

Icy Weather Plagues Area, Halts Harvest

Power Fails As Ice Snaps Lines

The sun peeped through overcast skies here Wednesday giving a brief respite before a second cold front which was expected to hit the area Thursday.

Freezing drizzle and scattered snow which started here Monday morning caused power failures, disrupted telephone service and brought farming activities to a halt.

Temperatures dropped to a low of 27 degrees here Tuesday with ice loading down power lines and tree branches. Trees were bent low under the weight and some branches were reported falling.

Power failures Tuesday night caused some rural families to be without heat or a way to cook. Reports continued to come in Wednesday from 'families out of electrical service. No long distance telephone service was available out of Olton Wednesday and some local telephones were reported

Southwestern Public Service, Lamb County R.E.A., and General Telephone linemen worked most of Tuesday night trying to keep area service going. Linemen were kept busy through Wednesday as reports continued to come in.

John Schenck, Southwestern Public Service, was injured Tuesday night when he was working on lines. He was cut just below the eye when he was accidently hit by a board. Ice caused at least one wreck here Tuesday. Ice on the windshield was listed as the cause of a "fender bender" when a car driven by Larry Fancher hit a parked car owned by John Moses. The accident occurred on Avenue H west of the high school building Tuesday afternoon.

Firemen fought a blaze Tuesday night in freezing weather at the home of Billy Patillo, seven and one half miles north, on the Hart highway. The house is owned by Jake Mitchell.

Fire Chief Tom Smith reported the house a total loss. A transformer was reported to have caught on fire at Cashway Food Wednesday morning. No damage resulted. Gins were at a standstill Wednesday with none reporting

any ginning done since Monday. Total ginnings stood at 6,390 bales ginned, far behind last year's total of 10,183 at this time

Moisture for Monday and Tuesday was measured at .60 of an inch by James Gallagher, Pioneer Natural Gas. Gallag-her pointed out, however, that the actual moisture was prob-ably higher due to the difficulty of measuring blowing snow and rain.

Total moisture for the month stood at 1.77 inches.
