TAHOKA ISD LOCKDOWN

Tahoka ISD campuses went into a brief lockdown just after 8 a.m. Tuesday, Nov. 8, after gunshots were heard that seemed to come from a nearby location. The lockdown was a precautionary protocol until law enforcement officers could determine the source of the gunshots, which turned out to be hunters firing shotguns while hunting crane and geese in a field a few blocks south of the school campus.

"With the low cloud cover and the wind out of that direction, the gunshots probably seemed much closer than they actually were," Police Chief Jeff Parker told *The News*. "There were five hunters, all with proper licenses and with the consent of the landowner, who were hunting in a field outside the city limits just south of Lockwood near the west end of Tahoka, which is actually just a few blocks from the school. When we located the hunters, they said they had let loose a burst of gunfire at about the time the incident was reported, while hunting," the chief explained.

Chief Parker said the school was in lockdown for a brief period, possibly 15-30 minutes, until the situation was investigated. It was determined that school campuses were not in any danger, and the lockdown was lifted.

Another report of gunshots heard was reported on Nov. 1 at 6 p.m. southwest of the 2100 block of Lockwood, which also was determined to be coming from hunters nearby.

Two deer and a calf were involved in three separate traffic accidents on Lynn County roadways, and a badger was trapped in a resident's garage during the past week.

A vehicle struck a deer about 3 miles south of Tahoka on US 87 at 12:37 a.m. Nov. 5. The female driver called Lynn County Sheriff's Office (LCSO) to report the accident, but said that her vehicle was still drivable, and no injuries were reported.

Three hours later, at 3:57 a.m., another vehicle reportedly struck a deer on US 87 northbound lanes at CR 17. The male driver also reported that his vehicle was still drivable, and no injuries were reported.

At 6:38 a.m. Nov. 7, a caller reported that his vehicle had struck a

calf on FM 212 about 2 miles north of US 380, and told LCSD that the calf would need to be put down. LCSD and DPS responded to the scene of the accident, and the owner of the calf was notified.

A two-vehicle accident occurred at the intersection of FM 211 and FM 2192 at 6:19 p.m. Nov. 1. A driver involved in the wreck contacted LCSD to report the incident and said that everyone involved was okay and

EMS was not needed. LCSD and DPS responded to the scene, and one vehicle was towed.

A caller at 7:30 p.m. Nov. 1 said he had a badger trapped in his garage at his residence on FM 211 and needed someone to take care of it. LCSD contacted the Game Warden, who responded that they did not deal with that type of animal. The home owner was advised to contact a pest control company that could handle that type of animal.

Two arrests were made during traffic stops. A female passenger arrested on a warrant out of Howard County for Failure to Appear and Bail Jumping, after a traffic stop at the FM 400 overpass at 10:20 p.m. Nov. 2. A male was arrested on charges of possession of a controlled

substance after a traffic stop on a vehicle north of Poka Lambro on US 87 at 11:27 p.m. Nov. 6.

Garza County Sheriff's Office alerted LCSD of a possible suicidal subject armed with a gun that was reported to be enroute from Garza County to the Grassland Cemetery area on FM 1313. Family members had told officers that they had received messages from the subject stating he was going to end his life and had a long gun and a pistol with him in the vehicle. LCSD deputies attempted to locate the vehicle, but Garza County called back and reported they had located the vehicle and everything was okay.

A caller on Nov. 2 initially reported a burglary of paint cans missing from a barn after noticing that the barn door appeared to have been pried open, but the owner called back later and reported that the paint had been found on a shelf.

Tahoka Police responded to a residence in the 1900 block of Ave. L at 9 p.m. Nov. 1, where the homeowner reported a front window had been broken. Reportedly no entry had been gained into the house, however. The investigation is ongoing.

Police responded to the area of Ave. L and S. 6th at 6:45 p.m. Nov. 4 for a report of a reckless driver, with a caller reporting the model of the vehicle. Police located the vehicle, which reportedly was not being driven recklessly at the time of the officer's contact, but police determined that the male driver had outstanding warrants for reckless driving, and he was arrested and transported to Lynn County Jail.

A caller reported a runaway juvenile to police at 4 p.m. Nov. 4, when a 15-year-old youth did not return to the home at the time requested. Police investigated several locations where the youth's friends lived, but the youth had returned home before being located by the police, according to reports.

