Norfleet, who has been executive vice-president and managing officer of the bank the past 13 months, purchased a majority interest in the institu-

Yates, who said he will devote his time to other interests, has disposed of his

stock. In the transaction, control of the institution was acquired by Norfleet and Frank Cornelius.



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



#### Unemployment **Pay Benefits** Are Extended

LITTLEFIELD - The payment of temporary extended unemployment compensation benefits which is scheduled to begin in Littlefield Wednesday, April 12. will potentially affect some 600 individuals in this area who have already exhausted their unemployment insurance benefits under the regular program, T.R. Jewell, Jr., manager of the Texas Employment Commission office said this week.

"This does not mean," Jewell said, "that all of these people will ne eligible for the extended benefits. Many of them have already found jobs, some of them have retired, some have left the area, and some will not be eligible for extended benefits.

In fact, he said, "It is my guess that not more than 50 per cent of the potential claimants will file. In addition to this, many of those who file will not be entitled to the full twelve weeks Maximum provided for in the agreement, nor will they be entitled to the

Aten explained that these rules apply only to producers who participate in the program. Farmers who do not participate may set up their grain and corn acreage any way they want to, however they will not be eligible for price supports. Aten last week announced that \$399.50 the grain sorghum yield average for Lamb County has been set at 2,430 pounds per acre. On corn, the figure is 62,2 bushels





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
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
