## FFA Takes National, State Honors

### Chapter, 10 Boys To Get Top Awards



All nine Olton FFA boys who applied will be awarded Lone Star Farmer degrees, another will receive the coveted American Farmer degree, and the Olton chapter will be awarded a gold medal as a "superior" state chapter.

Announcement of the honors came this week from vocational agriculture instructors Calvin Horn and Max Malone.

Lone Star Farmer degrees and the chapter award will be given next Wednesday at the 33rd annual State FFA Convention at Dallas.

The Olton chapter had the highest number of Lone Star Farmers selected in Area I. It will be the second largest number to receive the degree from OHS. The most to ever win the award in one year were 17.

Twenty-one-year-old Dewey Hukill, a 1958 OHS graduate who now resides in Lubbock, will receive his honor at the National FFA Convention at Kansas City, Mo., in October. He was the fourth Olton boy to win the national FFA title. Others are Wayne Bodkin, Bobby Johnson and Royce McFadden.

Receiving state degrees at Dallas will be Ronnie Smith, Kenneth Blades, Eddie Carson, Layton Covington, Gary Johnson, Donald Oursbourn, Randolph Schaefer, Fred Riney and Jerry Thomas.

The boys, accompanied by Malone, will leave next Tuesday for the three-day state convention, July 19-24.

From the 101 schools in Area I, which includes from the Oklahoma Panhandle through Lubbock County, 85 boys were approved for the state degree from 119 applicants. There are 10 FFA Areas in Texas with about 820 boys winning the top honor.

To be a Lone Star Farmer, a boy must have completed or be planning to enroll in his third year of vocational agriculture. He also must have earned over \$500 from FFA projects.

"To make Lone Star Farmer, a boy must not only have an outstanding FFA record, but be a good leader with a high scholastic average," said Horn.

All ten boys have won top honors showing livestock at various FFA shows, and several have served on winning FFA judging teams.

Outstanding crop programs also have been conducted by the boys.

Last year Olton FFA Chapter also won a gold medal state achievement award. Horn commented that "the nine Lone Star Farmers helped win this award."

Smith, Blades, Carson, Johnson, Schaefer and Oursbourn will be seniors in OHS next fall. Covington, Riney and Thomas were graduated this year.

Some of the other towns in Area I that have Lone Star Farmers this year are Dimmitt, Hart, Littlefield, Tulia, Hereford, Kress, Sudan, Friona and Hale Center.

Hukill, who received his Lone Star Farmer degree in 1958, was awarded the same year the Anderson-Clayton scholarship, which goes to the boy with the best cotton project in the state.

Schaefer and Smith both will receive their Lone Star Farmer degrees this year. Smith's parents are Mr. and Mrs. Fred Smith. Schaefer is the son of Mr. and Mrs. R.W. Schaefer. The officers were elected in May.

He had extensive cotton and grain sorghum projects and farmed a year after graduation from OHS. He attended Texas Tech a year, transferred to South Plains College a year, then returned to Tech, where he is a junior agriculture education major.

He helped organize Olton Swine Breeders Association. His parents are Mr. and Mrs. Paul Hukill. He married the former Miss Pat LaFrance in 1960.

Schaefer has shown swine throughout the state at stock shows and placed in several big shows. He showed steers

Burrus is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Paul Burrus. Carlisle's parents are Mr. and Mrs. Vernon Carlisle Jr.

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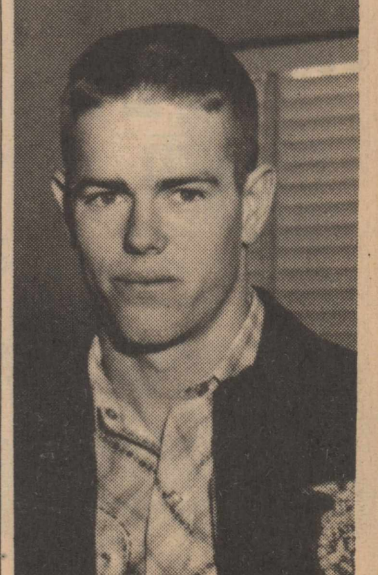

### Square Case To Court July 24

Olton Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture announced last Thursday at a board of directors meeting that the case concerning the old courthouse square property will be brought to court July 24 before District Judge E.A. Bills.

