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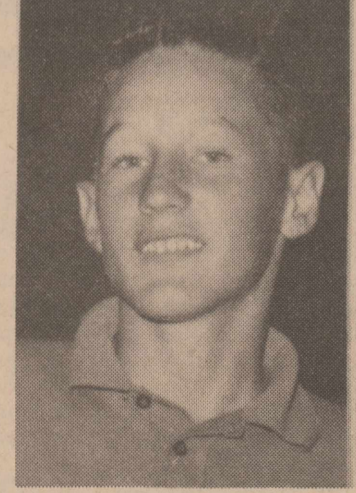
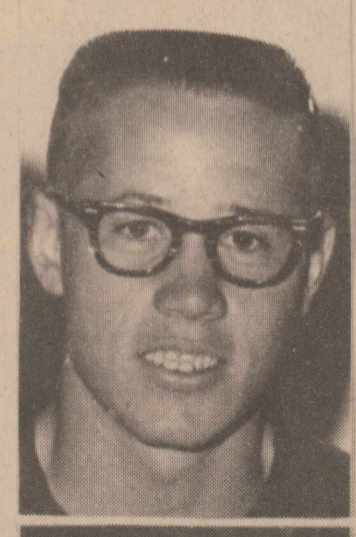
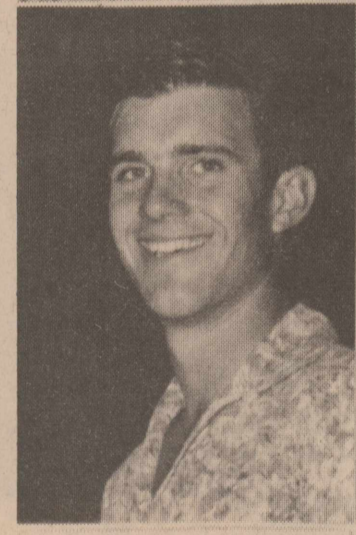

### Spoutin' Off Stickin' With Him

HOW DO YOU go about choosing between two men for public office when it appears, on the surface anyway, that both stand for about the same things?

That's the question being pondered by many Texas voters this week as they think on the election of a U.S. Senator for Texas at the polls next Saturday.

How do you decide?

Do you say to yourself—one's a Democrat and the other's a Republican and let it go at that, picking whichever one carries your standard?

Or do you say, "To heck with the party"?

**It's No Time To Stay At Home**

MANY VOTERS probably find neither William A. Blakley nor John Tower to their liking.

That's probably the case with many who consider themselves liberals, for both Tower and Blakley call themselves conservatives.

So what should the liberal do, "go fishing" on election day?

We will advocate many things in The Enterprise, but we'll never urge voters to stay home.

The man who stays home is saying, in effect, that he doesn't give a darn about his right to vote.

This sort of person unwittingly works against his country. It is this kind of apathy, disinterest, complacency that has allowed the Communists to take county after county in their march toward taking the world.

**Republican Or Not, Tower's The Man**

WE CAME OUT for Tower in the first vote, and we've been called "Republican" by some.

One man told me I was like the fellow who was called a "tobacco-chewin' Republican SOB."

The fellow is supposed to have answered: "You know, I couldn't say a thing, 'cause there I was with that wad of tobacco in my mouth."

I've been called worse, but I deny being a Republican. I still consider myself a Democrat, but I don't go along with people who say you always ought to vote for the party.

You can't tell, the party might come along with something you can't stomach.

All of this brings me around to saying that I'm still for Tower. Nothing has happened to make me change my mind.

**Party Not Only Issue Involved**

BILL BLAKLEY found out a long time ago that he couldn't make it in politics on his own.

His personal appeal never will be enough to get him elected, and I think he realizes it. He now is running his campaign on the idea of "Look at me, I'm a Democrat, and all these other good Democrats are for me."

It seems to me that Texas voters are realizing, in increasing numbers, the futility of blindly following the leadership of the Democratic party in the hope that one day they will return to the principles of constitutional government from which they have strayed so far.

Blakley says he wants to "preserve our Texas-type of conservative Democratic principles."

If they are the principles represented by such Texas Democrats as Lyndon Johnson, Sam Rayburn and Ralph Yarborough, then I want no part of them.

