

It's No Time To Stay At Home

MANY VOTERS probably find neither William A. Blakley nor John Tower to their liking.

That's probably the case with many who consider themselves liberals, for both Tower and Blakley call themselves conservatives.

So what should the liberal do, "go fishing" on election day?

We will advocate many things in The Enterprise, but we'll never urge voters to stay home.

The man who stays home is saying, in effect, that he doesn't give a darn about his right to vote.

This sort of person unwittingly works against his country. It is this kind of apathy, disinterest, complacency that has. allowed the Communists to take county after country in their march toward taking the world.

Republican Or Not, Tower's The Man

WE CAME OUT for Tower in the first vote, and we've been called "Republican" by some.

One man told me I was like the fellow who was called a "tobacco-chewin' Republican SOB."

The fellow is supposed to have answered: "You know, I couldn't say a thing, 'cause there I was with that wad of tobacco in my mouth."

I've been called worse, but I deny being a Republican. I still consider myself a Democrat, but I don't go along with people who say you always ought to vote for the party.

You can't tell, the party might come along with something you can't stomach.

All of this brings me around to saying that I'm still for Tower. Nothing has happened to make me change my mind.

Party Not Only Issue Involved

BILL BLAKLEY found out a long time ago that he coundn't make it in politics on his own.

His personal appeal never will be enough to get him elected, and I think he realizes it. He now is running his campaign on the idea of "Look at me, I'm a Democrat, and all these other good Democrats are for me."

It seems to me that Texas voters are realizing, in increasing numbers, the futility of blindly following the leadership of the Democratic party in the hope that one day they will return to the principles of constitutional goverment from which they have strayed so far.

Blakley says he wants to "preserve our Texas-type of conservative Democratic principles."

If they are the principles represented by such Texas Democrats as Lyndon Johnson, Sam Rayburn and Ralph Yarborough, then I want no part of them.

Texas Needs A Conservative Voice

IN MY OPINION, Blakley's election as the candidate of the Democratic Party, with the support of its present liberal leaders, would be a serious handicap to his effectiveness as a conservative voice in the Senate.

This is no time for Texas to send a Democrat to Washington to whisper our opposition to the socialistic trends-which keep popping up in the capitol, day after day. It boils down to this:

We have two conservative candidates in the run-off. One of them, John Tower, has no political obligations to handi-, cap his efforts, and in addition possesses all of the qualifications requisite to a great career as a statesman. We think he merits our wholehearted support.

The fact that he is the candidate of the Republican Party is not a liability to his fitness to serve the best interest of Texas in the U.S. Senate.


He was in battles on Leyte, Okinawa, Aleutian Islands and Philippines. He was discharged Sept. 10, 1945.


