Heisman 2018: Kyler Murray becomes Oklahoma's seventh Heisman Trophy winner

Kyler Murray of the University of Oklahoma was selected on Saturday, December 8, 2018, as the 84th winner of the Heisman Memorial Trophy, an award presented annually by the Heisman Trophy Trust to the most outstanding player in college football.

The junior quarterback was announced as the 2018 winner of the prestigious honor at the end of ESPN's live broadcast of the Heisman ceremony from Manhattan's PlayStation The-

"This is crazy. This is an honor," said Murray from the podium after being announced as the winner. "It's something I'll never forget. Something I'll cherish for the rest of my life."

Murray, who followed Baker Mayfield as quarterback at Oklahoma, is the first player to win the Heisman the year after taking over for another Heisman winner. His victory also marks just the fourth time a school has won consecutive Heismans.

He's the seventh Sooner to win the Heisman, joining Billy Vessels ('52), Steve Owens ('69), Billy Sims ('78), Jason White ('03), Sam Bradford ('08) and Mayfield ('17). That total ties Notre Dame and Ohio State for most Heisman wins.

The 5-10, 195-pounder from Allen, Texas, threw for 4,054 yards and 40 touchdowns, with another 892 yards and 11 scores on the ground while leading the Sooners to a 12-1 record, the Big 12 title and a berth in the College Football Playoff. His passer rating of 205.72 is the best in Heisman history, eclipsing the mark of 203.76 set by Mayfield

Ballots were emailed to 870 media personnel across the nation plus 58 Heisman winners and one fan ballot, for a total of 929 electors. The ballots were received and tabulated by the independent accounting firm of Deloitte & Touche LLP. Murray polled 2,167 points to capture the award over Tua Tagovailoa of Alabama (1,871 points), and Ohio State quarterback Dwayne Haskins (783 points). The point total is reached by a system of three points for a first place vote, two for a second and one for a third.

Murray was officially inducted into the Heisman family at the 84th annual Heisman Memorial Trophy Dinner Gala on Sunday evening, December 9, 2018, at the Marriott Marquis in New York.

Long-time education activist Ron Herndon opened Friday's event by reading from the late William McClendon's book "Straight Ahead," a collection of essays on the struggle of Blacks in America. McClendon was a writer, journalist, jazz musician and a prominent member of Portland's civil rights community until his death in 1996.

Herndon gave context to the current state of Black students by summarizing Portland's failed integration policy of the 1960s into the early 1980s. In the name of desegregation, Portland Public Schools bussed Black children outside of their northeast communities to some 32 predominantly White schools around the metropolitan area. Schools in historic Black communities were ultimately shut-

To uproarious applause, Herndon closed by saying that change lies with those who are willing to "fight like hell to ensure our children receive the education they deserve."

Moderator Joyce Harris, of Education Northwest, was joined by Ladd alongside panelists Joe McFerrin, CEO of Portland Opportunities Industrialization Center (POIC), and Lisa Collins, director of Teaching and Learning at Parkrose School District.

Ladd began by explaining how using criminalizing language to describe young African American children is directly connected to suppressing student achievement. She mentioned examples four-year-olds were being called "violent" by teachers and child care providers.

"It's no wonder we have disproportionate discipline of Black children in pre-school,"

Principal on leave after banning Christmas decorations, including candy canes and reindeer



The principal of Manchester Elementary School - located near Omaha, Nebraska - sent her staff a memo outlining specific steps educators were expected to take during the holiday season to remain " inclusive and culturally sensitive. "

A Nebraska elementary school principal has been placed on administrative leave following public backlash over the school's holiday policies. Those since-revised rules banned Christmas-related items - including candy canes, reindeer and the traditional Christmas colors red and green - in the name of cultural sensitivity.

The principal of Manchester Elementary School - located near Omaha, Nebraska - sent her staff a memo on holiday symbols that does not reflect the Elkhorn Public Schools District's policies, according to a district statement sent to USA TODAY Friday.

Principal Jennifer Sinclair has been placed on administrative leave as of Thursday, the statement says.

The statement comes after religious freedom advocacy group Liberty Counsel published a memo attributed to Manchester Elementary School. The memo outlines specific steps educators were expected to take during the holiday season to remain "inclusive and culturally sensitive."

The lists said winter-themed symbols such as sledding, gingerbread people and snowmen were allowed. But symbols associated with Christmas were not, as to avoid promoting a religious holiday.

The memo at times includes explanations for why certain items were disallowed:

Elf on the Shelf – that's Christmas-related. Candy Cane – that's Christmas-related. Historically, the shape is a "J" for Jesus. The red is for the blood of Christ, and the white is a symbol of his resurrection. This would also include different colored candy canes, Red/Green items - traditional Christmas colors. Rein-

The memo is signed "the (Unintentional) Grinch who stole Christmas (from Manchester)."

It explains the policies: "I come from a place that Christmas and the like are not allowed in schools ... over the years in my educational career, this has evolved into the expectation for all educators."

The memo's explanation of the candy cane's religious roots is commonly accepted but likely inaccurate, Smithsonian Magazine reports. The religious symbolism referenced was likely popularized after forms of candy canes were already common holiday treats, the publication

said Ladd "It's because we've forgotten who they are. We've forgotten that they're children." McFerrin drew parallels be-

tween rates of suspension and expulsion of Black students to what is referred to as the schoolto-prison-pipeline.

"You're two to three times more likely if you're Black in Multnomah County to be suspended or disciplined," he said. "What you'll find in the data is that students who are disciplined at a higher level in school are likely to end up in the criminal justice system."

Collins underlined the importance of having school districts and family members stand sideby-side to ignite difficult, but crucial, conversations.

"We know that there are teachers who are afraid of our kids and when our kids go to classes they have to deal with that," said Lisa. "We have to talk about micro-aggressions otherwise there's not going to be any engagement."

Collins also discussed pathways beyond public school and raised pressing questions about students becoming collegeready. "How are we leading them to get the courses and counseling they need to prepare?" she asked.

On the subject of solutions, Collins addressed the audience, "Everyone who is here, we must work outside of the school as well as inside of the school."

For the panelists, partnership and community engagement was the top priority for improving Black student outcomes. McFerrin suggested that local businesses can help by partnering with African American-serving organizations, like POIC, through donations, internships or volunteer opportunities.

And I'm a little disappointed in myself, because I believe I can do better."

Ladd added to the sentiment, as well as the importance of "It's only through partnerships that we really can begin to move the needle," she said. "One thing we have in common is that we understand the relational way that we are - that's a cultural thing. We have a relational taxonomy, so we build relationships.'

Towards its close, the panel opened to the audience. A handful of students approached the mic to comment on a lack of teachers of color in the district, trauma-informed practices in the classroom. "At this stage, we are discov-

ering ourselves. And if we don't have someone believing in us, it's tough," said Roosevelt High School senior Tosha Kitungano.

To end on a positive note, Ladd's ultimate call to action was for everyone to start believing in Black students. "All the adults need to see our children and their brilliance, and live into
