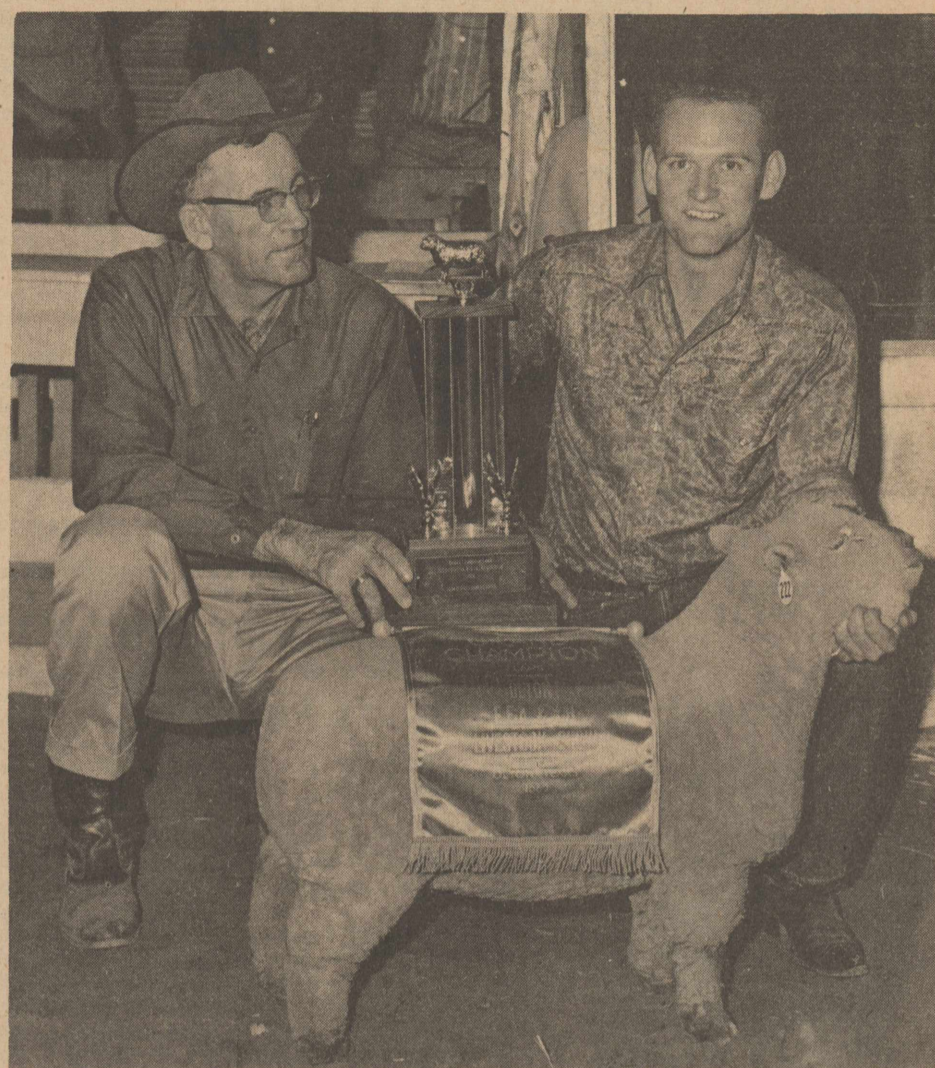

Deadline Is Saturday

No Candidates File For City Council Race

With Saturday set as the deadline in the city council election, no candidates had filed Wednesday for the three vacancies.

Terms of Lynn Fite, Clovis Poteet and C.A. Cox will expire.

Councilmen Cox and Fite have said they definitely will not seek re-election. Councilman Poteet has said he is undecided about running for re-election.

The election is set April 3 and, according to Mayor M.T. James, will be held, regardless of whether or not anyone files. James said the law requires that the

election be held and, if no one should file, the election would be conducted on a write-in basis.

Another election, for two places on the school board, is scheduled April 7. Fred Hicks and Roy Roberts, whose terms will expire, will both seek re-election. No other candidates had filed for the school board Wednesday. Deadline for filing is March 8.

The city election will be held at the city hall and the school board election will be held at H.P. Webb Elementary. Eldon Franks is presiding judge for both elections.

