TAMPA, Fla. — An all-Black officiating crew worked an NFL game for the first time in league history when the Rams faced the Tampa Bay Buccaneers on Monday night, November 23, 2020..

Referee Jerome Boger led the crew, which also included umpire Barry Anderson, down judge Julian Mapp, line judge Carl Johnson, side judge Dale

Shaw, field judge Anthony Jeffries and back judge Greg Steed.

When the NFL announced the crew was being assembled league executive vice president of football operations Troy Vincent hailed the move as "a testament to the countless and immeasurable contributions of Black officials to

the game, their exemplary performance, and to the power of inclusion that is the hallmark of this great game." Five members of the crew work together regularly. Johnson and Steed joined the group for Monday night's matchup. The members of the crew have a combined 89 seasons of NFL experience and have worked six Super Bowls.




Braxton said there's no secret to his long life, his son, however disagrees.





## **Charley Pride, Pioneering Black Country Singer, Dead at 86**

Charley Pride, the pioneering black country singer known for such hits as "Kiss an Angel Good Mornin'" and "Is Anybody Goin' to San Antone," has died from complications related to Covid-19, according to his publicist. He was 86.

Born in Sledge, Mississippi, in 1934, Pride picked cotton, played baseball in the Negro leagues, served in the U.S. Army, and worked in a smelting plant in Montana before moving to Nashville and becoming country music's first black superstar. He scored 52 Top 10 country hits, including 29 Number Ones, and was the first African-American performer to appear on the Grand Ole Opry stage since Deford Bailey made his debut in the 1920s. Pride became an Opry member in 1993. In 2000, he was inducted into the Country Music Hall of Fame.

After leaving the Army, Pride landed in Helena, Montana, where he continued to play baseball and took a job in a smelting plant. He also began singing in public, where he caught the ear of a local DJ who arranged for Pride to sing for country stars Red Sovine and Red Foley. The pair convinced him to move to Nashville and, in 1964, he signed a management deal with

longtime manager Jack D. Johnson. The following year, he had his first Nashville recording session and, a month later, signed with the label RCA.

Pride's debut single, "The Snakes Crawl at Night," failed to chart, but his debut album, Country, reached the Top 20. His 1967 album The Pride of Country Music went on to hit Number One and, that same year, he became the first African-American solo singer to appear on the Opry. On April 29th, he made his national TV debut, appearing on Lawrence Welk's Saturdaynight ABC music series.

A lifelong disciple of Hank Williams, Pride's debut on The Lawrence Welk Show presented his vibrant take on Williams' 1949 hit "Lovesick Blues." During a later appearance, Pride sang Lead Belly's off-covered folk tune "Cotton Fields," a song that reminded him of his hard upbringing as a sharecropper's son. "[It] reminds me of what I don't ever go back to doing because it hurt my fingers and my back and my knees," Pride said.

That Pride appeared on a variety show popular with a white audience was no small achievement for the times, especially when considering how RCA all but tried to initially obscure the

T.J. Patterson continued his tradition of visiting with inmates at the Lubbook County Detention Center on Christmas, but it was a little different this year.

Patterson, members of Each-One-Reach-One, local pastors, and family and friends of Patterson have been spending Christmas Day with inmates for 33 years.

A typical visit would include the visitors walking through the facility, delivering candy, and encouraging the inmates to move forward on the right track when they're done serving their sentences.

Determined to keep his commitment, Patterson's group visited the detention center on Christmas Eve in time to give

treats to workers to pass out to inmates on Christmas Day, but stayed outside due to COVID-19 safety restrictions.

"We have to encourage them and let them know that today is the first day of the rest of their lives," Patterson explained. "Tell them to do what's best in their lives and take care of business like it should be taken care of, because there are no shortcuts in life.

Each-One-Reach-One was notified about the changes to the visit about two months ago, so they began planning on how to adjust. Faye Dunn-Brown, founder of EORO, said they were saddened by the news.

"It's very heartbreaking because we enjoy going in and

singing to them and interacting with them," said Dunn-Brown. "This is the first time in 33 years that we won't."

She said it was still important for them to send their message to the inmates, so this year they depended on the media to help Patterson speak to them.

"He wants them to know he's out there and keeping his commitment," said Dunn-Brown.

LCSO Chief Cody Scott called Patterson a tremendous supporter of the detention center and said they all want to do this year's visit as safely as possible.

"[Patterson] has always brought this group out to provide for the inmates, and we're just glad he's willing and able to do that," Scott said.

"This is a time when they're often forgotten, even by their own families a lot of the time, so this is a big deal," said Hallford. "It keeps people positive, to know somebody cares about



"You never know whose life you touched, and you never know who will bring you a cup of water," Patterson said. "We need to treat people right and


