County Divorce Rate Low

Marital Ties Are Stronger Locally

(Special to the Enterprise) NEW YORK, Dec. 28-- In it is in most sections of the United States.

Local residents, once they get married, tend to stay that way. So the statistics indicate.

It has not increased the way it has done nationally, where the ratio has more than doubled in the last ten years.

The importance of an examination of our divorce rate was brought out last month at the 50th anniversary meeting here of the Family Service Association of America.

The association called family breakdown the number one social problem in the United States. At the present time, it pointed out, there is one divorce for every four new marriages. And, along with it, we now have a delinquency rate that is triple with what it was

In Lamb County, the Census Bureau figures reveal, 30 out Lamb County, marriage is a of every 1,000 people over the more permanent institution than age of 14 are divorced or separated. This does not include those who remarried after having been divorced.

The rate compares favorably with that in the rest of the United States, where it amounts

The actual count shows, for Lamb County, a total of 117 divorced women and 148 divorced men.

In addition, the Census Bureau lists 89 women and 84 men who are separated from their spouses, legally or otherwise, because of marital dis-

"Behind these statistics," states the Family Service Association, "are not only individuals, but whole groups of people--families--which are blight-

"This disease of society requires a 'cash program' whose goal would be to inform the public of the enormity of the problem and to seek its support in a plan of education and prevention."

Just such a program will be undertaken shortly by the Department of Health, Education and Welfare, with a fund of \$350,000 at its disposal.



Record Of 1958 Already Beaten

Olton news events of 1961 ranged over a wide field, but the biggest newsmaker of them all was the area's fabulous,

record-setting cotton harvest. The big story, in the making ever since farmers planted last spring, was a grand total of 43,237 bales weighed in as of late Wednesday.

The six gins serving the Olton area (including the two at Circle) reported 38,649 bales ginned at 5 p.m. Wednesday. Another 4,588 were on the yards. The total assured the Olton area of its biggest cotton

crop ever. The previous record was 43,222 bales, ginned There's more to that story, however, that will be com-

At least five per cent of the crop---possibly 10 per cent--is still to be harvested. The total for this year apparently

will flirt with the 50,000 mark. Ginnings in 1959 were about 33,000 and in 1960, about 37,000. Moneywise---based on a \$140 per bale average--- the 1961 crop will mean almost \$7,000,000 to the Olton area. While the cotton crop was the big story, Olton had plenty of other kinds of news-making events in 1961. Here's a

Burrow; A "freedom seminar" got underway; Blue Notes, OHS stage band, was judged outstanding stage band in Class AA in a meet at WTSC; Dr. Leon Hill, Amarillo humorist, spoke at the annual Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture banquet; Sign-up for Olton's paving project began; Truitt Sides was named Olton's "Man of Year" at the C-CA banquet; Olton Enterprise purchased new type of printing machines; Olton school trustees approved the schools' \$14,871 share of the city's paving program; City Council took under advisement a proposal to establish a curfew law for teenagers here; Olton FFA, 4-H and FHA youngsters took all major championships at the Lamb County Junior Livestock Show; The 16th annual Olton stock show auction set a record total of \$12,014.55; Jimmy Tollett exhibited the grand champion steer; Grand Champion Barrow was exhibited by Robert Struve, Grand Champion Lamb was shown by Jarold Simmons, in the Gilt Show, Don Blades exhibited a Duroc to the championship for his brother, Kenneth and Gary DeBerry showed the Grand Champion Heifer; Louis Schreier, 69, died.

How To Raise Delinquents

Taken from the Lions Club magazine this month, comes the following rules on how to raise delinquents. I came from the Houston Police Department. The rules are:

1. Begin with infancy to give the child everything he wants. In this way he will grow up believing the world owes him a 2. When he picks up bad words, laugh

at him. This will make him think he's cute. It will also encourage him to pick up "cuter" phrases that will blow off the top of your head later.

3. Never give him any spiritual training. Wait until he is 21 and then let him decide for himself.

4. Avoid the use of the word "wrong." It may develop a guilt complex. This will condition him to believe later, when he is arrested for stealing a car, that society is against him and he is being pers-

5. Pick up everything he leaves lying around -- books, shoes and clothing. Do everything for him, so that he will be-

come experienced at throwing all responsibility on others.

Let him read any printed matter he can get his hands on. Be sure the silverware and drinking glasses are carefully sterilized, but let your child's mind feast on garbage.

7. Quarrel frequently in the presence your children. It will keep them from becoming too shocked when the home breaks

8. Give the child all the spending money he wants. Never let him earn his own. Why should he have things as tough as you had them?

9. Satisfy his every craving for food, drink and comfort. See that every sensual desire is gratified. Denial may lead

to harmful frustration. 10. Take his part against neighbors, teachers and policemen. The are all prejudiced against your child.

11. When he gets into real trouble, apoligize for yourself by saying, "I never could do anything with him."

12. Prepare for a lifetime of grief. You'll probably have it.
