New Police Chief Hired By The City Of Lubbock, Texas!!

The City of Lubbock is pleased to announce the selection of Floyd Mitchell to serve as the next Chief of the Lubbock Police Department. Chief Mitchell has more than 29 years of law enforcement experience and is currently the Chief of Police for Temple, Texas, a Recognized department by the Texas Police Chief's Association. Mitchell served previously in Kansas City, Missouri, where he began his police career. He is a veteran of the United States Air Force and holds both a Masters and Bachelors of Business Administration from Baker University. Chief Mitchell is a Master Certified Peace Officer in Texas

and is a graduate of the FBI National Academy.

Chief Mitchell completed a rigorous recruitment process that saw 43 applicants vie for the position. The process included video and in-person interviews as well as a public reception attended by more than 100 community representatives.

"We are greatly honored to bring Chief Mitchell to Lubbock," said Lubbock City Manager Jarrett Atkinson. "His experience, his sincere desire to be in Lubbock and the opportunity to incorporate his community policing skills into our city played strongly into his selection."

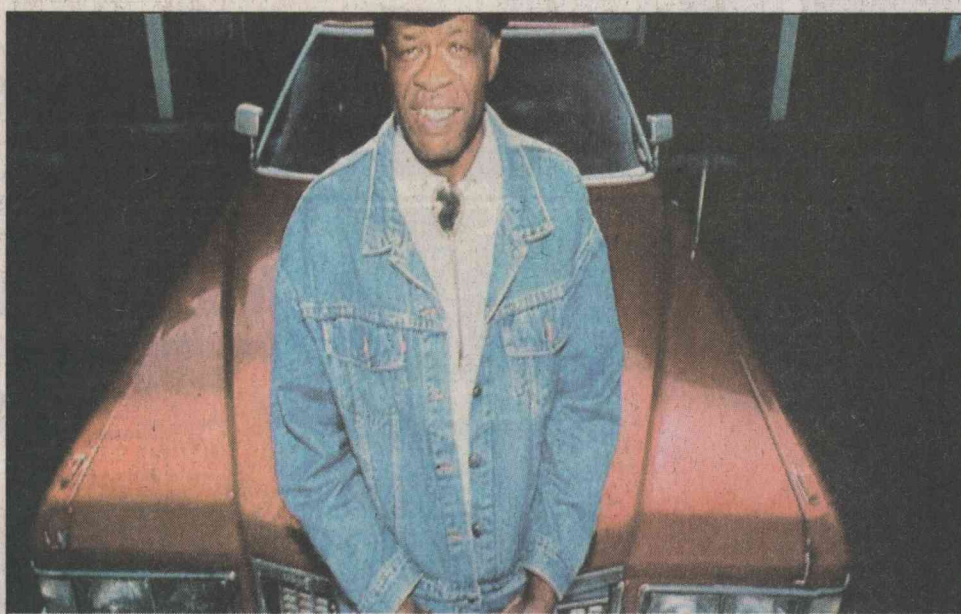
"First and foremost, I'd like

to begin by expressing how truly honored I am to be selected as Lubbock's Chief of Police," said Chief Floyd Mitchell. "I look forward to working with each member of the department, and the citizens of Lubbock in continuing its great tradition of public safety and community engagement."

Chief Mitchell's appointment will be presented to the Lubbock City Council at its regularly scheduled meeting on October 22, 2019 for confirmation. Chief Mitchell expects to join the Lubbock Police Department on November 11, 2019.

C.B. Stubblefield, of "Stubb's Bar-B-Q," inducted into BBQ Hall of Fame

On Saturday, September 14, 2019, at the World Series of Barbecue in Kansas City, Lubbock-native C.B. Stubblefield was inducted into the Barbecue Hall of Fame.

Christopher B. Stubblefield, or "Stubb" as he became known, is famous around the country for his barbecue sauce, originating from the restaurant he used to operate in Lubbock, Texas in the 1960's.

Stubb was born in Navasota, Texas in 1931, and he started his cooking career as a veteran during the Korean war, serving as a mess sergeant in the last all-black regiment. Friends of Stubb say his mess hall was the first true incarnation of Stubb's Bar-B-Q. He left military service with two purple hearts, and moved to Lubbock where he opened a restaurant.

In 1968, Stubb's Bar-B-Q opened as a building that could

reliably fit 75 patrons, but their website says they would squeeze in when the live music started to play.