Dick Whiteley, chamber manager, made the announcement. The chamber this week presented a petition addressed to Judge Bills, asking the court to take immediate action to sell the property.

The chamber board also discussed the possibility of an airport being built in Olton.

The board has written the Federal Aeronautics Administration concerning the matter.

Percy Parson and James Hall went to the Post Office Real Estate Department at Lubbock Wednesday to discuss the possibility of building a new post office here.

Leaflets combating communism will be mailed to local residents by the OCCA, according to Whiteley.

A Farmers-Merchants Day will be sponsored by the chamber September 7. Town merchants will entertain area farmers with a barbecue.

### Bank Deposits Are Up Over Quarter Million

Deposits in the Olton State Bank totaled \$3,892,946.36 at the close of business June 30, the date of the second quarter bank call made by state banking authorities.

The 1961 deposits were more than a quarter million dollars over the total registered at the end of the second quarter in 1960.

Two more bank calls are required by law for the year and customarily come with the season on varying dates with the exception of the final call of the year which comes on Dec. 31.

The first quarter bank call, this year in April, showed an increase of \$138,959.79 over the first quarter call in 1960.

### Area Crops Thrive Under Sunny Skies

Hot weather may have made living a little uncomfortable for local residents the past two weeks, but area crops have thrived on the sunshine.

Farmers agreed that the warm weather is "just what the doctor ordered" to speed crops along.

Blooms are popping out in local cotton fields and cucumber harvest is just around the corner.

Clovis Poteet, manager of one cucumber processing shed here, said harvest should begin this weekend. There are 642

acres of cukes under contract in the Olton community.

Dick Whiteley, OCCA manager, said the Dalton Co. will set up its grader at Olton Co-Op Gin. Poteet, manager for Brown-Miller Co., will operate his processing shed at Straw Gin.

"This looks like the best cucumber crop we've ever had in this area," said Poteet.

"Cucumber prices are slightly higher than last year, and harvest will begin a little sooner," he added.

"This hot weather is just what cucumbers needed to really load

up," Poteet said.

Poteet operated a processing shed for corn here last summer, but said he doesn't plan to reopen the shed this year, because "very little corn is in the area."

Whiteley said J.F. Cole will be one of the first farmers under contract with the Dalton Co. to harvest cucumbers this year.

"I expect the first big day of harvest about July 17," Whiteley said.

L.A. Johnson, who completed potato harvest last week at his farm, reported a good yield from his crop. Marion Green began harvesting his potatoes last week.

Some of the farmers in the area with potato crops are J.T. Tollett, Clifford Carlisle and Vernon Carlisle Jr.

Most local farmers are shipping potatoes from the processing shed at the J.B. Williams farm.

### Speakers Discuss Project On Self-Feeder Cattle

Three speakers discussed Olton's self-feeder cattle project at the Olton Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture meeting last Thursday night.

About 30 farmers and local business men met in the Legion Hut to hear Grady Sheppard, who has a self-feeder cattle operation at Hale Center; John Seipert, extension service management specialist from Lubbock; and Dr. Byron Griman, feeds and management specialist from Lubbock, speak on the cattle project.

Griman recommended lots be built to contain from 50 to 200 cattle, with adequate space for each cow. He suggested pens be built on sloping ground so water can drain.

He also compared open-top feeding to the self-feeder plan.

Seipert estimated the cost of building a self-feeder operation for 100 cattle at \$13,552. In his speech, Griman estimated equipment costs and feed lot facilities.

Sheppard explained his self-

feeder operation at Hale Center and showed slides he had taken of similar operations in Illinois, Iowa, Alabama and Texas.

He said ensilage and burmuda grass are two of the best crops for cattle feed.