Legion Hut Repairs Done

"This town doesn't have to put up with a meeting place like this."

Butch Hudgens Shows Top Steer

Olton's 17th Annual Stock Show went into the history books this week as one of the most successful of them all.

Large crowds turned out for the two-day event, which ended Saturday with the biggest auction sale, volume-wise, in history.

Climax in the judging came Saturday afternoon, when an 844-pound Hereford calf exhibited by Butch Hudgens, 4-H youngster, was named the grand champion steer of the show.

Swine and Sheep were judged Friday, with a Poland China shown by Gary Johnson, FFA boy, named the grand champion barrow, and a Southdown exhibited by Charlie T. Burrus, FFA youth, winning the grand champion lamb award.

The champion steer sold at the auction for 75 cents a pound to Olton State Bank and Olton Grain Co.

Hart Grain Co. purchased Johnson's 199-pound grand champion barrow for 75 cents a pound.

Harvest Queen Mill of Plainview paid \$1.65 a pound for Burrus' champion lamb, which weighed 84 pounds.

The reserve grand calf, an Angus exhibited by Eddie Carson, FFA boy, brought 55 cents a pound from Thompson Chevrolet and Ed Thompson Implement.

Caprock Fertilizer of Littlefield bought the reserve champion barrow, a Berkshire shown by Randolph Schaefer, FFA, for 60 cents a pound.

The reserve grand lamb, a Southdown shown by Robert Duncan, was sold for \$1.25 a pound to Olton Butane Co.

Stock show officials said the animals consigned for sale in the show's auction brought a total of \$13,400—a new record.

Although prices failed to match those of some previous years, more animals went through the auction ring than ever before. Officials said 27 calves, 54 sheep and 75 hogs were sold.

Previous record sale was \$12,014, set after the 1961 show.

Grand Champion Gilt was a Poland China exhibited by J. Curtis Hall. Reserve grand gilt, was a Berkshire shown by Randolph Schaefer.

Trophies for the grand champion exhibitors were presented by Olton Farmers Union, Olton Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture sponsored trophies for Clean Pen and Showmanship awards. Olton Swine Breeders Assn. presented trophies for breed champions in that division.

The clean pen awards went to D. Oursbourn, steer division; Gary Dickenson, sheep division; and Junior Cordero.

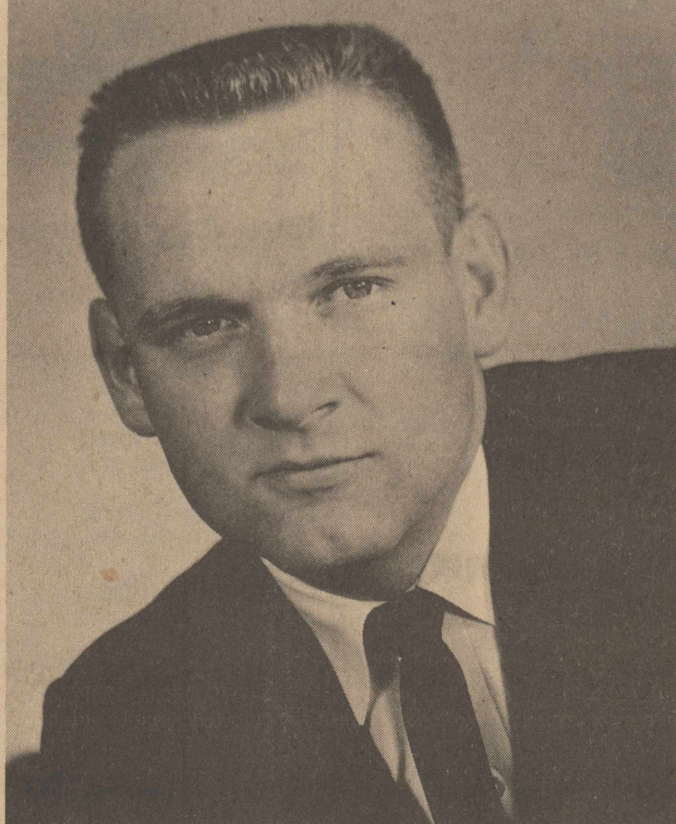

Government Spending

Government spending in the United States has grown so vast that in a 15-month period it would be sufficient to buy up everything that Soviet Russia produced in one year, including financing the Russian armed forces and all missile work, according to the Chamber of Commerce of the United States. In 1960, federal, state, and local governments in this country spent \$190 billion. The federal government alone accounted for \$130 billion.

