Lubbock ISD and Texas Tech Sign Articulation Agreement



A Very Historical Signing By LIS D & Texas Tech University For Estacado High School

Officials from the Lubbock Independent School District (LISD) and the Texas Tech University College of Education signed an articulation agreement on Thursday, November 19, 2015, making Estacado High School (EHS) an Early College High School campus. The program is funded in part through the East Lubbock Promise Neighborhood grant and matching dollars from Texas Tech.

Becoming an Early College High School will allow EHS students to earn dual credit hours that count toward high school and college degrees. Students who start their first year of high school will graduate four years later with 60 hours of college credit, classifying them as juniors. Students will not have to pay tuition on these college

Most of the dual-credit classes will be college basics, including English, science, public speaking, math and history. The schedule for students enrolled in

the program will get increasingly more rigorous, taking only two college courses in the first year, four in the second and eight in the final year. Most of the classes will be held on the Early College High School campus at Estacado, and Texas Tech professors will travel to the location. Students will have some mainstream high school classes and will still be able to participate in extracurricular activities and take electives.

LISD Superintendent Berhl Robertson, Jr., Ed.D. said, "This is a great partnership with Texas Tech University and an outstanding opportunity for our students in Lubbock ISD. Research has proven that students who participate in an Early College High School program are more likely to complete a bachelor's degree and outperform regular high school graduates. We believe that this program will serve our students well.

LISD Deputy Superintendent for Academic Services Theresa

Williams, Ed.D. added, "We are thrilled about the partnership with Texas Tech University and the implementation of the Early College model at Estacado High School. This has been a yearlong collaborative process of researching and planning between Lubbock ISD and Texas Tech. We believe that having an Early College High School available to our students in LISD will be a "game changer" in their lives and will forever alter the trajectory of their future success."

Texas Tech College of Education Dean Scott Ridley said, 'This fast-growing movement in our state and nation dramatically improves the probability that high school children living in poverty will complete their uni-

versity degree." Vernita Holmes, veteran District Two Trustee, said, "This is very historical, and our students will benefit tremendously." She continued by saying, "This is an effort the entire City of Lubbock

The Chatman Neighborhood Association voted to have the sign identifying the neighborhood at their meeting on Friday evening, November 6, 2015.





Man charged with murder in 'assassination' of Tyshawn Lee, 9

(CNN)—Four weeks after alleged gang members lured 9year-old Tyshawn Lee into an alley and killed him -- a slaying that some in violence-riddled Chicago called a new low -- the city's police superintendent announced the arrest of one man and vowed to "obliterate" the "criminal" group to which he be-

"That gang just signed its own death warrant," Superintendent Garry McCarthy said Friday. 'We're going to go in and destroy that gang and, by the way, the rival gang, too.

McCarthy said Corey Morgan, a 27-year-old "documented gang member (and) convicted felon," is in custody on a firstdegree murder charge. But police don't think Morgan was alone, saying he acted "in concert" with two others. McCarthy didn't name one, who is in custody on an unrelated charge; the other, Kevin Edwards, is at

Bond was denied Friday to Morgan, prosecutors said.

Court papers provided by the prosecutor's office said that 'Tyshawn's death is the result of a gang war" between two particular gangs that "came to a boil" after Morgan's brother, Tracy, was shot and killed in a car with their mother on October 13.

The mother was shot and wounded, court papers said.

"Shortly after the shooting (Corey Morgan) stated that since his brother was killed and his mama was shot he was going to kill grandmas, mamas, kids and all," according to court papers filed in prosecutors' request that Morgan be held without bail.

An autoposy of Tyshawn's

body showed two perforating gunshot wounds, and part of his right thumb was lost as a defensive wound trying to block a gunshot, court papers said. The boy's body had a gunshot wound to the head, a bullet graze wound to his right upper back, and a superficial wound to the right forearm, documents said.

"There was evidence of closerange firing," court papers said.

