


FOOLISHNESS

The Jim Crow Segment of **Professional Sports, Part I**

Professional sports around the world can be proud of the social improvement that has evolved. Soccer in Europe has advanced immensely. A few years ago I was in a waiting room at a French government office. One of the French employees was watching a professional soccer game and he blurted out in English "That's all you see playing these games -Africans!" I responded with a smile, "Get ready that is how American Basketball started." He nodded with a smile of surrender. Sports, big time money sports, is a meritocracy. Owners have the final say on who will play, coach or be traded. The games are about who gets the most money. The winners are the ones with the greatest Television Value, ticket sales and marketing schemes. Professional sports generate trillions of dollars around the world. jans shook up the world!" Every white football fan in the South was horrified. Integrated schools in the rest of the country were having field trips to the South and generated hundreds of Black football stars for their schools. One NCAA announcer who worked that trailblazing event entered a Birmingham restaurant for breakfast and sat next to a table of sulking Alabama fans. One of the fans shouted, "I know what Bear needs to do. He needs to go out and recruit some of those colored boys for Bama!" The rest of the table shouted "That's right!!" Yes indeed, it shook up the world. After the game, Coach Bryant sent Coach McKay a request. He wanted him to send their star running back, Sam "The Bam" Cunningham. When Sam came over, the Bear told his team to, "all stand up walk by and shake the hand of a perfect football player". Sam had

Voting helps determine the future of our cities, counties, state, and nation. As the Texas Secretary of State, I am the state's chief election officer charged with ensuring all eligible Texans know what they need to do to cast their ballots.

My office has undertaken a statewide voter education campaign engaging voters and working to ensure that all qualified voters in Texas understand what they need to bring to the polls in order to vote in ongoing and upcoming elections.

If a voter possesses a form of approved photo ID, the voter must use it to vote. Currently, there are seven forms of acceptable photo ID in Texas:

- Texas driver license issued by the Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS)
- Texas personal identification card issued by DPS
- Texas License to Carry a Handgun issued by DPS
- Texas Election Identification Certificate issued by DPS
- U.S. passport

U.S. citizenship certificate containing the person's photograph

U.S. military identification card containing the person's photograph

With the exception of the U.S. citizenship certificate, the approved photo ID must be current or have expired no more than four years before being presented for voter qualification at the polling place. If the voter has continued access to their acceptable form of photo ID, but, for example, forgets to bring it to the polling place and/or leaves it, for example, at home or in their car, the voter still possesses the acceptable form of photo ID and must use it to vote.

If the voter does not possess and cannot reasonably obtain one of the seven forms of approved photo ID, the voter has additional options when casting their ballot in person. As provided by court order, if a voter does not possess and is not reasonably able to obtain one of the seven forms of approved photo ID, the voter may vote by (1) signing a declaration at the polls explaining why the voter is reasonably unable to obtain one of the seven forms of approved photo ID, and (2) providing one of various forms of supporting documentation.

A voter whose photo identification has been lost, stolen, suspended, revoked or expired more than four years does not possess one of the acceptable forms of photo ID, and, if the voter cannot reasonably obtain a replacement of the identification that was lost, stolen, suspended, revoked or expired or another form of acceptable photo ID, the voter is eligible to present a supporting form of identification, execute a Reasonable Impediment Declaration, and, assuming they otherwise qualify, vote a regular ballot.


Supporting documentation can be a certified birth certificate (must be an original), a valid voter registration certificate, a copy or original of one of the following: current utility bill, bank statement, government check, or paycheck, or other government document that shows the voter's name and an address Government documents that include a photo must be original and cannot be copies. If a voter meets these requirements and is otherwise eligible to vote, the voter will be able to cast a regular ballot in the election.

