



### Miss USA 2017: Miss D.C. Kára McCullough wins the crown

Las Vegas -- For the second but an "equalist," in her winning year in a row, the Miss USA crown went to the District of Co-

Miss D.C. Kára McCullough became the 66th Miss USA during Sunday night's pageant, May 14, 2017, with Miss New Jersey Chhavi Verg named the runnerup and Miss Minnesota Meridith Gould the second runner-up.

As she joked earlier in the competition, McCullough hoped to win the crown to give D.C. "back to back" wins "like Drake." Miss D.C. 2016 Deshauna Barber won the competition last year. Before passing on the crown Sunday night, Barber shared an emotional story about her mother's death shortly after she won Miss USA.

Among the top five - Minnesota, Illinois, South Carolina, New Jersey and District of Columbia — four were women of color, which didn't go unnoticed, with social media celebrating the #blackgirlmagic on the Miss USA stage. The contestants' diverse backgrounds included Miss D.C.'s work as a nuclear scientist and Miss Illinois's guest role on Fox's Empire and position dancing for the Chicago

Bulls The Miss Universe organization has worked to incorporate women's empowerment into their pageants in the years since its split with its former owner, President Trump. For their last question, District of Columbia, New Jersey and Minnesota were all asked about their definitions of feminism. Their answers touched on the fight for equality, with McCullough saying she wouldn't call herself a feminist,

Other political topics popped up throughout Sunday night's competition, featuring voiceovers where contestants talked about issues including student loan debt and the American Dream, and a taped segment featuring the participants discussing the White House's proposed travel ban and the administra-

tion's stance on immigrants. While its sister competition Miss Teen USA replaced its swimsuit portion with athleisure outfits, Miss USA hasn't made that leap. But the Yandy swimwear seen on the contestants showed a greater range of styles than the once-dominant bikinis, with several women wearing one-pieces, jackets and suits with sleeves.

One change the competition did make was in its O&A portion, which featured user-submitted questions in partnership with the Skimm, instead of the usual pre-scripted prompts. In an interview before the competition, co-host Julianne Hough said she hoped the new format would help the women navigate through tough, politically-oriented questions. "I'm just hoping with the questions, instead of trying to stump someone, (the Q&A) gives them an opportunity to have a voice," she said. With topics including women in the workplace, healthcare and America's place on the global stage, the Q&A hinted at social issues without venturing into more controversial issues, and the five contestants all emerged flub-free.







### **New Orleans Mayor Delivers Powerful Speech on Removal of Confederate Monuments**

On Friday, May 26, 2017, the last of four Confederate monuments was taken down in New Orleans, La.

Three of the monuments depicted General Robert E. Lee, Confederate Jefferson Davis and Confederate General P.G.T. Beauregard. A fourth depicted a violent attack against an integrated police force in the name of white supremacy.

The removals were not met with opposition. Views on symbols of confederacy vary greatly among races. Only 33 percent of Americans believe the Confederate flag is a symbol of racism, rather than Southern pride. However, 75 percent of Blacks feel this way. And in New Orleans, the population is 60 percent Black.

The topic was brought to the forefront following the brutal, racially motivated murders of nine Black churchgoers in South Carolina in June 2015. The attacks were carried out by selfproclaimed white supremacist Dylann Roof, who admitted he

sought to start a race war. Photos of Roof with Confederate memorabilia circulated online following the tragedy.

In response to the removal of the monuments, Mississippi Rep. Karl Oliver even suggested the leaders responsible be lynched. He called the removal "heinous and horrific."

And while some of the city's own residents disagreed with removing what they consider a critical aspect of their city's history, New Orleans Mayor Mitch Landrieu believes the city, which he describes as "truly a city of many nations, a melting pot" and one that is "rooted in a diverse people who have been here together every step of the

way," is better for it.

"These monuments purposefully celebrate a fictional, sanitized Confederacy, ignoring the death, ignoring the enslavement and the terror that it actually stood for," Landrieu said in a powerful speech on Friday.

To those who tie the Confederacy to history, Landrieu points to a much darker part of history that is often left out of the con-

"And it immediately begs the questions, why there are no slave ship monuments, no prominent markers on public land to remember the lynchings or the slave blocks; nothing to remember this long chapter of





### Don't Meddle With Medicare's Prescription Drug Benefit:

Seema Verma, the new administrator of the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services, recently praised Medicare's prescription drug benefit for giving seniors access to affordable medicines, saying she was "thankful" for the program.

There's a lot to be thankful for. Medicare Part D, as the drug benefit is known, provides seniors with huge discounts on medicines, enabling them to live healthier, longer lives. That's good news for the more than 41 million Americans who currently rely on the program for prescription drug coverage.

Nevertheless, Rep. Elijah Cummings, Sen. Bernie Sanders, and some other members of Congress believe the program isn't cost-effective enough. Current law says the government can't meddle in price negotiations.

Many wrongly assume that means there are no price negotiations, which is not true. Discounts are negotiated every day in Part D, but not by the government, by the private sector. To achieve greater savings, they've proposed letting the government "negotiate" drug prices.

The policy change would be a disaster. Government wouldn't negotiate -- it would simply set prices and refuse to cover medicines it deemed too expensive. That would deprive seniors of life-sustaining medications.

