Pace Still Is Behind '60 Figure

Olton's cotton harvest turned into a full-fledged 'round-the-clock job for ginners this week after farmers got a break from the weatherman last weekend.

The sun popped out on Thanksgiving Day and clear weather prevailed until Monday morning.

Farmers loaded gin yards during that time, then added more cotton Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday as they took advantage of sunny afternoons.

Some farmers worked into the night this week, attempting to make up for lost time.

The harvest Wednesday afternoon stood at 14,604 bales ginned, compared to 26,808 on the same date last year. These figures included totals from the six ginning firms serving the immediate Olton area.

Most ginners had a lot more cotton on their yards Wednesday afternoon, with one reporting about 800 bales waiting to be ginned.

After the rush last weekend, one gin had 1,800 bales worth of cotton on its yard Monday morning.

Ginners probably will have a round-the-clock job from now until the first of the year, if clear weather holds.

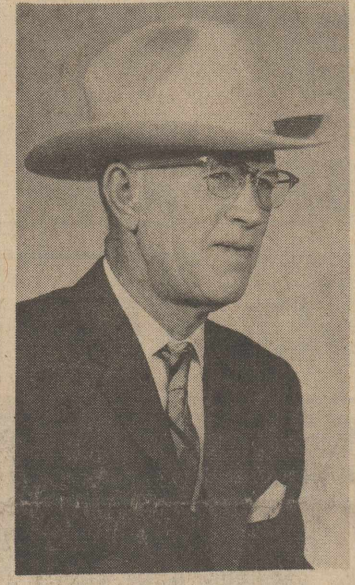
Although cloudy weather made farmers wait until the afternoon to harvest the first three days this week, one ginner said the weather itself during that time "didn't hold them up much."

"Most farmers," he said, "were able to bring in about as much as they had trailers for."

Some estimates have placed the total number of bales expected in the immediate area this year between 45,000 and 50,000.

This would be an all-time record, surpassing the top year of 1958, when the six ginning firms ginned about 43,000 bales.

Wayland Teacher Tells Of Red Menace, Japan

"We are in a war, but a lot of American people don't seem to realize it."

Dr. John D. Chapman, of the Plains Heritage Foundation, made this statement in a talk given to the Olton High School students Tuesday morning. Dr. Chapman is head of the history department at Wayland College.

"We are facing a greater crisis today than we've ever faced in this country," Dr. Chapman explained, speaking of the menace of communism. Dr. Chapman, who has had extensive experience in Japan,

spoke to the students on Japanese youth.

He said that the social system in the "old Japan" was the exact opposite of that of the United States. In this country, we have discipline for the youth and freedom for the adult.

"Children are completely undisciplined in Japan," Dr. Chapman said. "When they start to school, it's bedlam. Gradually, they subdue each other until they become very meek. The pressure comes from above until finally the adult Jap is just a cog in the Imperial machine."

He explained that all children were welcome there because of their religion, which is a worship of the spirits of ancestors.

"It is a tragedy not to have any children. Boys are especially welcome. Girls are necessary nuisances."

"They don't even bother to name the girls. They name themselves and, as you might expect, usually choose very romantic names. The boys are numbered, for example, first

Aid Programs

When a city accepts a federal aid program, it is likely to lose some of its rights to central government bureaus. In the last 30 years, there has been a major program a decade: federal public housing, federal slum clearance, federal urban renewal.

Now the trend is accelerating. This year through the Housing and Depressed Areas Act the federal government acquired partial control over commercial and industrial development in cities that it subsidizes.

Next year Congress will be pressed by the Administration to create a Department of Urban Affairs, in effect a department of local government. This department will have federal aid for -- and federal control over -- projects involving new factories, new stores, new streets, new water mains, new sewers -- you name it.

Spokesmen for an Urban Affairs Department are urging its creation despite the barren results that can be seen in almost every city with a federal urban renewal

program. Buildings have been razed. Brilliant construction plans have been announced and on the empty, silent acres in the hearts of many cities rag weed flourishes. In 10 years only 5 per cent of urban renewal programs have been completed.

Inspiration and flexibility have lost out to bureaucracy and redtape. Beneficiaries in more than one subsidized city have been slum landlords who reaped millions of dollars in windfall profits.

Bureaucrats cannot replace interested citizens.

No one knows better than the citizens of a community the needs of the community. No one has more incentive to work harder for community improvement than the man who lives in the community.

The inspiration, the thrust of community development programs have to be local if they are to succeed. And there are some cities around the country where the citizens are demonstrating this hard fact.

LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Dear Editor:
In my letter to you last week, space would not permit me to tell you how imperative it is that we enforce our antitrust laws and reform our tax system.

I have always been interested in Economics and Government but until the last few months have not made an extensive study of them and what I have come up with is appalling.

It has been my feeling for sometime every newspaper in the country needed a column on Economics alone.

We are not alone in this belief.

The nonpolitical committee for Economic Development, the Ford Foundation and the Carnegie Corporation have been studying the problem of Economic Education.

We are a nation of Economic illiterates.

And the question is raised "Can a Free Economy Survive Its Own Economic Ignorance?" They are in general agreement that it will not be able to.

What they have found is most American adults are not just ill informed on economic issues but what is worse, they don't care about being informed.

True, true, I have tried in every way possible to interest the adults of this community in economics and it seems the same is true all over the country.

From the reports of these groups they have found less than 5% of America's high school students have been taking the equivalent of even one

course of economics. Fewer than 10 per cent of elementary school teachers and fewer than 25 per cent of high school teachers have had as much as one-quarter course in economics, and at the college level the situation isn't much better.

At the adult level it's unlikely that one adult in twenty has any formal training in economics.

They found the lack of understanding is so great that in one recent survey adults placed the whole field of social studies on a par with such subjects as training in driving a car.

This group believes the situation is so urgent they have launched an all-out attack.

At the adult level they are establishing the "CED Associates" in twenty centers to help local leaders of business and education promote the widest understanding of our economy.

At the "Freedom Seminar" held in Olton this year I asked the question "What is going to be done about the students and adults who want to be owners, not employees?" The instructor could not answer the question. He was there to instruct the students and adults on "How to fight communism" and did not have any basic understanding of our economic system.

The basis of our economic system is "Private Property". "Individual incentives and responsibility." We may not all be owners but we must provide the opportunity for private ownership and private ownership is not having a share of joint stock. It is owning and operating your own business or farm.

If we do not enforce our antitrust laws and provide loans and capital for small businessmen and new owners our capitalist system will continue to die and capitalism will have destroyed itself.

Do not take my word for it. All anyone has to do is look around and see how few private owners are left. They have either joined a cooperative for protection against "Big Business" and taxes or they have become a distributor for a corporation or what is worse gone out of business.

Many blame the cost of labor for this and say labor is no longer reliable. This is plain, pure and simple bunk. "Big Business" has stifled competition and it has not lowered the cost of living. True some people goldbrick but most Americans like to work and dream of someday owning their own business, if given the opportunity.

Grain Sorghum Yields Told

The top yield for 1961 in the test of 62 hybrids and varieties of grain sorghum was 8,852.88 pounds per acre. This yield was 800 pounds greater than the top yield of 1960. The low yield in the test of irrigated grain sorghum was 6,123 pounds per acre. The average of the entire 62 hybrids and varieties was 200 pounds higher in 1961 than the 1960 average in the tests conducted at the High Plains Research Foundation at Halfway.

The test plots, planted June 13 were irrigated July 31; Aug. 10; Sept. 5; and Sept. 19 with 2.5 inches per irrigation. Rainfall received between June 1 and Oct. 1 amounted to 9.67 inches. All varieties received a sidedressed application of 120 pounds anhydrous ammonia June 27. The field was planted in cotton in 1960. There was no serious insect or disease damage to any of the 62 entries in the irrigation tests. The research reports on these tests include the yield, early vigor, bloom date, percent stand, percent lodging, plant height in inches, head length in inches, exertion in inches, head compactness and percent moisture. The chemical data will be reported later.

There was no significant difference in the yield of the top 16 hybrids of the 62 hybrids and varieties tested under irrigation at the Foundation. The yields of these top 16 hybrids at 14 per cent moisture were: WAC 750, 8,852 pounds per acre; Paymaster Apache, 8,567; Taylor-Evans TE77, 8,564; Asgrow Double T, 8,507; P.A.G. 625, 8,388; R.C. Mitchell's Standking, 8,326; Lindsey 788, 8,303; Shelby Howell's Excel E-52, 8,245; P.A.G. 515, 8,201; WAC 700, 8,196; P.A.G. 665, 8,152; Richardson's 303R, 8,145; Steckley R106, 8,122; Steckley R-212, 8,077; Texas 660, 8,044; and Northrup King 310, 7,869. The remaining 47 varieties in the test were high. Space does not permit the complete list of all in the report.

