Doc McKenzie & The Hi-Lites are looking forward to performing in Lubbock on Saturday afternoon, August 24th.



Lubbock Community Celebrated Its' Annual Fourth on Broadway

The people of Lubbock enjoyed a day of celebration as part of the 29th annual 4th on Broadway celebration. The day began with hundreds of families coming together at Mackenzie Park to beat the heat and enjoy the annual 4th of July parade sponsored by Sonic Drive-In.

Parade Chair Erik Mahal said that over 50,000 people showed up for the parade this year. Hundreds of kids lined up on East Broadway catching candy and waving to the parade floats that went by.

Riders waved to the crowd as their floats made its' way through East Broadway. The LISD Marching Band played "America the Beautiful." They were joined by high school cheerleaders from Lubbock High and Roosevelt High School. The Mayor, Sherriff Deputy, and several veteran groups also marched in the pa-

After the parade ended, the crowd made its' way into Mackenzie Park where they were greeted with dozens of

food vendors, numerous musical groups, and the first appearance of the Lubbock National Bank Ferris Wheel.

The 4th on Broadway celebration lasted from 10:30 a.m. to dusk after which the Glasheen, Valles, and Inderman Fireworks Extravaganza took place. The fireworks show was scored by the Lubbock Youth Orchestra.

State Sen. Royce West of Dallas, center, during a Senate Finance Committee hearing on Senate Bill 2 on March 14, 2017.

Royce West on Monday, July 22, 2019, launched his campaign for th U.S. Senate, joining a crowded field of Democrats looking to unseat incumbent U.S. Senator John Cornyn.

West, who has served in the Texas Senate since 1993, was boosted by nearly 1,000 supporters at the CWA Union Hall in Dallas, including U.S. Rep. Eddie Bernice Johnson, former U.S. Trade Rep. Ron Kirk and former Dallas Cowboys Hall of Fame running back Emmitt

"It's going to be a long road," he said, nodding to a primary fight and potential general elec-

"I'm battle tested," he said. "You've seen me in battle and I'm ready today to announce my candidacy for the United State Senate."

West called for a "New Texas of America" that "incorporated the values of the past," while acknowledging the need for change.

He said of his style: "I will be a LBJ-type senator who sits down and gets the job done."

He understands this will be

a Tough Democratic Primary

West's entry into the Senate race fuels a fierce fight for the Democratic Party nomination, with the winner to face a bruising battle against a well-funded Cornyn.

The Dallas Democrat told supporters his campaign would be hard, but said he had the support and the record to prevail.

"The only thing I can do is be who I have been over the years. I've got to be me," West told The Dallas Morning News. "I've got make certain that the people in the Democratic Primary that don't know Royce West will know that I represent the things they want a leader to fight for in Washington."

West joins a Democratic Primary field that includes former Army helicopter pilot M. J. Hegar of Round Rock, who in 2018 lost a close congressional race to Republican John Carter. Also running for Senate seat held by Cornyn is former Rep. Chris Bell of Houston and former Houston council member Amanda Edwards.














Kamala Harris was the unflappable Alpha Kappa Alpha

When the line had to rush to put on black coats for a group task, everyone frantically grabbed a coat, even if it belonged to another sister. Harris always managed to grab her

When it was time to put together a routine for a Black History Month program with little time to prepare, Harris choreographed it.

"She did not waver in the storm, ever," said Jill Louis, who was among the 38 women initiated into Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority Inc. with Harris in 1986 at Howard University in Washington, D.C. "When things were the most pressured, she was focused."

So it was no surprise to Louis and the other line sisters when Harris announced she was running for president in 2020.

Her sorority sisters say Harris was born to lead, and she got some of her earliest training as an Alpha Kappa Alpha woman at Howard.

Now the sorority is proving to be a secret weapon for Harris, as members across the country host fundraisers, show up to her appearances in the sorority colors of pink and green, and campaign for her election.

"Membership has its privileges," said Daphne Rankin, another Harris line sister. "If a soror has a need, she can always lean on the sorority and we will answer."