**Texas Needs A Conservative Voice**

IN MY OPINION, Blakley's election as the candidate of the Democratic Party, with the support of its present liberal leaders, would be a serious handicap to his effectiveness as a conservative voice in the Senate.

This is no time for Texas to send a Democrat to Washington to whisper our opposition to the socialistic trends which keep popping up in the capitol, day after day.

It boils down to this:

We have two conservative candidates in the run-off. One of them, John Tower, has no political obligations to handicap his efforts, and in addition possesses all of the qualifications requisite to a great career as a statesman.

We think he merits our wholehearted support.

The fact that he is the candidate of the Republican Party is not a liability to his fitness to serve the best interest of Texas in the U.S. Senate.

## Clark Elected Superintendent

Johnny R. Clark, superintendent of schools the past three years at Wilson, was named today as Olton's new superintendent, succeeding Joe Harper.

Clark, 34, will assume the Olton post July 1, the day Harper's resignation is effective, according to an announcement made this morning by Gilbert Roberson, president of the school board.

Roberson said Clark will be signed to a two-year contract calling for a salary of \$9,000 per year.

"The board was unanimous in its selection of Clark," Roberson said.

Olton trustees began the search for a new superintendent two weeks ago. Harper resigned to take a similar post at McKinney.

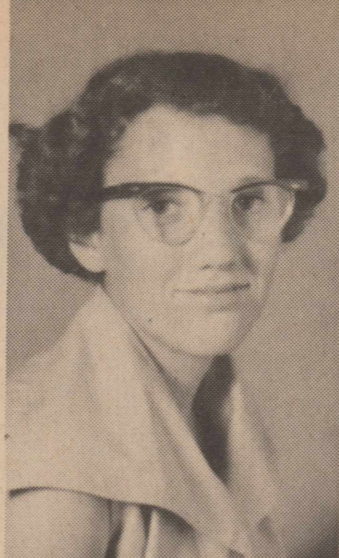

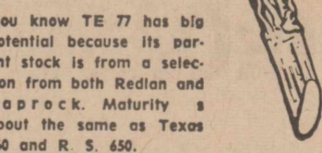

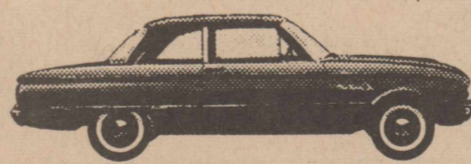

Although Howard spends his winters at Corpus Christi and his summers in Colorado he still calls Olton his home and has a farm about two miles south of town.

Wherever the Howards go, he just naturally eyes every piece of wood as a potential cane. If it shows any promise, he starts to work.

Howard tells this story of getting interested in cane making:

"About 30 years ago we were up in the mountains near Crede and I got to looking at a pine tree. All of a sudden I thought that if I had a piece of wood like the top of the tree I was looking at that I could make a good cane."

Why did he want to make a cane? "I just wanted to. That's all," Howard explains.

So the Howards drove out of the national forest and Howard got himself a hunk of tree top just like the one he had seen near Crede.

He made his first cane and hasn't been able to stop since. "I make them out of all kinds of wood and all I use is a hatchet, saw, rasp and sand paper," he said.

**Sides Tells Of Testimony At Hearing On Sugar Beets**

"We believe in the philosophy that the American should definitely grow more of our domestic sugar,"

Thus began the statement of Truitt Sides, representing the Olton Sugar Beet Assn., as he testified last week before the Agriculture committee of the House of Representatives in Washington.

In telling the story of his trip to Washington at the Lions Club Tuesday, Sides said congressmen with whom he met were not optimistic but he added: "I believe we will get sugar beet acreage...probably not in 1962, but we will get it."

He commented that only 45% of the sugar used in the US is produced domestically.

Sides was in Washington, along with representatives from other areas, trying to get legislation to allow sugar beet plants to be built in this country. This would give farmers a market for the crop.

"We see no reason economically or politically," the Washington statement continued, "why the American farmer should not be given this opportunity."

"We feel that we could better utilize our water that is being pumped out from underground with sugar beets than we can with grain crops that are now being subsidized."

