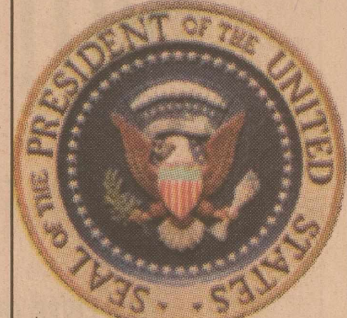
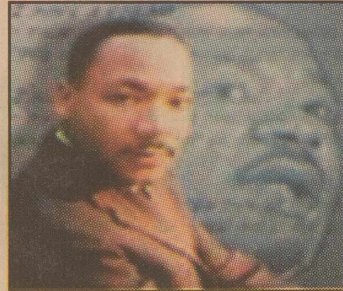

Other activities are forthcoming, according to Tyrone Moore, Vice President.

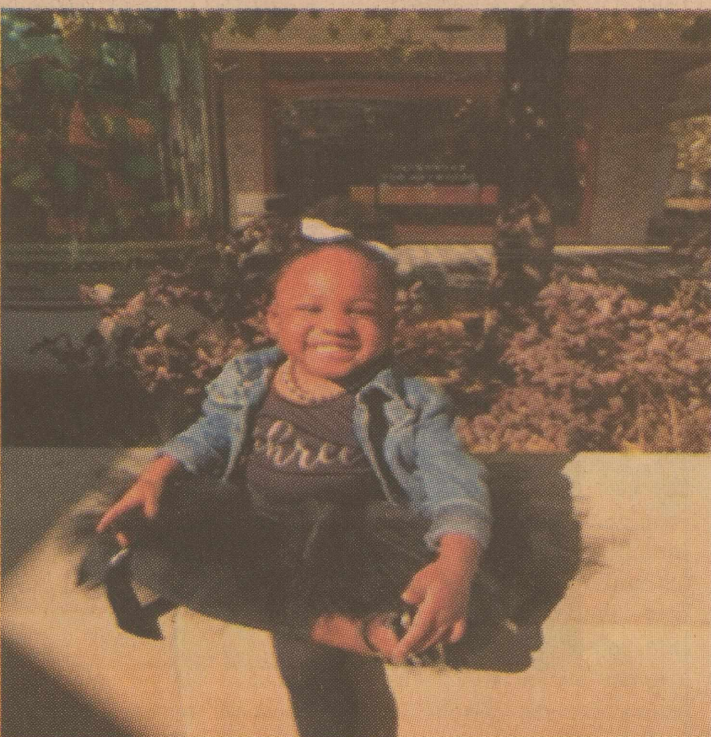
## Mae Simmons Park Pedestrian Bridge Cost Lubbock \$33,473

As you can see, the pedestrian bridge will help tremendously. The new bridge is 8 feet wide and 58 feet long. It is aluminum. This bridge was built by Gatorbridge of Florida. The bridge has non-skid treads. It will not heat up in the summer because aluminum doesn't conduct heat well. The cost of the new pedestrian bridge cost is \$33,473.

This new development in Mae Simmons Park could allow opportunities for community organizations to develop a tree planting program as well as beautification projects.

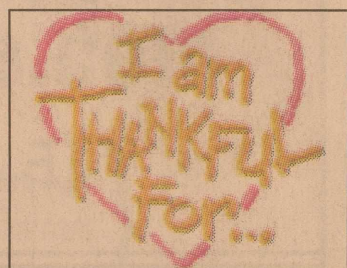

## Chad Weaver Named Intrim City Manager

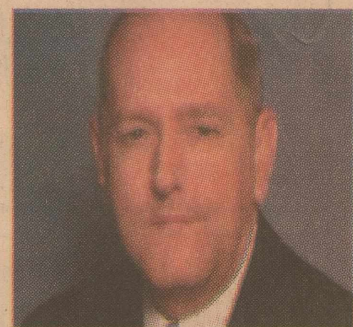
At the Thursday evening, October 27, 2016 Lubbock City Council Meeting, members appointed current City Attorney Chad Weaver as Interim City Manager.

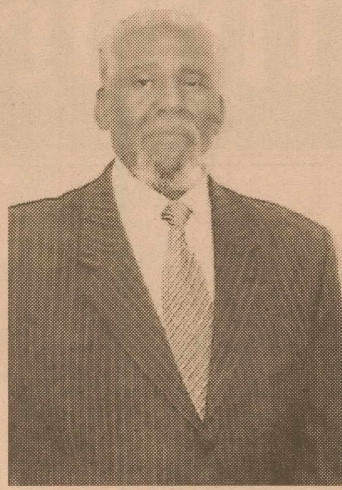

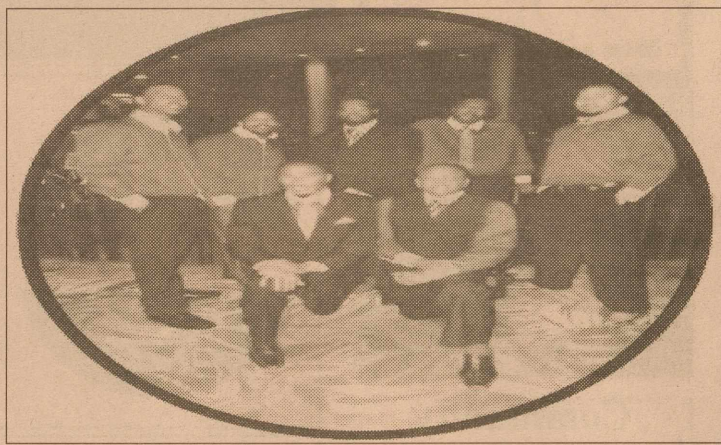
He passed away on Monday, October 17, 2016, surrounded by his loving family.

