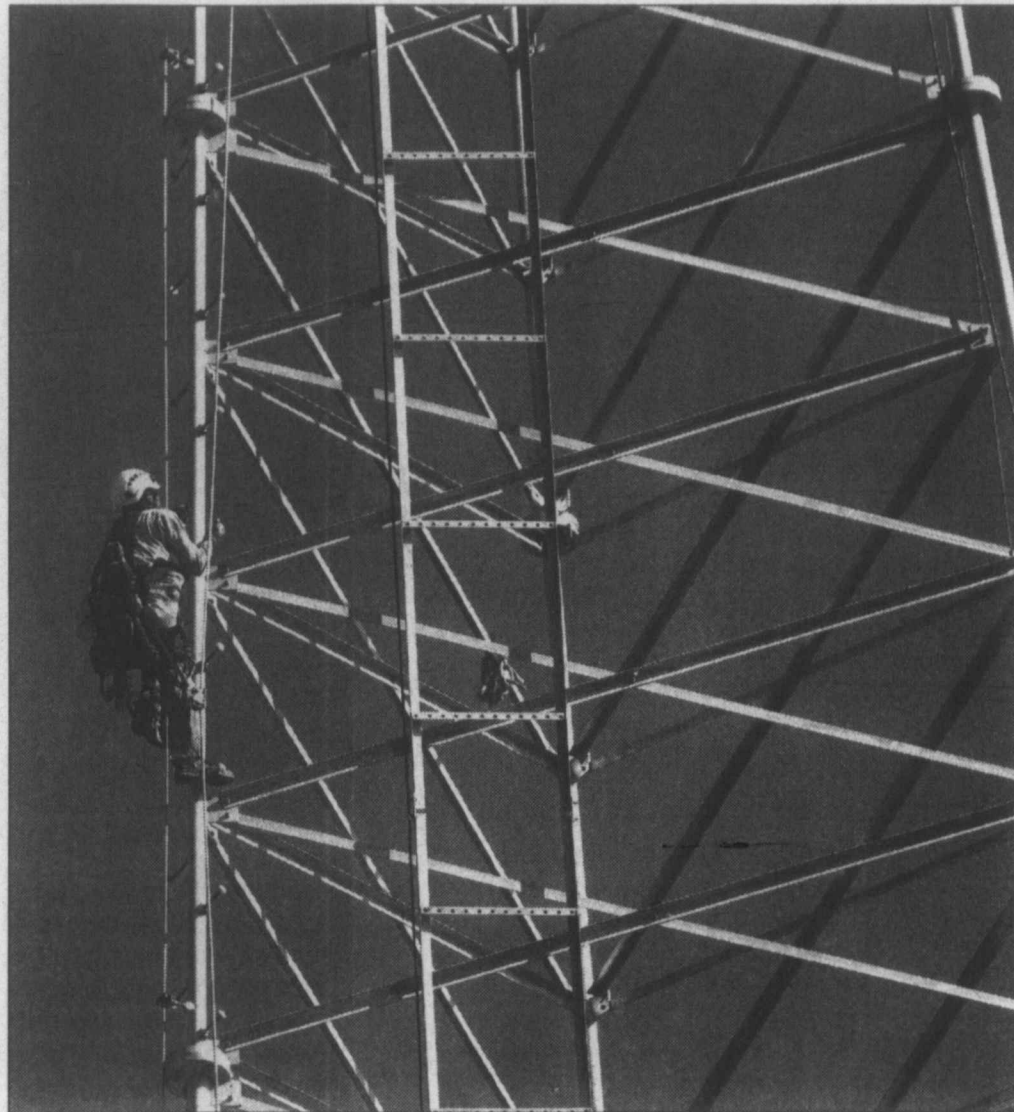

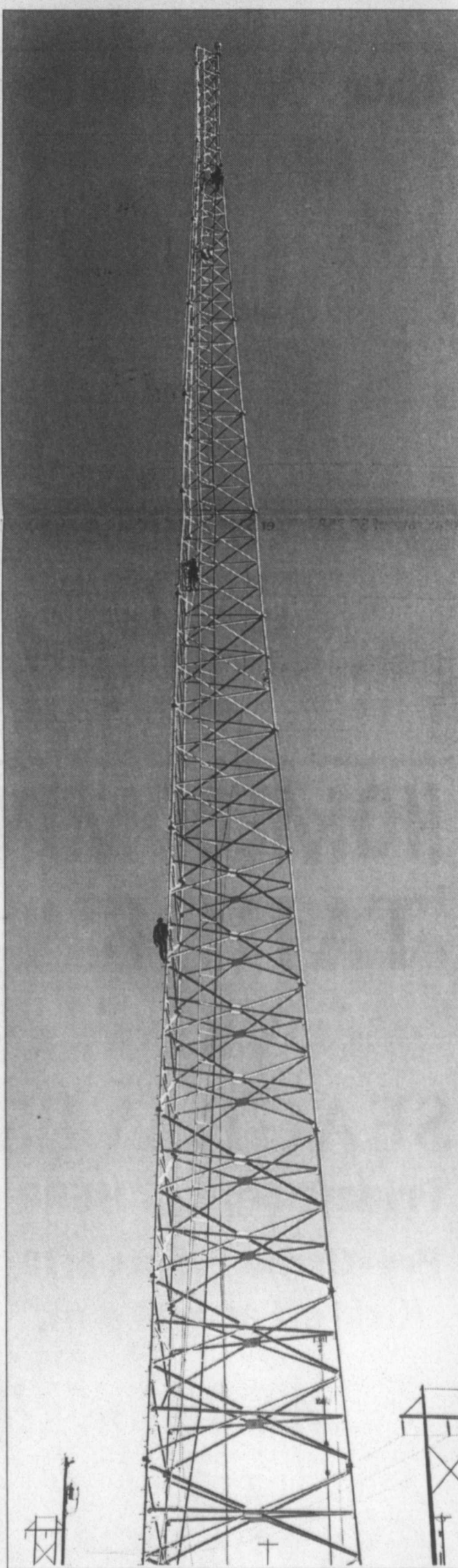

Bulldogs start fast, but fall short in season opener

The Tahoka High School Bulldogs opened their football season at home Friday by taking an early lead, but the Plains Cowboys rallied back and took the win for the first game, 38-18.

This Friday, the Bulldogs will host Seagraves in a Homecoming match, with pregame festivities starting at 6:30 and kickoff at 7 p.m. The Tahoka Homecoming Queen will be crowned during halftime ceremonies.

In their opening match, Tahoka took the lead with three touchdowns, and were 18-0 before Plains took the reins and charged back into the game. Adiryn Herevia had a 3-yard TD run, and Hunter Garrison scored a TD on a 48-yard run. Brogan Stone scored Tahoka's final TD on a 1-yard run.

"I was really happy with the energy and juice that we started the game with. We came out really hot and got a quick turnover that set us up in really good shape for that first score," said head coach

Stephen Overstreet.

"We came out and executed the game plan early on but allowed some penalties and other small things to catch up to us in the end. I felt like our kids came out and played hard early on, on both sides of the ball. Plains was a very much improved team from last year and played really hard.

"I felt like the overall difference in the ballgame was turnovers and penalties. We had way too many turnovers and the penalties killed us. I expect some penalties in the first game of the year because scrimmages are controlled and most penalties aren't called or enforced, but some of them I didn't necessarily agree with. However those didn't cost us the ballgame but the turnovers and the lack of execution down the stretch hurt," said Overstreet.

"This is still a young group and everything we saw on film is fixable. I was proud of them and how they came

The guy who stuck out the most to me Friday and had a really good night on both sides of the ball was Hunter Garrison. Due to an injury we asked him to play a different position and moved him into that tailback spot. He did a really good job. Hunter has a huge upside and we feel like he's going to be a weapon we can use in many different areas moving forward. What's even better is the fact that he's a Junior and we get him back for another year," said the coach.

