It is a drastic change from previous regulations, under which the farmer was restricted to an index given him by the ASC. Under the new ruling, the farmer can produce the average of his 1959-60 crops, so long as he can prove the amount of production he

> "We've had quite a rush ever since the announcement," said Aten. About 50 farmers showed up Monday and Tuesday with proof of higher production than the amount alloted them.

Sign-up in the feed grains program began Monday and will continue to May 31. Farmers have until May 15 to appeal the allotments sent them late

last week by the ASC. "Some farmers are bringing in settlement sheets from their grain production in 1959 and 1960, to prove that their production was higher," Aten said.

# To Add Few ORC Open House, Golf Set More Units

City councilmen Wednesday afternoon gave the go-ahead on 10 more units of paving, bringing the total number of blocks released to the contrac-

tor to 52. In doing so, the council approached the end of the line on the amount of money the city has left to spend on its

part of the project. Wednesday afternoon's session was a special meeting, called in an effort to keep actual construction going.

Hodges and Tierney Co., Lubbock contractor, already had completed curb and gutter work on 46 blocks previously released by the council.

Word came from the contractor Wednesday afternoon that the entire paving project probably can be completed in the next 30 to 45 days, barring bad weather.

Of the \$80,000 authorized by Olton voters last September for the city's share of the program, about \$7,000 remains for allocation in the project, the council was told Wednes-

Engineer's estimate of the amount of city participation money authorized so far comes to about \$67,000. Another \$6, 000 was set aside for seal

**Texas Farmer** 1960 Income Over 2 Billion

The 1960 estimated cash income to Texas farmers and ranchers amounted to \$2,209, 219,000, the third straight year in which total income was well in excess of the two billion dollar level.

At the same time, 1960's total income was down 3.2 per cent from 1959, which came out at \$2,300,906,000.
Income in 1960 from all crops

amounted to \$1.2 billion, while income from livestock was a little over \$1 billion. This represented an increase in livestock receipts over the \$895, 261,000 realized in 1959. But it was not enough to offset the drop from \$1,405,645,000 for all crops in 1959 down to \$1,200,000,000 in 1960.

The increase in cash income the result of 24 per cent increase in cattle marketing in the past year. 1960 over 1959. Average prices for cattle were down about 16 per cent, but heavier marketings more than offset the drop in prices.

Shrinkage in farm cash income for crops was due largely to the drop in proceeds from cotton and cottonseed. Farmers received 15.9 per cent less for their smaller cotton crop in 1960. Farm cash income for cottonseed was 15.3 Approximately 26 pastors atper cent less in 1960 than in 1959.

However, there was a spect-acular increase in income for Texas wheat growers, which gained 27.6 per cent in 1960 over 1959. Income for wheat in 1960 was \$135,475,000, compared with the 1959 income of \$106,205,000. At the same time, income from sorghum grain dropped six per cent,

Voluntary reductions up to 40 per cent are encouraged for growers with bases of 100 acres or more. Growers with bases of 25 acres or less may retire the total under the program.

Q. What advantages are offered to cooperating farmers? A. Cooperating farmers will be eligible for support prices -1.88 cwt. on grain sorghums, \$1.20 per bushel on corn, 92 cents per bushel on barley, 62 cents for oats and \$1.02 per bushel for rye. These figures are all national averages. The non-cooperator will not be eligible for price support on any of these crops. His productions would have to move at market prices.