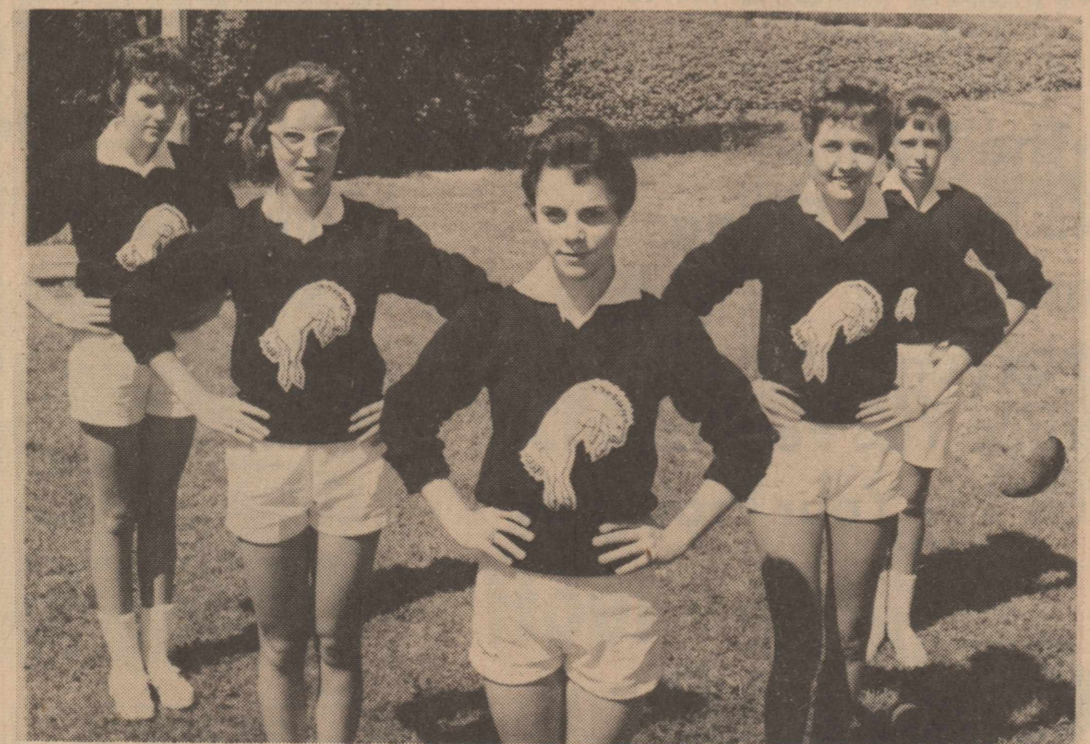
Olton's first self-feeder cattle demonstration was held last week by a committee of local men and Bill Kimbrough, Lamb County agent.

Twenty Whiteface heifers owned by Allen Johnson were weighed in and put on a self-feeder in a lot behind Sanders-Paris Co. on Hwy. 70.

The demonstration is being sponsored by Olton Farm Supply and the Ralston Pruina Company.

Efficient, fast-gaining cattle feeding is the goal of the project. The cattle will be weighed again July 31.

The OCCA will sponsor another meeting in the next two or three weeks, to explain the feeding operation to area residents interested in setting up a self-feeder cattle program, according to Whiteley.