Russian Gross National Product). The large size of government spending in this country is not generally known. For one thing, most people consider that the federal budget reveals all the federal spending. It does not. Omitted are tens of billions spent on highways, Social Security, and other programs not included in the budget.

Mrs. Eaton Announces For County Superintendent

The Olton Enterprise has been authorized to announce the candidacy of Mrs. Doris Eaton for the office of County School Superintendent, subject to the

Republican Party Primary on May 5. In making her announcement Mrs. Eaton released this statement:

"When I filed for a place on the ballot as a candidate for the office of County School Superintendent, I did so with the intention of immediately beginning proceedings to abolish the office entirely.

"The office of County School Superintendent is obsolete, an archaic holdover from the pioneer days. It is a needless drain on the taxpayers, and in the interest of economy, should be done away with.

"However, upon investigating further, I find this cannot be done as easily or quickly as I had first hoped. To abolish the office will require action by the State Legislature, since the civil statutes preclude abolition by petition of local voters.

"Therefore, I shall continue to actively campaign for the office, with the avowed purpose of implementing proceedings as

soon as possible to abolish the office.

"The office of County School Superintendent pays approximately \$8,000 per annum. This is an unnecessary drain on the taxpayers of Lamb County and can be eliminated, in the interest of governmental economy.

Economy in government must begin at the local level, and the abolition of the office of County School Superintendent is a prime example of how governmental economy can begin at home.

"During the interim period, while abolition proceedings continue, I shall work to the best of my ability to carry out the duties of the office, minor though they may be.

"I am a graduate of Texas Women's University, and have taught in public schools for 13 years. I have been a resident of Lamb County for 15 years, and in addition to my teaching duties, I am a housewife and mother. My family and I reside at 124 E. 15th in Littlefield.

"Your vote and support of my candidacy will be appreciated."

