
All who attended this wonderful evening event was entertained by live music from Richard and La Familia, and also Darren Mann and The Levites.

This Type of Cancer is a Growing Concern in the Black Community

There are all different types of cancer. Leukemia is one type that involves the production of abnormal white blood cells in bone marrow. There are four different types of the more common forms of leukemia, but one type is increasing concern in the black community.

A study done in 2013 showed that African Americans with this type of cancer did not live as long as other patients with the disease, in spite of receiving the same treatment. It's called Chronic Myeloid Leukemia (CML), also known as chronic myelogenous leukemia). It primarily affects adults, and occurs in about 6,000 people in the U.S. every year. Although it represents 10-15 percent of all the different types of leukemia, it has become a growing concern for African Americans.

What reseachers know What researchers know about



the cancer is that this type of leukemia typically grows slowly, but it can quickly accelerate and spread to just about any part of the body. They also found a link between CML and an abnormal chromosome known as the Philadelphia chromosome (Ph chromosome). Further, they know that the disease is usually diagnosed in its chronic phase (early stage) when treatment is very effective for most patients.

What researchers don't know What researchers don't know is why people develop the disease. They also do not know why this form of leukemia is becoming more prevalent in the black community, or why blacks with CML may not live as long as other patients with the disease. Because of the disparity with which this cancer affects African Americans, it is definitely a cancer they need to know more about.

Rise in Suicide by Black Children Surprises Researchers

The suicide rate among black children has nearly doubled since the early 1990s, while the rate for white children has declined, a new study has found, an unusual pattern that seemed to suggest something troubling was happening among some of the nation's most vulnerable citizens.


Suicide among children ages 5 to 11, the age range the study measured, is rare, and researchers had to blend several years of data to get reliable results. The findings, which measured the period from 1993 to 2012, were so surprising that researchers waited for an additional year of data to check them. The trend did not change.

Suicide rates are almost always lower among blacks than among whites of any age. But the study, published in the journal JAMA Pediatrics on Monday, found that the rate had risen so steeply among black children — to 2.54 from 1.36 per one million children — that it was substantially above the rate among white children by the end of the period. The rate for white children fell to 0.77 per million from 1.14.

It was the first time a national study found a higher suicide rate the period of the study and for blacks than for whites of any age group, researchers noted.

"I was shocked, I'll be honest with you," said Jeffrey Bridge, an epidemiologist at the Research Institute at Nationwide did not take part in the new re-Children's Hospital in Columbus, Ohio. "I looked at it and I thought, 'Did we do the analysis negative health outcomes that correctly?' I thought we had made a mistake."

including that black children are more likely to be exposed to violence and traumatic stress, and that black children are more likely to experience an early onset of puberty, which can increase the risk of depression and impulsive aggression. But it was not clear whether those characteristics had changed much over would account for the sharp rise.

Sean Joe, a professor of social work at Washington University in St. Louis, who has studied suicide among black youth and search, pointed out that suicide had long been one of the few have affected blacks less than other trends by race. Among whites.

A departure from that trend the 1990s, when rising suicide rates among black teenagers narpossible rowed the gap with white that the rate was driven up by easier access to guns; another was that there had been a cultural shift, in which young blacks were not as religiously observant as older blacks. In that thinking, religious faith had conferred a protective quality that had made older blacks less vulnerable to suicide.

"What it means to grow up young and black has changed," Professor Joe said. "Something happened that put black teens at risk.'

He added, "I find the rates for children even more troubling, because they are the most vulnerable."

The finding seemed to buck adolescents of both races, for example, the rate declined over the same period, falling for blacks more than for whites, according to figures Dr. Bridge provided. The rate for black boys rose sharply. The rate for black girls also rose, but the change was not statistically significant, he said.

The way the children were dying seemed to provide some clues. Dr. Christine Moutier, chief medical officer for the American Foundation for Suicide Prevention, who read the study, pointed out that gun deaths among white boys had gone down by about half while staying about the same for black boys, signaling that gun safety education may not be reaching black communities as effectively as white ones.

Suicides by hanging, on the other hand, roughly tripled among black boys, while remaining virtually unchanged for whites.

"He uncovered something very significant in the data," she said, referring to Dr. Bridge. "Viewed over all, that age group looked like it was flat.'


She said the traditionally lower rates for blacks had often been attributed to strong social networks and family support, religious faith and other cultural factors. "That makes me wonder whether there is something in those protective factors that may have shifted in the wrong direction over those two decades," she said.

Many, many years ago, when I completed high school at Southern Christian Institute in Edwards, Mississippi, where I earned fifteen cents an hour working as a student, upon my graduation, the school closed its doors forever. I had planned to stay there to enter college because it was a junior college and as valedictorian of my class I was to receive a scholarship upon my return. With the sad news of closing, the graduating seniors and junior college students had to look for other options to complete college work. As it were, Jarvis Christian College in Hawkins, Texas was a sister school and the Dean from Jarvis came to SCI and offered all of the students work for fifty cents an hour if we chose to attend Jarvis. Having no other plans, I hastened to take him up on the offer. Two weeks later, I was on the Tri-State Bus to Hawkins, Texas. Ironically, I arrived in Texas about a week before the Juneteenth celebrations.

