

## **Hunter Safety Course Has** Food, Fun and Education

Texas Parks and Wildlife law enforcement division is sponsoring weapons, a lot of challenge, and a its annual hunter safety class Friday and Saturday, March 28-29, at the Tulia VFW Hall. Hunters are and I have gone hunting for elk invited from Swisher, Briscoe, Hale, Castro and Floyd counties.

"Those born on or after September 2, 1971, must take a hunter safety course before they can legally hunt in Texas," said Audie Hamm, game warden serving this area. "You may know how to hunt after having been out with your dad for years, but you learn other things in these courses. People learn the ethics of hunting, safe weapons handling techniques, first aid, survival skills, and the hunter's role in maintaining a viable wildlife population."

Students will be exposed to a range of topics that will include primitive firearms that use black powder. In the last 20 or so years black powder weapons have gained many enthusiasts.

"These are very inexpensive lot of fun," Hamm said. "Game Warden Mark Collins of Plainview with black powder every year in Colorado that our names have been drawn. It's fun."

The deadline for owners or their appointed representative to make initial base and yield option selections for the DCP program is April 1, 2003. The deadline for program participants to sign-up for the 2002 and 2003 DCP program is June 2, 2003.

Both the initial base and yield option selection and the decisions to participate in the 2002 and 2003 DCP program can be completed at the same time.

The 2002 and 2003 DCP payments for the balance of the 2002 cylical advance payments and the advance for the 2003 direct payment will be processed as soon as sign-up is completed.

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
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# Congratulations to the One-Act Play Cast for Winning Zone and The Third Grade for Passing the TAKS test 100%!

smith, and a very good teacher," Hamm said. "He taught the course last year and did such a good job we are using him again. The kids liked him real well.

On Friday from 6:30 p.m. to 9:30 p.m. the class will discuss safe handling techniques for each class of modern firearms. They will cover revolvers, semi-automatic pistols, shotguns, rifles, Sharp's buffalo guns, and crossbow. Safe storage of ammunition and secure storage of weapons also will be discussed.

On Saturday the group will meet at 8:00 a.m. and finish about 4:00 p.m. Instructor will be Bill McCumbin of Amarillo, who is in charge of the Texas hunter education program for the northern Pan-

Archery instructors will be Jimmy Joe Johnson and Mike Culwell, both of Tulia.

"I believe we will have targets available for student archers. In the Panhandle, archery is growing in popularity and we want to see people get a safe start in the sport.'

Hamm and Collins will lead the portion of the course on black powder firearms. They will stress safe handling, loading, unloading and cleaning. "There is a lot to learning how to use a black powder firearm," Hamm said. "Improper handling and loading can lead to serious injury or death. Black powder is traditional in hunting as well as being an inexpensive hobby. Also, it opens a new avenue of hunting because in most of the state there is a separate season for black pow-

Part of the program will be a simulated hunting session for each student. They will use the new laser-shoot system from Texas Parks and Wildlife. There are seven in the state and this unit was obtained from Ballenger. It costs about \$13,500, and is not a computer generated video game. The machne uses video tape shot by New Mexico and Colorado fish and game departments.

The objective is to help students learn safe hunting skills in the area of target recognition.

'Most hunting injuries occur as a result of improper target recognition and hunter error," Hamm said. "They will have to identify the wildlife in the background. In some scenarios there are campgrounds, people, roads, vehicles and wildlife that is not in season. They will be able to hunt antelope, black bear, rocky mountain elk,

whitetail deer and wild turkey."

The shoot-no shoot decision is extremely important to anyone who handles weapons. Police, military and hunters all face the and identification of the target are essential, as is recognizing the hunter's own emotional state.

'Inexperienced hunters get trigger happy," Hamm said. "We hope that the class will make people aware of how easily mistakes can be made. Veteran hunters don't make those errors. We want to give hunters training that simulates experience in a safe environment."



"The U. S. dollar strengthens during wars as the world's investors seek safety, but after war it tends to weaken partially because wars usually increase U.S. debt and partially because foreigners repatriate currency to invest in their local markets," an industry observer said.

In other news, net export sales of U.S. cotton for the week ended March 13 totaled 358,300 bales, a 6 percent slip from the prior week's marketing year high but still 25 percent above the four-week average. Once again, China was the primary buyer for the week with purchases totaling 119,100 bales. Pakistan and Hong Kong rounded out the week's list of top three buyers of U.S. cotton with acquisitions of 41,600 and 39,600 bales, respec-


"Although we've had a larger amount of export sales recorded in a two-week period a number of times, this is the first time we've had over 300,000 bales twice in a row since the first two weeks in November 1990," a cotton market observer explained.

Export shipments for the week established a marketing year high at 265,700 bales. The figure was 5 percent above the previous week and 27 percent higher than the four-week average. Major destinations included Turkey, China and Mexico.

On the spot cotton scene, trading activity slowed. Online sales by Texas, Oklahoma and Kansas cotton producers for the week ended March 20 totaled 11,223 bales, a decrease from the previ-ous week when 14,842 bales changed hands. The average price received by producers selling their cotton online ranged from 47.71 to 51.24 cents per pound compared to the previous week's range of 48.14 to 49.21 cents per pound.


Meanwhile, the cotton market's focus now is shifting to plantings for the new season. There is anticipation of an abundance of new plantings because of the current higher prices, but the market is waiting for USDA's planting intentions report set for release on March 31. Traders have noted, though, that there is a long way to go between the crop being planted and harvested.


