



Just a little over a month ago, a man and his dog had a heart-warming reunion here.

"Red", an Alaskan sled dog, and Tom Ross, his master, got back together after the dog disappeared 10 days prior to the reunion.

Saturday morning, "Red" was found dead, the victim of a 22-caliber slug which entered his brain.

This week, Mr. and Mrs. Ross were trying to understand why someone would shoot the dog. They are anxious to learn who fired the shot.

The case also is of interest to Police Chief Emmett Burrows. He would like to know who is firing a .22 in the city.

'We want to put a stop to it before some person is hit by a bullet," said Chief Burrow.

The dog was found ded just outside the kitchen of Mr. and Mrs. Hoyt Paschal, mother of Mrs. Ross.

The Rosses, who are staying with the Paschals, are at a loss to explain why someone would kill the dog, who was chained to concrete blocks and apparently bothered no one. The shooting occurred about mid-morning Saturday. Earlier, "Red" had been fed and was in good spirits.

The Paschals and Mrs. Ross were home all morning, but they heard no shot. Possibly this was because they were watching TV and the noise of the shot blended in with the TV program.

The Rosses described "Red" as "friendly." He had been acquired by Tom when he was in Alaska.

A big dog, "Red" resembled a German Shepherd, He weighed about 65 pounds and was three years old.

FARM BUREAU.

WHAT IS IT?

Farm Bureau is a free, independent, nongovernmental organization of farm and ranch families united for the purpose of achieving collectively that which they cannot secure individually.

Farm Bureau is organized on the county, state and national levels. The Texas Farm Bureau, with 81,000 members, is affiliated with the American Farm Bureau Federation, largest farm organization in the world with more than 1,600,000 members in 49 states (all except Alaska) and Puerto Rico.

HOW ITS POLICIES ARE MADE

Farm Bureau policies are made at the "grass roots" level with each member given an opportunity to participate in policy development. Policies are not made by taking a poll. Instead, they are adopted after discussion, debate and exchange of ideas at county, state and 'national conventions. A majority vote is required for adoption of policies. Thus, Farm Bureau's policy-making process garantees that the majority shall always rule.

Food, Cars Take Half Of Lamb Retail Dollar

NEW YORK, - Just how the average Lamb County family spent its retail dollar during the past fiscal year, trimming on some kinds of purchases and expanding on others, is revealed in the latest market data findings. All th all, it appears county

All in all, it appears county residents did not becomeso disturbed at signs of the current recession as to curtail their purchasing generally. As a result, most retail lines stood up well.

Attending the quarterly Woman's Missionary Union Meeting at Anton Thursday were Mrs. Jack Moore, Mrs. Elmer Burleson, and Mrs. Blanton Martin. The details are from the comprehensive study of consumer buying made by the Standard Rate and Data Service on the basis of Federal, state and local reports. All sections of the country are covered.

The study shows that the nation's consumer, despite considerable unemployment, spent \$218 billion in retail stores in the year as against \$209 billion in fiscal 1959.

In Lamb County, a major portion of the retail dollar went for food and for automobile purchases and operation. This combination received 50 per cent of the dollar.

The total so-spent in county stores in the 12 month period was \$15,710,000.

A breakdown shows that \$6,854,000 of that amount was spent for food in the county This is exclusive of expenditures made in restaurants.

Dealers selling cars, trailers, boats and other automotive equipment of a nonindustrial nature had sales of \$6,900,000.

Gas filling stations accounted for an additional \$1,956,000 in the year.

The rest of the retail spending picture in Lamb County appears in the totals recorded by the other types of stores. Most of them compared well with the fiscal 1959 figures.

The principal ones, as shown in the SRDS reports, are: General merchandise stores, with a sales volume of \$1,689,000, apparel shops, \$1,362,000, home furnishings storeş, \$832,000, and drug stores, \$995,000.

The overall total of retail sales locally was \$31,260,000. It was equivalent to \$4,915 per household as against \$4,129 in the United States as a whole. According to a recent consumer-interview survey made by the University of Michigan, while people are uneasy about current business they are not alarmed. They are confident that an upturn is not too far away.