I was surprised that after a week of working in extreme heat, the kind I had never endured, preparations were taking place to celebrate Juneteenth on the nineteenth of June. At first, I thought it was an early 4th of July activity and I was informed that it was the celebration of the end of slavery in Texas. Therefore, I envisioned it as a celebration of the Emancipation Proclamation which had been issued by President Abraham Lincoln on September 22, 1862, preliminarily and was effective on January 1, 1863. Little did I know that it was not until June 19, 1865, over two years later, that U.S. Major General Gordon Granger and his soldiers arrived in the Galveston -Houston area, with the news relayed that slaves were free.

My reaction to this news was immediately a feeling of resent-

ment that the slaves had been robbed of two years of freedom. What I did not know was the fact that the slave owners were not willing to immediately let their subjects be free. Because of the hostilities incurred by this slow moving information, many free men and women began to desert the plantations of their previous owners and many were killed in an attempt to escape. The final unquestionable freedom arrived with the passing of the 13th Amendment to the United States Constitution on December 6, 1865. The Juneteenth celebrations as a joyous day for the Black people of Texas had its official beginning in 1866. According to Opal Lee, a staunch organizer and supporter of Juneteenth celebrations in Fort Worth, Texas, about 45 states now celebrate Juneteenth as a state holiday and she is on a crusade to have it declared as a National holiday. She has worked to have the state of Texas issue a special license plate honoring Juneteenth and is set to begin "Opal's Walk to DC" on Thursday, September 1, 2016 from Baker Chapel AME Church on Humbolt Street with her walking supporters. She plans to arrive in Washington D.C by December, 2016 with enough signatures by October 1 to get a proclamation from President Barack Obama to make Juneteenth not just an independence day but a National Juneteenth Independence Day as it is the oldest Black American holiday observance in the United States. This octogenarian deserves to be applauded for her tenacity and supported in her efforts. May we get ' in cinque' and support her and may the

When was the last time someone asked you to take out a membership into the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People? Did you say "I am not colored"? Yes, the name is outdated and should be addressed by its membership. My father was proud to be a lifetime member. I took out a membership once in 1988 and have not been asked since. There is something missing here. Usually single memberships represent the decision making of an organization like this. The federation or chapters were once the backbone of such a "national" association. But in America chapters or Black chapters cannot be depended on for funding and strong leadership. The largest NAACP chapter is the city of Detroit. Considering the economic state of Detroit paints a dismal picture of this once proud and strong association.

During the Civil Rights Era the NAACP swelled in chapters and individual memberships. We won a lot during the famed Era but the fervor sort of lost its need after obtaining the goal and implementation of the Civil Rights Act of 1964. The next time you have a civil rights complaint call your local chapter of the NAACP and see what happens - usually NOTHING! What drives the NAACP today are major corporations and Hollywood. Within this structure are major trade unions who have no commitment to diversity. The big bucks they give annually are a method of buying peace and public relations. Construction unions are some of the most racist organizations in this nation. But you can't tell that to the leadership of the NAACP. "Construction unions have been our friends. I don't know why any Black group would criticize

The actual birthday is on SEPTEMBER 11, 2016! As we recall the historical event begun on WEDNESDAY, SEP-**TEMBER 10, 1977**

This was done because many of the readers wanted to involve all areas of THE SOUTH PLAINS OF TEXAS as well as the Eastern Part of NEW MEX-ICO..... Although a very dedicated person in the development of this HISTORICAL DEVELOPMENTnone other than EDDIE P. RICHARDSON, JR. who was determined that HIS DREAM would become a REALITYand it did..... RICHARD-SON and T. J. PATTERSON, SR. hooked up until RICHARDSON passed away...... Both became like brothers. ... They went through many situations together and refused to quit..... With the help of GOD and supporters it has happened!!

them", Ben Jealous, former NAACP President.

Of late, a few chapters of the association are starting to see the picture and raise protests about the trades. New York City is a fine example of that (http://nydn.us/2bw78RC). If the national leadership continues down that path the NAACP is destined to fail. Right now the association membership levels are below 1% of the Black population of our nation.

What initially caused the existence of the NAACP (1909)? It was a northern white liberal group known as the Niagara Movement. This group came together and placed W.E.B. DuBois as their spokesperson and "Leader". His immediate role was to discredit and oppose Booker T. Washington, Founder of the National Negro Business League (1900). Mr. Washington's work and mission (economic empowerment of the American Negro) was indeed a

powerful message. He built 39 chapters in cities throughout the South. One of his most popular one was Greenwood, outside of Tulsa, Oklahoma. It became famous (known as Black Wall St.) and was burned to the grown by racist elements - Not long after the mysterious death of Mr. Washington. There would be other examples of destruction of Black business districts emulating the teachings of Mr. Washington.


If ever you visit Tuskegee University, a fine institution that Mr. Washington built and developed with the support of Henry Ford, Andrew Carnegie, President Theodore Roosevelt and other national leaders, please stop to hear the actual Atlanta Debates. This is a recording of the debates between Mr. DuBois and Booker T. Washington. In my opinion, Mr. Washington won.

Today, many of the local chapters of the NAACP are tribal.

For instance, when I lived in Indianapolis the local president would not accept nor sell any new memberships. Why? He had enough votes to win any upcoming elections and he would not dilute that advantage through growth of his chapter. Many people in Indianapolis would complain to the National Office but that didn't seem to do any good.

The NAACP must break away from the "grasp" that unions have on the chapters and their Board of Directors. Remember that stupid practice of "School Busing"? Our children would get up at very early hours to be bused across town and then return home in the late afternoon. Offended whites would leave that school and put their children into private schools. This went on to the detriment of Black students and families alike. It was like we were forcing our children onto people who weren't **Continue on Page 6**
