



Kay's father, Charles DeBow Jr., comes from an all American family. His father served our nation during World War I, a Calvary man -spurs and all carrying on the tradition of the famous Buffalo Soldiers. He himself became one of the original four Tuskegee Airmen during World War II. His specialty was dive bombing. Pop gave German General Rommel's tanks fits over the North African desert. He led the annihilation of German artillery during the invasion of Sicily. Then he and his fellows knocked out German radar stations in preparation of the Normandy Invasion. I imagine when Mama DeBow first saw her Tuskegee Hero she put that same mystique on him like Kay did me.

Mystique indeed. Mama DeBow was part of the prestigious Indianapolis, Indiana Stuart Family. Her parents, William Weir Stuart and Mae Llewellyn had four daughters and five sons. A very productive family with entrepreneurial accomplishments. All the children married well and were considered a very prestigious group throughout the segregated Indianapolis community. The state of Indiana was lobbied by the Ku Klux Klan and had "Race mixing laws". Indy was as segregated as Birmingham, New Orleans, etc. until the mid -1960's. Much of the Black segment of the Indy population relied on the services, console, etc. of the Stuart family.

Patriarch William Weir Stuart had a great productive life. He was born in northern Alabama and journeyed to Indianapolis. It was there, as the story goes, that he met the famous bandleader John Phillips Sousa. Sousa took him in and employed him as his valet. Grandfather Stuart made a diary of their tours to Russia, Europe, etc. I had a

Lubbock Independent School Board Of Trustees Met On Thursday Morning, April 27, 2017

Lubbock ISD Board of Trustees recognized three National Scholastic Art and Writing Competition Winners, the Lubbock High State Champion Speech and Debate Team and six state qualifying wrestlers.

Three Lubbock ISD students were recognized with National Scholastic Art and Writing Awards, the country's oldest and most prestigious awards and recognition program for creative teenagers. NeNe Phenix from Coronado High School and Emma Whitfill from the Talkington School for Young Women Leaders received silver medals for their artwork. Hutchinson Middle School student Maddie Haas received a silver medal and gold medal for her photography entries. Haas was also awarded Best in Grade for her organic photo, a recognition given to only two students in each grade nationally. The competition attracted approximately 350,000 submissions in 28 categories.

The Lubbock High School Speech and Debate Team earned a regional sweepstakes award and a state championship at the Texas Forensic Association state tournament. The Westerner debate team won the Region 1 sweepstakes championship by placing highest out of the schools in their region, their first in the last five years. Team member Gabriella Ghandour won the state championship in Impromptu Speaking, placing first out of 115 entries. This is the largest team of students Lubbock High has taken to the state tournament. 
Five Lubbock ISD boys and one Monterey girl qualified for the state wrestling tournament.

Missing Toddler Found Dead After She Vanished While Playing in Yard



An Illinois toddler whose disappearance sparked a desperate search last week has been found

The body of 16-month-old Semaj Crosby was discovered in a Joliet Township home early Thursday, more than two days since she'd been last seen playing with about a dozen kids gathered in a nearby yard.

Semaj's body was discovered at about midnight, according to the Will County Sheriff's Office. Her family reported the tod-

dler missing at about 6:30 p.m. Tuesday, just hours after Department of Children and Family Services officials say they saw her safe in her home.

"DCFS had been at the home on April 25 at approximately 3:20 p.m. and had seen all three of the mother's children including Semaj," DCFS spokeswoman Alissandra Calderon

said in a statement obtained by the Chicago Tribune. "There were no obvious hazards or safety concerns at that time."

"The family had been looking for her for an hour and a half,' Public Information Officer Kathy Hoffmeyer told InsideEdition.com Wednesday.

More than 80 people were at one point searching for the child, aided by bloodhounds and drones. An all-night canvas of the neighborhood using a helicopter equipped with an infrared and heat-seeking device found nothing, authorities said.

A reverse 911 call was sent out last night to all residents within a five-mile radius.

Demaj's body was found after the Will County Sheriff's Office, along with the FBI, gained consent to search an area residence late Wednesday, April 26, 2017.







Williams, 35, is speaking out against racist comments allegedly made by Romanian tennis captain Ilie Nastase. During a Fed Cup press conference on Friday, Nastase — a Grand Slam champion in the '70s and former world No. 1 — allegedly said of Serena's unborn child, "Let's see what color it has. Chocolate with

Taking a break from her babymoon with fiancé Alexis Ohanian, Williams addressed the incident on Instagram.

"It disappoints me to know we live in a society where people like Ilie Nastase can make such racist comments towards myself and unborn child, and sexist comments against my peers," Williams wrote.

The "sexist comments against my peers" statement is referencing other obscene outbursts from Nastase at the Fed Cup tournament during the match between

Romania and Great Britain. Nastase was ultimately ejected for verbal abusing Britain's Johanna Konta, Britain's captain, Anne Keothavong, and the chair um-

Serena continued, "I have said it once and I'll say it again, this world has come so far but yet we have so much further to go. Yes, we have broken down so many barriers — however there are a plethora more to go. This or anything else will not stop me from pouring love, light and positivity into everything that I do. I will continue to take a lead and stand up for what's