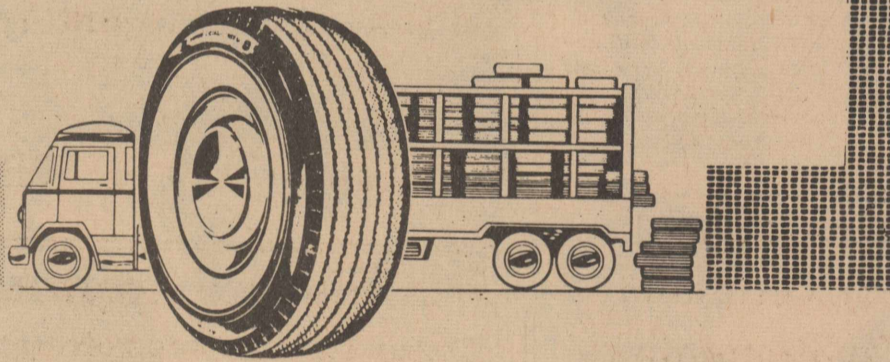

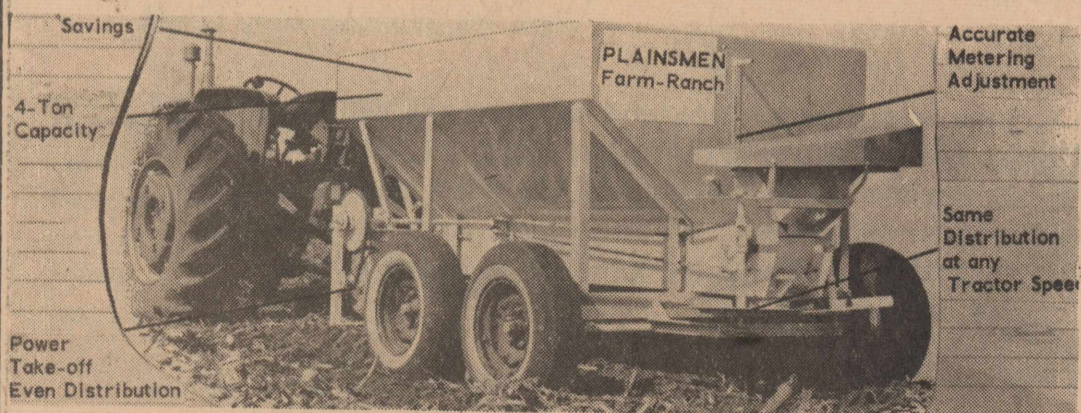

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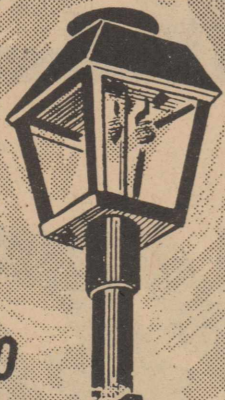
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## Women's Society At Nazarene Church Meets

**Dream Of Olton Youth Becomes Reality**

A lifelong dream became a reality for a twenty-one-year-old Olton youth, Don Hardy, in May of this year, when he completed building a race car. The project, which he began in October of 1960, took about eight months to complete, with Hardy working on the car about four nights a week. The class B gasser, a 1932 Ford with a 1960 model Chevrolet engine, is owned by Hardy and Kelly Chadwick, a coach from Hale Center who races the car. "Since I was old enough to drive, I wanted to build a dragster," said Hardy. "We've put enough money in the car to buy a new corvette," Hardy commented. Best time the gasser has turned is 101 mph in 13.40 seconds in a quarter mile. The world's record in the class is 107 mph in 12.75 seconds. The dragster won a trophy at the Amarillo dragstrip. The car also has raced at Hobbs, N.M., Wichita Falls and Pampa. Hardy plans to race the car

to Arizona and California later this month, and at the National Drag Races in Ft. Worth September 4. He said, "I think I have a good chance to win at the nationals." Each class winner will receive a new pickup and merchandise prizes there, according to Hardy. While building the dragster, Hardy consulted some of the top dragster engineers in the country, and drove hundreds of miles looking for parts. The car was repainted black and reupholstered. It has a 4-speed automatic transmission and the springs, axle and steering mechanism are chrome plated. Hardy said the car is built "from some of the best speed equipment you can buy." There are four classes of racing cars, stock cars, altered cars, roadsters, dragsters and gasers. Stock cars are raced just like they come from the factories. Altered cars have the fenders removed and modified motors. Roadsters have

the top removed and modified motors. Gasers have stock chassis with modified engines, and dragsters have no body, just a chassis and modified engine. Each class then is divided according to the weight of the car and the engine size. Hardy has started building two other race cars, but never finished them. He plans to build others. "The hobby of drag racing is getting more popular and spreading over the country every year," Hardy said.
