Farm Planning Service

Many farmers have requested special technical help in planning and applying adequate soil and water conservation practices on their farms.

However, many other far-mers do not realize this serice is available or that conservation of soil and water is a science which should have as a base careful planning before application begins.

Some conservation practices must be applied in accordance with the best known scientific and technical standards if they are to do the job which they were intended, Some people still think of soil conservation in terms of using certain individual practices without proper consideration of other supporting measures that may be required to make the conservation program economical and

practical. It takes skill to conserve the soil and water on most farms in the District. For an individual practices the only skill that may be needed is that which would be used in carrying out an ordinarily good farm business, but the proper use of many conservation practices with a combination of several soil types requires technical skill and training in en-gineering, agronomy, biology, hydrology, soil science and other scientific fields.

The over-all job of conservation involves such complex pin fitting. problems as wind and water erosion control, water conservation both natures water and irrigation water, improvement of soil fertility and physical condition, range and pasture improvement and conserva-





The U.S. department of Agriculture today announced dates and other general provisions

for price-support operations. Support prices for soybeans was announced March 22 at national average of \$2,30 per bushel. The soybean support price was increased 45 cents from the level in 1960 to gear production of this important oil crop into the 1961 feed grain program and to meet

Soybeans must grade No. 4 or better and contain not more than 14 percent moisture to be eligible for support. They must also be in adequate storage. In addition, soybeans to be eligible for 1961 support must be grown on farms where 1959-60 average acreage of conserving and idle land has been maintained. This requirement is designed to insure that increases in soybean production will come from acreage that has been used for crops that are in abundant supply such as wheat, cotton, corn, grain sor-