The afternoon of November 2, officials say, men approached young Tyshawn as he played basketball with friends at a Chicago playground. They led him to an alley and, with a single gun, shot the boy

The shooting was "targeted and calculated," McCarthy said. He connected it to Tyshawn's father, who the superintendent said hasn't helped police "at all" in the case, and at least two other fatal shootings over the previous

"This is a crime that shook city," the superintendent said. "It was an act of barbarism, the assassination of a 9-year-old child as a gang retaliation to get back at his father.

"Tyshawn Lee was failed on many, many levels."

Gun violence, racial tensions in Chicago

Shooting deaths on the streets of Chicago, sadly, are nothing

In 2012, the city gained the dubious distinction of murder capital of the United States after it registered 503 homicides, more than any other city. Those numbers have ticked down some, though the FBI's 2014 statistics show 411 killings, still outpacing cities (such as New York with 333 and Los Angeles with 260) with higher populations.

Some areas of the city are worse than others. They include Auburn-Gresham, a neighborhood on the South Side where gangs battle over turf and the right to sell drugs. That's where Tyshawn was shot dead, down the street from his grandmother's house, the Rev. Michael Pfleger said at the child's funeral.

Opinion: How to end Chicago's cycle of violence

Investigators don't know whether any of the men involved in his death knew the 9-year-old personally. But they do believe that he was singled out, not for anything he did but because of his father.

"It's truly an act of barbarism," Chicago police Chief of Detectives Dean Andrews said Friday. "It's a 9-year-old boy that was targeted and executed."





In 1865, with the surrender of the Confederate army, that meant victory for the Union. With this surrender, ALL STATES were bound to recognize the superiority of the federal government. 

1 Timothy 4:1, -- Now, The Spirit Speaks Expressly, That I The Last Times Some Shall Depart From The Faith, Giving Heed To Seducing Spirits, And Doctrines Of Devils.

New Book Has the Formula for "Eradicating Racism" and "Debunking White Supremacy"

Nationwide — In their new book, A Formula for Eradicating Racism: Debunking White Su-Professors Tim premacy, McGettigan and Earl Smith spell out a practical plan to end racism. The authors argue that racism is a remediable form of suggestion-induced sadism. This means that racism is a type of undemocratic social architecture that people purposely construct. The good news is that people can also dismantle undesirable social constructions.

McGettigan and Smith argue that, early in its history, the US intentionally dehumanized people of color so that white invaders could plunder the western hemisphere without moral qualms. Technically speaking, a crime is not a crime when it's committed against people who are defined as sub-humans.

The most glaring example of democratic dehumanization is the 3/5 Compromise which, even to this day, fractionates the perceived merit of African

Americans in the USA. In addition, the US "denaturalized" Indigenous Peoples, Hispanics, Asians and every other person of color via the Naturalization Act of 1790 — which established that only free whites could be US citizens. Subsequently, the US has treated people of color like wartime enemies. The US still enthusiastically celebrates continent-wide genocide of Native Americans under the sacred banner of Manifest Destiny.

She began outlining all of the rules and regulations of this new diet and she did it with such glee, in fact, I have never seen her smile more, and it was going to be hard not to do it.


After her plan was firmly set on the table the only thing that I lost was interest in the whole new diet plan.



Why blacks believe in the American Dream more than whites

The financial deck appears to be stacked against blacks and Hispanics in America.

Their family wealth is typically one-tenth that of whites. They earn considerably less. They are more likely to be unemployed or in poverty and they are less likely to own a home.

Yet despite all this, blacks and Hispanics are far more optimistic about being able to live the American Dream these days than whites.

Some 55% of blacks and 52% of Hispanics say it's easier for them to achieve the American Dream than it was for their parents, compared to 35% of whites, according to a new CNN/Kaiser Family Foundation poll on race.

This is true even though many blacks and Hispanics CNN-Money interviewed said they are not in a financial position to fulfill their own dreams anytime soon -- if ever. For them, however, it's about opportunity. And they feel they have a lot more of it than their parents did.