These tests are being conducted as a part of the Foundation's continued efforts to determine the best adapted grain sorghum hybrids and varieties for the High Plains. Dr. Earl H. Collister, Chief Agronomist, said in releasing the information.

boy, second boy and so on."

Speaking on education, he noted that co-education had only come about in Japan in the past ten years. Before that time, the woman had no legal standing and different studies were offered for boys and girls.

"Girls weren't expected to know too much other than tea serving and flower arranging and that sort of thing."

In learning to read, the Japanese student must learn 19,000 Chinese characters.

"The Japanese child spends all his life trying to learn his own language."

He explained that math was a very difficult subject as the word you used depended on the objects you were counting.

He told of the young missionary who had been studying the language and was finally allowed to preach a sermon. Unfortunately, the young man used the wrong word for God. "He preached a great sermon on love of the turtle."

There is no dating, no courting and marriage is a business proposition arranged by a go-between.

"The individual in the old Japan had no liberty, no freedom. He could not choose his work, his school or his mate."

He explained that the family, rather than the individual, was the unit of society in Japan.

"Thank God every day of your life that you were born in America and remember that your blessings did not come without a price. Many gave their lives that you might enjoy your freedoms," Dr. Chapman concluded.

ACP Application Change Told

A change in the manner of handling ACP applications for 1962 from prior years was announced this week.

The sign-up will begin Dec. 1 and continue through Dec. 15, for the first quarter of 1962. All persons signing an application between these dates will have equal opportunity to receive payment for ACP practices, regardless if they sign up Dec. 1 or Dec. 15. All money available for this quarter will be distributed between all persons signing during this period.

The county committee has adopted this policy in order to prevent large crowds on sign-up day and to give each producer in the county an equal opportunity for receiving assistance on ACP practices.

The practices remain the same as in prior years with the exception of spreading cotton burrs and listing. The cotton burr practice will be eligible for payment only if the burrs are applied to cotton land or to bare land and are left on the land and not turned under. Listing will be eligible for payment only on dry land which is listed on the contour.

19 Varieties Of Corn Tested

Nineteen varieties of corn were tested at the High Plains Research Foundation in the 1961 season. The varieties were planted April 18 and fertilized at planting time with an application of 225 pounds of 13-39-9 per acre. The fertilizer was placed about four inches to the side of an four inches below the seed at planting time. A sidedress application of Uran at 57 pounds of nitrogen per acre was applied May 12 and an additional 40 pounds per acre was applied June 9. Five irrigations of 3 1/2 inches each were applied during the growing season.

Dr. Earl H. Collister, chief agronomist conducted the tests, assisted by Paul M. Belcher. All plots were harvested by hand during the period from Oct. 2 to Oct. 6.

The first nine varieties were equal in yielding ability. The yields of shelled corn at 14 percent moisture follows: P.A.G. 10185, 168.73; Asgrow, 300, 167.17; Texas 28, 160.25; P.A.G. 485, 158.16; Asgrow 500, 154.23; Texas 26, 150.45; Steckley 30-B, 149.92; Texas Experimental 6006, 148.90; Funks, G-711AA, 148.68; Asgrow 105W; Texas 36, 144.48; Texas 30, 144.19; Steckley 15-B, 141.23; Texas 34, 136.59; P.A.G. 436, 136.36; Texas 17W, 135.77; Texas Experimental 5803, 126.22; and Texas Experimental 5925, 112.37 bushels.

Cotton Vote Slated Dec. 12

The referendum on the 1962 crop of upland cotton to determine whether marketing quotas will be in effect on the crop has been set for Dec. 12 from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m.

If more than two-thirds of the farmers voting over the nation approve marketing quotas, penalties will apply on farms having excess cotton acreage in 1962 and price support will be available to cooperators within the range of 65 to 95 percent of parity, the exact level to be announced later.

If more than two-thirds of the farmers voting do not approve marketing quotas, there will be no penalties on 1962 crop cotton and price support to cooperators will be at a rate equal to 50 percent of parity.

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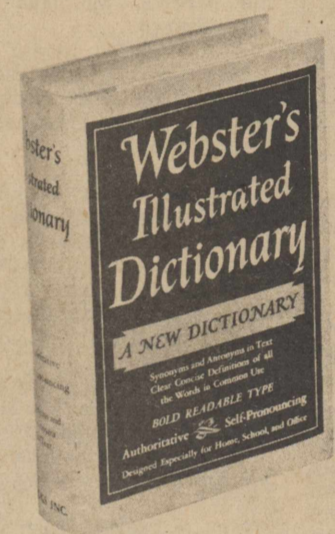
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