Harris will be the first black woman to to win a major party nomination if she succeeds in the primary. And the black vote, particularly black women who overwhelming support Democratic candidates, will be critical for Democrats in 2020. In 2018, 92% of black women voted for Democrats, according to the Pew Research Center. Meanwhile, issues of equality and diversity could be especially key with President Donald Trump being painted as a racist by his critics, including Harris.

Harris, 54, surged in the polls after a strong performance in the first Democratic primary debate last month. It arguably secured her status as a top contender in a Democratic 2020 field of two dozen candidates.

During the debate, Harris had a powerful exchange with former Vice President Joe Biden, where she called out Biden for opposing federally mandated busing to integrate schools while he was in Con-

Sorority sisters say Harris' ability to remain calm and think clearly has benefited Harris throughout her career in politics as the district attorney of San Francisco, attorney general of California and United States senator. Harris also boasts a track record of fighting for marriage equality, prosecuting transnational gangs, helping families avoid foreclosure and supporting affordable health-

However, Harris has been criticized for her record on criminal justice reform, an issue that disproportionately affects many black families. For example, some critics say Harris was too harsh when as attorney general she championed a truancy law that punished parents whose

kids habitually missed school. Political analysts say the

support from sorority members could help Harris secure the votes of black women.

"Having black women as spokespeople to support your polices and agenda is useful when trying to engage black women at large," said Danyelle Solomon, the vice president of race and ethnicity policy at the Center for American Progress, a Washington D.C.-based liberal policy nonprofit. "But I also think that a candidate has to put forward policies that are actually responsive to that community at

Shaping leaders

AKA, an international organization made up of 300,000 college-educated women, has prided itself on shaping leaders like Harris who can affect

It is the oldest Greek-letter organization established by black college-educated women and has more than 1,200 undergraduate and graduate chapters around the world. The sorority was founded in 1908 at Howard University.

A growing list of prominent, successful women - including Jada Pinkett-Smith, Phylicia Rashad and Toni Morrison - are members of AKA.

While sororities and fraternities span across all cultures, they are a staple in campus life for Historically Black Colleges and Universities such as

AKA is also part of the Nanal Pan-Hellenic Council. also known as the Divine Nine, an umbrella organization for nine black Greek sororities and fraternities that all strive for academic excellence and service to communities.

On Harris' line alone, there are 10 attorneys, a sitting judge, a doctor and a dentist. Two line sisters have passed away since the group was initiated. A "line" is a group or class that is initiated into a sorority or fraternity together.

"Throughout your life, you find friends who become family and - like family - they help shape you and your life experiences," Harris said in a statement to USA TODAY. "For me, that was the women of Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Inc. who became my sisters."

Harris' was born to an Indian mother and a Jamaican father. She grew up in Oakland, California, and lived with her mother in Montreal, Canada, before attending Howard.

Harris said there were times in her career when she was the only person in the room "who looked like me, or had my experiences."

Alpha Kappa Alpha and the Divine Nine network allowed Harris to meet other people with similar experiences, she said.

"Having my AKA sisters behind me, seeing them at events across the country, is a reminder to me as I run for president, because I know if I'm not on the stage, there's a certain voice that will not be present on that stage, a voice that must be heard," Har-

Cynthia Howell, executive director of Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority Inc., said the organization celebrates members who are serving their communities and holding public office, but it does not endorse political candidates..

Harris was a senior when her line was initiated in 1986, so she had less than a semester on campus with her sorority sisters. She was number 15 on the line, which was named 38 J.O.I.S., for Jewels of Iridescent Splendor.

The line sisters brought different talents and experience to "8-J the group. Harris had served on the Liberal Arts Student Council after winning the seat her freshman year.

The line has remained close over the years with annual girls trips and meeting up at Howard's homecoming festivities every

A group of line sisters traveled to New Orleans earlier this month for the Essence Festival, where they attended Harris' appearance wearing matching Tshirts that read "Essence of Sisterhood Kamala 2020."

"We really are like sisters," said Rankin, a paralegal and minister in Memphis. "We send Christmas cards. We keep in touch. We have a group chat. We know what's going on in everybody's life."

Harris' line sisters say they didn't think twice about supporting her run for president.

With members of the line living in different cities across the country, they have been able to cast a wide net with their fundraising efforts.

