Traffic accidents, dog rescue, naked man in law reports

raffic accidents, a dog rescue, a naked man, and a burglary were among Tahoka Police and Lynn County Sheriff's Office reports during the past week.

At 8:54 p.m. Oct. 13, a Ford pickup struck a deer on FM 212, about a half mile north of FM 2282. The vehicle was reportedly damaged on the right side of the vehicle, and was towed from the scene. No injuries were reported.

A minor accident occurred in the staff parking lot at Tahoka High School at 4 p.m. Oct. 15, when a a 2012 GMC Terrain driven by Catherine Lee backed into an unoccupied 2023 Chevy Silverado owned by Matt Woodley. No injuries were reported.

On Oct. 16 at 5:46 p.m., a caller to Lynn County Sheriff's Office (LCSO) said he witnessed a semi truck cross the lanes of traffic on US 87 about 2 miles south of Tahoka and ended up jacknifed in a ditch on the east side of the highway, striking a concrete fence. Lynn County EMS was called to the scene, but the driver reportedly refused transport.

Burglary of a barn was reported on property on FM 1317 on Oct. 11, with the caller reporting someone had broken into his barn the previous night by cutting the lock off the front door. Several items were

reported missing from the barn.

A suspicious person was reported at 3:23 a.m. Oct. 17, when a caller reported that a naked man carrying something in his hands had just walked onto his porch at a residence located on CR 24, and then ran back towards the cemetery overpass. According to the LCSO call sheets, the caller said the man did not take anything from his yard, but that he had the incident on security video for officers to view. Deputies responding to the scene checked the area, but were unable to locate a suspect.

Tahoka Police were called at noon Sunday to the underpass on US 87 underneath the 380 overpass, where a dog was reportedly stuck in a deep storm drain and unable to get out. An officer was attempting to free the dog, when the dog's owner arrived and they were able to safely get the dog out from the drain.

Police were called to a residence in the 1700 block of South 7th at 1:40 a.m. Oct. 16, where a woman reported that she had been asleep and had awoken and discovered her grandson, 15 years old,



Cities, county get monthly sales tax payments

Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar announced he will send cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose districts \$1.06 billion in local sales tax allocations for October, 17.4 percent more than in October 2021. 





Truel Cinderella's Castle—and Disneyland's Sleeping Beauty Castle before it-make brilliant use of the "forced perspective" technique to make them appear bigger than they actually are. And it's not just the castles that do this-many buildings (and supposed-to-benatural features like rock spires!) throughout the parks use forced perspective—but the castles are the best-known, perhaps most effective example of it. How it works is that, the higher up you get in these structures, the smaller the features (like windows and turrets) get. While efficient, this technique also makes it look like the top of the castle is farther away, making the castle as a whole seem taller. For instance, Sleeping Beauty Castle in Disneyland is only 77 feet tall, but it seems a lot taller!

Lamesa Supt. Knight retires

LAMESA - Lamesa school board members on Sept. 29 accepted a "voluntary retirement agreement" presented by Superintendent Jim Knight. The agreement came after board members spent almost an hour in closed session for discussions with legal counsel regarding Knight's employment.

"He resigned. It was his decision," school board president Rebecca Gonzales said shortly after the board's unanimous vote to open session to accept the agreement.

The board immediately named Dalia Benavides, a former elementary principal here, to serve as acting interim superintendent beginning the following week.

"She's been in education for 32 years, and she spent years working with students here with Lamesa ISD," Gonzales told the Lamesa Press-Reporter.

Knight's retirement caps off an increasingly contentious period between school board members and the administrator.

Board members this past January voted 4-3 against extending Knight's contract beyond the two years that were remaining at that time. After heavy criticism following that action, the board's vote flipped the following month to a 4-3 decision to extend his contract an additional year.

Tension escalated at a board meeting last month when remarks between administrators and board members - also involving employees and even audience members - became loud, and sharply worded.

Knight's contract with the district doesn't end until July 31, 2025. Since he voluntarily resigned, Gonzales said, the district will not be responsible for paying him through that contract period.