Stubb's restaurant was a welcome sight for fans of food and blues music. Featuring appearances from legendary musicians like Johnny Cash, B.B. King, Stevie Ray Vaughan, and Muddy Waters.

After 17 years, Stubb was forced to close his doors in

1985. One of Stubb's musician friends, Willie Nelson, tried to convince him to move his business to Austin. In March of that year, Stubb told Texas Monthly: "I got run out of Lubbock, 'cause I was broke, busted, and disgusted. I can't fight the IRS with barbecue and sauce."

Stubb reopened Stubb's Legendary Bar-B-Q off I-35 in Austin, Texas in 1986.

A Legendary Coach, Coach Louis Kelley, Succumbs Here



Coach Louis Kelley, A Legend From Lubbock, Texas

Funeral services were held for a man who wanted to help young people along the way in their lives and never giving up on what they were doing to do something good in life!

This gentleman was Coach Louis E. Kelley who left some positive footprints in the sands of time.

Funeral services were held on Friday morning, October 4, 2019, at the Estacado High School Auditorium with Rev. Dr. J. H. Ford, pastor of the Greater St. Luke Baptist Church, officiating.

Interment followed in the Peaceful Gardens Cemetery under the direction of Griffin Mortuary & Funeral Home of Lubbock.

Coach Kelley, age 81 of Lubbock, Texas, passed away on Friday, September 27, 2019.

Kelley was born on July 10, 1938 in Fort Worth, Texas to Emmitt and Lilian Kelley.

Coach Kelley, graduated from Woodson High School in 1956 in Abilene, Texas, and participated in football and basketball all four years of his high school career. After graduating from Woodson High School in 1956, he received a football scholarship to Cisco Junior College and was the first black player to integrate.

He transferred on to New Mexico State University where he was co-captain of his football and baseball teams and was named Most Valuable Player in

football in 1959.

Coach Kelley was drafted in 1960 by the Dallas Texans, which are now the Kansas City Chiefs. In 1960.

Coach Kelley started as a Junior Varsity Coach at Dunbar High School in Lubbock, and later became Varsity Assistant Coach and later Head Coach.

He was named Head Coach of Estacado High School in 1975 and retired in 2000. As a head coach, his career includes 15 district champion teams, 8 state, state playoff appearances that included a Class 4a state runner up in 1983 with only three losing seasons.

In his 30 years, Kelley compiled a record 240-91-10 with 17 total district championships. Coach Kelley was named A-J's coach of the year eight times, and Texas Tech Legendary Coach of the Year, and was inducted into the Lubbock ISO Hall of Honor, the Texas High School Coaches Association Hall of Honor, the Abilene ISO Hall of Honor, the New Mexico State University Hall of Fame and Prairie view Interscholastic League Coaches Association Hall of Honor.

After retirement, he worked for City Bank of Lubbock.

He leaves to cherish his memory and legacy: wife, Claudier Armstead Kelley; son, Louis Earl Kelley (wife, Zabrina); sister, Hattie Wyett; three grandchildren; a host of other relatives and friends.





West Nile Virus

The City of Lubbock Health Department has confirmed the first case of West Nile Virus (WNV) in a resident of Lubbock for 2019.

WNV is a disease of birds. Humans are exposed to the virus when they are bitten by mosquitoes that have fed on infected birds. The infected mosquitoes become the link (vector) that spreads the disease from birds to humans through a mosquito bite. WNV cannot be spread person-to-person.

Symptoms of West Nile fever include headache, fever, muscle and joint aches, nausea and fatigue. People with West Nile fever typically recover on their own. There is a more serious form of the illness, West Nile encephalitis, which may have additional symptoms of neck stiffness, stupor, disorientation, coma, tremors, convulsions,

loud applause and cheering that the very motivated crowd awarded to him again, again and over and over. Cyntoia Brown-Long to Speak at Texas Tech's Celebrate Diversity Banquet

The author, speaker and advocate for criminal justice reform will deliver the keynote remarks at the annual event, which recognizes those who exemplify inclusive excellence.

The Office of Institutional Diversity (OID) will once again recognize those within the Texas Tech University and Lubbock communities who exemplify inclusive excellence at the ninth annual Celebrate Diversity Banquet.

Cyntoia Brown-Long, author, speaker and advocate for criminal justice reform, will serve as the keynote speaker

for the annual scholarship fundraiser, held at 7 p.m. Nov. 6 in the Frazier Alumni Pavilion.

