Weldon Schaefer, son of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Schaefer of Springlake, is attending Lehigh University, Bethlehem, Penn., doing graduate work toward his PHD in Chemistry.

He was graduated from Olton High School in 1955 and received his Bachelor of Science Degree from Texas Tech in 1959, majoring in Chemistry.

Commissioned a Second Lt. in the United States Air Force, Schaefer was granted a deferment to do graduate work at Texas Tech.

Schaefer received his Master of Arts Degree in May of this year after working with Dr. Draper of the Chemistry Department at Tech and a fellowship from the Welch Foundation Grant to Texas Tech for Chemistry research the past two years.

At Lehigh University, Schaefer will be working with and studying under the head of the Chemistry Department, who is recognized as the authority in the nation on Surface Chemistry, Schaefer's chosen field.

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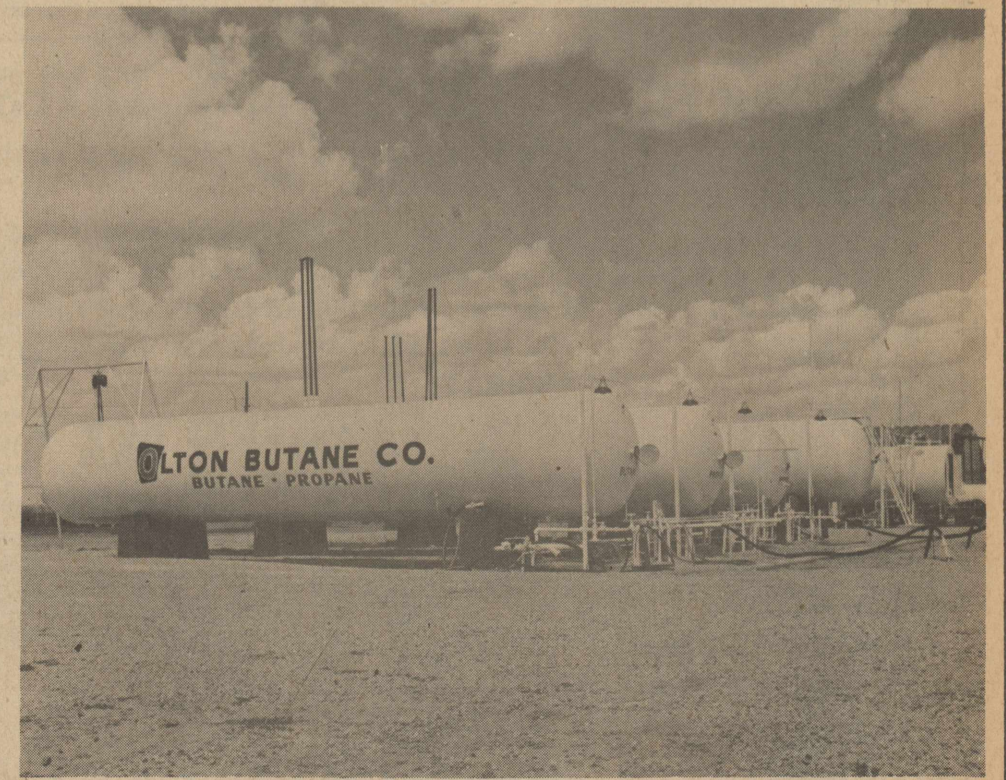
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Mrs. Salman Returns

There's just no place like home. . . .
Or so said Mrs. K. Salman when she returned Friday from a two month tour of her home country Beirut, Lebanon.
"It was such a nice trip. There was no trouble with the plane or anything, but I was just plain glad to get back home."
This was the first trip Mrs. Salman had made to the old country since coming to the United States ten years ago. In Choueifat, Lebanon Mrs. Salman spent her time "catching up" and visiting with her mother, Mrs. Rachid ElHalabi. There was also much visiting to be done with her five brothers and three sisters who live in other parts of Lebanon. Before leaving on the trip, Mrs. Salman had laughingly remarked, "I'll bet there'll be plenty of people to meet me." Sure enough, on her first night in Choueifat, she was honored by a large group of friends and relatives with a party.

"I had a lot of old friendships to renew," she explained.
When questioned about the country and its people, Mrs. Salman answered, "The people had not changed. The stores and other buildings are larger and more modern. They wear the same kinds of clothers you do and eat the same kind of food."
"Why, they even have hot dogs and hamburgers," she laughingly added.
For the scenery, Mrs. Salman seemed to have particularly enjoyed her visit in Da-

mascus and a ten day visit with one sister who lives on the shores of the Mediterranean Sea.
"I really like the jet ride, too," she added.
"It's just like you were home sitting in the living room chair! It doesn't make you sick at all."
Mrs. Salman traveled by jet both from Lubbock to Beirut and on the return trip.
"I went to Lebanon," she said, "and saw my family, but then I was plenty ready to come back home to Olton and the United States."

boil for 1 minute:
2 cups sugar
1/2 cup milk
1/4 cup butter
remove from heat and add:
3/4 cup peanut butter
3 cups oatmeal (minute oats) uncooked
3 teaspoons cocoa
1 cup pecans
vanilla

Mix well and pour onto waxed paper, press flat (about 1/4 inch thick) and let cool. Cut into squares when cool or drop by teaspoon while mixture is hot.

For variation omit cocoa for coconut. Makes about 2 1/2 dozen cookies.

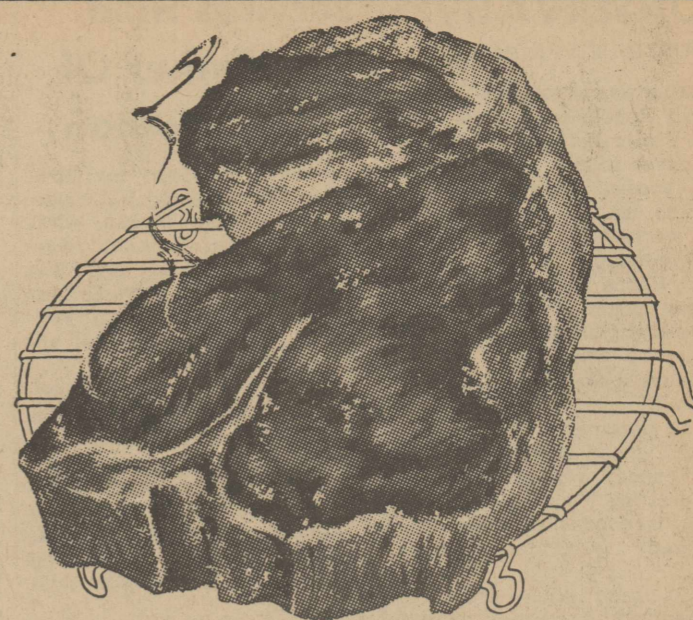

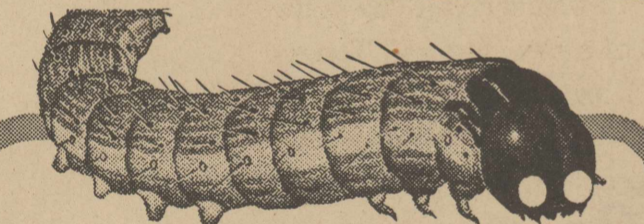
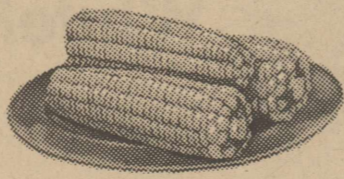