Sides' statement, which was written into the Congressional record, gave a brief description of Lamb County farming and emphasized:

"Sugar beets for our area would not only be a top producing cash crop, but its by-products yield a highly nutritious feed for livestock and

this being fed along with existing grain and alfalfa hay can produce beef, mutton and lamb at a very low cost."

Sides concluded, "...sugar beets would help to put some... people back to work... as it takes more hand labor to raise and harvest sugar beets than grain sorghum."

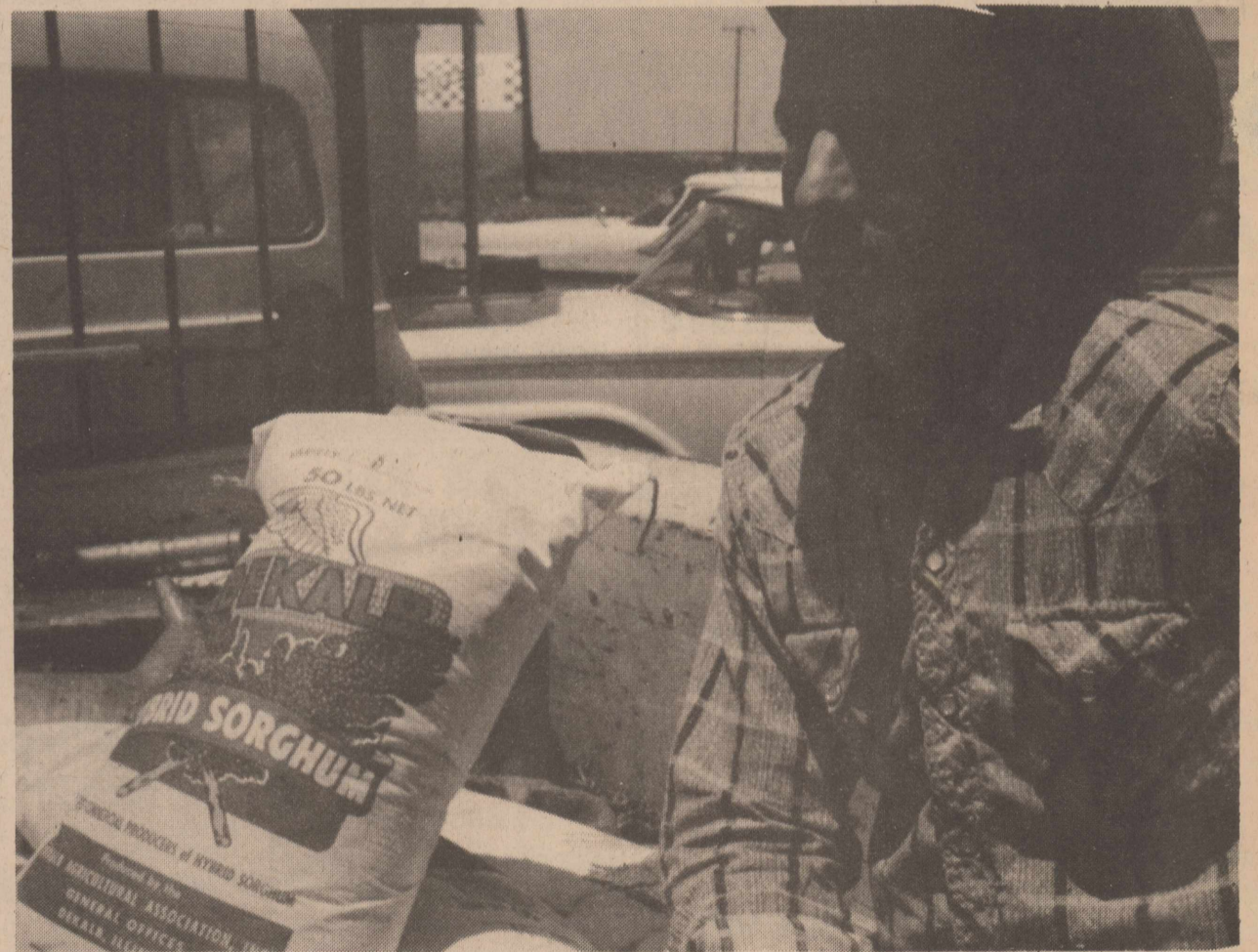