Brown-Long will share her story in the hopes that it will not only inspire others, but also shine a light on the injustice people still face on a daily basis, especially the injustice to women and children in American prisons.

Her memoir, "Free Cyntoia: My Search for Redemption in the American Prison System," was written while she was in prison and released in 2019. It will be available for purchase at the event, and a book-signing will immediately follow the banquet.

The memoir documents her life before prison and the 15 years she spent incarcerated. It is set against the backdrop of a life behind bars, the injustice of sentencing sex-trafficked juveniles as adults and Long-Brown's struggle to overcome a family legacy of addiction and a lifetime of being ostracized and

abandoned by society. Past speakers for the banquet include Edward James Olmos, Terrence Howard, Soledad O'Brien, John Quiñones, former U.S. Poet Laureate Juan Felipe Herrera, Grace Gealey-Byers, Michael Benitez and Ana Navarro.

"The Celebrate Diversity Banquet provides a unique opportunity to bring in noted individuals whose lives and work have had a significant impact on private and public conversations, thinking, policy and practice, and ways in which our communities can be more inclusive to those who might often get overlooked or are simply ignored," said Carol A. Sumner, chief diversity officer and vice president of the Texas Tech Division of Diversity, Equity & Inclusion.

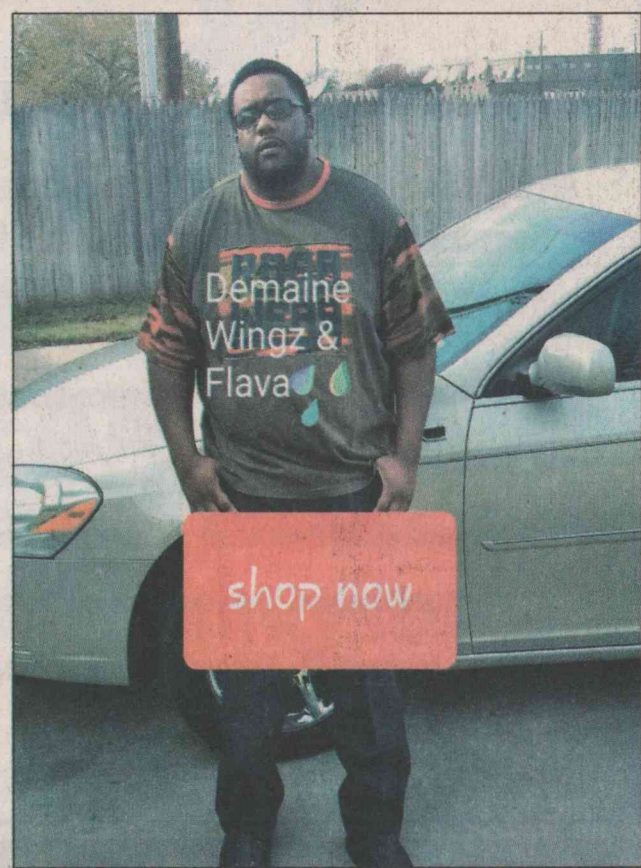
"Having Cyntoia Brown-Long as our keynote speaker will bring awareness to an issue that has history and significance in our Lubbock community while

simultaneously providing hope and possibility in real terms. We are honored to have her and know her address will affirm that one person with hope can change lives, policy and our national discourse."

The recipients of the Robert L. Duncan Community Champion Award and the Inclusive Excellence Awards, who will be announced prior to the banquet, also will receive recognition at the banquet. About Cyntoia Brown-Long
Born to an alcoholic, teenage mother who also was a victim of sex trafficking, Brown-Long experienced a sense of isolation, low self-esteem and alienation. She became a victim of sex trafficking and was arrested at age 16 for killing a man who had solicited her for sex. After being tried as an adult, she was sentenced to life in prison, without the chance for parole for 51 years.

Long-Brown's life took a dramatic turn when the prison education principal took her under her wing, introduced her to a spiritual path and encouraged her to build a positive life in prison while resisting negativity. Her journey included a documentary about her life, a profound encounter with God, an unlikely romance and, after 15 years, a commuted sentence

by Tennessee Gov. Bill Haslam. After receiving an unprecedented national and international outpouring of support from social media advocates, pastors and celebrities, she was released from the Tennessee Prison for Women on Aug. 7, 2019.
