State Laws Guide Paving In Cities Many individuals have misconceptions about how a city can pave its streets. If you think that you can sit by and wait for the city to pave your street by your property with public funds or by a general tax bond, you may stay in the mud for quite a while as there are state laws that govern paving of city streets, the paving policies of all cities in Texas are governed by Article No. 1105b of the Revised Civil Statutes of the State which provide that the property owner adjacent to street improvements can be assessed for all the cost of the curb and gutter improvements and 90 percent of the cost of paving of the half of the street adjacent to the property. The statute assumes that paying improvements are an asset to the adjacent property, and for the assessment to be valid it must not be for a greater amount than the benefits to the adjacent pro-