Part D's success is driven by market competition, not government control. Private insurers negotiate with drug firms to secure discounts -- an average of 35 -- off the list price of medicines.

Plans extract big discounts from drug makers by threatening to steer patients to a rival company's drug. Consider what happened with a new class of hepatitis C treatments, which cure the disease in more than 90 percent of patients with few side effects. When only one treatment was available, plans providers negotiated rebates that shaved 22 percent off the drug's list price.

But once a competing drug was introduced, plans egotiated a 46 percent average ebate.

Insurers transfer savings like these to consumers in the form of lower plan premiums, copays, and deductibles -- the Part D law requires it. Seniors can choose whichever Part D plans -- ranging from basic, nofrills options to extremely generous coverage -- suit them

There's a strong incentive for insurers to keep costs low. If they don't, seniors can jump ship and enroll in a rival insurer's Part D plan. Because of this competition, total costs for Part D came in \$349 billion lower than the Congressional Budget Office's cost projections for 2004-2013.

Which other government program comes in hundreds of billions under budget?

If the government meddles with what's in patients' medicine cabinets, it will jeopardize all these gains.

As the CBO has made clear, the government wouldn't be able to negotiate prices that are lower than what private insurers already get. To keep costs down, the government might ration access to medicines by establishing a formulary -- a list that dictates which drugs are covered, and at which copayment levels.

If the government were to establish a formulary, it would be one-size-fits-all. We've seen this happen at the Department of Veterans Affairs. The VA's formulary doesn't cover onefifth of the top 200 most commonly prescribed Medicare Part D drugs, according to a 2015 study by the research firm Avalere Health.

Part D largely owes its success to the free-market principles of choice and competition. Let's hope Ms. Verma defends those principles as the drug cost debate heats up. Getting the government more involved in Part D plans would be a step backwards for patients and tax-

the shame... all of it happening on the soil of New Orleans. So for those self-appointed defenders of history and the monuments, they are eerily silent on what amounts to this historical malfeasance, a lie by omission. There is a difference between remembrance of history and reverence of it."

The statues were not erected in honor of history — they were erected "to rewrite history to hide the truth, which is that the

our lives; the pain, the sacrifice, Confederacy was on the wrong side of humanity," Landrieu

> "It is self-evident that these men did not fight for the United States of America, They fought against it," Landrieu went on. "They may have been warriors, but in this cause they were not patriots. These statues are not just stone and metal. They are not just innocent remembrances of a benign history. These monuments purposefully celebrate a fictional, sanitized Confederacy; ignoring the death, ignoring the enslavement, and the terror that it actually stood for."


And as for those who are still seeking the days of the Confederacy? Perhaps it is time to move on, Landrieu suggests:

"The Civil War is over, and the Confederacy lost and we are better for it. Surely we are far enough removed from this dark time to acknowledge that the cause of the Confederacy was wrong."

In the days following the presidential election, the nation saw a sharp uptick in hate crimes. Possibly in an allusion to the president, Landrieu described "what really makes America great":

"In our blessed land we all come to the table of democracy as equals. We have to reaffirm our commitment to a future where each citizen is guaranteed the uniquely American gifts of life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness. That is what really makes America great and today it is more important than ever to hold fast to these values and together say a self-evident truth that out of many we are one."



### **Evans Ray Jr.: Starting Over; From** Cocaine Dealer to Youth Counselor

WASHINGTON -- Nearly a year ago, Washington, D.C. native Evans Ray, Jr. was inside a prison cell serving a life sentence and unsure of when or whether he would be released. Today, he's home surrounded by his family and beginning a life far different from the one he left.

In 2004, Ray was convicted of selling 60 grams of crack cocaine, which at that time normally carried a sentence of 10 years. Two prior low-level drug convictions and new enhanced sentencing guidelines created under the nation's "War on Drugs, however, resulted in Ray being sentenced to a mandatory minimum sentence of life in

"I made a terrible mistake and it cost me everything," Ray said. "That was a death sentence. I knew I was going to die in there.'

Ray, 57, said as a young man growing up in the District of Columbia, he believed the quickest and easiest way to make money was drug dealing. Spending the rest of his life in jail was not something he had planned.


The inordinately harsh sentences created for crack cocaine were frowned on by many long before then-President Barack Obama and Attorney General Eric Holder began drawing attention to them during his administration.

For instance, the judge who sentenced Ray told him during his trial in 2004 that he believed the judgement was "cruel and unusual," Ray said.

Ray's mother, Gwendolyn Bell, thought so, too. Bell, a retiree, said she believed her son should have been punished for his crime, but not so harshly.

"I think he should've done some time for the crime, but not the life sentence without the possibility of parole," Bell said.

Ray fanded in a penitentiary in Inez, Kentucky, called Big

Sandy. The prison, he says, was sure and cholesterol. given the nickname "Killer Mountain" for its violent environment, and its recent history includes a litany of examples of violence between inmates.

Less than a year after being sentenced, Ray was transferred to another prison, the McCreary Penitentiary, a high-security facility near Pine Knot, Kentucky because of his high blood pres-

While at the new prison, Ray said he heard of then Obama's Clemency Project and decided to fill out an application. Two months later, Ray said, he was approached by an attorney and told him he had a "poster-child case," for clemency.