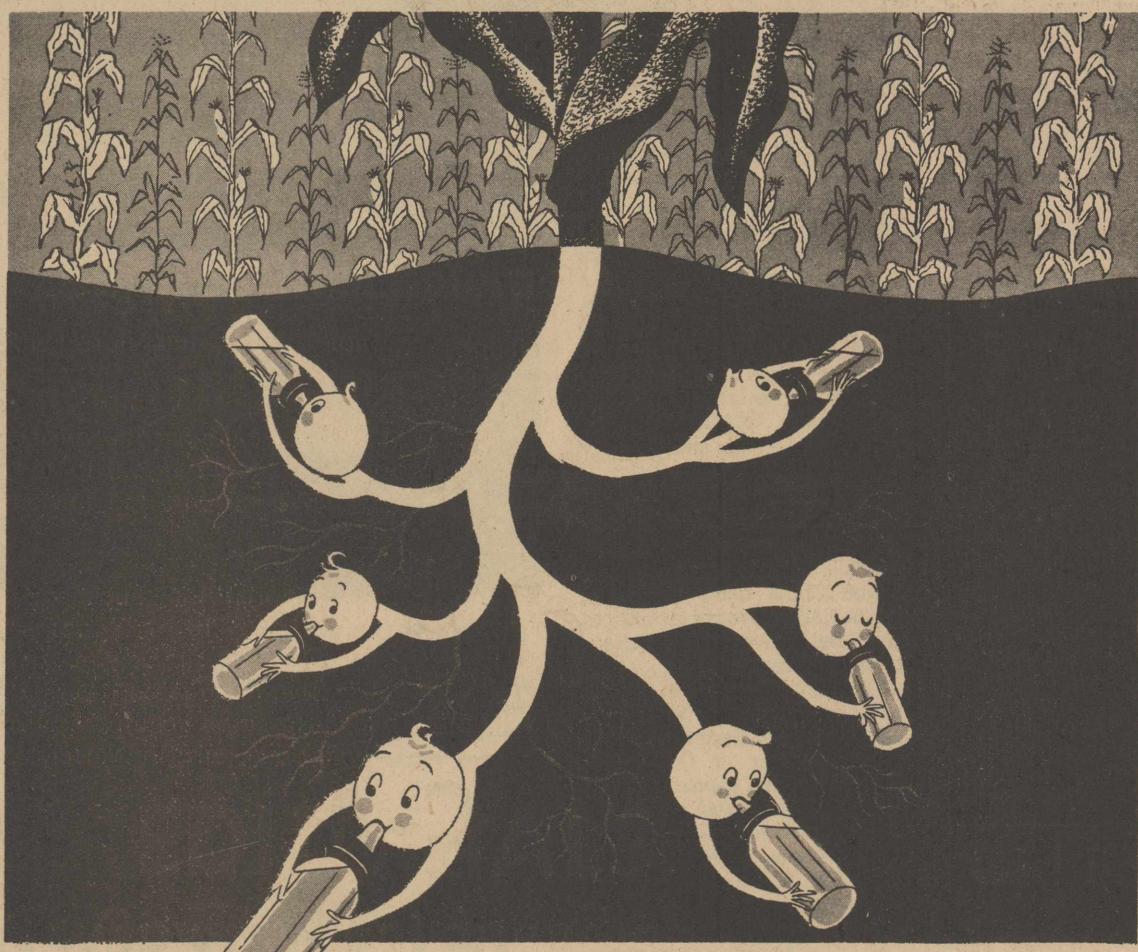

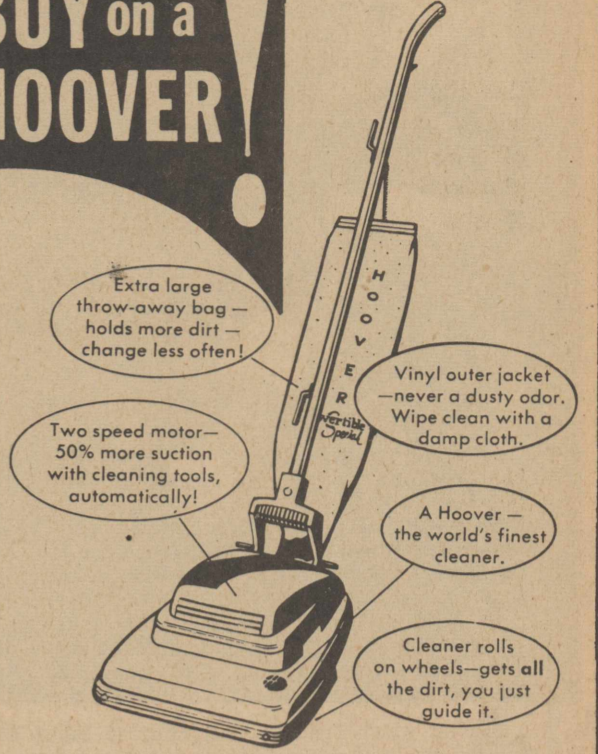

Junior Play Presented Monday

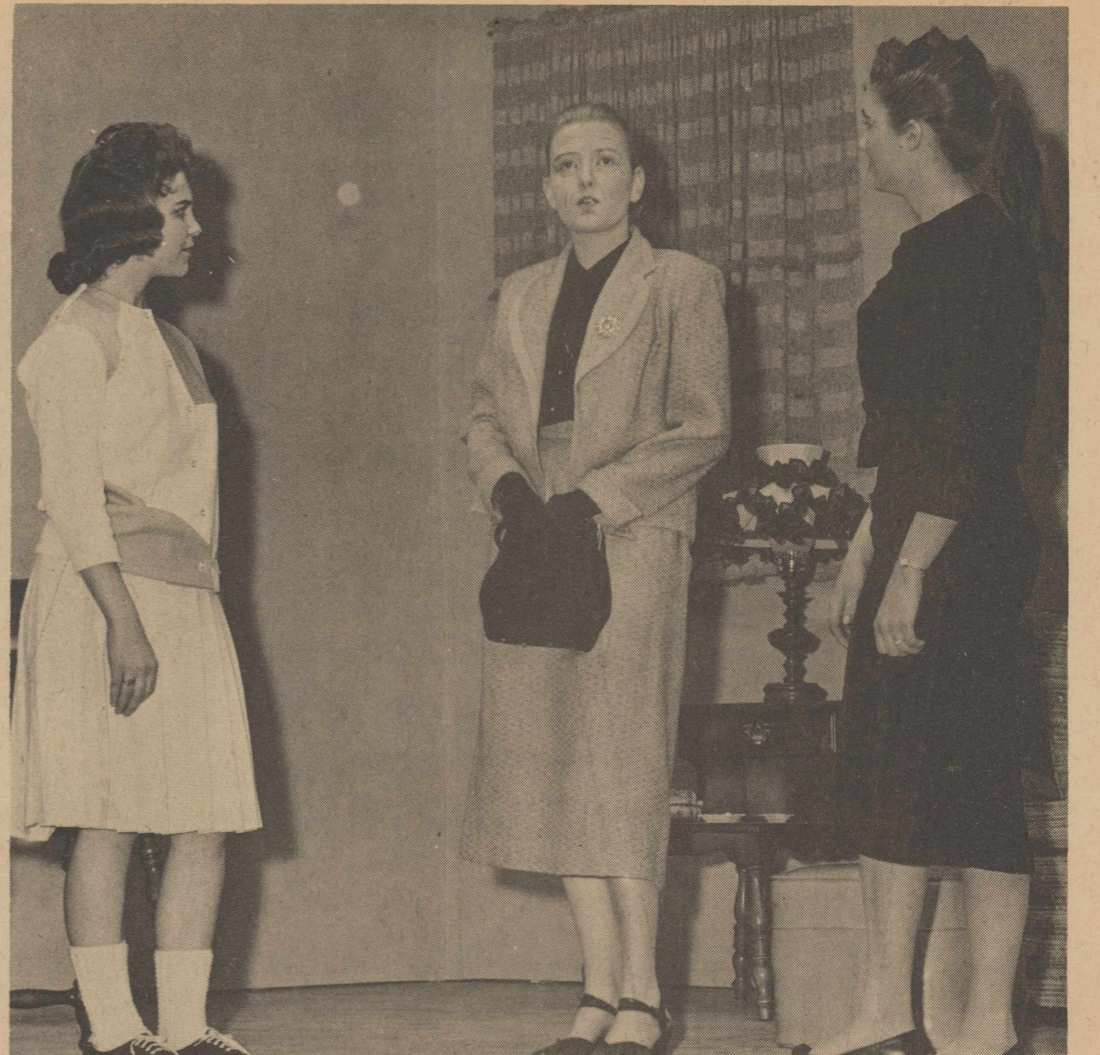

Tanya Bryant portrayed a breezy, talkative girl with an overwhelming fondness for dogs and Dana Speer played a professional model.

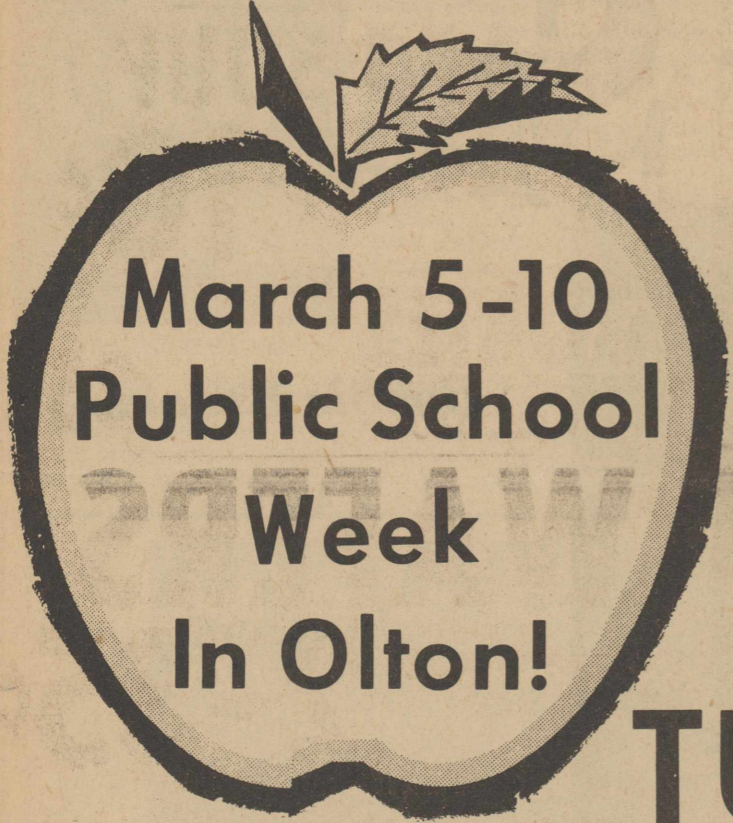

Nosebleed Treatment

How do you stop a nosebleed? Almost everyone has his own pet remedy. Remember the technique of inserting a wad of paper under the upper lip? And after awhile the bleeding stopped. Of course, the paper probably didn't really help and the bleeding would have stopped anyway.

