





The one thing that I do recall it that they were simpler days and in spite or racism which has not dwindled, there was not as much hate in America as it is now.

"Far-right extremists are exploiting internet technology to create a broader, more decentralized and more dangerous movement. The proliferation of numerous internet platforms has allowed individuals to engage with potentially violent movements- like QAnon and the Boogaloos- without being card-carrying members of a group ((SPLC REPORT, Summer, 2021, Vol.51, Number 2)." We must get 'in cinque' and arrange our priorities in such a manner as to not help to perpetuate hate in this country and help to seek justice for victims of hate in America.





Decision made: LISD votes to close Dupre Elementary



Dupre Elementary- 2008 Avenue T - Lubbock, Tx

The Lubbock ISD Board of Trustees voted Thursday morning in favor of closing Dupre Elementary school, a decision that was controversial since it first came to light publicly on Octo-

A petition was started on November 4 calling for the LISD to not close Dupre.

"When a neighborhood school is closed, one of the main drivers for people to stay or move there is removed," the petition said. Dupre is located at 2008 Avenue T in the historic Heart of Lubbock Neighborhood. Constructed in 1927, Dupre is the oldest school building in the Lubbock ISD

As for the reason to close Dupre, LISD Superintendent Dr. Kathy Rollo said in October, "We have seen the numbers decline each and every year until this year we are actually less than 200 students."

Because of declining enrollment, it was difficult, LISD said, to provide cost-effective services. Students at Dupre will be given the choice to go to either Carmona-Harrison or Brown Elementary School.

The LISD has experienced overall decline in enrollment for 10 years. Much of the city's development has been outside the older areas of the city and outside the LISD's boundaries.

Typically, it has been a 1 percent decline yearly, but it was 3.4 percent during COVID, according to information presented during the board meeting. Since 2015, the district has lost 3,000 students — 21% of its overall population. Dupre Elementary has suffered the worst of this trend, losing a third of its population since 2015 and serving under 200 students today.

The administration told the board, "The cost per student at elementary schools with 200 students is approximately \$6,500, while the cost per student at schools with greater than 550 students approximately

"Nobody feels great about having to make a decision like

this. But I do think it's the best one that we can make right now for the best number of LISD students," President of the LISD Board of Trustees Zach Brady said. "I think they will find over time that we can offer more services to students, more wraparound services like counseling [and] additional specialized instruction at a larger school, in terms of student population, than we've been able to do at Dupre."

The building will be repurposed, Dr. Rollo said, possibly as a daycare for LISD staff. Future planning was still in the works, she said.

Many parents and neighborhood residents, however, hoped to preserve the community and the small learning environment Dupre provides their children.

"Our kids aren't asking for a full-time counselor, they're not asking for a full time librarian," pastor Karen Owens told the board. "They're asking for a small school where they are known, where they are seen."

Texas Tech Introduces New Head Football Coach Joey McGuire

My family and I are fired up to officially be Red Raiders. I can't thank Kirby Hocutt, President Schovanec and the entire search committee enough for this tremendous opportunity. Having been involved with football in this great state for the last 25 years, I couldn't be more excited to be named the head coach here at Texas Tech. The sport of football is so much about relationships, and I can't wait to build those bonds with our players and all of Red Raider Nation. Let's go!



Joey McGuire has been named the 17th head football coach in Texas Tech history. Texas Tech Director of Athletics Kirby Hocutt, TTU President Lawrence Schovanec introduced McGuire during a 12 p.m. news conference on November 9, 2021.

Joey McGuire, a 2020 inductee into the Texas High School Coaches Association Hall of Honor, has been named the 17th head football coach in Texas Tech history, Director of Athletics Kirby Hocutt announced.

McGuire has spent the previous five seasons helping build Baylor after a legendary run as Baylor into a Big 12 title contender following a legendary career at Cedar Hill High School.

McGuire will join the Texas Tech athletics department immediately and will assume head coaching duties immediately following the 2021 football season. Sonny Cumbie will continue to serve as Texas Tech's interim

head coach for the three remaining regular-season games and any bowl appearance.

During his five seasons in Waco, McGuire's ties throughout the state helped develop a Baylor program that appeared in the 2019 Big 12 Championship game and the Allstate Sugar Bowl, one of three times the Bears have secured bowl eligibility during his tenure. McGuire has served as Baylor's associate head coach each of the last three seasons.

McGuire made the jump to head coach at Cedar Hill High School in the Dallas-Fort Worth metroplex. Over his 14 seasons, he took a Cedar Hill program that hadn't won a playoff game prior to his tenure and led the Longhorns to 12-consecutive playoff appearances and three state championships, including back-to-back titles in 2013 and

Cedar Hill was an impressive 141-42 during McGuire's tenure as the Longhorns also claimed the state title in 2006, only his fourth season as head coach. Cedar Hill was the state runnerup in 2012, starting a run where the Longhorns were among the most dominant programs in Texas. Cedar Hill won nine bidistrict titles and seven district during crowns overall McGuire's tenure.

McGuire and his wife, Debbie, have two children, a daughter Raegan and a son Garret. Garret was a quarterback at Baylor from 2017-20 before joining the coaching profession as a member of the Carolina Panthers prior to the 2021 season. Raegan is a graduate of Texas Tech University.


