



President Obama's Open Letter to America's Law **Enforcement Community**

In the wake of the tragedies in Dallas and Baton Rouge, President Obama penned a letter to the men and women of America's law enforcement community. The President's letter was shared with officers around the

To the brave members of our Nation's law enforcement com-

Every day, you confront danger so it does not find our families, carry burdens so they do not fall to us, and courageously meet test after test to keep us safe. Like Dallas officer Lorne Ahrens, who bought dinner for a homeless man the night before he died, you perform good deeds beyond the call of duty and out of the spotlight. Time and again, you make the split-second decisions that could mean life or death for you and many others in harm's way. You endure the tense minutes and long hours over lifetimes of service.

Every day, you accept this responsibility and you see your colleagues do their difficult, dangerous jobs with equal valor. I want you to know that the American people see it, too. We recognize it, we respect it, we appreciate it, and we depend on you. And just as your tight-knit law enforcement family feels the recent losses to your core, our Nation grieves alongside you. Any attack on police is an unjustified attack on all of us.

I've spent a lot of time with law enforcement over the past

couple of weeks. I know that you take each of these tragedies personally, and that each is as devastating as a loss in the family. Sunday's shooting in Baton Rouge was no different. Together, we mourn Montrell Jackson, Matthew Gerald, and Brad Garafola. Each was a husband. Each was a father. Each was a proud member of his community. And each fallen officer is one too many. Last week, I met with the families of the Dallas officers who were killed, and I called the families of those who were killed in the line of duty yesterday in Baton Rouge. I let them know how deeply we ache for the loss of their loved ones.

Some are trying to use this moment to divide police and the communities you serve. I reject those efforts, for they do not reflect the reality of our Nation. Officer Jackson knew this too, when just days ago he asked us to keep hatred from our hearts. Instead, he offered—to protestors and fellow police officers alike—a hug to anyone who saw him on the street. He offered himself as a fellow worshipper to anyone who sought to pray. Today, we offer our comfort and our prayers to his family, to the Geralds and the Garafolas, and to the tight-knit Baton Rouge law enforcement community.

As you continue to serve us in this tumultuous hour, we again recognize that we can no longer ask you to solve issues Continue on Page 6

Statement On Mae Simmons Park **And 100 Black Men Event Cancellation**

City of Lubbock staff regrets the decision by 100 Black Men to cancel this year's Kids

In February of this year an unfortunate accident occurred causing a pedestrian bridge to collapse taking the life of a City employee. The replacement of that bridge must be engineered, manufactured, and installed properly to assure the safety of the patrons using Mae Simmons Park. The replacement bridge is presently being manufactured and will be installed once deliv-

It was suggested to 100 Black Men to relocate this year's Derby east of Martin Luther King Boulevard in Mae Simmons Park, where there is adequate shoreline and parking, or relocate the tournament to McKenzie Park, or simply hold the tournament where it is normally held without the pedestrian bridge. These suggestions were rejected by 100 Black Men.


Michael Jordan speaks out on police shootings: 'I can no longer stay silent'

For years, Michael Jordan has taken criticism from those who'd wished one of the most famous, visible, wealthy and powerful athletes in the world would use his considerable public profile and influence to speak out on social issues affecting the African American community. For years, the six-time NBA champion and basketball legend's legacy of on-court success has been counterbalanced by four non-quoted words - "Republicans buy sneakers, too" often used to call Jordan onto the carpet for failing "to embrace the leverage he possessed as the nation's most iconic athlete across the 1990s."

Well, now, the Hall of Famer and Charlotte Hornets owner has chosen to speak.

In an essay for The Undefeated published Monday, the 53-year-old Jordan makes his voice heard in the wake of the recent unrest in the country following the police killing of Alton Sterling in Baton Rouge, La., the police killing of Philando Castile in Falcon Heights, Minn., the killing of five police officers by a lone gunman at an otherwise peaceful Black Lives Matter protest in Dallas, the police shooting of North Miami behavioral therapist Charles Kinsey as he lay on his back with his hands thrust in the air trying to coax an autistic patient back into a mental health center, and all the protests and demonstrations that have followed.

With persistent issues of racism, violence against African Americans, police brutality and gun violence coming to the forefront for many NBA and WNBA players of late, Jordan decided that, "as a proud American, a father who lost his own dad in a senseless act of violence, and a black man [...] deeply troubled" by the deaths on both sides of

I have decided to speak out in the hope that we can come together as Americans, and through peaceful dialogue and education, achieve constructive change.

Jordan's commitment to diversity, his spokeswoman said, has been long established, "But he's always been very private and personal about many of these things.'

Of the decision to speak out and contribute his voice and money now, she said: "Michael is just tired of talking. He wanted to do something about the issue. This was very important to him.'

In years past, Jordan has tended to wield influence in the social sphere as an extension of his business pursuits, as Scoop Jackson detailed for ESPN back in 2014 (hat-tip to Myles

"In the comprehensive context of Jordan "not being black enough," people miss how over the years with his position in the Jordan Brand as CEO, the company is the only one inside of Nike that has had multiple African-American presidents. (Disclosure: I worked with Nike from 2001-05, but not with the Jordan brand.) Outside of Nike president Trevor Edwards, the execs at the Jordan Brand have always been the highest-ranking blacks in the parent company (Nike). This is something that Jordan's made sure of; something that is not happenstance or a mistake.







