

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

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

In our past, our ministers were visible and available to the whole community; not just their congregation they assisted with preparation through discipleship and community involvement and setting positive examples.



"Lawrence Brooks, the Oldest Living World War II
Veteran is Now 112-Years Old"



Nationwide — Lawrence Brooks, the oldest known World War II veteran from New Orleans, has turned 112-years old.

The National WWII Museum organized a drive-by celebration last Sunday to honor Brooks with a Jeep parade and live performances from the Museum's vocal trio, The Victory Belles, as well as other local musicians. It has been a yearly tradition but it was brought outside his home for the past 2 years due to the coronavirus pandemic. The City of New Orleans also issued an official proclamation recognizing Brooks' birthday.

Brooks, who grew up in Norwood, Louisiana, served from 1940 to 1945 in the predominantly Black 91st Engineer Battalion, which was stationed in New Guinea and the Philippines during the war.

Moreover, Brooks is a father tofive children and five stepchildren

Earlier this year, Brooks got his COVID-19 vaccine at the Veterans Affairs Medical Center in New Orleans.

Lawrence Brooks celebrated Sunday with a drive-by party at his New Orleans home hosted by the National World War II

The Times-Picayune/The New Orleans Advocate reported. He also receivedgreetings from Louisiana Gov. John Bel Edwards, who tweeted, "Mr. Brooks, the entire state of Louisiana thanks you for your service and we all wish you a joyous birthday."

The museum has previously hosted parties for Brooks, although the coronavirus pandemic has caused those events to shift to drive-by celebrations for the past two years.

This year's festivities included a Jeep parade, a live performance from the museum vocal trio and entertainment from New Orleans musicians. The city also recognized Brooks' birthday with an official proclamation.

Born in Norwood, Louisiana, in 1909, Brooks has lived in New Orleans since 1929. Drafted in 1940, he was a private in the Army's mostly Black 91st Engineer Battalion, a unit that was stationed in New Guinea and the Philippines and built infrastructure such as

In an oral history about his service posted on YouTube, Brooks also described how he was delivering a load of barbed wire to the front when one of the engines of the C-47 he was traveling in went out.

bridges, roads and airstrips.

After they dumped the barbed wire to conserve weight, he made his way to the cockpit. He told the pilot and co-pilot that since they were the only two with parachutes, if they had to jump for it, he was going to grab on to one of them.

"We made it though," he said laughing. "We had a big laugh about that."

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

November 2, 2021 Special Election (Bond Election)



A Special City Election will be held on Tuesday, November 2, 2021, for the purposes of voting on the following proposition:

Proposition A - "Shall the City Council of the City of Lubbock, Texas, be authorized to issue general obligation bonds of the City in the amount of \$174,575,000 for the purpose of providing funds for permanent public improvements, to wit: to acquire, construct and reconstruct street improvements, including but not limited to sidewalks, utility line relocation and traffic signalization, neces -

sary and related storm drainage facilities and the acquisition of land and rights-of-way therefore; said bonds to mature serially over a period of not to exceed forty (40) years from their date, to be issued in such installments and sold at any price or prices and to bear interest at any rate or rates as shall be determined within the discretion of the City Council under laws in effect at the time of issuance, and to provide for the payment of the principal of and interest on said bonds by levying a tax sufficient to pay the annual interest on and to create a sinking

fund sufficient to redeem said bonds as they become due?" Proposition language will appear on the ballot as follows:

The issuance of \$174,575,000 general obligation bonds for street improvements, and the imposition of taxes sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on the bonds.

Pamela Uba Makes History as the First Black Woman to Be Crowned "Miss Ireland"



Ireland — Pamela Uba, who is a South African native, is crowned as the 2021 Miss Ireland, making her the first-ever Black Miss Ireland in its 74-year history.

Six years ago, Uba was just mistaken for a contestant by one of the judges while working at a Miss Galway event in a bar. Since then, the idea stuck to her and she aimed to join the pageant someday.

Fast forward to 2020, Uba became the titleholder for Miss Galway for 18 months. And finally, she won Miss Ireland in 2021, making her the first Black woman in history to win the

"It was a surreal experience and I'm so delighted. I couldn't

believe this actually happened," Uba, who is 26-years old, told the Irish Independent. "Even being Miss Galway for a year and a half, it was a long time coming, I thought the pageant would never happen. I am so happy and the outcome is amaz-

Moreover, her historic win came after she rose above several obstacles in her life. She was just 7-years old when she and her family moved from South Africa to Ireland. For 10 years, she had been living in di-

rect provision. But she did not let that dictate her life. Instead, she strived to do more than what was expected of her.