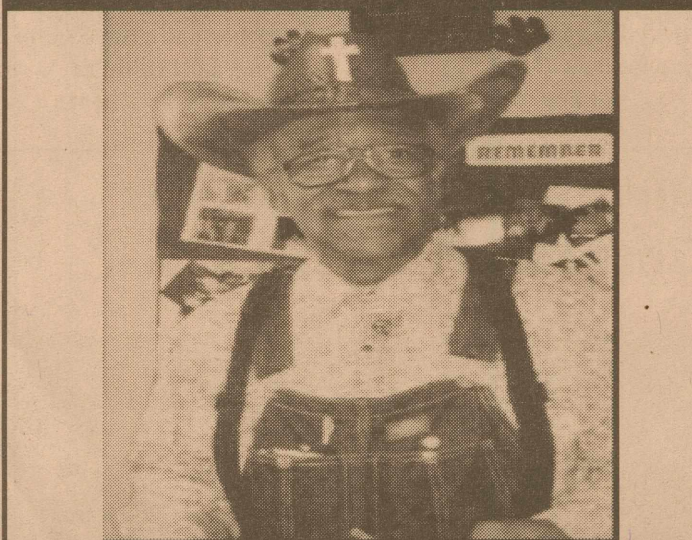

## Beyond the Rhetoric

NY Attorney General goes after Construction Discrimination

After three decades of fighting against discrimination amongst construction unions, I finally see a shining example of due diligence. Most elected officials don't give much attention to leveling the field for minority and female contractors. Start calling out the fraudulent general contractors who will do anything to try and game projects where the owners have good intentions by setting targets or goals for minority and female subcontractors and they just ignore you. Some depressing days would cause me to say to myself "Am I the only one who sees this?"

But finally it appears that leaders are catching on to this expensive and illegal activity that decimates our workforce and blocks the development of minority entrepreneurs. Most of the discrimination is targeted towards Blacks. The people of Rochester, New York have received a blessing. That blessing is New York Attorney General Eric Schneiderman. After hearing complaints about the fraud and fronting on a multi - renovation school system project, the Attorney General began to look at this \$325 million 13 schools project funded by the State of New York.

He organized a formal investigation and on October 14, 2016 he announced his conclusions. There were five construction firms guilty of discrimination against minority and female firm who sought subcontracting tasks. The firms have agreed to pay \$825,000 in fines after they were "cold busted". A whistleblower stepped in and exposed what was happening and the firms - Concord Electric Corporation, Manning Squires Hennig, Hewitt Young Electric, Michael A. Ferraulo Plumbing & Heating Inc. and Mark Cerrone Inc.

blamed it all on sloppy paper work and unforeseen mix-ups.

According to the Attorney General, "All five firms lied about sub-contracting with minority and women owned businesses when in reality, they got materials and labor elsewhere. In many cases, the firms gave MWOBs (minority women owned businesses) kickbacks in exchange for falsifying documents." I certainly hope he has no mercy on the minority culprits who went along with these games.

The program was well intended. Not only will they correct the above but will also start similar programs. Reviewing what went wrong in Rochester, the Syracuse school systems will now begin on their renovation and have pledged to do it right. The mayor of Syracuse has pledged decent minority and female participation and has hired a consultant to monitor the progress and assure the numbers

and percentages are real and correct. After that comes Buffalo. These and other New York cities understand the seriousness of the Attorney General.

The fines that will be collected by Rochester will go into the needed funding for more ongoing city projects. Syracuse is raising a \$400,000 fund to assist minority and female contractors who are being paid in a very slow process. This is called "factoring". Slow pay is a major issue for small businesses. Another pledge by the Syracuse mayor is that most of the workers will be Syracuse citizens - no carpet bagging which construction unions are noted for. It is a new day coming for the Black contractors of upstate New York and that is a very, very good thing.

As our new friend, Attorney General Schneiderman laments, "Women and minority owned businesses have historically been shut out of government

contracts for all the wrong reasons. That's why our state, and localities, implement reasonable diversity standards to level the playing field. These contractors engaged in flagrant schemes that flouted the diversity rules they were required to meet, and in the process, denied minority and women owned businesses a fair shot at winning valuable sub-contracts. My office will continue to aggressively enforce the law against contractors who game the system." Look out! There is a new "sheriff" in town.