Some people, particularly children, have frequent nosebleeds even though they have no serious disease. Small blood vessels under the delicate nasal lining may rupture easily, especially during violent exertion. Nosebleeds are common following a blow on the nose.

Exposure to high altitudes can cause nasal bleeding. Some diseases also are credited in nosebleeds. High blood pressure sometimes is to blame.

Loss of blood usually is much less than the victim thinks, and, unless bleeding persists, this loss usually isn't serious.

Several suggestions for treating nosebleeds are offered in the February issue of Today's Health, the magazine of the American Medical Association--

*Have the victim sit up unless he is faint.

*Apply large, cold, wet towels over the face, nose and back of the head and neck.

*Pinch the nostrils together.

The bleeding point is usually near the tip of the nose. He should not cough, blow his nose or walk about during or soon after a nosebleed. Even talking or laughing should be avoided. He should breathe through his mouth.

*If bleeding is severe or prolonged, call a physician.

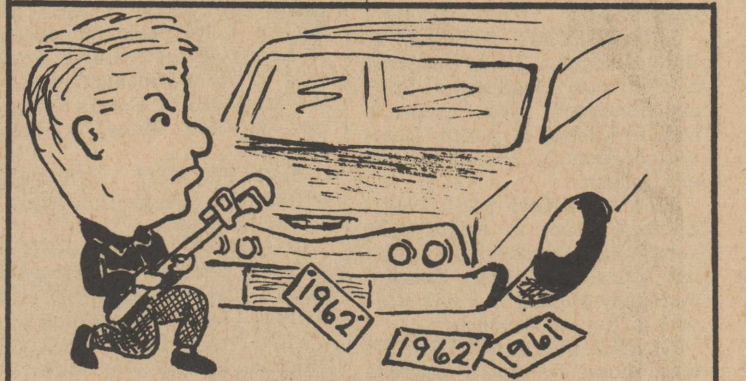

Agreement Revised

Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman has announced the updating and broadening of the agreement which provides the official basis for cooperation between the USDA and local soil conservation districts.

According to the announcement, the USDA is now ready to enter into this revised agreement which will offer help to districts "in conserving and improving soil, water, vegetation, wildlife and related sources, and in reducing damage by flood and sedimentation."

The new memorandum will be used with all newly formed districts. Agreements with existing districts will be renegotiated using the new document as rapidly as they wish to do so, the Secretary said.

Updating USDA's assistance to districts comes on the 25th anniversary of the district movement. In Texas, 182 soil conservation districts, including 98 percent of the state's privately owned agricultural and forestry land, have entered into agreements with USDA for help in conserving soil and water resources.

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Reporting Gross Income Is First Tax Return Step

Reporting your correct gross income is the first and most important item of business in preparing your federal income tax return.

As a general rule, gross income can be defined as the sum total of amounts received by you for your services, amounts which you received from others for the use of your property of money and the profit which you realize from the sale of your property.

While your gross income will normally result from cash re-

ceived in the form of wages or pay for your services, this need not be the case. Money, therefore, is not the sole medium of exchange used to determine the receipt by you of gross income. The fair value of property or services you received in return for your services and the use of your money or property must also be taken into consideration in determining your gross income. Thus, if your employer provides in your gross income the fair value of these items.

A person who receives a prize or contest award or who gambles and wins must include in his gross income the cash received and the fair value of items or services received. There are some items which would logically fall within the general rule which are specifically excluded from gross income by law. For example, if your employer requires that you be present on a 24-hour basis and provides you with a room or house on his premises, this amount does not constitute gross income. Similarly, if your employer gives you meals and requires that you eat on the premises, this amount would not constitute gross income to you.