Other calls during the week were for suspicious persons/vehicles, welfare concerns, assisting motorists, and domestic disturbances.

Veterans Day honors all who serve the USA

Veterans Day is a federal holiday in the United States observed annually on November 11, for honoring military veterans of the United States Armed Forces. While those who died are also remembered, Veterans Day is the day set aside to thank and honor all those who served honorably in the military - in wartime or peacetime.

The day honors all people currently serving in the U.S. armed forces. This includes the men and women who have served or are serving in the Army, Navy, Marine Corps, Air Force, Space Force and Coast Guard, including the National Guard and Reserve components.

In 1954, Congress passed the bill that President Eisenhower signed proclaiming November 11 as Veterans Day. The date of November 11 has historical significance, pertaining to the ending of World War I fighting at 11 a.m., November 11, 1918 (the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month). The day became known as "Armistice Day," and was eventually changed to Veterans Day.

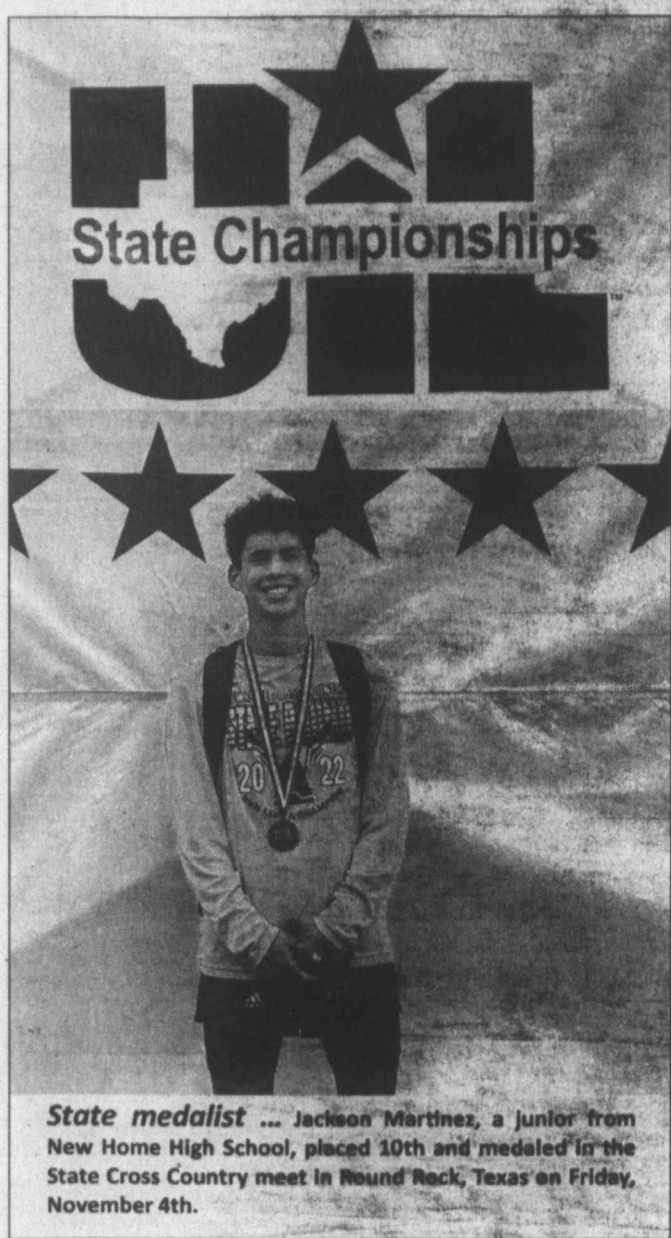

Council approves staff training for software/financial practices

Tahoka City Council met in special session Monday night, approving a motion to hire Gary House and an associate, Steve Hightower, to oversee the financial software structuring and training for city staff, as the city strives to incorporate a more sustainable structuring of accounts receivable and upgrading financial accounting practices for all city departments. The training and restructuring will be an ongoing process, at a cost not to exceed \$10,000, for the year.

In other business, council members chose an engineering contract to design walking trail plans for a Texas Department of Transportation 2023 Transportation Alternatives Set-Aside Grant, choosing the same engineering firm that is designing city pool upgrades through another grant source. Grant funding requests, and matching costs for the city, will be determined at a later date according to design plans which the council will oversee.