Take Breionne Carter, a 22year-old black woman who lives in Pflugerville, Texas, a suburb of Austin.

After working at Popeye's for three years, she just landed a full-time job with benefits at Dairy Queen and hopes to be promoted to manager in coming months. She plans to enter Austin Community College once she is more financially settled and can buy a car.

Carter doesn't know exactly what she wants to do in life, but her dream is to create companies that focus on things she likes -including clothes and music -that will also provide those in her community with jobs and other opportunities. She wants to encourage people to have more confidence and pride in themselves. "You have to keep going forward, no matter what's holding you back," she said.

Though she is strapped for cash now, Carter has no doubt she'll be able to achieve any goal she sets. A high school graduate

"[They] were bound by a set of legal and institutional restrictions," said Margaret Simms, director of the Low-Income Working Families project at the Urban Institute. There are "more possibilities for mobility than a generation or two ago."

with no children, she's thankful the children or grandchildren of immigrants. They often see their fortunes rise with every generation, said Carol Graham, a Brookings Institution senior fellow whose research has also found blacks and Hispanics to be more optimistic about the future than whites.

But faith in the American Dream has withered in recent years. The Great Recession and weak economic recovery has left many families struggling. A 2009 Pew Charitable Trusts poll found that 63% of blacks and 62% of Hispanics said it was easier for them to achieve the dream than their parents, compared to 46% of whites.

Ray Sanchez, however, remains a firm believer in the dream, even though his personal finances have suffered in the last

Sanchez, who is Hispanic, made good money touring the country as a Buddy Holly impersonator until 2011, when he aged out of the role. Now 51, he's unemployed and finding it hard to land a job because of his severe diabetes, which has left him with neuropathy. His family -- which includes a son in 5th grade and a daughter in 11th grade, both on the honor roll -- depends on his wife's income as a health care Continue on Page 7





aide. He also has a 28-year-old daughter who lives several hours away from his Monmouth, Oregon, home.

For Sanchez, the American Dream is about having a happy and loving family and a president he trusts. Right now, he says he's content on both fronts...though the 2016 election may alter that.

His life stands in sharp contrast to his parents' experience. His father, who was of Mexican descent, was forced to live on the streets in Texas at the age of 7, after his mother (Sanchez's grandmother) abandoned the family and his father died. Sanchez's father had to teach himself to read and write. Eventually, he found work at a lumber mill. Sanchez's mother dropped out of high school and became an "average housewife," raising three children, he said.

So while times are tough at the moment, Sanchez is hopeful he can change his fortunes.

Dorothy was born March 6, " I have an education, so I have 1934 in Clarksville to Victoria a lot of options," Sanchez said,

while watching his son play soccer. "I could go back to school. If one thing doesn't work, I can do something else."

Whites, however, aren't as optimistic about their chances of living the American Dream. That's likely because many of their parents were able to buy homes and send their kids to college, possibly even on one income

They are starting from a place where they were much more comfortable," Simms said.

Jon Burke's parents were able to achieve their American Dream and were more confident they could hold onto it. But Burke, a 34 year old white man, can't say the same about his own situation.


While he's financially stable,

he is less certain about the future. A legal aid lawyer in Harvard, Massachusetts, he is raising three children with his wife, a lawyer in a private practice. Child care is expensive. Health care is expensive. College, even at a state school, is expensive, he says. The family's finances could go downhill quickly if someone gets sick or loses their job.

Americans have far less certainty and face more challenges these days -- partly because of the decline of unions and changes in government policies -- than many did in his parents' generation, Burke said.

His father was a college professor and his mom was a high school teacher. They had job security, guaranteed pensions and free healthcare. Now, people must shoulder too much of the risk and the burdens, rather than being spread across society, he says. The American Dream is too focused on individual achievement, he said.

"You could be doing fine today, but down the road, not so much," said Burke. "There are a lot of unnecessary obstacles people have to overcome. I don't think my parents had them in the past."