"The group that showed up to play Friday wasn't the team we have been up to this point. I still feel like overall this group has a huge upside and our better days are ahead. We're going to take some growing pains along the way, but I feel like the grit and determination this

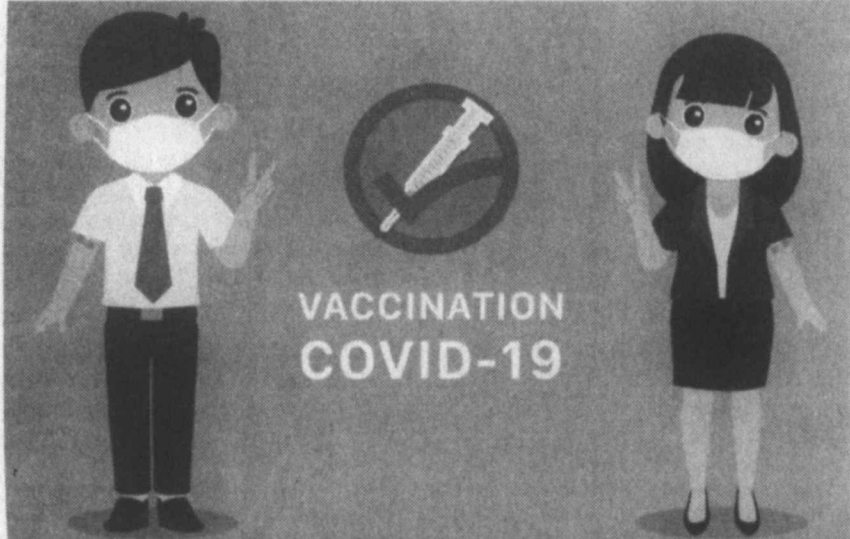

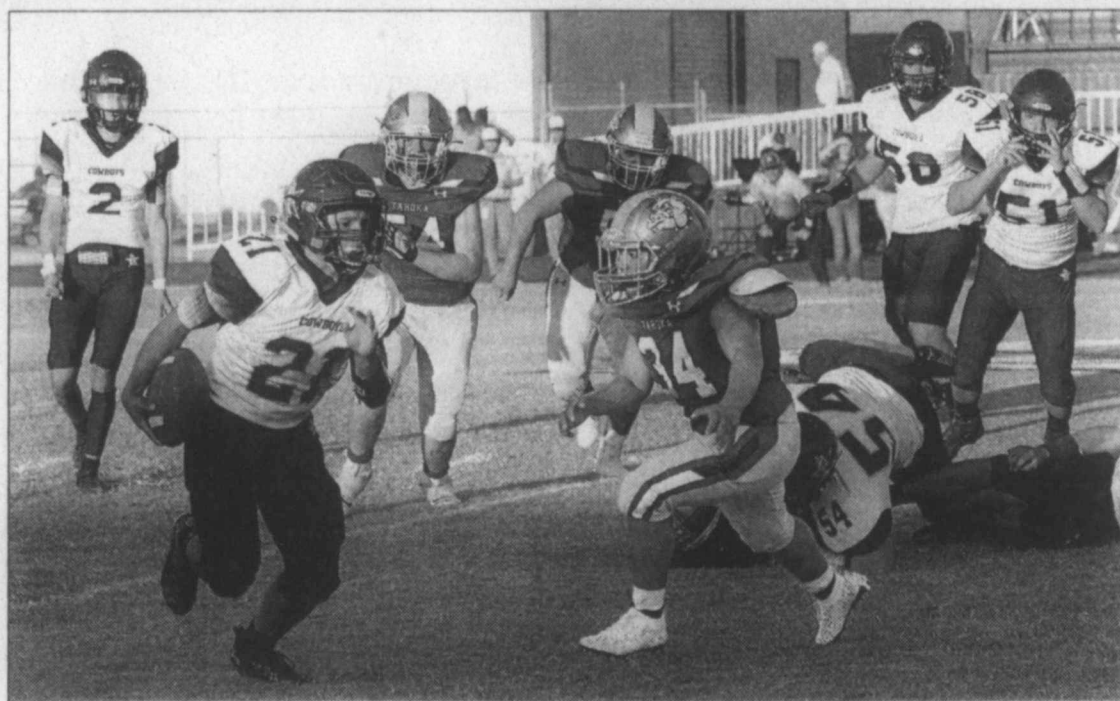