Uba worked hard, with the help of her mother, to be able to go to college. She eventually graduated with a master's degree from Trinity College in clinical

Black Woman Succeeds in Getting 94% of Alabama Town Vaccinated



Nationwide — Dorothy Oliver, a Black woman from Panola, Alabama, is getting national attention and receiving high praises for her dedication to helping almost everyone in her small town to get vaccinated against COVID-19.

Panola, Alabama, a small rural town that currently has about 400 residents, did not have its own vaccine center and the nearest is 40 miles away. That's when Oliver, along with county commissioner Drucilla Russ-Jackson, took the initiative to coordinate a pop-up vaccination clinic with the nearest hospital.

"I just felt like I had to do it because the government, nobody does enough in this area," she said, according to The New Yorker. This area here is majority Black. Kind of puts you on the back burner. That's just it. I mean, you don't have to put nothing else with that. That's just it. I don't have to elaborate on that one."

But she didn't just stop with bringing the vaccine center to the town. As the hospital requires at least 40 people to sign up for vaccination before they could start the vaccination, Oliver did her best to eliminatevaccine hesitancy by personally talking to the residents.

Oliver, who is a retired office administrator and now a local general store owner, dedicatedher time to making phone calls and going door-to-door to convince residents to get vaccinat-

If they ever have questions, Oliver would kindly answer."

Her mission in getting many people in her town vaccinated is featured in a short documentary called The Panola Project by Rachael DeCruz and Jeremy S.

Moreover, Alabama has one of the lowest vaccination rates in the country, but Panola has a 94% vaccination rate thanks to Oliver. And she is working on persuading the other residents who haven't got vaccinated yet


Man Cashes In Pennies He's Been Saving For 45 years

Otha Anders saved his first penny more than 45 years ago when he found it on the ground. The coin reminded him to pray and give thanks.

"I became convinced that spotting a lost or dropped penny was an additional God-given incentive reminding me to always be thankful," said Anders, 73. "There have been days where I failed to pray and more often than not, a lost or dropped penny would show up to remind me."

Fifteen five-gallon plastic water jugs and half a million pennies later, Anders on Tuesday deposited \$5,136.14 into his account to go toward a recent dental bill.

He cashed in the coins to the Ruston Origin Bank, in Ruston, La. After that first coin, Anders said his penny pile began to grow and he ultimately stopped spending pennies and always made sure whenever he made a purchase, his change contained at least three to four pennies.

I just looked at her and smiled. "Oh," she said with a grin, "your truck is ready."


She drove me to get my truck, and as we were traveling, she looked at me and said, "You really missed your truck, didn't





"Jack saved nickels as I saved pennies and every nickel that passed through my hands I would save for him," he said. "He did likewise with pennies


He said Brown could only redeem his nickels with pennies and he could redeem his pennies only with nickels.



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


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The Lubbock Impact Organization **Continues To Make A Large Impact** on the Communities in Lubbock

Our Story:

In March of 2007, Trinity Baptist Church called Dan Reynolds to be its pastor with the intention of starting a new church that had community outreach as its mission. For many years Trinity had been a thriving church, but as southwest Lubbock grew and people relocated, the congregation dwindled to approximately twenty-three members. Twenty-one of those members were elderly; two of them were college students.

The new pastor and his small congregation asked Bacon Heights Baptist Church to assist in their mission. Four families from BHBC agreed to join the Trinity group.

As one looks back on the early days of Lubbock Impact, it is evident that the guidance of the Lord was strong. Even though Trinity Baptist was dwindling, the small congregation had recently redone its kitchen. It was easy to see that a soup kitchen should be the starting point for a community outreach. The two college students got married and became the first leaders in the children's program that took place immediately after the meal.

In October of 2007, the first soup kitchen opened. Actually, the LI group had a 'practice night' one week. Family and friends were invited, and a meal featuring BBQ sandwiches was served. The next week, the first opened. Approximately 50 people attended that night. Today, an average of 300-350 are fed each Wednesday evening.

What started as a soup kitchen has now grown to a ministry containing many different programs. Each ministry has a unique beginning where a volunteer or interested person(s) had an idea of how to help the less fortunate or those who had fallen on hard times. The hygiene closet, for example, began as one volunteer wanted to supply shampoo and sleeping bags to the homeless that she took sandwiches to each week at the

Today, the hygiene closet is completely full of necessity items and oversees a Christmas hygiene gift bag for over 400 people. The med clinic started as the pastor chatted with his doctor about 'doing something' at Lubbock Impact. Today, the TTU Free Clinic is one of the

finest in the nation of similar clinics. All of the ministries at Lubbock Impact are free and help clients in the areas of food, clothing, healthcare, and spiritual needs.

In addition to helping the unofficial soup kitchen was derprivileged of the community, Lubbock Impact is dedicated to breaking the bonds of generational poverty in the children we serve. This mission is what motivates the leaders of the min-Consistent biblical teaching, loving friendship and guidance, and intentional partnership with the families of our children and youth will make a difference.




