Old Hospital Will Be Razed

The long dispute over the old Olton Memorial Hospital and square is settled.

Three osteopathic physicians, Dr. Ben Souders, brothers Dr. Lynn and James Fite, have reached an agreement

after parting company more than five years ago. Settlement of the case was announced Monday by Dis-trict Judge E.A. Bills. This, in general, is the method agreed upon:

The Fite brothers will get the east two-thirds of the property, including the building and all contents except an x-ray machine, which goes to Dr. Souders. Dr. Souders will receive the west one-third of the prop-


Cattle Weighing Slated Monday

Settlement of the five-yearold dispute may have opened the door for location of a new post office for Olton on the square.

Olton Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture directors have favored the square as the site for the new office for several months

Dr. Fite said Wednesday he also will work toward that goal. An announcement made two months ago indicated that Olton is near the top of the list of towns slated for new post offices.

The Chamber of Commerce had urged the court only last month to take action to sell the square property so that it might be developed. The C-CA started a petition to that effect, saying that non-development of the property tended "to hinder the progress of Olton.

The court case was styled Dr. Ben Souders vs. Drs. James and Lynn Fite. Souders and the Fite brothers had been partners in operation of the osteopathic institution.

Dr. Souders moved out of the hospital in March of 1956, opening a Main Street office following personal disagreements between himself and Dr. James E. Fite.

The Fite brothers continued to operate the hospital until June of 1958. The hospital was closed at that time and Dr. James Fite moved to Muleshoe to open a practice. Dr. Lynn Howard Horne, master of Fite opened an office at 505 ceremonies, told the first meeting of a group of 23 conser-Ave. E.