A \$30,000 Economic Development Grant was approved as recommended by the Tahoka Economic Development Corporation (EDC), for Bates Ventures, LLC (Family Dollar Store), as matching grant funds for work already completed in the building of the new dollar store facility here.

The council approved a change order from Tejas Construction for the chemical housing building located at the Hwy 87 pump station,

through the Texas Community Block Grant.

A \$1,000 donation to the Hometown Christmas Committee was approved, from the Tahoka EDC.

The council also discussed adopting procedural rules for city involvement in community events, to outline cost protocols from the city for hosting or assisting with four community events per year, which currently includes an Easter event, Cinco de Mayo, July 4th, and Christmas event.

"I believe it is important for the city to do these events," said Mayor John Baker. "Everything that we do can't be a moneymaker. Some things need to be to give back to our citizens, and these kinds of events are what makes our community unique."

Council members all agreed that the community events are important to Tahoka, and City Administrator Julie Arrington said that the city would like to have a Community Relations board, to have a hand in these types of events. She explained that the city could advertise or promote the Community Relations board to seek input for names of persons who might like to serve on the board, and then the council could choose who to appoint on the board.

Mayor Baker led the meeting, with all council members present including Joe Craig, Nathan Garcia, Shiloh Braddock, Samantha Henderson, and Stephen Overstreet.

Askew Farm recognized for 100 years in same family

The family farm is a proud legacy in Texas, and the Askew family in Lynn County is especially proud of their heritage, as the Askew farm in Lynn County has been recognized by the Texas Department of Agriculture's Family Land Heritage program as having been owned by the same family for 100 years. The farm has seen five generations of Askews farm the land that has been in the family since 1922.

On Oct. 29, 2022 the Askew family was among honorees at ceremonies held at the Texas State Capitol to celebrate and commemorate the families who have passed down their proud Texas legacy from generation to generation.

Several members of the Askew family traveled to Austin to participate or observe the ceremonies that were conducted on the floor of the State Capitol. Lyndol Askew and son Ty Askew represented the family as Texas Agriculture Sid Miller presented the Askew family with the 100 Years Family Land Heritage Certificate of Honor for the P.E. Askew Farm, founded in 1922.

Prior to the ceremonies, a barbecue lunch was hosted on the Southwest Capitol Lawn for honorees and their families.

The Family Land Heritage (FLH) program is a recognition program through the Texas Department of Agriculture that honors families who have owned and operated a continuous agricultural operation for 100