All attorney generals, prosecutors and mayors should emulate what is happening in New York. Most urban areas outside of the South are menaced with vile and racist contractors who refuse diversity and will plague minorities and females to satisfy their greed. Wherever there is high union activity in construction there will be games played. Sign them to firm diversity stan

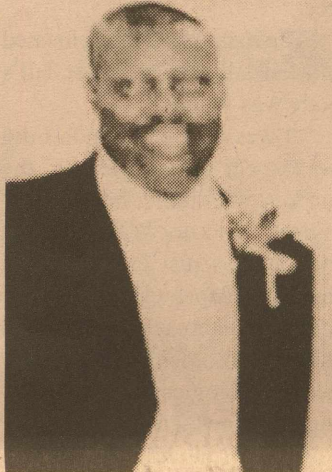
In the late 1940's, he met and married Margie Dell Stinett in Texas, then they moved to California. To this union was born his precious daughter, Hellen.

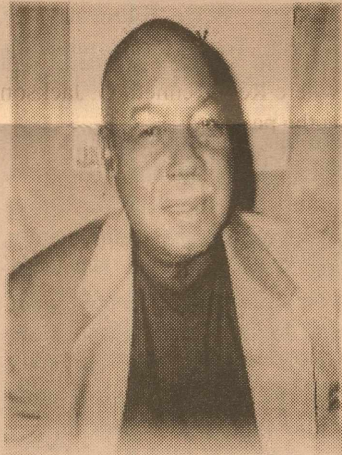

## Emmett Till Memorial Sign Vandalized With Bullet Holes

*"That marker was just evidence that there are people who are still living in those areas who still hold those ideologies dear to their heart."*

A sign honoring Emmett Till was found riddled with more than 40 bullet holes. Kevin Wilson Jr., a filmmaker who is working on a short film on Till, made the discovery; the incident garnered attention when Wilson posted about it on Facebook.

"I'm at the exact site where Emmett Till's body was found floating in the Tallahatchie River 61 years ago," he wrote. "The site marker is filled with bullet holes. Clear evidence that we've still got a long way to go."

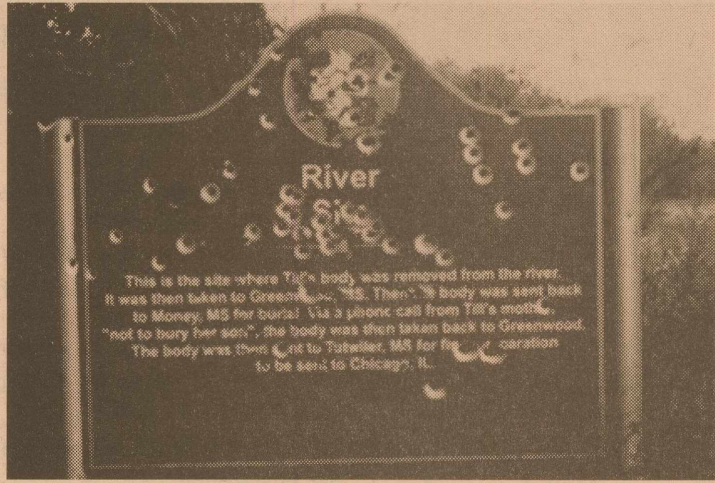
Till was a 14-year-old Black boy who was lynched in Mississippi in 1955. The Chicago native, who was visiting relatives at the time, was kidnapped, mutilated and shot. His body was found floating in a river several days after he went missing. The perpetrators, who eventually confessed their crimes, were acquitted by an all-white jury.

Till's mother, Mamie Till Mobley, insisted that Till's casket be open at his funeral so people could see exactly what happened to her son. Pictures of young Till's mutilated body shocked the nation. Till's death was a pivotal event of the Civil Rights Movement and brought to the forefront issues of racial injustice.

The memorial sign is located in Mississippi at the spot Till's body was found.

"I was very emotional. I did not expect to see the site, the marker, with bullet holes in it," Wilson said to WJTV. "That marker was just evidence that there are people who are still living in those areas who still hold those ideologies dear to their heart. Ideologies that we're trying to get away from."

Robert E. Huddleston, a Democratic state representative and member of the area's local NAACP chapter, questioned

why people continue to harbor "so much hatred."

"This child died in 1955 and people still have so much hatred," he said to ABC News. "Why do they feel the need to keep on killing him again and again?"

Glendora, Mississippi, Mayor Johnny B. Thomas called for unity to move forward from the hate-filled act of vandalism.

"When I see hatred like this it makes me want to work that much harder to rebuild it, begin healing, and get members of the Caucasian community to join us in that effort to heal," Thomas said. "When the descendants of those who perpetrated slavery here and Jim Crow laws stand up against this sort of vandalism it means so much more... When they join in rejecting this we can move forward."

Thomas' father may have had a possible connection to Till's murder. Both Thomas and his father are Black. According to Thomas, a long history of racial tension exists in the area.

Till's legacy and important place in Civil Rights Movement history remains just as relevant today as in 1955. Many people have drawn comparisons between Till and Trayvon Martin, an unarmed Black teenager who was gunned down in Florida.

This year's presidential election has also made evident that racial tensions are still alive and