They have hosted fundraisers in Atlanta, Dallas, Washington and Memphis this year. Sorority members beyond Harris' line have supported their ef-

Louis said most Alpha Kappa Alpha women are already leaders in their communities and have professional networks, so organizing campaign fundraisers comes naturally.

"We aren't people who just go to work and come home," Louis said.

New York Jets Player Saved 90 Percent of His **Income and Teaches Finance Class at UPenn**

Brandon Copeland is paying attention to numbers on and off the field.

The New York Jets linebacker, who recorded 35 tackles and five sacks last season, spent time in a classroom on Mondays at the University of Pennsylvania last spring semester. But the 28-yearold wasn't there to take down notes and earn a grade - instead, Copeland was teaching a class financial literacy with Dr. Brian Peterson, the director of Penn's Makuu Black Cultural Center, according to ESPN.

The class, called "Life 101," was created to give college students practical lessons on finances, such as budgeting and investing, like understanding the benefits of a traditional 401K or a Roth IRA.

"I don't care if you're an engineering student, a nursing student, if you're going to build rockets when you grow up or if you're going to sweep floors," Copeland, a native of Baltimore, told the outlet. "You're going to have to use something in this class," Copeland said. "And you can't say that for every class at Penn. Every student. Every major."

"Even if you don't go to college, you're going to use something in this class," he added. "Your credit is going to matter."

While he doesn't claim to be a financial expert, Copeland has a special way of connecting with students, sophomore Mark Jackson told ESPN.

"I was kind of shocked how good of a professor he was,"




Jackson said. "I didn't go in with any expectations, but he's a very, very smart guy, and you can just tell it by listening to him. He knows what he's talking about, and he's obviously willing to learn."

While Copeland has made a fortune playing in the NFL, he has done his best to use it wisely. According to CNBC, almost 60 percent of his post-tax salary has gone to long-term investments, while another 30 percent goes to his savings.

"I've literally hoarded money," he previously told ESPN. "I'm literally stacking, stacking, stacking."

Copeland then lives off of the 10 to 15 percent that he allows himself, while the money he stashed away in his accounts slowly grow. It's a combination that works for him personally, he said, and he doesn't recommend

"Anything I can get into an account and just let sit, I've got to a point where I have enough, where if football is over today, I have more than enough to take care of me for a while," Copeland said.

Copeland's strategy is similar to another NFL star, the nowretired Rob Gronkowski, who lives off his multi-million-dollar endorsement deals, and claims to have not touched the money

he made from his NFL contracts. "To this day, I still haven't touched one dime of my signing bonus or NFL contract money," Gronkowski, 30, said in 2015. "I live off my marketing money and haven't blown it on any bigmoney expensive cars, expensive jewelry or tattoos and still wear my favorite pair of jeans from high school."

Prosecutors set to defend Bill Cosby's sexual assault conviction in appeals court next month call the accusations from other women no coincidence, but "the culmination of a decades-long pattern of behavior."

Cosby, a long-beloved actor and comedian, was convicted in the first celebrity trial of the

He turned 82 this month while serving a three-to-10-year prison term for drugging and molesting a woman at his suburban Philadelphia home in 2004. More than 50 women have accused him of similar conduct since trial accuser Andrea Constand went to police in 2005.

Cosby's lawyers have raised a long list of alleged trial errors as they try to get last year's verdict overturned. They include the judge's decision to let five other accusers testify to bolster Constand's account.

Montgomery County prosecutors, in a response filed late Thursday, said such testimony is permissible under Pennsylvania law when it demonstrates a "signature" crime.

"There was no coincidence here. To the contrary, defendant's drug-facilitated sexual assault of Constand was the culmination of a decades-long pattern of behavior evidenced by his prior bad acts towards the five witnesses sufficiently 'distinctive and so nearly identical as to become the signature of the same perpetrator," the prosecutors wrote, quoting from case law on the issue.

Arguments in Cosby's appeal are set for Aug. 12 in Pennsylvania Superior Court in Harris-

Constand, a former professional basketball player from the Toronto area, met Cosby through her job with the women's basketball team at Temple University, where the long-married Cosby was a popular alumnus, trustee and basketball fan.