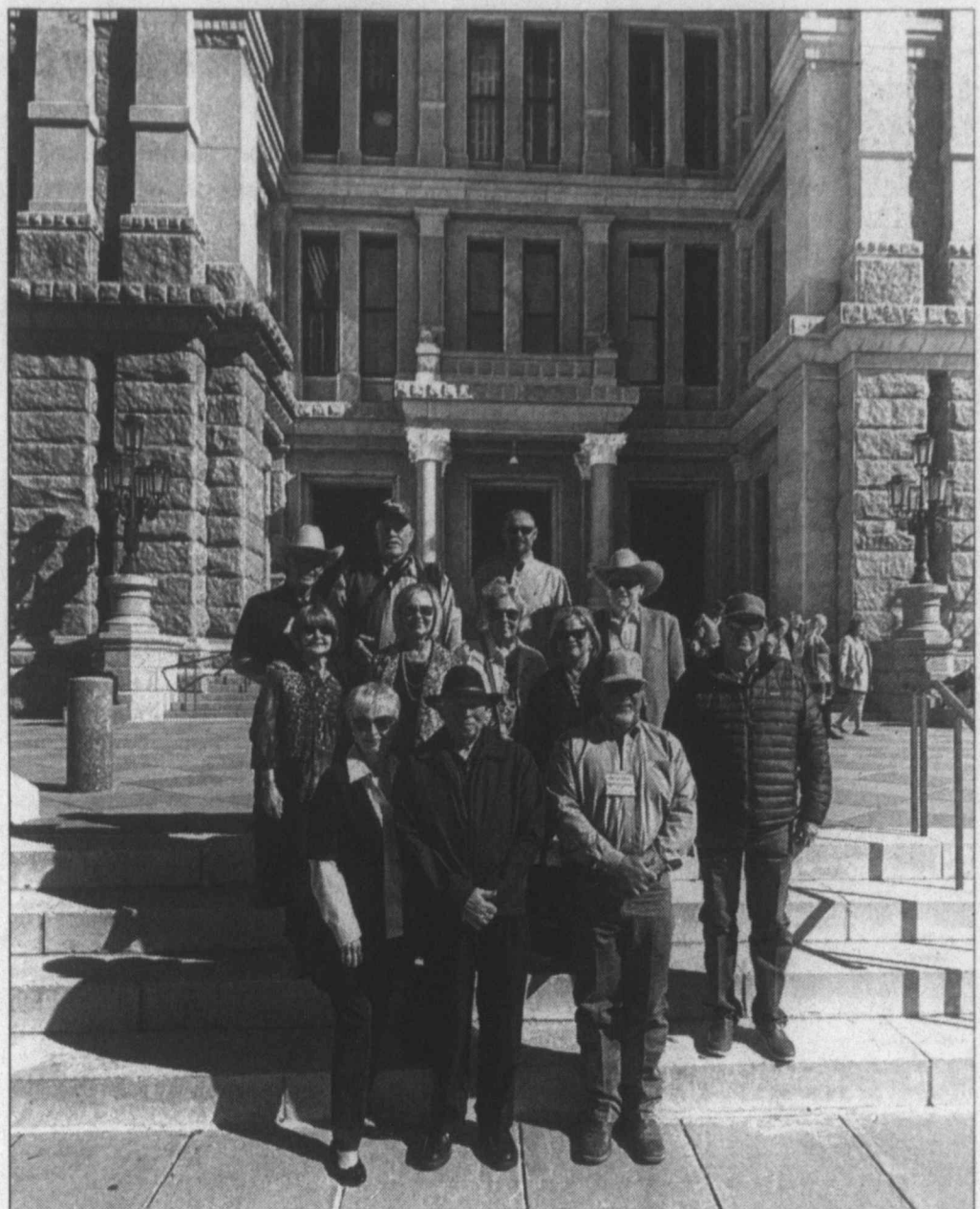
years or more. According to information on the Family Land Heritage website, only two other Lynn County farms have been presented with the 100 Year Certificate of Honor – the C.C. McLaurin Farm (in 2004) and the Vaughn Farms (2004).

According to family history compiled by Benna Askew, the Preston Ellis (P.E.) Askew farm was founded in 1922 when P.E. acquired 160 acres of land from Ike E. Butler from Karnes, Tx. The land is located a mile north of the current Wells Co-op Gin in Lynn County.

The family patriarch, P.E. Askew, travelled to the South Plains from Palo Pinto County in 1919 in two covered wagons with his wife, Hettie, and their six children, settling in Lynn County. He and Hettie had four more children, and they raised 10 children on the farm. Together they raised livestock, cotton, milo, and wheat on the land.

Their son, Bertice Preston Askew, moved to the farm with his family in 1943 and farmed there until 1946. Preston and Hettie moved back to the farm after living in Brownsville, with their son Arlys. They continued to work the land until 1952 when another son, Reece, moved to the farm with his family. Arlys moved to the farm with his family in 1957. Their father died in 1961 and Hettie acquired the land. Arlys Askew purchased the land from his siblings after Hettie died in 1980.

Preston Taylor (Ty) Askew, grandson of Bertice Preston Askew and son of

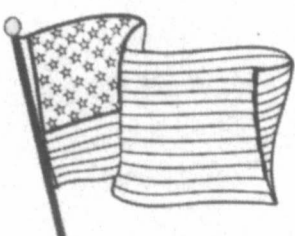

Lyndol Preston Askew, has rented the farm since 2015 and continues today. He is assisted by his son, Brady Preston Askew, and son-in-law Justin Bass. Today, they raise cotton, wheat and milo.

P.E. Askew was one of the founders of the Wells Farmers Cooperative Gin in 1938. He was the President of the first Board of Directors and there has been an Askew on the Board continuously since then: Preston, Bertice, Arlys, Lyndol (son of Bertice), and currently Ty is serving as Secretary. All cotton produced on the farm has been ginned at Wells Co-Op Gin since the gin was built.