Progress at our 24th **Annual Conference**

Our 24th Annual Conference, held in New Orleans, proved to be our best conference yet. We had over 40 speakers and held it at venues: Hilton Riverside Hotel and the Port of New Orleans Administrative Building. We were at the Port because there are more than 2 trillion dollars annually in contracting opportunities at American ports. From now on we will focus on this industry. So this was our "Maiden Voyage". The Port of New Orleans is the 6th largest port in the nation. It did not disappoint. The featured cruise line for the port is Carnival Cruise Lines. The CEO of Carnival is African American Arnold Donald and he came and spent a half day with us. He is extremely brilliant. In sum, the conference was our best yet and that is quite an accomplishment.

One of our Memorandums of Understanding (MOU's) was with the Surety and Fidelity Association. This concerns an 8 week program for construction companies. It is to prepare them so that they become bondable or increase their bonding levels. A bond is a combination of insurance and credit. For example, if a contractor wins a bid for a \$200,000 contract he must have a bonding capacity of, at least, \$200,000. If not, he cannot proceed. This Construction Development Model Program will begin in Kansas City, Missouri and then spread to St. Louis, Missouri. Our goal is to provide this service to contractors in at least 25 states. We thank our Missouri Black Chamber of Commerce for kick starting this program. Our contractors will increase their bonding capacity by hundreds of millions of dol-

bonding program. This is going to be a dynamic MOU and program. Look out Canada! The NBCC is coming to town. We have signed three MOU's

concerning the nation of Columbia. Our chapter in this dynamic nation has been extremely busy. One MOU is with the City of Choco. The mayor, who is a leader with the nation's Black mayors' association, has given the NBCC full use of more than 4,000 acres of fertile farm land. Thus, we are forming our Agriculture Committee. We see including the National Black Farmers Association HBCU's with Agriculture Departments and the US Department of Agriculture. University of Santiago has also signed an MOU concerning the application of this project and the next one. That MOU is with a coalition of local governments as well as the legislature of Columbia. And at the end of the day, you have a right to go home to your family, just like anybody else.

Robert Kennedy, once our Nation's highest-ranking law enforcement official, lamented in the wake of unjust violence a country in which we look at our neighbors as people "with whom we share a city, but not a community." This is a time for us to reaffirm that what makes us special is that we are not only a country, but also a community. That is true whether you are

As we bind up our wounds, we must come together to ensure that those who try to divide us do not succeed. We are at our best when we recognize our common humanity, set an example for our children of trust and responsibility, and honor the sacrifices of our bravest by coming together to be better.







On August 30, 2016, Lubbock ISD will ask voters to decide whether the district can shift two cents from the Debt Service tax rate to the Maintenance and Operations tax rate. The LISD tax rate will remain at \$1.235 – the same rate it has been for the last 10 years without extending the time for LISD to pay its existing debt. Trump Scolded by Father of U.S. Muslim Soldier Killed in Action

The Muslim father of a U.S. soldier killed while serving in Iraq passionately admonished Donald Trump Thursday night for his hateful rhetoric, religious intolerance and overall disrespect of communities and cultures.

In what has been called the most powerful speech given at the Democratic National Convention in Philadelphia this week, Khizr Khan said he and his family never would have been able to come to the United States — and his son, Army Capt. Humayun Khan, never would have served in the military — under Trump's proposal to ban Muslims from entering the country. Khan and his family immigrated to the United States from the United Arab Emirates when his son was two years old.

"Donald Trump consistently smears the character of Muslims. He disrespects other minorities, women, judges, even his own party leadership. He vows to build walls and ban us from this country," Khan declared to a packed arena with his wife standing beside him.

He continued, speaking directly to Trump: "Donald Trump, you are asking Americans to trust you with our future. Let me ask you: Have you even read the United States Constitution?" As the audience erupted in cheers, Khan pulled out his pocket edition and said: "I will gladly lend you my copy" and challenged Trump to "look for the words liberty and equal protection [under] law."

Capt. Khan was killed in Iraq in 2004 at age 27 by a car bomb. After telling his fellow soldiers to stay clear of the suspicious vehicle, he approached it, and it exploded. He was buried in Arlington National Cemetery with full military honors and posthumously awarded a Bronze Star

and Purple Heart.

"Hillary Clinton was right when she called my son the best of America," Khan said, and further rebuked Trump.

"Have you ever been to Arlington Cemetery? Go look at the graves of brave patriots who died defending United States of America," he said. "You will see all faiths, genders and ethnicities."

And then Khan unleashed on Trump: "You have sacrificed nothing and no one."

The response to Khan's address was overwhelming, both in the arena, as well as on social media and other commentary, and was praised by Democrats and Republicans alike.

Outspoken conservative pundit Erick Erickson, and former editor of "Red State," tweeted: "If you are a Republican, you should watch this and be

ashamed of what you have done."

Meghan McCain, the daughter of Sen. John McCain, a veteran and former prisoner of war, tweeted: "Most powerful speech of the DNC easily from a patriotic American, Khizr Khan. They should just end with that."

In an interview with CNN on Friday morning, Sen. Tim Kaine, the Democratic vice presidential nominee, said "That was probably one of the most moving events of the entire four days when he talked about his son. I got a boy in the Marines, so I hear somebody who sacrificed a child in military service. It really grabs you."

Khan wrapped up his address saying: "We can't solve our problems by building walls and sowing division. We are stronger together."

say they can't imagine what could have led to such a situation. "They kept them busy and they supported them in everything that they did. There was not any mark that they messed with their children," a cousin of Dawn Armstrong told the Hous-

ton Chronicle. "There was nothing that even could possibly have justified this situation. This doesn't even make sense."

Antonio was an All-American linebacker at Texas A&M and a sixth-round draft pick of the 49ers in 1995. He played briefly for the Dolphins and Rams and then spent four seasons in the Canadian Football League.