Voters with a disability may continue to apply with the county registrar for a permanent exemption to showing approved photo ID (which now may be expired no more than four years) at the polls. Also, voters who (1) have a consistent religious objections to being photographed or (2) do not present one of the seven forms of approved photo ID because of certain natural disasters as declared by the President of the United States or the Texas Governor, may continue apply for a temporary exemption to showing approved photo ID at the polls. In addition, voters age 65 or older, those with a disability, or those who will be out of the county during both early voting and Election Day may vote by mail. The deadline to request a ballot by mail is Oct. 28.

The General Election is Nov. 8. Early voting runs from Oct. 24 to Nov. 4. The last day to register for the election is Oct. 11.

Colin Kaepernick responds to Supreme Court

Colin Kaepernick has been kneeling for the national anthem since August (AP)

When Yahoo's Katie Couric asked Supreme Court Justice Ruth Bader Ginsburg about the national-anthem protest by San Francisco 49ers quarterback Colin Kaepernick, it added another layer to the controversy.

Ginsburg isn't a fan of the protest and didn't hold back her opinion of it. She called the protests from Kaepernick and other NFL players "dumb and and disrespectful."

"If they want to be stupid, there's no law that should be preventive," Ginsburg told Couric.

That put Kaepernick in a tough spot. He presumably doesn't want to get involved in a messy back-and-forth with a member of the Supreme Court (though it didn't bother Washington Redskins running back John Riggins back in the day), but he obviously isn't going to agree with Ginsburg.

"It is disappointing to hear a Supreme Court justice call a protest against injustices and oppression 'stupid, dumb' in reference to players doing that," Kaepernick said.

"I was reading an article and it refers to white critique of black protests and how they try

'idiotic, dumb, stupid,' things of that nature, so they can sidestep the real issue. As I was reading that I saw more and more truth how this has been approached by people in power and white people in power in particular."

Kaepernick also told the Mercury News that while he understands the emotion people have over the symbolism of the U.S. flag, "people are getting too caught up in the flag.'


"At the end of the day the flag is just a piece of cloth and I am not going to value a piece of cloth over people's lives," Kaepernick said. "That's just not something I can do, it's not

to de-legitimize it by calling it something I feel morally right doing and my character won't allow me to do that."





real-world results. searchers pre-plan certain modifications that they can make part -way through the trial, based on the results they've uncovered so Think of it in terms of map-

ping a run. A runner might look at a map and realize that at one point, the road will fork. Instead of deciding whether to go left or right before he ever begins jogging, he might choose to postpone the choice until actually reaches the fork. Perhaps he'd like to observe which path is muddier or which path has less traffic -- and he'll only know when he gets there.

Similarly, researchers administering adaptive clinical trials can modify their tests as they make observations. Like the runner, they have to pre-plan what choices they'll make and when. But the more flexible

Dr. Esserman's trial, for example, personalized testing by splitting breast cancer patients into different groups depending on various measurements of their health. She tested a combination of therapies on these patients -- and only continued testing those that were found initially effective.

By not having to run a dud treatment through the course of a standard clinical trial, the adaptive design reduced the cost, time, and number of patients needed for the trial.

The FDA currently permits adaptive trials in limited instances. Letting researchers use this model more often would improve the drug development process.

Adaptive trials and increased data sharing would deliver better medicines to patients faster and with greater safety. That's something to sing about.

Another way to improve the process is to enable doctors, insurers, and drug companies to share data on patients' health outcomes after they take new FDA-approved medicines. By analyzing this data, they could uncover patterns that can't be detected even in the largest clinical trials.

For instance, a clinical trial for a diabetes drug might include 1,000 participants, 10 of whom are Native American. Perhaps 60 percent of all patients respond well to the drug, but all 10 Native Americans get their blood sugar under control thanks to the medicine. It's impossible to tell from such a small sample size whether the medicine really is vastly more effective for Native Americans, or whether those 10 patients just got lucky.


Changing regulations to permit greater sharing of such data would help researchers unveil rare side effects, complications, or "miracle" results that crop up.

Adaptive trials and increased data sharing would deliver better medicines to patients faster and with greater safety. That's something to sing about.
